

Pet Clinic Set For Fri. & Sat.

The annual Rabies Clinic for all city pets, a community project, is scheduled for March 24 and 25.

All pets may be brought to the City Hall Friday afternoon between the hours of 2 and 6 p.m., or on Saturday morning from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Local veterinarians, Dr. Wesley Garnett and Dr. Tom Latta will be administering these rabies shots. FFA boys will be on hand to assist.

Everyone is urged to bring in pets for these inoculations, to help in the control of this dread disease. The shots will cost \$3.00 each. City pet license are also due at this time and will be available. License for male and spayed animals are \$1.00; and \$3.00 for female animals--dogs and cats alike.

The City's Animal Control ordinance states that all animals are required to be kept up--enclosed behind a fence or on a leash. To let pets roam free is violating this city ordinance.

The animal control report for the year 1971 shows there were 48 animals picked up,

293 were destroyed, 131 were paid out of the city pound, 12 escaped, 133 citations were issued for violation of animals running loose in the city.

\$99,000 Locally For Highways

Car owners in Hansford County are beginning to realize that Uncle Sam's 42,500 mile Interstate Highway System, now three-quarters finished, has become a more costly undertaking than expected.

They know that because they, along with the rest of the motoring public, are footing the bill through their purchases of gasoline, tires and other items.

At the present time, the Federal government is collecting some \$90,000 a year from car operators in the local area. The bulk of it is derived from the four-cent tax levied on every gallon of gas.

Not included in this total are the and gas taxes collected by the state.

The revenue is deposited in the Highway Trust Fund, which pays 90 percent of the cost of construction. The other 10 percent is borne by the states.

For the typical driver in Hansford County, who covers 10,000 miles a year and gets 14 miles to the gallon, the annual cost is about \$30, according to Government figures. For those who travel more or less than this average, the cost varies proportionately.

Based upon the 3,290 cars in operation in the local area during 1970, it adds up to \$99,000 a year.

The increasing cost is attributed to the expansion of the highway system from the original 41,000 miles to 42,500 miles and to the fact that the expected completion date is now 1978 instead of 1972.

As a result of the changes, the ultimate expenditure will be about \$75 billion, it is estimated. That is nearly double the figure set in 1956, when the project was started.

Because of the extended construction time, car owners in Hansford County will be contributing an additional \$592,000 before it is finished, six years hence.

There is special interest in the Highway Trust Fund at this time because of the demand by many civic groups that it be used, in part, to support

some public needs that they consider more urgent.

They contend that there is a pressing need to refurbish other transportation facilities, such as railroads, airports and mass transit generally, and that some of the money should go in that direction.

