New Coach Takes Reins



The big varsity game at Sunray Friday night, will be a test of the new "Mires Lynx footballers." The new Spearman coach, and his staff have already impressed everyone that they have come in contact with. The Sunray-Spearman game will be a rather hard obstacle for the new coach to overcome. Sunray always plays well anywhere and especially at home. Fans, however, will be assured of a fine game, if they will "show up" in Sunray Friday night at the 8 p. m. kickoff!

Members of this year's varsity will be one of the finest group of boys that the town has ever seen. They are a well disciplined, football-loving group of kids, and they love and respect their coaches. The coaches this year are Clark Mires, the new head coach and athletic director, Dan Truelove, defensive coordinator, and well-known Spearman coach who was here last year. Allen Simpson, our head basketball coach, will coach the ends and linebackers on this year's team. Allen was with the Lynx last year also. New interior line coach is Ken Friemel from Groom. This will be Ken's first year at Spearman. E. C. Jenkins, is back with the Lynx this year, and will coach the backs. Don Drummond, will handle the 8th grade team, and do the scouting for the Lynx.

Cheerleaders this year are Amy Renner, Donita Floyd, Suelen Womble, Sharon Lambert, Kathy Brown, and Debbie Gregg. These "pretty" Lynx girls will "put the pep" in the pep squad and Lynx fans, as well as being the No. 1 boosters for the Lynx team.

Managers this year are Garry Harnish, Jim Tope, Eugene Barnes, and Curtis Hayes. The managers are a very important part of the team operations, and assist the players and coaches at every scrimmage and during the games.

Superintendent of the Spearman school system is James Cunningham, who is very active in his community as well as at the school. James is an "enthusiastic" football fan and never misses a game. Principal Kenneth McKay, high school principal, is likewise an enthusiastic Lynx fan, and will be on hand at all of the games. Band directors Mickey Owens and Frank Porter will furnish the half-time shows, with their sweepstakes band.

The varsity players are as follows: Quarterbacks Jerry Pat Davis and Scott Beedy. Davis weighs in at 145 lbs and Scott Beedy at 170 lbs. Both these boys show plenty of leadership and ability. Joe Bob Grayson weighs in at 175 lbs, and will be a real ball-toter this year.

He is a cinch to hold down one of the halfback slots Friday night at Sunray. Adrian Barrera is another fullback for the Lynx and he tips the scales at 180 lbs. Mike Cook, one of the fine scatterbacks for the Lynx weighs in at 140 lbs. Tommy Brinkley is another 180 lb. back, and Kim Brock, who was one of our offensive stars late in the season last year, will be starting at 180 lbs. Scott Latham, the "quickest" starter in the backfield, will weigh a solid 160 lbs. at Sunray Friday night. Scott is the leading scorer and ball carrier in the scrimmage games so far this year, and was plenty flashy last year. Mike Floyd, "Mr. Sticky Fingers" has had to rest because of an injury earlier this year, but will be ready for limited action soon. Reagan Baker is another fine 145 lb. back for the Lynx, who plays both offense and defense. Gary Upchurch was a fine ball player last year, and will be a 180 lb. starting tackle for the Lynx. Ricky Driscoll has been the most promising player, rather one of the most promising on the team, because of attitude and hustle. Ricky is big (175 lbs.) and plenty capable. Jay Holland has been injured almost all of the spring training, but will be plenty capable when he heals up. Jay weighs a whopping 180 lbs. Billy Pettitt, a tough little 135 lb. guard, will be ready Friday night, and is quick as the motorcycle he rides. Brent Wheeler, will also be plenty capable, as another 150 lb. speedy guard. Kim Kelp, well known to the local fans, will be another big 170 lb. tackle, ready to claw the Bobcats at Sunray Friday night. Billy Brown, Spearman's biggest player, will tip the scales at 180 lbs. and anchor in the middle of the line at the center position. Billy is quick enough to play tennis, and could be a stand-out star for the Lynx. Terry Innis is a 155 lb. guard, and will be plenty active with the Lynx. Lonnie Lusby, is another one of the Lushy boys who knows how to play the game, and like his older brother, should be a 180 lb. star tackle. Joe Woolley is one of our fine 165 lb. ends. Joey is fast, has good hands, and is experienced. He will be ready for Sunray Friday night. Ranch Schell, is another star end and pass catcher, as well as being a fine defensive player. Tony Barrera is another 150 lb. end for the Lynx. Lee Cooper finishes up the Lynx squad for the year and he is a 145 lb. end for the Lynx. You will not be disappointed with the Lynx this year—plan to attend every game.

