### Jury Finds Smith Guilty

Four defendants were tried in an 84th judicial district criminal appearance session here Friday before District Judge Max W. Boyer. Richard (Dick) Smith was tried by a jury and found guilty on a "swindle by worthless check" charge. The case involved a \$1,060.80 check Smith had given two years ago to a Mr. Staley for hogs. The check, given on the Gruver State Bank, was returned to Staley marked "no account." After the jury found Smith guilty, the judge decided upon the sentence. Judge Max Boyer sentenced Smith to three

years in the penitentiary. Smith immediately filed a motion for appeal. A \$5,000 appeal bond was set by the Judge. The court of criminal appeals will decide if there is to be another trial. Joe Burleson, Pampa, was tried for "swindle by worthless check". The check for \$114.45 was given to Douglas Dry Goods in Spearman Jan. 11, 1971. Burleson entered a plea of guilty and the Judge gave him a 5 year probated sentence. The defendant made restitution for the check. Bill Haney, tried in criminal court here last year on "theft

by bailee" charges & given a 3 year probated sentence, recently was convicted in Pampa on a worthless-check charge, and sentenced to 3 years in the pen. Friday he appeared before Judge Max Boyer who revoked his probation. Haney will serve this sentence along with the Pampa term. Sentences will run concurrently. Raymond Montgomery appeared before the court on a revocation motion by probation officer at Berger. He had been previously tried on "theft over \$50." charges and given a 4 year probated sentence. The Judge continued his probation.

## Tractor School Set For Farmers

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held November 13 through 16 at 8 p. m. each night in the vocational agriculture building at the Spearman High School.

The short course is being sponsored by the Vo-Ed department of SHS. The Tractor Maintenance short course will

offer a minimum of 12 hours, with each classroom session being 3 hours in length. Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Supt. of Schools, James Cunningham, or Vo-Ag teachers Herman Boone or Burt Williams. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Certificates are to be pre-

presented to each man who attends the training sessions. Subjects to be covered include: Engine, horsepower ratings, operation, fuel systems, cooling systems, hydraulic systems, transmissions, power-take-off, diesel systems, and etc.

Norman K. Waggoner, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instruction.

Mr. Waggoner states that the key to longer tractor life comes from a full knowledge of the fundamentals of an engine and the application of the proper maintenance skills involving lubrication, fuels, carburetion, air cleaners, cooling systems, valves and ignition. Mr. Waggoner will cover the proper adjustments and maintenance of the above, with emphasis on the importance of each in obtaining a longer tractor life. Throughout the short course, emphasis will be placed on "Learning to do by doing." Several demonstration tractors will be used.

All farmers in the area are invited to participate in the short course which begins November 13.

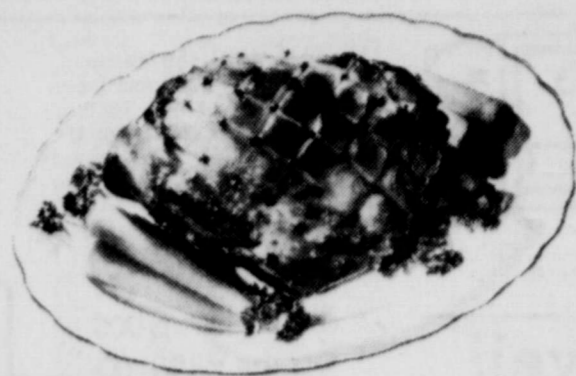

**State Rep. Cobb Calls for Justification**

State Representative Dean Cobb of Dumas has called for justification of the increase in medical assistance funds requested by the Department of Public Welfare

for the 1974-75 budget. The increase requested amounts to more than \$150 million dollars.

"In view of the recent leveling off in number of welfare recipients," Cobb said, "the increase is alarming."

Medical assistance for people receiving welfare, called Medicaid, has previously accounted for over 58% of the welfare budget.

"If the legislature approves this increase in medical assistance, Texas' share of the Federal Revenue Sharing funds will be completely absorbed by Medicaid. The state then would be faced with demands for more money for other welfare programs," Cobb stated.

Cobb is chairman of the Interim Committee on Medical Welfare which is charged with the responsibility of analyzing efficiency and effectiveness of medical assistance programs.
