## Out-Of-State Cowboys Arriving

The news of Tex Martin's Rodeo School, beginning its second session here this week, is beginning to have far-reaching effects.

Cowboys checking in this week at the Spearman headquarters come from Australia, California, Arizona and Nebraska. Most of the boys said they read about the school in the Rodeo Cowboys of America sports newspaper.

Tom Hansen, 23-year old son of a fruit farmer at Hollister, California said he came to the Spearman Rodeo School to improve his riding skill. Hansen began to perform in Junior rodeos when he was 13, went on to amateur riding and finally obtained a "permit" to carry an RCA card. He cannot own his RCA card until he has earned \$1,000. He said he would like to become a professional, and he felt the best teacher he knew of was "Tex Martin", instructor for the rodeo school in Spearman.

Hansen said he checked on Rodeo schools everywhere and would like to have attended one a little closer to home, but all his informants advised him that the Spearman school, with nationally famous Tex Martin as instructor, was the best on the circuit at this time.

Like the other would-be cowboys, Barry Martin of Tuscon, Ariz. read about the school in the RCA sports news. Martin (no relation to all the other Martins connected with the training school) said he had rode in various rodeos for the past three years. "But, I'm tired of just donating all my money to the cause--and I'd like to improve enough to be

able to earn some for a change."

Barry says he has no plans to become a professional rider--he just simply enjoys doing it.

The Martin Rodeo School is drawing other cowboys. Two more flew in from Scotts Bluff, Neb. Tuesday of this week, many of the local riders have enrolled to improve their riding techniques, or to iron out some of the wrinkles by practicing on the weaker points.

The school is open to everyone, whether you are a beginner anxious to learn the ropes from the very beginning, or an old pro eager to improve your ride.

The Martin Rodeo School, offers 14-day sessions, with daily riding sessions staged at 7 p.m. at the Spearman Rodeo Arena. Each cowboy gets a chance to ride proven bucking stock to practice whatever he desires--bareback broncs, saddle broncs or bulls.

James and Charles Martin furnish the stock, some 31 head of horses and as many bulls. This includes all types of stock from range Hereford bulls and gentle saddle horses to National Finals Rodeo stock. Some of the animals are plenty "salty."

Instructor Tex Martin, 7-times National finalist, says he is very pleased over the way the school is progressing and expects that the enrollment will pick up weekly, as the news travels.

Every Sunday evening at 7 p.m. a Jack-pot riding event is staged in the arena. Cowboys from all over the Panhandle have been driving over for this. Last Sunday evening, Rusty Tooley from Boise City, Okla. took home the top money. This event is open to every rider who wishes to enter.

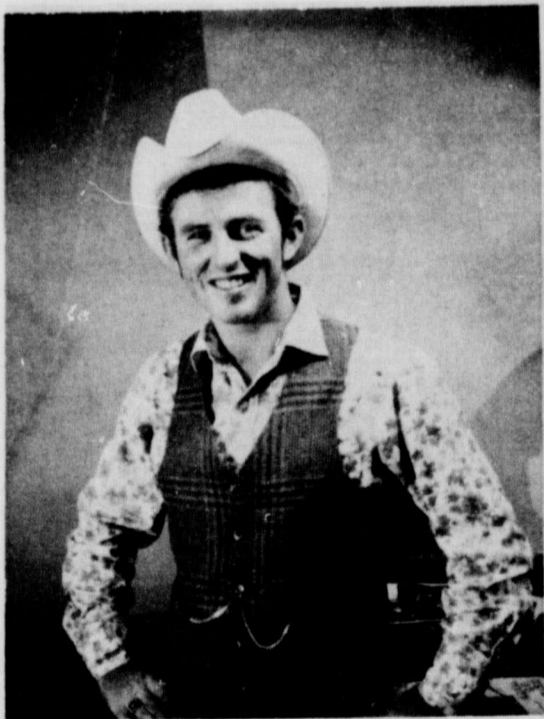

REAL ESTATE VALUES UP--  
 Advances in real estate values  
 made up 73 percent of 1970's  
 gain in farm and ranch assets

## County Agents Join VEE Fight

The Texas Agricultural  
 Extension Service has assumed  
 a vital cooperative role along-  
 side other agencies in the in-  
 tensifying battle against  
 Venezuelan Equine Encephal-  
 omyelitis (VEE)

At the request of the USDA  
 and the Texas Animal Health  
 Commission, Extension per-  
 sonnel are helping to perform  
 two major tasks, according  
 to B. F. Yeates, Extension horse  
 specialist. They are making  
 a daily dead horse count and  
 a daily sick horse count and  
 reporting to officials at different  
 locations. Their second job  
 is to organize a county plan  
 to assure that all horses are  
 vaccinated as quickly and  
 efficiently as possible.

