

1971 LYNX FOOTBALL



SPEARMAN LYNX have been having twice-a-day scrimmage sessions this week preparing for their September 10 opening game against Sunray, 8:00 P.M. there.

That old pigskin smell is in the air in Spearman, with several events heralding the coming of football season. Pre-season magazines hit the newsstands a few weeks ago, followed by letters from coaches to players, football schedule signs and the starting of the workouts.

The annual summer workouts began Monday, August 16th, for local gridiron hopefuls. Head Coach Clark Mires expects some 65 High School footballers to report for the two-a-day drills. About 30 varsity players, and 35 junior varsity charges are anticipated for this first week's activity.

Workout schedules begin early each morning for the gridders, and close each evening with a 6 p.m. workout. "Skull" sessions and training will be worked in with conditioning, and new coaching techniques, by the al-

most "all new" coaching staff at Spearman High School. During the summer practices, Coach Mires will concentrate his efforts on an overall team effort, with plenty of accent on offense.

Although pre-season pollsters have a doubtful success at picking district winners, the annual selections stir fans all over the state. Such is the case this year, as the Lynx are tagged as the No. 4 team in the district; Dalhart is 1, Phillips 2, and Panhandle is 3rd in the un-official coaches poll so far this year.

This actually has taken all of the pressure off of the Lynx coaching staff, as most fans think they do face a re-building program this year. The Spearman coaches have been working hard, and an un-believable 60 to 70 boys are going to be on the squads this year.

Head coach Clark Mires will handle the back-field;

Ken Friemel, will handle the line; Dan Truelove will be defensive coordinator; Allen Simpson, line coach; E.C. Jenkins, defensive coach; and Don Drummond will work with Jr. High football, and varsity defense during the 2-a-day summer workouts.

If we were going to pick a starting lineup for the Lynx this year, here's how we would pick: Quarterback, Beedy 175 lbs.; H. B. Latham 164 lbs.; Full-back Brock 185; Center Brown, 190; Guard Driscoll and Holland and Kunkel all weighing around 170 lbs; Tackles Upchurch 173 and Kelp 168; Ends, Woolley 160, Schell 155, Floyd 150.

School Budget Is Approved

Spearman school pupils, some not too enthusiastic over settling down to another school term, enrolled at all schools this morning, Thursday, August 19. School buses ran, cafeterias were open and the first all-day session of the new year got underway.

The 1971-72 school budget calls for total expenditures of \$1,173,781.00 as compared with last year's expenditures of \$1,133,999.00. \$33,000 of this increase is in teacher's salaries, so it is easy to see that the budget has been only slightly increased over last year.

The Spearman school board

approved the 1971-72 budget at a meeting held recently. The board had earlier announced a lowering of the tax rate from the previous \$1.65 per \$100 valuation, to a \$1.47 rate.

The total valuation of property in the district rose from \$52,768,000 last year to \$59,000,000.

The cost of the proposed new field house, which will be approximately \$30,000,000 will be charged against the 1970-71 school budget because the contract will be let before September 1; so this figure was not included in the new budget.

New State Law Makes Jury Wheel Mandatory

EXEMPTIONS HAVE BEEN ELIMINATED

The first jury wheel in Hansford county history will go into action August 31, when the jury will be selected for the September term of District court.

As a result of an error by the Texas Legislature, all counties in the state this year will use a jury wheel in selection of juries for both county and district courts.

Names of all qualified voters have been prepared on

cards and placed inside the wheel. Juries will be drawn out by lot, much as the drawings for a community lottery.

In the past, venues have been selected from a list of prospects selected by a jury commission.

Although the new law did not set out to eliminate jury commissions except in counties having more than 10,000 or more population it did so.

Attorney General Crawford Martin issued a legal opinion on July 14 in which he held that all counties must comply with the new law. He said all laws pertaining to jury commissions have been wiped off the books.

The law requires that the Sheriff, County & District Clerk and Tax Collector shall meet sometime each year between August 1 and August 15 and prepare the wheel.

This required, in Hansford County, a meeting of Sheriff J. B. Cooke, District & County Clerk Norma Jean Covel, Tax Assessor deputy Vicld Warren and District Judge Max Boyer. This group met August 10 to place the prepared list of qualified voters name cards inside the wheel box. Qualified voters under 21 years of age cannot serve on a jury, but all other voter's names in Hansford county have been placed inside the wheel.

The jury wheel must be of solid exterior and must have

two locks with the sheriff having one key and the district clerk the other. Cards placed in the wheel must be of uniform size and color. The wheel is to be turned so that the cards are thoroughly mixed before the venire is selected.

After the cards are drawn out of the wheel, the jury list is prepared and prospective jurors are notified.

Those who are exempt from jury service have been greatly reduced by law. Only those persons over 65 years of age and women who have legal custody of a child or children under the age of ten years are now exempt.

The law specifically eliminates any consideration of economic factors.

The law did have a long list of exemptions including ministers, doctors, undertakers, butchers, teachers, newspaper workers, firemen, policemen, women with children under 16, public officials and many other exemptions. But all have been eliminated with the exception of people over 65, and women with children under 10.

Sheriff Cooke said that on August 31, he and Clerk Mrs. Covel, will draw the names of jurors for the September court term which convenes September 13.

"The Jury commission will then meet and select the 20 grand jurors from the regular voter list", he said.
