**GEORGE YOUNG NAMED MANAGER OF LOCAL RADIO STATION**

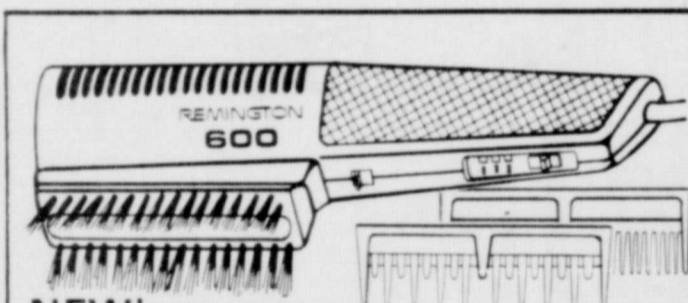

The bird was found in a field near Spearman and brought to Dr. Garnett. Needing to know procedure of handling this extremely protected specie, Dr. Garnett called State Wildlife Officials who told him hold the bird for pickup. Area game warden Starkey Whitehorn picked Mr. Eagle up Monday for Federal Game Warden officials. These birds are seen quite often in this area, many spend winter months here in the breaks. Whitehorn said "we don't know where they come from, nor where they go when they leave here."

But its perfect for those of you who don't especially care for all that bitter tasting citrus peel most fruit cakes call for. If you want a big cake, and a delicious one to boot, make this one! I've seen it called "Texas Pecan Cake" "White Fruit Cake" "Lemon Butter Cake" and other titles.

1 lb. butter, 6 eggs, 1 lb. sugar (2 1/2 C), 1 lb. flour (4C) 2 tsp. Baking pdr., 2 oz. bottle lemon extract, 1 lb. white raisins, 1 lb. broken pecans, 1/2 lb. candied cherries, 1/2 lb. candied pineapple. Mix as cake with shortening. Add nuts & fruits. Bake in large tube pan in 275 degree oven for 2 hours.

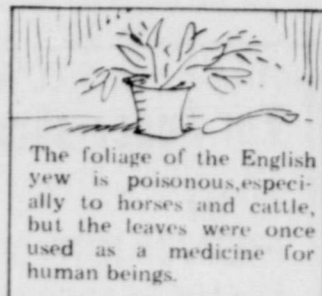
We took a drive Sunday afternoon up to Guymon, just to get out of the house and enjoy the sunshine. The country side was beautiful... all white and clean looking. Amazing what a snow cover does in changing an ugly landscape into dazzling beauty. Junk piles, weeds & rubbish all hidden under a blanket of snow.

We saw two of the biggest Golden Eagles as we drove through the breaks toward Guymon. One was perched on a fence post, while its mate devoured a rabbit at the edge of the highway. We see these birds often now. Last year about this time, hundreds of them spent months at a lake just east of Spearman. Vera Wroten, Hansford County's number one wild life protector, has had these eagles nest out to her ranch for several years now--off and on. But she provides wild fowl with the proper cover and this entices them. Several days ago Frank Chadwick found an eagle with a broken wing out in the field and brought the huge bird into Dr. Wesley Garnett. Not knowing just what to do with the bird, Dr. Garnett called the State Wildlife Department

which sent Starkey Whitehorn up Monday to pick up the golden eagle. He turned the bird over to Don Kreibel--Federal Game Warden out of Lubbock, which was orders from headquarters! The Eagle is America's National symbol and if you ever have a thought to shoot one, better think again. You'll find yourself in the hoosegow quicker for killing an Eagle than you would for rustling cattle!

A SNOWY STREET SCENE in Spearman Monday, Nov. 27 as big feather-like flakes drifted down all day long. Weather observer Billy Haden measured 3 inches of snow which melted out to 0.24 of an inch of moisture. Temperatures dropped to a cold 9-degrees Monday night. This was the 5th snowfall for the month of November, for a total of 16 inches.

# Weather SNOW

The area's fifth snow fall for November left another three inches on the ground here Monday Nov. 27 when a moisture laden cold front

moved into the Panhandle once again. U. S. weather observer, Billy Haden, has recorded a total of 16 inches of snow for November, which melted out 2.56 inches of moisture. November of 1971 was much wetter, when the area received a whopping 5.19 inches--but in the form of rain. Maize harvest last year was completed late in December. A very few maize farmers

have their crops in the elevator--there is still 70% of the grain yet in the fields. A check with grain men here this week revealed that most of the maize stalks are still standing--only a small amount has fallen due to the wet snows. One farmer, R. L. McClellan, said the grain was not hurt so long as stalks remained upright. If the weather will cooperate so fields can dry out enough that machinery

can roll, the bumper maize crop can still be harvested--in good shape. Christmas harvest? Could be. November's moisture, all falling in the form of snow, was recorded thus: Nov. 1st, 0.68; 13th 0.25; 18th 0.43; 19th 0.16; 21st 0.55; 25th 0.51; and on the 28th 0.24 which totals 2.56 inches. This brings the year's total to 17.79 still some 4 inches short of average. The coldest temperature for the season was 5 degrees on November 22. The mercury dropped to 9 degrees here Monday night. # More schooling in Hansford County

From a purely dollars and cents standpoint, what is the value of an education to a young man living in Hansford County? How much is it worth to him, in annual and lifetime earnings, to go through high school and college? On the strength of national studies conducted by the Department of Commerce, the Research Institute of the University of Michigan and others, the answer is "plenty."