Since the on-premise quar-  
 antine has been removed, this  
 means that in many instances  
 county agents will have to help  
 to set up vaccination clinics  
 and help arrange for horse-  
 owners to bring their animals  
 in so that the veterinarians  
 can quickly complete vaccina-  
 tions in their counties.

This involves having owners  
 available to sign a release when  
 the horses are vaccinated and  
 identifying owners of horses  
 left unattended in the county.  
 Yeates pointed out that these  
 absentee owners can cause  
 delays in the vaccination of  
 a large number of horses.

County Extension personnel  
 have been developing organiza-  
 tions involving veterinarians,  
 public health officials, and  
 others through groups which  
 were already functioning.  
 County agricultural agents  
 have involved their county  
 program building committees  
 and livestock and horse sub-  
 committees in efforts to coor-  
 dinate plans for their areas.

Many are working with  
 organizations as veterinarians,  
 associations and health  
 groups.

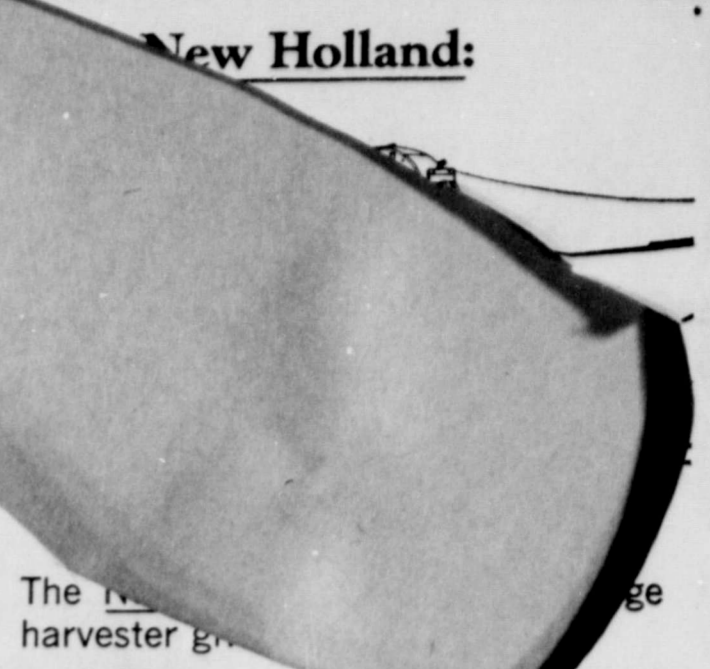
Yeates said that the  
 problem is creating a  
 awareness to make sure  
 all horses are vaccinated.  
 "The key to the success of the  
 program is the interested,  
 motivated, involved horsemen  
 who will assist the authorities  
 and make sure we have a  
 thorough and effective vaccina-  
 tion program," he commented.

He reminded horsemen that  
 there is ample vaccine avail-  
 able to vaccinate all horses in  
 the state and that the govern-  
 ment is providing the vaccine.  
 It must be administered by an  
 accredited veterinarian.

Interested horsemen should  
 contact their county Extension  
 office to find out the plan for  
 their county and to determine  
 how they can become involved  
 and be of assistance.

SALES AND SHIPMENTS--  
 Cattle and calves marketed  
 through Texas auctions during  
 May numbered 645,000 head,

**Telephone Workers Reject Contract**

San Angelo--Communication Workers of America has rejected a General Telephone Company of the Southwest offer for a new contract, according to a joint news release by the union and the company.

Talks Thursday following the rejection also included discussion of classification to towns and wage rates, details of board and lodging and hospitalization plan improvements. Negotiations are expected to continue.

**"Living Alone" On Rise In Co.**

A dramatic increase has taken place in Hansford County in recent years in the number of single people who are living alone and maintaining their own households.

These men and women--some young and some old--who would have been living with relatives or others in former years, are now able to swing it financially, by themselves. And, it appears they are getting great satisfaction out of their ability to do so.

In Hansford County, according to a study of data compiled in connection with the recent Census of Housing, no less than 15.4 percent of all dwelling units are now occupied by singles.

Throughout the United States as a whole, the percentage is 17.6. It is 16.7 percent in the West South Central States and 16.3 percent in the State of Texas.

