Britt Jarvis Seeks Co. Attorney Post

Britt Jarvis has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the office of County Attorney, subject to the action of the voters in the May 6 Democratic Primary.

Jarvis, 29, has been a resident of this area all his life. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Billy Jarvis, prominent farmer-stockman of the Morse community. Britt attended Pringle and Morse schools.

In 1965 he graduated from Texas A&M University with a BS degree in Agricultural Economics. At A & M he was a member of Alpha Zeta, an Agricultural Honor fraternity, and Phi Kappa Phi which is a National Honor fraternity in Technical schools.

From there Jarvis went to Southern Methodist Law School and received his Juris Doctorate in 1968.

After being admitted to the Bar in 1968 he practiced at Stinnett as Assistant County Attorney for Hutchinson county for seven months, both in trial service and working in the law office.

In 1969 he entered the military service and was stationed at Ft. Bliss for several months. His first assignment there was Adjutant to the Hawk Battalion. The armed services had just implemented a new manual for Court Martials and Jarvis was appointed Trial Counselor with the Staff Judge Advocate's office. He was assigned to many trial cases while serving in this capacity.

From Ft. Bliss Mr. Jarvis was sent to Vietnam where he spent one year working with Administration and Personnel. He was Trial Counselor for his brigade as well as Defense Counsel and Chief of Legal Assistance. He received the Bronze Star for Meritorious Service in Vietnam and was discharged from the army with the rank of Captain.

This young man's record shows he has done nothing but practice criminal law and has a lot of experience crammed into the short period of time in which he has been an Attorney at Law.

In 1965 he married the former Linda Holt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nolan Holt of rural Spearman. They have three children: Will, age 6, Ann Marie 3, and Bonnie Lea who is 3 months old. Gun Shot Wound Fatal To Rancher

William David "Bill" Campbell, a native of Spearman, was found shot to death shortly after noon Tuesday lying beside his pickup on a dirt road about 8 miles northeast of Stinnett.

Campbell, 41, was pronounced dead at the scene by Hutchinson County Justice of the Peace, Buck Christian. Christian ruled that the shooting was accidental.

Campbell had borrowed a shotgun earlier in the day stating that he had seen several skunks and coyotes on his land and planned to shoot some of them.

Christian said it looked like Campbell was carrying the gun in the back of his pickup, saw one of the animals, and jumped out and grabbed the gun. When the body was found the automatic shotgun was lying in the back of the pickup with the barrel resting on the sideboard. The spent shell was still in the gun. He had been struck in the left side of the chest.

A Stinnett man, driving past on the road, found the body. Survivors include his wife, Jackie; a daughter, Mrs. Glenn Kam of Clarendon; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Campbell of Spearman; a brother, John H. Jr. of Spearman; and a sister Mrs. Madlin Patterson of Spearman.

BOB DUNN, LOCAL PILOT, BROUGHT FIRST SHIPMENT FROM GALVESTON



Seafood lovers shopping at Ideal and Cut Rate Grocery stores today will notice a new "Fisherman's Wharf" display in each of these local shopping centers.

Fresh, frozen shrimp, displayed on ice to imitate as nearly as possible the demand.

Galveston, Texas seafood displays have been installed.

This is a new service for the Spearman stores and is strictly an experiment to see how shrimp and fish lovers accept it. The fresh frozen seafood will be available constantly if the public so demands.

Bob Dunn, local pilot who owns a flying service in Spearman, will be flying his Cherokee 180 to Galveston after the shrimp and fish as often as shipments are needed. Bob flew down Tuesday for the first load, and returned that evening with 100 lbs. of fresh, frozen shrimp—the same quality which is offered in Galveston at Fisherman's Wharf.

Bob said this was an experiment, to see how this new seafood service is accepted by the buying public. "We'll bring back anything the public wants," he said. "All people have to do is make their desires known at either of the local grocery stores.

The local markets will keep this service going as long as the public demands it. If the service goes over well, local markets will keep branching out with various kinds of fish, whatever seafood lovers demand.

Sheriff Cooke Extradites Fugitive From Washington

Sheriff J. B. Cooke and deputy Tom Messer returned last week from a trip to Kelso, Washington where they had gone to extradite Don Ray Albertson, charged in this county with "theft over fifty dollars."

