Ranchers Must Re-record All Livestock Brands

Fort Worth -- All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be rerecorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971 according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature, reports Frank H. Lewis, President of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971 through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are entropy; usin he added. Ifter this time, any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "firstcome" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark re-

corded in his name. It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording with the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than

it must be recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording

of that brand. There is no limit to the number of brands and/or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and rerecording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have mar's or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or rerecorded as ovided by the new law.

The County Clerk of each county shall have this act published in some newspaper of general circulation in the county for a period of 30 days. The act shall be published on the effective date, August 30, 1971, and

It is the obligation of the County Clerk to assure that no more than one brand of a kind be recorded on the same location of the animal in each county. Therefore, no two people in a county may record the same brand in the same location. It is also the responsibility of the County Clerk to make certain that in recording any brand for a person, that the part of that animal on which the brand is to be placed be designated. Failure to do so is punishable by a fineable offense of not less than \$10 or more than \$50.

(Article 1486 P.C. The law as outlined above applies to all counties in the State of Texas and shall take precedence over any special statutes heretofore applying to individual counties pertaining to recording and rerecording of brands.





20,000 steers provide some 80 tons of waste daily. California cattle feeders must not furnish much food for their cattle, for in Texas we are told that 10,000 cattle in a feedlot can produce some 260 tons of solid waste daily. But, you know Texas! Bigger, better, probably even more mal-

Anyway, this California man had a problem of what to do with all this stuff. It was costing him \$40 a day to haul it off. So he took his dung problem to USCA engineers and their collaboration has resulted in a new product. Optimists say this "end" product could revolutionize the construction industry and strike a blow for cleaner environment. By mixing treated dung with recycled glass and then heating it, the stuff turns into bricks. The ceramic-like product won't burn, can be painted, drilled and sawed. It's suitable for roofing, structural blocks, water pipes, acousti-cal tiles and walls, (they swear it is completely odorless.) rind pickles. Here is a recipe if you wish to make some. 4 Quarts prepared watermelon rind (trim dark skin and pink flesh from thick rind and cut into 1" pieces

or as desired). 1 cup salt or lime, 2 quarts cold water, 2 Table spoons whole cloves, 3 sticks cinnamon 2 pieces gingerroot, 1 limon, 8 cups sugar, 1 qut white vinegar, 1 quart water.

Dissolve lime or salt in 2 quarts cold water; Pour over rind. Add more water, if needed to cover rind. Let stand 2 hours if lime is used or 6 hours if salt is used. Drain, rinse and cover rind with cold water. Cook until tender; drain. Tie spices in a thin cloth bag, add other ingredients and simmer 10 minutes. Add watermelon rind and simmer until clear. Add boiling water if syrup becomes too thick before rind is clear. Remove spice bag. Pack boiling boiling into hot jars, leaving 1" head space; close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing time when water returns to boil. Makes 6 pints.

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