Included in the "singles" category are people who have never married as well as divorced and widowed persons who have not remarried.

The extent of the change in the local area is to be seen by looking at comparable figures gathered 10 years ago. At that time only 7.2 percent of the units were

occupied by singles.

In most other parts of the country, similarly, there have been big increases in the number of one-person households.

As a result of this development, the average household is smaller than before. It declined from a median of 3.0 persons per unit to 2.7.

In Hansford County, the latest figures show, the number of one-person households is now 308, as compared with the 1960 total of 132.

Analysts offer a variety of explanations for these changes. They point to the rise in job opportunities for women, which has made them more self-sufficient economically.

Many more women are in the unattached state because of the rise in the number of widows and divorcees in the last decade. However, a bigger proportion of them have become self-supporting because of job availability, social security, pensions and other resources.

The living alone trend is growing rapidly, also, among young unmarried people, especially in the larger cities. More than a million of them now have their own places.

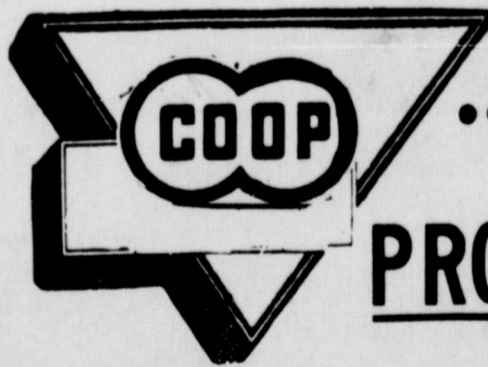

# Mail Costs To Hit \$91,160

To what extent are individuals and business firms in Spearman being affected by recent increase in postal rates? How much will it add to their costs in the present fiscal year?

It is estimated, on the basis of the latest figures on postal receipts in the local area, released by the government, that they will have to pony up an additional \$16,820 a year. That is approximately 21 per cent more than in the past fiscal year.

The increase went into effect on May 16th, despite court proceedings brought by newspaper and magazine publishers and others whose costs will be considerably higher as a result.

Under the rate rises announced by the new Postal Service its revenues will go up by \$1.45 billion in the current fiscal year.

The rate increases are the first to be put into effect since Congress voted to change the money-losing Post Office Department into an independent corporation, free of its control.

A major part of the \$1.45 billion, it is expected, will have to go for increased wages to the 750,000 postal workers in the service.

As far as the average Spearman resident is concerned, the principal effect of the rate changes is that now he has to put 8-cent stamps on letters instead of 7 cents, 11 cents on air mail letters rather than 10 cents and 6 cents on postcards, instead of 5 cents.

If he mails just one letter a day throughout the year his postal costs will be \$7.30 more than they were in 1970.

Also hit by the higher rates are local businesses that use other classes of mail service. For second class, which applies chiefly to magazines and newspapers, the present rate amounts to 20 percent.

The bulk rate in third class and the rate for books and records, which come under fourth class, have also been advanced.

In Spearman, the cost of stamps and other postal services has been \$75,340 a year, according to the latest annual figures.

In the present fiscal year, under the new rates, this will rise to an estimated \$91,160.

On a national basis, the increase is expected to bring the Postal Service's annual revenue to \$8.3 billion.

# Junior Rodeo

The Junior Rodeo which was previously scheduled and canceled because of the VEE ban on moving horses, has been rescheduled for Friday and Saturday, August 6 and 7.

It must be stressed, that contestants must have their VEE vaccination slip with them when transporting their horse in case there are requests made for proof of inoculation.

Bailey Patterson and Roy Hawkins, local teen-agers are promoting the event. The two performance rodeo (one go-round) is set for 8 p.m. nightly at the Spearman Rodeo Arena.

Entries will be accepted up to show time each evening.

Boys aged 14-18, who attended school last term, may enter events with a fee of \$10 each, excluding team roping which costs \$20.

Entry fee for girls aged 14-18 will be \$7.50 for barrel racing, pole bending and goat tying.

Boys 13 and under may enter steer riding and shieland pony race for \$7.50 each event.

Girls 13 and under will pay a fee of \$7.50 for barrel racing.

Bill Hext is furnishing 20 head of horses and bulls each night. First come, first served basis.

To receive the buckle for the all-round boy contestant, he must enter at least 3 events. Girls must enter at least two. All ties will be flipped off at the time buckles are awarded Saturday night.

Young cow-hands who are interested in performing in this junior rodeo, may obtain entry blanks from either of the two promoters named above.

