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

Some newspaper editors will try anthing ... once. Down in Jensen Beach, Fla. editor Richard Campbell was going flat out of his mind trying to come up with some great, unusual promotional campaign for his circulation drive he had going. He came up with the idea of running a nude centerfold ... borrowing the dea from Cosmopolitan magazine which recently sold out on the newsstands when it ran the picture of a nude male in its centerfold. His newspaper ran a four-week promotion announcing then the nude centerfold would appear. Then his search began for a subject with enough nerve to pose for such a picture! A prominent physician, known for his sense of humor, agreed to do it. Dr. Richard Penick approached the nude centerfold idea with a medical attitude. He pointed out that nudity was not the issue, but rather what people are taught to believe in. "If people were taught that if was taboo to show the nose, then showing it would be outrageous, "he commented.

Editor Campbell said his readers knew the doctor well enough to know he would be nutty enough to do it and were going crazy wondering whether in this liberal age of permissiveness, the newspaper would indeed join the ranks of Playboy and Cosmo. Even the staff was kept in

the dark and all the work was done at a central printing plant 70 miles away. The publisher there demanded a written release from the doctor before printing the picture. On the eve of publication the production manager at the plant got cold feet and called Campbell and told him that when the picture had been blown up to centerfold size, it was just too life like.

In the meantime, subscribers were threatening to

you see all of us' .. and other statements. Then came the publication date and debut of the

centerfold. There on the front page was a head and shoulders shot of a reclining, nude Dr. Penick quoting the doctor as saying "I think the inside centerfold reflects the beauty of the human body.

An editorial from the publisher Campbell told the readers "no expense was spared to bring this precedent-establishing "first" to the People, " adding that the people could judge in their minds if the newspaper had violated the trust of a family newspaper by bringing this art form to them.

When eager hands turned to the centerfold, they found Dr. Penick in the altogether...as he appeared 50 years ago when the good doctor was still

a bouncy, cuddly baby. Publisher Campbell said it was the best promotion he had ever had. All the articles concerning the centerfold had been vague. They just mentioned a nude male with no indication of age. "We just let imaginations of our readers run wild, " he said.

Dr. Penick just laughed and laughed, for a long time. The results for the circula-

tion department of the newspaper were 151 new subscribers and 250 renewals.

Lots of funny things happen to newspaper people. Roy Bilberry, a Graham, Texas publisher, tells about the experience of moving a printing press. "We bought the press in a neighboring town and after loading it onto a flat bed truck we headed for home. As we passed through a small town, somehow, due to circumstances beyond our control, we accidently found ourselves right in the middle of a high school homecoming parade. We were awarded first place in the float division.

Then there's the newspaper man who raises chickens. He noticed that one of his hers was sick. Fearing that some disease might be descending on his flock, he wrung the hen's neck and sent the corpse to the county agent to have the malady diagnosed. A few days later he received this report: "The hen died of a broken neck."

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

American Farm Bureau Federation, is built around interviews with some grape vineyard workers in the Delano, California, area who were forced to join the farm workers union led by Cerar Chavez without the privilege of secret ballot elections to determine which urion, if any, they wanted to represent them.

The tactic used by the Chavez forces was the secondary boycott which effectively closed markets for grapes. Unable to sell their produce, the