The figures show that there is a close connection between education and income. With each added year in school the average person's earning prospects rise considerably. Apparently that fact has registered with the young people in the local area. They are staying in school longer than those in many areas of the country. The latest figures show that Hansford County residents, by the time they reach 25, now have a median of 12.2 years of formal education. It compares with 11.5 years in the West South Central States and with 11.6 years in the State of Texas. As detailed by the Department of Commerce, some 50.6 percent of the male population in the local area and 56.4 percent of the female, age 25 or over, are high school graduates. Just how much the added

years of schooling are producing at the present time, financially, is indicated by the general findings. They show that the median income received by a man who has attended college for four years is approximately 45 percent greater than is paid to a high school graduate. The high school graduate, in turn, has a 27 percent advantage over one who has no more than an elementary school diploma. For those who did not finish elementary

school, the wage scale is 26 percent lower, on average. The differentials, over the 40 to 45 years that a person usually works, add up to an important sum. Because elementary and secondary schools in the United States are handling more pupils, necessitating bigger expenses for salaries, supplies and maintenance, their operating costs in the past year reached \$47 billion, which was 161 percent greater than ten years ago.

## Wesley Jarvis To Attend National F-B Convention

WACO--The Texas Farm Bureau will send ten voting delegates to the 54th annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation Dec. 10-14 at the Convention Center in Los Angeles.

State delegate strength is based on membership size. The TFB ended its official year with a record high of 136,943 member families enrolled.

Also planning to attend the convention from Texas are a number of county Farm Bureau leaders, state officers and board members and staff, as well as representatives of Farm Bureau young people's activities.

National policies to guide the 2-million-member AFBF will be adopted by voting delegates from 49 states (all except Alaska) and Puerto Rico. The

TFB annual convention Nov. 12-15 in Houston approved recommendations on a number of national issues.

The TFB is asking for an extension of the Agriculture Act of 1970 and said the set-aside portion of the law should be supplemented by some form of long-term land retirement program.

TFB opposes dollar limitations on government payments. It is also against government-owned or controlled reserves of farm products.

Restrictions on use of farm chemicals and feed additives should be removed unless they are proved harmful, the TFB recommended. TFB also wants more research by USDA to develop new materials and methods which are "economical and ecologically safe" in controlling harmful insects.

Guest speakers include Governor Ronald Reagan of California and Frank E. Fitzsimmons, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. AFBF president William J. Kuhfuss and Secretary-Treasurer Roger Fleming will also address the convention.

Heading the Texas FB delegation will be J. T. (Red) Woodson of Gober, recently elected to his third one-year term as president.

Other delegates include: Vice-President Carol Chaloupka, Da Hart; Secretary-Treasurer Bill Reid, Lamesa; and State Directors H. L. King, Brownfield; T. J. Richards, Paducah; Dan Pustejovsky, Hillsboro; Edwin Sanderson, Paris; B. J. Gist, Abilene; John A. Smith, Cameron; and Henry Burton, Lufkin.

Representing TFB in young peoples' activities will be Miss Anna Marie Shutt, Edna, 1973 Queen; Miss Anna Mary (Scout) Bergner, Stinnett, state Talent Find winner; and Wesley Jarvis of rural Spearman, Discussion Meet Meet representative.

Miss Shutt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey A. Shutt, Edna, will be introduced, along with other state queens, at a general session of the convention.

Miss Bergner, daughter of Mrs. John Bergner and the late Mr. Bergner of Stinnett, will participate in the national-level Talent Find.

Jarvis, a 27-year old wheat farmer, will compete in the national Discussion Meet at the AFBF convention.

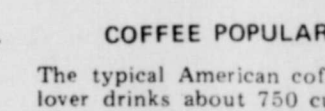

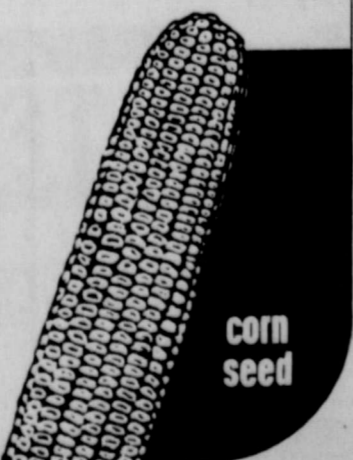

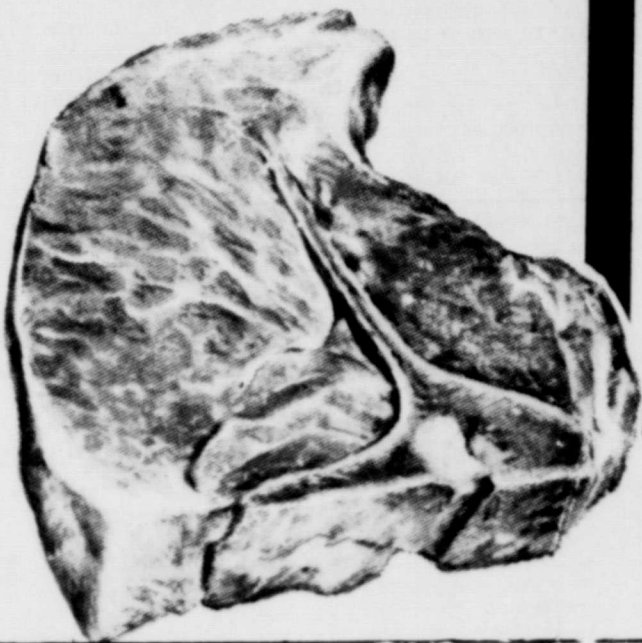