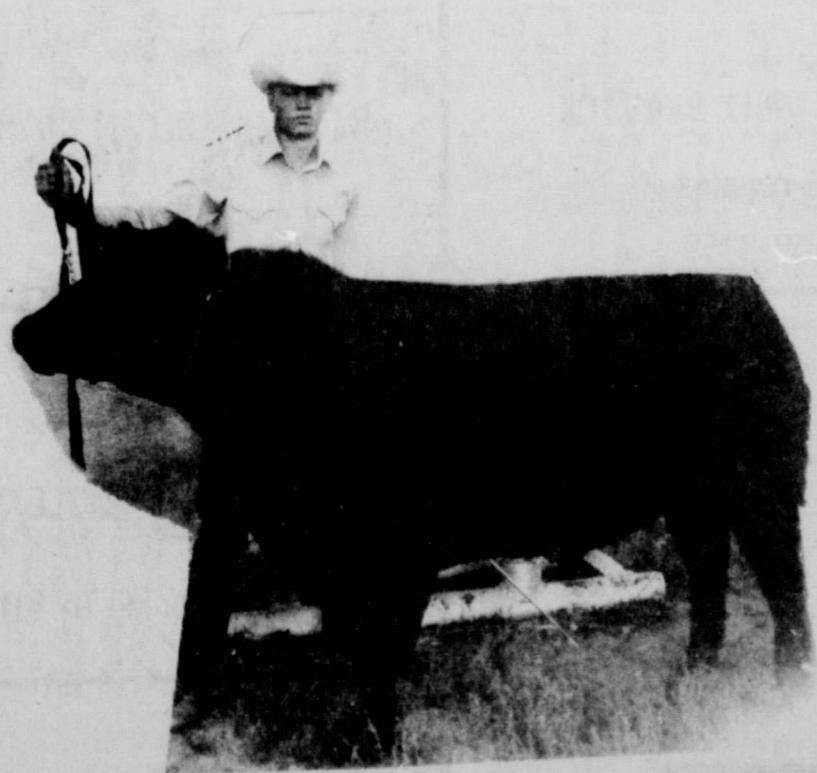

Change In ASCS Set-aside Regulation

GSPA Executive Director Elbert Harp was notified this week by U.S.D.A. officials that the set-aside regulations have been relaxed for farmers who produce both wheat and summer row-crops.

Under the new regulation, a farmer who has wheat set-aside will be asked to designate his intended set-aside for cotton and grain sorghum at the time of wheat certification. However, if for any reason he wishes to change his set-aside later, he may do so by notifying

the county ASCS office at the time of certifying his grain sorghum and cotton.

Prior to this adjustment, a change could have been made only with the approval of the county ASCS office, which unduly complicated the farming operation at the time of starting crops in the spring. The Grain Sorghum Producers Association and the Plains Cotton Growers Association have been working on this problem with the U.S.D.A. for over a month.

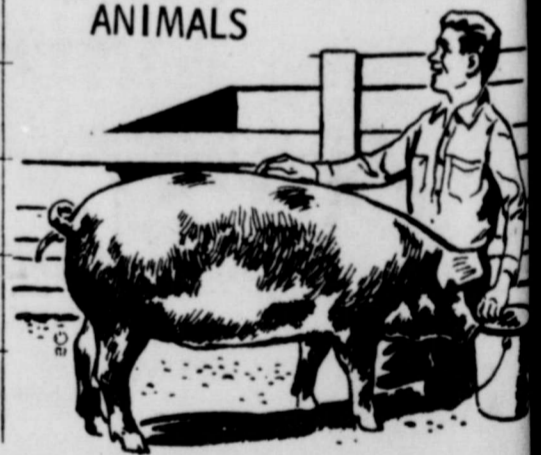

EYE BANK STARTS DONOR DRIVE

To the thousands of blind individuals in America today, the best thing that life could offer is the ability to see again.

Would you mind if, after your death, your eyes were used to give some totally blind person the precious gift of sight...making it possible for one or more persons to emerge from constant darkness?

The success of a drive now being inaugurated by the Hi-Plains Eye Bank Incorporated and the Lions Clubs in District 2-T1 will determine whether many of our blind, or nearly blind residents, now and in the future, will have the opportunity to regain their eyesight.

This is not a drive for financial donations. The Hi-Plains Eye Bank is sponsored and supported by the 81 Lions Clubs in the District. It is a drive to sign up eye donors—individuals who are willing to pledge their eyes-upon death—for use in sight restoring operations.

Individuals whose blindness has been caused by damaged or diseased corneas can often be given restored sight through the transplanting of human eye tissue, which has been donated by some generous person-to be used at his death. There is no other way in which such people can be helped, thus pointing up the need for public co-operation in this sight saving work.

The quality of your vision makes no difference whatsoever. If the cornea, sclera and vitreous are not diseased, the tissue can be used.

Actually six people can be helped by one pair of eyes. Two corneal transplants can be given, two sclera (white part of the eye) can be used for ruptures, and vitreous (fluid in the eye) can be used for two vitreous implants.

It is not possible to buy or sell eyes. They are furnished to the ophthalmologist and his patient free. Of course there is the usual hospital charges and the surgeon will charge his usual fee.

Those who are willing to cooperate in this humanitarian project are asked to contact Spearman Lions Club, or the Eye Bank Office in Amarillo for pledge cards or further information.

New Income Tax Tables for 1972

Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of the Dallas District of Internal Revenue Service, covering 143 North Texas Counties, issued the following fact sheet on the New Income Tax withholding Tables for 1972:

Under the Revenue Act of 1971, the withholding tables will make the amount of tax withheld for 1972 more closely match the tax liability for the year.

The new tax tables correct an underwithholding problem experienced by many taxpayers who ended up with large year-end tax bills. Taxpayers most affected by this problem were working couples and persons who held more than one job.

