





Description. The eggs are elliptical to oval, flattened, slightly convex on the upper surface, and translucent white when first laid. They average 1.2 to 1.6 mm. in lengthby 0.8 to 1 mm in 1 width. They are found in chains or groups of from two to fifty or more, both on the upper and lower leaf surfaces, slightly overlapping in the manner of fish scales. A characteristic color change in eggs of the southwestern corn borer is the appearance of three parallel rows of orange -red lines which give the egg an orange hue. The color of the eggs change to yellow, orange-yellow, or reddish-brown before hatching. Under the microscope the shell is seen to have a net-like appearance.

The full grown borers are from one inch to one and one-fourth inches long, dull

which is closed with a tough silken plug. In the spring, the borers extend their tunnels to the outer wall of the stem leaving sucha thin covering that the moth can easily push it aside. Pupation then follows. The female moths glue their eggs in chains or small masses on the leaves of the food plant. The larvae upon hatching make their way into the central whorl at the growing tip, then bore into the stalk. Except for an occasional emergence from the stalk to reenter it at some other point, the re-mainder of the larval period is spent within the stalk. At the end of the feeding period, the larvae pupate in the feeding tunnel. There are two to three generations annually of the corn borer. Development Periods: Stage Average No. of days egg larva prepupa Control. Since sorghums

are not heavily infested, their substitution for corn may be recommended for areas especially subject to heavy borer damage. Late plantsings are subject to severe attack by second generation borers at a very critical time in the period of their development so that early planting and early maturing varieties are recommended as a preventive measure. In areas where the winters are cold, plowing out the corn stubble exposes the borers to freezes and most of them are killed. Listing is recommended, where soil blowing is a problem, as it reduces wind erosion and prepares the soil for reception of winter rainfall. Deep plowing under of stubble in the spring buries the larvae in the stalks so that the moth cannot emerge. Several insecticides are also available for in-season control. These include Sevin, Diazinon, and parathion.