Students Still Enrolling

School officials projected that more students will enroll for the 1971-72 school term following Labor Day holidays. New students did enroll class Tuesday morning. However, principals have been yet to enroll a number of custom grain cutters who follow the harvest. Then move back to school for the school term. People have not yet returned home, and when they do several more students will enroll to class rolls. School rolls at Spearman High

School show that there are 101 Freshman students, 99 Sophomores, 79 Juniors and 62 Seniors. Two new students entered SHS Tuesday morning and are included in the above figures. 350 SHS students were listed on the rolls at the end of the school term last year. In Junior High, Principal Eddy Clemmons said there were 105 fifth graders, 92 in the sixth grade, 100 in the seventh and 101 in the eighth. Enrollment in Junior High is up from 375 at the end of school last term, showing a current total of 398. One new student enrolled

at the Elementary campus Tuesday, bringing the total to 384. Several more students are expected in the lower grades when harvest workers return home. There are 90 first graders this year; 89 second graders; 104 in third grade rooms; 91 in the fourth and 10 students in the Special Classes. Elementary enrollment is down from the total of 415 at the end of last year's term. As of September 7, Spearman's school enrollment is off some 17 students from the count made when school ended last May.

Don Beck's Crew Could Be Tough Game For Spearman!

New coach Clark Mires of Spearman will have to be rated as an underdog, when he meets Don Beck's crew at Sunray Friday night. Coach Mires and his Lynx, will be facing Sunray's big strong all-star quarterback Rick Keith, a six foot, 191 pound senior. Plus, veteran running back Kenny Keisling, a 155 pound senior and Rick Taylor, a 150 pounder. A surprise for the Lynx this Friday night, will be Freight Train "Mark Greer" who weighs in at 210 lbs. Greer will probably be the bulldozer for the Bobcats, and will test the Lynx defense. In case Greer isn't big enough Coach Beck might throw Joe Caudle, a 240 pounder against the Lynx,

although Caudle is expected to see only line action, and no running chores. However, Sunray's major strength will be in the fabulous passing of their all-state candidate quarterback, Ricky Keith. The Bobcats do lack speed, and most sports fans feel that the Lynx line will be able to cope with the Cats running game. But, the passing arm of Keith will keep fans in a "state of shock" all night. "Crazy-Corners" name still fits . . .

Accidents were so frequent at the 5-street intersection off by the Equity Elevator that city law enforcement officers dubbed it "crazy corners" several years ago. Time after time the City of Spearman appealed to the Texas Highway Department for traffic lights at the highway intersection, and each time traffic counts were made the city was notified "traffic does not warrant lights."

However, it can still be called "crazy corners". The wreck which occurred there Tuesday afternoon is a perfect example. Traffic coming off Kenneth Street and Gruver highway get a green light to travel, but traffic turning off Kenneth to the Borger highway must turn in front of traffic coming off Gruver highway. This is what happened Tuesday.

Vehicles involved included a pickup driven by Harold Ellison and a car driven by Charles Dean McLain. Both vehicles were heavily damaged but no one was injured, other than minor cuts. Drivers have difficulty determining which "go signal" is theirs. Many think the green lights should be set to let more traffic through. . . when the light turns green, there is time for about 3 vehicles to get through the intersection before the light switches to red, the rest must wait through another light change. So, city officials continue to caution motorists about the crazy "Crazy corner."