If taxpayers haven't filed a new Form W-4--Employee's Withholding Exemption Certificate--(Revised December 1971) it is essential for them to do so now. This should ensure that the correct amount is withheld from their pay.

In the past many taxpayers had been claiming fewer exemptions than they were entitled to in order to avoid paying additional tax at the end of the year. These persons may now claim on a new W-4 all exemptions and special allowances to which they are entitled; they no longer need to claim fewer exemptions to avoid paying large income tax bills each April.

tions. The Form W-4 contains a table that will show the number of extra allowances that may be claimed for large itemized deductions. These extra allowances, like the special withholding allowance, may be claimed only for withholding purposes, not on income tax returns.

The amount of tax withheld in 1972 will decrease for an estimated 47 million taxpayers if they claim all exemptions and extra allowances to which they are entitled. Most taxpayers who do not claim all exemption allowances to which they are entitled will receive refunds when they file their income tax returns in 1973.

Forms W-4 may be obtained either from employers or Internal Revenue Service offices. The TAP symbol, boosting Texas Agriculture Products, is rapidly becoming recognized as a boon for state farmers and ranchers, arousing admiration as well as envy in neighboring states. Texas consumers are urged by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White to look for the symbol on products in the supermarket and "Buy Texas" when possible. As a sales promotion, the TAP program opened entirely new export markets amounting to more than \$12 million in 1971 for livestock alone. Similar successes are recorded for other products. As a result, Texas food, fiber, fruits, vegetables and livestock are now familiar sights in markets in Japan, Europe and South America--all stemming from the TAP program initiated by Commissioner White six years ago. But the most immediate "feed-back" has come from other states.

Apparently resigned to a philosophy of "if you can't lick 'em, join 'em", two states recently contacted Commissioner White asking how to begin similar programs. From a Mississippi State Representative came the comment, "I see the TAP symbol on food in our supermarkets and it's just like the products we grow here. I'm not against Texas in our supermarkets but I just want to know you--you do it."

The inquiry came from Rep. Douglas Abraham of Jackson, Miss., who said he wanted to inaugurate a program for his state similar to TAP. From Auburn, Alabama, Extension Agriculturist Carl Dennis wrote White, "We are interested in determining the feasibility of such a program for Alabama. Would you please send us detailed information..."

"If imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, then we are flattered indeed," Commissioner White noted. Consumer recognition of the TAP symbol and what it indicates and stands for, is the most essential element in the program.

"We have been working towards consumer recognition for six years--and it is beginning to pay off," said White. "We want buyers to reach for the package with TAP on the label. It means more money in the pockets of our farmers and ranchers."

LEGISLATION LIMITS USE OF SACCHARIN

According to recent legislation, the use of the artificial sweetener, saccharin, will be limited under a new regulation of the Food and Drug Administration. "This regulation took effect February 1," said foods and nutrition specialist Sally Springer. "Saccharin was then removed from the list of food additives that are generally recognized as safe."

The specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service said that the use of saccharin has been limited to the following: 12 milligrams per fluid ounce in fruit drinks and other beverages, no more than 20 milligrams of saccharin per substitution for one teaspoon of sugar (when used as sugar substitute) and 30 milligrams per serving in processed foods. In addition to these, the Food and Drug Administration regulations require that labels of foods containing saccharin state what amounts of saccharin the product contains. "This labeling will become effective for food sold after July 1, 1972," Miss Springer said.

3 ACCIDENTS ON COUNTY'S HIGHWAYS

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Hansford County during the month of February, according to Sergeant C. E. Henderson, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in no persons killed and one person injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1972 shows a total of six accidents resulting in no persons killed, and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for February, 1972 shows a total of 478 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 233 persons injured as compared to February, 1971 with 521 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 251 persons injured.

The 15 traffic deaths for the month of February, 1972 occurred in the following counties: Wise, three; Hale and Lubbock, two each; Garza, Lamb, Lynn, Carson, Donley, Moore, Swisher and Wheeler one each.

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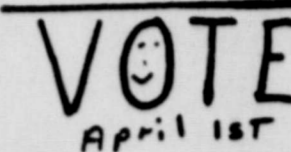
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Absentee Balloting Ends Tues
