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

Drop measured chocolate batter from tablespoon onto the cheese mixture; swirl the mixtures together with a spatula just to marble. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 35 to 40 minutes. Cool. Cut in squares or bars. Cover and store in the refrigerator. Makes
