Farm Trailer Equipment Regulations Are Altered

Equipment requirements on farm trailers have been changed, effective in late July of this year, and many trailer operators are not aware of the changes.

Joe Hataway and Frank Montana, Perryton-based Texas Highway Patrol officers, pointed out some of the recent changes affecting farm trailer equipment.

Tail Lights:

- Only one required until 1-1-72
- Two required after 1-1-72, visible 1000 feet
- Only required on rear-most vehicle in combination
- Both mounted on same level
- Widely spaced laterally as possible
- Mounted 15" to 72" high

White light on license plate:

- Lighted when head lights (or auxiliary lights) lighted
- Make license plate legible 50' to rear

Reflectors:

- Visibility
- After 1-1-72 on vehicles assembled or manufactured prior to that time, must be visible 100' to 350'
- On vehicles assembled or manufactured after 1-1-72, must be visible 100' to 600'

Brakes:

- Required
- Two or more on rear, red 15" to 60" mounted height
- If vehicle is 80" or more in width
- If vhc
- If vehicle is 80" or more in width

1. At front, mounted on each side, one amber reflector

2. At rear, mounted on each side, one red reflector

Stop lights:

- Two required after 1-1-72
- Visible 300 feet
- Activated upon application of foot or service brake
- Must be red or amber

Clearance lights (Required if 80" or more in width):

- At front, two amber lights, one on each side
- At rear, two red lights, one on each side
- Mounted on permanent part of structure so as to indicate width and height of vehicle.

Side marker lights (Required if 80" or more in width):

- At front, two amber lights, one on each side
- At rear, two red lights, one on each side

After 1-1-72 if vehicle is 30' or more in overall length, one amber side marker lamp and one amber reflector will be centrally located on the side of the vehicle.

Identification lamps:

On vehicles over 80" wide after 1-1-72, three red identification lamps will be grouped in a horizontal row, the lamp centers spaced not less than six, nor more than 12 inches apart, mounted on permanent structure at vertical center line, shining to rear.

Turn signals:

- After 1-1-72, electric turn signals on every vehicle
- Flashing light required
- Lamps showing to front to be mounted on same level, and as widely spaced as practical
- Lamps showing to front, white or amber or any shade between white and amber
- Lamps showing to rear, to be mounted on same level and as widely spaced as practical.
- Lamps showing to rear, red or amber or any color between red and amber
- Visible for a distance not less than 500 feet in normal sunlight
- Turn signals may be incorporated with other lamps on vehicle

Brakes:

- No brakes required on any farm trailer if gross weight does not exceed 10,000 pounds and speed does not exceed 30 MPH
- No brakes required on any farm trailer used solely to transport cotton if gross weight does not exceed 15,000 pounds and speed does not exceed 30 MPH
- Farm trailers, to be eligible for brake exemption, must meet all requirements for total or partial exemption from registration fees

Inspection:

A. Farm trailers, meeting all the requirements for total or partial exemption from registration fees are exempt from motor vehicle inspection regulations.

Hazardous warning light (on vehicles over 80" in width or 30' or more in overall length):

- After 1-1-72 hazardous warning light required
- Lamps showing to front to be mounted on same level and as widely spaced as practicable
- Lamps showing to front,

Sign-Up

Wheat, feed grain and cotton farmers who plan to enroll in the 1972 set-aside, programs may sign up beginning January 17, according to John Trindle, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

"January 17 through February 25 is sign-up time at all county ASC office for the voluntary farm programs," he said.

Trindle emphasized that the sign-up period is earlier than usual, and also pointed out no extension of the February 25 deadline will be made.

Farmers who know they will be out of the county through the sign-up period may arrange with the County Office to sign up in the programs by mail or by other procedure.

To qualify to participate in ASCS set-aside programs for crops, farmers will set aside 83 percent of the farm's domestic wheat allotment, 25 percent of the feed grain base, and/or 20 percent of their cotton allotment.

The Agricultural Act of 1970, which established the set-aside concept, has opened the way for major shifts in the patterns of American farming. By using set-aside acreage to limit general overproduction, individual farmers are free to plant the rest of their cropland to crops which will give them the most profit. In 1971, 90 percent of U.S. farmers altered their cropping patterns from their established bases and allotments in order to increase their profits. The set-aside programs encourage this.

Under the 1972 set-aside programs, a participant who complies with the set-aside acreage he has signed up for and maintains his conserving base, is free to plant the rest of his cropland to anything he chooses, except a few crops which are under marketing quotas.

"With the set-aside program, farmers can decide what and how much to plant on their farms," John said.

Notices of cotton and wheat allotments and feed grain bases plus projected yields, and payment rates along with leaflets on the various voluntary farm programs offered in Harsford County, have been mailed to area farmers.

"If farmers have any other questions on program participation, County ASC Committee and County ASC Office officials will be glad to answer them," said Trindle.

5. "Said August 23rd, 1971 order was duly, properly and timely entered and filed in the minutes of this Board. That said order properly set a hearing on the petitions.