6th Grade Student Dies Suddenly Here!

David Lee Gaither, 11 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gaither of Spearman and a 6th grader in Junior High School, died about 9:40 a.m. Wednesday morning at school.

David Lee was on the school ground during his P.E. period where students were having "tests," such as soft ball throw, pull ups, etc. David had thrown the soft ball twice, and had completed his 2 pull-ups on the monkey bar. He was sitting on the ground resting while other boys finished their turn. According to school officials, David just slumped over. The coach ran to him, then called the school nurse. They placed the child in a car and rushed him to Hansford Hospital. He was dead on arrival.

Funeral arrangements are pending with Boxwell Brothers Funeral Home of Spearman.

The attending physician said, in his opinion that the P.E. program had nothing to do with the child's death. "It would have happened if the child was walking down the street, or playing in his own yard," the doctor said. At present time, the cause of death is unknown and will not be known until autopsy reports are available.

 THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF HANSFORD CITY OF SPEARMAN ORDINANCE #348
 An ordinance providing for the regulation of the collection of refuse in the City of Spearman, Texas, being an ordinance adopted for the preservation of the health, sanitation and safety of the public; providing for the collection, removal and disposal of refuse within the City of Spearman, Texas; requiring all owners, occupants, tenants, lessees or other users of property within the City of Spearman, Texas to use receptacles for refuse; specifying the size of receptacles and the removal of the contents thereof at regular intervals; prohibiting the burning of refuse within the city limits of the City of Spearman, Texas without approval; providing reasonable charges to be made for refuse collection services; providing a monthly statement of charges for such services to be mailed to the person, firm or corporation receiving such services; providing for discontinuance of city services in the event of failure to pay for services within ten days after billing; providing for the removal of dead animals from the City of Spearman, Texas; providing for distribution of receptacles by the City; fixing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; providing a savings clause and declaring an emergency.

also an extra \$10,000 as "double indemnity," payable in case of accidental death.
 However, a court denied the extra \$10,000, saying Harvey's death was not really an accident at all. The court said he was well aware when he sought out the angry husband, that he had an excellent chance of being killed.
 Double indemnity for accidental death is a common feature in life insurance policies. But it is not payable if the victim had recklessly courted danger.
 This is true even if what he did was simply in the name of fun. Thus, double indemnity was denied to the family of a young man slain in a game of "William Tell." In a spirit of playfulness, he had allowed a friend to shoot at a tin can on top of his head.
 "One who volunteers his head for such an experience," said the judge, "must anticipate injury."
 Suppose the act was dangerous, but the danger was not apparent at the time. Then, as a rule, the death would still be considered accidental. For example:
 A motorist skidded into a ditch. While waiting for a tow truck, he ran the motor to keep his heater going. What he failed to realize was that the end of the exhaust pipe was trapped in a mud puddle, causing deadly carbon monoxide gas to seep into the car. Result: he was dead by the time the tow truck arrived.
 Was this accidental? Yes, ruled a court, awarding double indemnity to the victim's family. The court said his conduct could fairly be judged only by what he knew at the time, not by the wisdom of hindsight.

