# Spearman Woman Is New U.S. Citizen



MYONG CHUN NOBLE of Spearman is a new American Citizen. She received her papers, September 26, 1972 in District Court, Amarillo, Texas.

Mrs. James L. Noble of Spearman received her citizenship papers last week in U.S. District Court in Amarillo. Myong Chun was one of 33 petitioners to pass the requirements for U.S. citizen-

Mrs. Noble, 30, has been a resident of the United States for the pastt 11 years, but did not seek to become a naturalized citizen until she and her husband moved to Spearman last November. Then, she was urged to begin her studies which are required for citizenship. "Mickey", as the petite native of Korea is called, said she owed so much thanks to Mr. and Mrs. G.M. Nichols and Mr. and Mrs. Coy Kelly of Spearman for helping her with her studies. Immigrants are required to have a thorough knowledge of U.S. History, the Constitution, Government, and etc. Since her command of English was not so good, Mrs. Noble said these Spearman friends helped her in many ways and she was able to complete her studies in five months.

Myong Chun attended school in Korea, and completed the 6th grade. Since her school then taught no English, she only began to learn this language when she came to America 11 years ago. In Korea, her father owned a grocery store. He is deceased, but her mother, who is 51 years old, still lives. She resides with her family, four daughters and three sons. Mrs. Noble said she will "sponsor" her brother, 25 year old Wam Sang Lee, to come to America. She has

sent him the necessary papers and hopes it will not be long before he can come here. Then, she will help him to become a citizen of "this wonderful, free Country,

the friendly Mrs. Noble stated. James L. Noble, who is employed with Daco Lease & Well Service, said his wife was nicknamed Mickey because of her size. She is about the size of Mickey Mouse -- 56 inches tall. She weighs only 82 lbs.

Blessed with a radiant smile and a great personality, this new American said. "I'm so happy to be an American, and to be Free American. In Korea, we are free, but we have not much opportunity, like here.

Mrs. Noble went on to say how frightened she was to go and take her examination at the District Court last week. She was under the impression she must know by heart the Oath of Allegiance, so she set to work and memorized it! Then--to her surprise and great relief, the District Judge himself repeated the Oath, and all the petitioners had to say was "I Do. " Mickey said "I was the first one to answer my I

Do, and I said it real loud. Her examination was no problem for her either. Her questions required her to explain the difference between Senators & Congressmen; to name Texas Representatives, locate the capitol of the U.S.; name the President, etc.

Her husband laughed and said "Micky had more trouble getting her drivers license than she did her citizenship

This newspaper joins with all people of this community in congratulating Myong Chun Noble, and in welconing her as a citizen of the United States and of Texas.

news from your HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT

This is National 4-H Week. We hope you will look at the exhibit the Penny Pinchers 4-H Club has placed in Gordon Drug's window. The week was begun a day early with the annual achievement banquet held on Sept. 30th. Ninety 4-H ers and 30 leaders were recognized for work done this past year.

Each month the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture releases a list of foods plentiful for the month. These are food in good supp! y and usually at reduced prices during their feature time. For October look for wheat products (October 3 was the internationalday of bread.), turkeys, rice, broiler-fryers, fresh apples, canned applesauce and apple juice and eggs. One of the most often com-

plained about items is the amount we spend in the grocery store. The fact, that is so often overlooked, is that we buy many non-edible items in the supermarket. The next time you shop separate items when you get home. It's quite a shock to see how much is spent for cleaning aids, paper products, personal care and even linens and clothing. These items must be deducted to get the true picture of food costs

As you shop watch your basket and those of shoppers around you. It's quite interesting to see what we purchase at the grocery" store.

The fact is that each year we are spending a smaller percentage of our pay checks for food. In 1950 we spent 22.2% and in 1971 this dropped to 16.3%. Of each dollar spent in the grocery store 72¢ goes for food and 28¢ for non-food items. Remember that pet foods are not a part of our food costs.

As fall progresses we will be seeing nuts in the shell. Many times these are mixed nuts. These include almonds, Brazils, filberts, pecans, and walnuts. When buying these check the quality. They should have clean, unbroken shells. Avoid nuts with oil-stained or moldy shells. These are signs that the kernels may be rancid or decayed. Also look for the U.S. grade name as several companies package nuts under USDA inspection. This is your assurance of quality and size. The extra fancy and fancy grades will carry the grade shield. U.S. Select or U.S. Commercial are lower grades and do not carry the grade