Albertson, 41, came to the Spearman area with the custom harvest crews and is charged with having stolen several radios, a television set, equipment and clothing from R. C. Thompson, a custom cutter whose equipment was parked at the time at the Frank Davis farm west of Spearman. Albertson is also charged with taking tires belonging to Frank Davis. He left Spearman in a 1950 Cadillac car he had purchased from Thompson. The car had not been paid for however.

Albertson was picked up by Highway Patrol officers in Kelso, Wash. on a traffic violation. Officers there checked out his record through the National Crime Information Center in Washington, D.C., and found he was wanted by Hansford County Sheriff's office.

Albertson, who has been in custody at Kelso several weeks, refused to waive extradition, so Sheriff Cooke was forced to go through State legal channels. The Governor of Texas, Preston Smith, officially appointed Sheriff Cooke a Special Agent for the State of Texas and ordered him to proceed to Washington for the purpose of receiving the fugitive Albertson. The Governor of Washington in turn released the fugitive to Cooke.

Sheriff Cooke and Deputy Messer found the trip eventful in the recovery of some of the stolen goods. They recovered the TV set at a service station in New Mexico. They checked at some of the places where Albertson had sold the stolen radios, but this merchandise had already been disposed of. The car was recovered, and was equipped with the tires which belonged to Mr. Davis.

Albertson, who has an extremely long record of arrests, is in Hansford County jail waiting trial.

There can be no question
about the average American's
pride in his desire to
preserve this precious heritage
at all costs. Nevertheless some
of our foreign ideas have
slyly wormed their way into
civilization without his
realizing what was going on.
I have found the unsuspect-
ing patriot garbed in pajamas,
and of Indian origin;
lying in a bed built on a
terrace which originated in
Persia or Asia Minor.
I'm muffled to the ears in an
American material: cotton,
domesticated in India;
wool, domesticated in the
East; wool from an ani-
mal native to Asia Minor; or
whose uses were first dis-
covered by the Chinese. If
the weather is cold enough,
may sleep under an eider-
down quilt invented in Scandi-
navia.

In awakening he glances
at the clock, a medieval Euro-
pean invention, uses one po-
tential Latin word in abbreviated
form, rises in haste, and goes
to the bathroom. Here, if he
has to think about it, he
feels himself in the pres-
ence of a great American in-
vention; he will have heard

stories of both the quality and
frequency of foreign plumbing
and will know that in no other
country does the average man
perform his ablutions in the
midst of such splendor. But
the insidious foreign influence
pursues him even here. Glass
was invented by the ancient
Egyptians, the use of glazed
tiles for floors in the Near East,
porcelain in China and his
bathtub and toilet are modified
copies of Roman originals. In
this bathroom the American
washes with soap invented by
the ancient Gauls, he cleans
his teeth, a subversive Euro-
pean practice which didn't in-
vade America, until the latter
part of the 18th century. He
then shaves, a rite first devel-
oped by the heathen priests of
ancient Egypt. This rite is
made less of a penance by the
fact that his razor is of steel,
an iron-carbon alloy discover-
ed in either India or Turkestan.
Lastly, he dries himself on a
Turkish towel.

Breakfast over, he places
upon his head a molded piece
of felt, invented by the nomads
of Eastern Asia, and if it looks
like rain, puts on outer shoes
of rubber, discovered by the
ancient Mexicans, and takes
an umbrella, invented in India.
He then sprints for his train-
ing, not the sprinting being an
English invention. At the station
he pauses for a moment to buy
a newspaper, paying for it with
coins invented in ancient Lydia.
Once on board he settles back to
inhale the fumes of a cigarette
invented in Mexico, or a cigar
invented in Brazil. Meanwhile,
he reads the news of the day,
imprinted in characters inven-
ted by the ancient Semites by a
process invented in Germany
upon a material invented in
China. As he scans the latest
editorial pointing out the dire
results to our institutions of ac-
cepting foreign ideas, he will
not fail to thank a Hebrew God
in an Indo-European language
that he is 100-percent (decim-
al system invented by the
Greeks) American (from Ameri-
cus Vesputius, Italian geogra-
pher.)

It's a little disheartening to
learn we didn't discover all
these things ourselves.
Although few of us might be
unaware of how little of our
own culture we have created,
our use of it in all its many
aspects, is what makes us "the
melting pot" I guess.