 When it comes to removing stains from and giving new glow to your home and property, every homemaker and her husband should be "Johnnie on the spot." Here are some hints that will achieve success for both men and women who apply themselves.
 Equal parts of turpentine and ammonia will remove paint from clothing even if the paint has hardened.
 Sometimes, bathtub stains just do not take a household cleaning. Especially the stains caused by the rusty pipes which some apartments have. Fill the tub with water, add lots of bleach and let this stand overnight. The next morning you will have a sparkling clean tub. If your rubber mats are badly stained, throw them in, too.
 To get graphite (from lead pencils) out of nylon and dacron uniforms, apply the type of hand soap that mechanics use. Scrub with a soft brush.
 If a third of a cup of vinegar is poured in your baby bottle sterilizer and left to soak overnight, it will remove the mineral and rust deposits.
 You can remove yellow from treated white cotton shirts by using color removers that come in boxes. Follow directions on the box, using only enough for one shirt at a time. One package will whiten four or five shirts, depending on size. This works on dacron and cotton, too.
 Here's a hint to the man of the house: Just as your wife wouldn't use a paper towel to clean fine silver, you shouldn't use anything but Chamois to dry and polish your car. It has an extraordinary ability to absorb and disperse quantities of water approximately seven times its own weight. It can be used wet on cars, boats, windows, mirrors, walls and chrome... and dry on silver, stainless steel and jewels. Pick some up at automotive accessory stores, hardware stores, department stores, chain and discount stores, and supermarkets.
 Heed these hints and you'll have a bright future both inside and outside your home.

We knew that people in bygone days had had some queer notions that there were actually such creatures, with supernatural power received from below, but that was all something that we, in our enlightened age, had outgrown. It was just preposterous.
 But recently, on three very popular television shows which are seen nationally, I saw and heard women who very clearly and unequivocally said that they were witches.

 Articles on witchcraft have been appearing in major magazines such as Time, Life, and Look Look magazine, dated August 24, this year, contains an article which says in a headline, "Witches are surfacing everywhere, practicing rituals once punishable by death."
 There has been an effort to popularize the concept that witchcraft is divided into two sections — black and white. Black witchcraft is supposed to be evil, while white witchcraft is said to be good.
 One of the best-known witches now is Louise Huebner, of whom it has been said that she casts "only good spells." But in her book, "Power through Witchcraft," she tells about her "sexual seduction spell." And she has an LP record called, "Seduction through Witchcraft." This is good?

come a "captain of devils." Persuading two of his young friends to assist him, he went with them to a pond in a suburban area. After conducting a ritual service to Satan, he asked his friends to bind his hands and feet with adhesive tape and push him into the pond. They did according to the report, and he sank out of sight. His body was recovered three days later.
 The young man, his friends said, believed that he would turn to earth as a "captain of devils" if killed in this way.

 What is the truth? Is witchcraft real? Are there witches who actually have occult power? If this power exists, where does it come from?
 The Bible has never indicated that witches were non-existent. Witchcraft is mentioned in the Scriptures as evil origin and producing evil effects.
 The people of Israel were cautioned by Moses, "Thou shalt not learn to do after the abominations of those nations. They shall not be found among you; any one... that uses divination... or an enchanter, or a witch... for all that do these things are an abomination unto the Lord."
 God's command was "Thou shalt not suffer a witch to live."
 The Bible does not cast doubt on the reality of the evil occult power of genuine witches.
 There may, of course, be false among witches, who claim to possess powers that they do not have. So it is possible that there are some who do not really have any extraordinary power to influence people or events.

NEWS FROM YOUR

Home Demonstration Agent

This month I'm enjoying meeting many more of the home demonstration club members as I give the programs to their clubs. Do want to encourage any of you who are not club members to visit a club or organize a new club. If you'll call me I'll be glad to help you to do this. There are many interesting and exciting programs planned for this year. These include new clothing accessories, common poisonous plants, Christmas decoration workshop, defensive driving course, home furnishings home study course, furniture refinishing workshop, keeping foods safe to eat and many more.

Quite a few of you are getting my monthly newsletter. This will include new recipes, sometimes patterns, home-making hints, etc. If any of you would like to be added to the mailing list for this newsletter please call or come by and we'll be glad to add your name.

Meal planning and preparation are one of the homemakers jobs that takes a lot of time and often becomes tedious and then neglected. We do need to each remember that well planned meals can be preventive medicine. This is especially important to keep in mind as fall and cooler weather approaches.

