Will Be December Bride



To help you determine if a knit fabric is a good buy take your ruler to the fabric shop. Determine the fabric stability by gripping the knit fabric and ruler in your left hand, four inches from the raw edge. Then stretch the fabric toward the right and measure how much it stretches.

If the stretch is no more than half an inch, the fabric is stable; 1 1/2 inches means its moderately stretchy; and more than 1 1/4 inches means it is very stretchy. After determining stability check the back of the pattern

envelope to see if the fabric is suitable for the chosen style. While checking the fabric

stability you can also check its recovery ability. If it springs back to its original shape as soon as you let it go it has good recovery ability and won't "grow" during con-struction. If it doesn't snap right back you must use spe-cial care in sewing and hand-

ling it.

In the year 1876 the United States of America was observng it's 100th year anniversary of the nation's founding. On November 6th of that year Mrs. Hettie Davis was born. Monday of this week this petite little Spearman woman ce'ebrated her 96th When this reporter walked into her sparkling, neat, clean little home at 308 South Ar-cher street Monday, the deli-

cious aroma of turnip greens and baking bread filled the air. She had stopped her quilting long enough to prepare herself a "bite to eat." Her husband, Walter Davis, died in 1966. She has lived alone since that time. She might admit that at times she has been lonely, but she has never been idle. She does all

Hettie said she didn't get to attend school until she was 12 years old, for it was only then that the community could acquire a teacher. Her first teacher, a Mr. Kay Hanes, is a vivid memory for Hettie. She and the girls she went to school with, got water for the school at his home. One day they went there for water and when his wife admitted them to the home, they say the teacher lying on the bed "having a fit." It scared them and they reported the incident to the school board which quickly got rid of him!

Hettie recalls three girls she went to school with, Annie Crane, and Buela and Ann Sharp. There were more boys than girls attending this school. She studied altogether from the McGuffey School Readers, first through sixth, and learned her spelling from the "Old Blue Back book."