A concessions stand will be open at the arena both nights.



# Archer Talks At Rotary

Guest speaker at the regular noon meeting of the Spearman Rotary Club this past Monday was Carl Archer telling the story of Hansford Feed Yard Inc.

The speaker noted that the Feed Yard presently employs forty two employees.

On the subject of taxes he reported the school tax is about five cents per head per month and County tax is 3¢ per head monthly. He further stated that school taxes were paid at the rate of approximately \$5,000.00 yearly.

Archer asserted that the lot purchases everything possible within the county.

He mentioned a number of packing houses that are currently buying feed from the lot. These buyers included Missouri and Iowa beef, Swift High Plains and Wilson.

Carl went into some detail as to the reception and care of cattle after arrival. He noted that new animals were constantly watched for the first thirty days on the lot.

Dr. Garnett who is D.V.M. for the lot asserted that all new arrivals were wormed and put through a dipping vat. He also stated that a nutritionist makes a constant check on all feeds in order to insure a properly balanced diet.

Archer passed out a number of copies of "Beef Extra" a publication of Farm Journal Inc. The issue contained a very interesting story about the formation and operation of the Feed lot.

During the question and answer session, the speaker explained that it was possible for a group of men to pool their resources in order to feed a pen or several pens of cattle.

He explained that the stockholders grow most of the grain and have adequate storage capacity due to the fact that both President Archer and Vice President Jack Hart both are elevator owners.

Silage, he stated is a little harder to get in the area inasmuch 50,000 ton quantities are needed at a time.

In reply to a request from Mayor Hackley for a one cent per head city tax, Archer replied he would gladly comply provided the city would take over all the pollution problems of the lot.



# Morse Girls In USAF Training

# TECH STUDENTS MUST HAVE DIPHTHERIA SHOT

Texas Tech University officials announced Friday (July 23) that new legislation requiring specific immunizations for students will mean a change in policy at the University.

Students enrolling for the fall semester will be allowed to enter with the provision that immunizations are begun before Jan. 1, 1972, and all are completed as soon after that date as medically feasible.

Effective with the spring 1972 semester, and continuing thereafter, new enrollees (those not previously enrolled in the summer or fall 1971 semesters) who have not completed the required immunizations at time of enrollment, must complete them as soon as is medically feasible.

Students in institutions of higher education must have had a minimum of three injections of diphtheria and tetanus with the last dose within 10 years and one small pox vaccination within the past 10 years. At least three doses of oral polio vaccine are required for students who have not reached their nineteenth birthday.

Recommended implementation procedures and an outline of current regulations were recently provided to the State's colleges and universities by the Texas State Department of Health and the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

## Home Demonstration Age

Five Hansford County 4-H'ers attended and participated in District I electric leadership camp at Scottsdale 4-H camp in New Mexico. Attending the activity sponsored by Southwestern Public Service were Barbara Farr and Mary Kibler of Spearman, Marty Rasor, John Hardesty, and Johnny Armes of Crouver. The Home Demonstration clubs of Hansford County helped sponsor this group by assisting with transportation costs. Participants attended classes on lighting, wiring, heating, foods, and personal appliances as well as participating in recreation, tournaments, ceremonies, etc.

Want to share with you some recipes from the foods session. Many of you probably have been enjoying fondue since it became popular in the United States a few years ago. The basic types of fondue are meat, cheese and dessert. Many people prefer dessert fondue though the cheese variety was the first to gain widespread popularity.

**SWISS FONDUE:** Heat one 10 oz. can cream of mushroom soup in fondue pot. Add 8-10 oz. grated Swiss cheese and 1 teaspoon dry mustard. Stir occasionally until cheese melts. Serve with cubes of French bread, crisp crackers bread sticks or apple slices.

**MINT CHOCOLATE FONDUE:** Melt one 6 oz. package mint milk chocolate chips and 1/4 to 1/3 cup milk in fondue pot. Amount of milk depends on how thin you wish the fondue. Pineapple chunks, mandarin oranges, peaches, cherries, bananas, marshmallows, cubes of pound cake or angel food cake are delicious dipped into the chocolate sauce.

Let your imagination be your guide in making fondue and selecting foods to dip.

Another delicious recipe for crab lovers is crabbie dip. Mix together one 8 oz. package cream cheese, 1 teaspoon minced onion, 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind, 1 teaspoon horseradish, 2 tablespoons milk, 2 tablespoons

lemon juice, and a dash paprika. Add one 8 oz. can crab meat, drained, 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup crackers. Makes 2 cups.