Each day we need to include foods from the basic four food groups. Just as a matter of review lets discuss these briefly. The milk group is important to provide calcium for strong bones and teeth. Everyone should have 2 to 4 servings daily. These may be obtained as fluid milk, cheese or ice cream. The meat group provides protein for muscle development. Each of us needs 2 or more servings daily of meat, fish, poultry, eggs, dry beans or peanut butter. The fruit and vegetable group is often neglected by homemakers. Four or more servings are needed daily. One of these should be a citrus fruit to provide vitamin C. Every other day a dark green, leafy or yellow vegetable should be served to provide Vitamin A.

The last group probably most of us get more than enough servings. This is the bread and cereal group. Four or more servings a day are needed. This includes bread, rolls, biscuits, macaroni, rice, cooked and dry cereals. Then of course we all know we need some other foods to round out our menus. These include oils, sweets, jams, jellies, etc.

It may help you plan meals if you will keep these points in mind. Include a variety of foods each day and from day to day. Introduce a new food from time to time. Try to have some meat, poultry, fish, eggs, milk or cheese at each meal. Vary flavors and textures. Contrast strong flavor with mild, sweet with sour. Combine crisp textures with soft. When possible have different sizes and shapes of food in a meal. Brighten food with color—a slice of tomato, a carrot curl, a sprig of greens or other garnish. And make a collection of nutritious recipes that your family enjoys and serve them often.

If you want additional information on meal planning and recipes call or come by the extension office and we'll share our recipe collection with you. Do want to share a recipe with you now that is both nutritious and economical. It would be excellent as an after school snack accompanied with a glass of fresh cold milk.

NO-BAKE CHOCOLATE OATMEAL COOKIES
2 cups sugar 1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup oleo 1/3 cup cocoa
3 cups quick cooking oatmeal
1/2 cup peanut butter

Combine sugar, milk, oleo and cocoa in saucepan. Heat to boil stirring to dissolve sugar. Boil one (1) minute. Remove from heat. Mix in oats and peanut butter. Drop by teaspoon full onto waxed paper. Makes 30 cookies.

WT's Nursing Program Draws Large Class

CANYON, Tex.--West Texas State University's new baccalaureate program in nursing opened the fall semester with an unexpectedly large enrollment, Mrs. Eunice King, acting head of the Department of Nursing, said Saturday.

The four-year program leading to a bachelor's degree is a cooperative effort of the university and the Amarillo Hospital District.

Mrs. King said that 95 persons registered in the new program during the regular registration period ended Aug. 28 and late registrators could bring the total to about 100.

"When the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System approved the baccalaureate program for West Texas State last year, it was projected that 40 to 50 students would enroll the first year," Mrs. King said.

Ten of the students who enrolled were granted scholarships under the \$20,000 appropriated by the 1971 Legislature to the university for such tuition grants.

The first nursing class included students from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas and 25 West Texas towns. Amarillo had 25 students and Canyon had five.

LAKE SIDE LAB FOR CLARENDON COLLEGE STUDENTS

CLARENDON--Mr. Bill Elerbrook, chairman of the Science Division at Clarendon College, stated today the Biology Department of Clarendon College has secured a site located on the Greenbelt Lake north of Clarendon. This site will serve several purposes.

First, it will be a study site for biology research, dealing with marine life, where the student will collect specimens, study them, and preserve them for future reference. This will give the student a more realistic view of marine life.

Second, it will serve as a relic and artifact area with the site undisturbed compared to the changes in the surrounding area. Thirdly, this site will serve as a research area giving the student practical experience with the methods and tools of biological research.

Greenbelt Lake is a relatively new lake and the research will serve as on-going biology history. This lab site will be used extensively by the Biology Department to stress the study of our environment and man's relationship to it.

A number of men enrolled in the program since nursing, traditionally a woman's field, is increasingly recognized as a most advantageous profession for men," Mrs. King said.

The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare has estimated that one million registered nurses (RN) will be needed by 1975, the year West Texas State's first class will be graduated.

Mrs. King said that critical shortages exist in the fields where baccalaureate preparation is required--nursing education, supervision, administration and clinical specialization.

She added that in 1970 there were 1,244 budgeted faculty positions vacant in schools of nursing in the United States.

At a recent Coordinating Board meeting on the campus of West Texas State, the board approved the appointment of Mrs. King to a 16-member advisory committee for its nursing education program.

The committee will study the present status of nursing education in Texas and make recommendations to meet the changing needs in health care.

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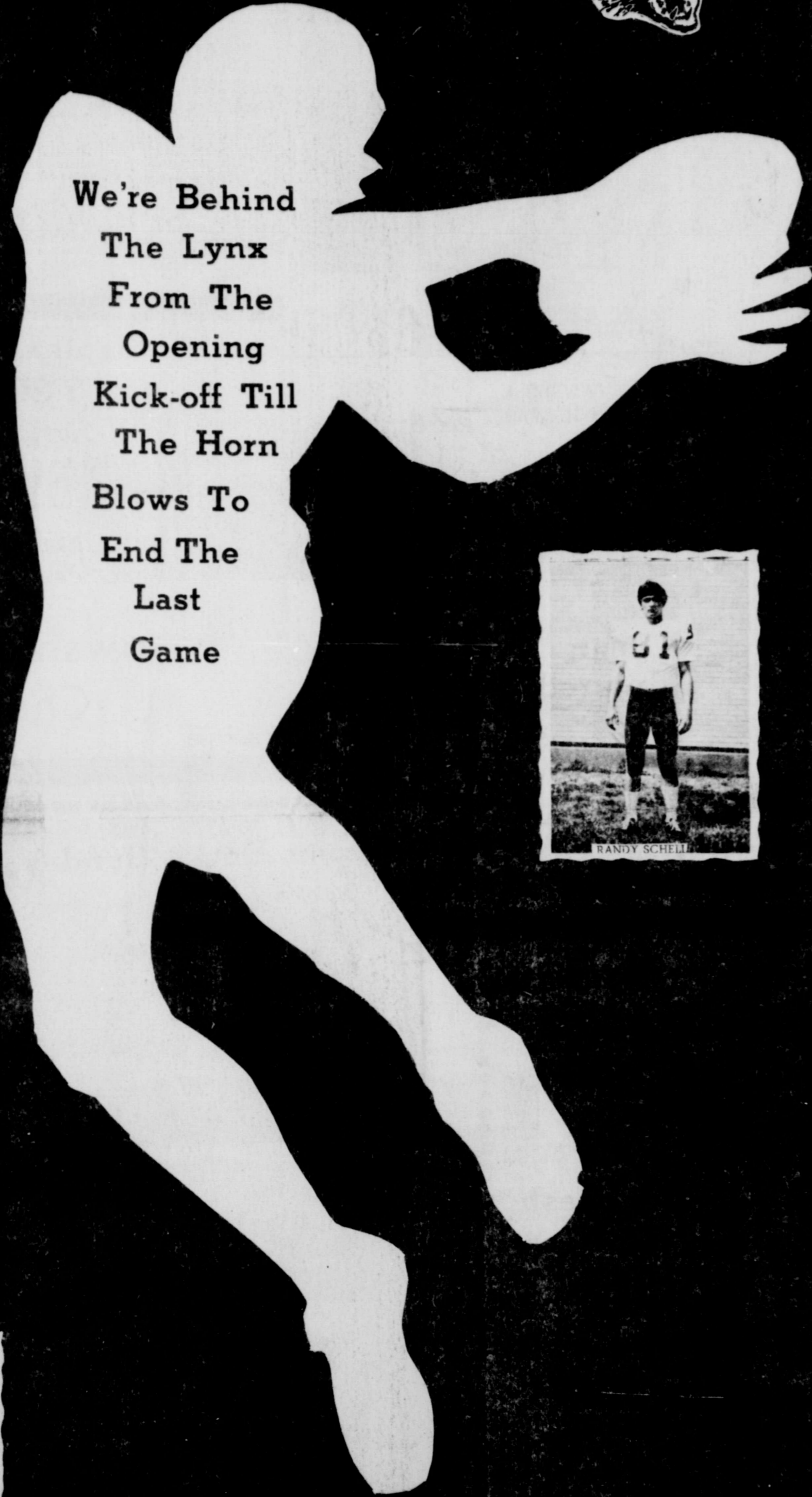

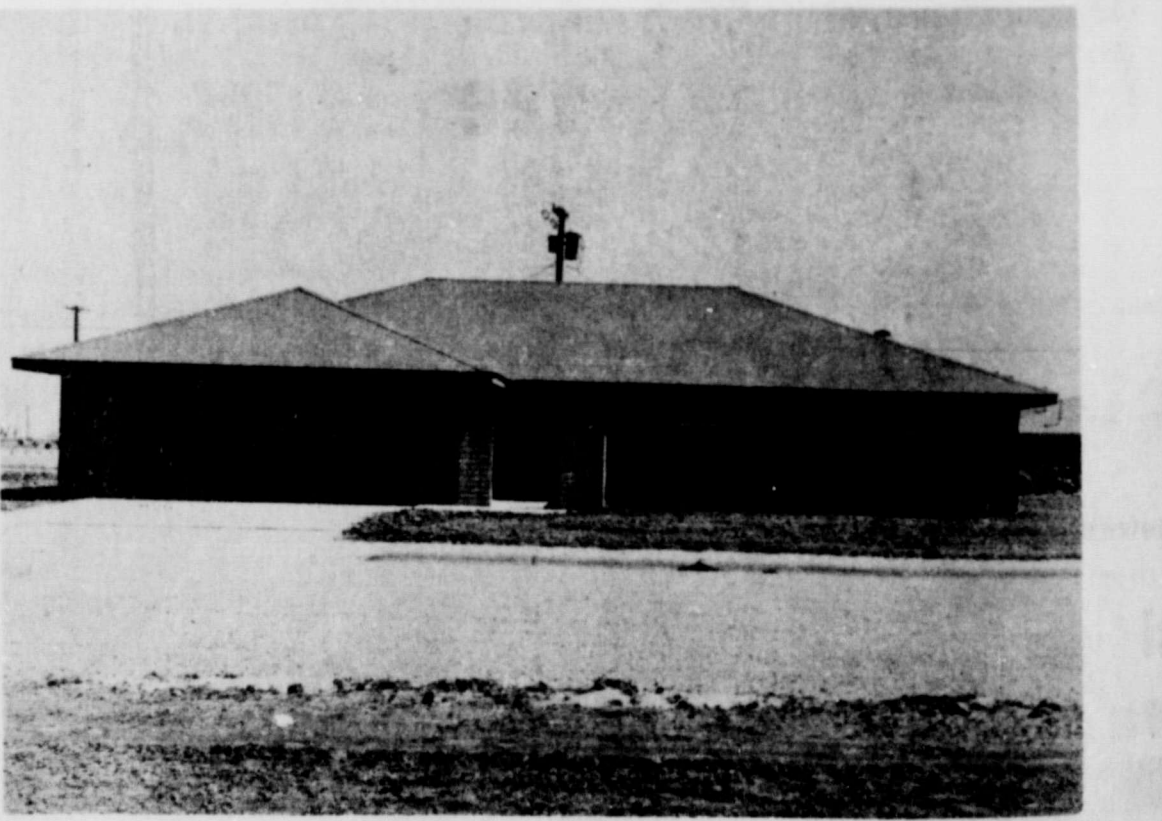
