More schooling in Hansford County

From a purely dollars and cents standpoint, what is the value of an education to a young man living in Hansford

How much is it worth to him, in annual and lifetime earnings, to go through high

school and college?
On the strength of national studies conducted by the Department of Commerce, the Research Institute of the University of Michigan and others, the answer is "plenty."

The figures show that there is a close connection between education and income. With each added year in school the average person's earning prospects rise considerably.

Apparently that fact has registered with the young people in the local area. They are staying in school longer than those in many areas of the country.

The latest figures show that Hansford County residents, by the time they reach 25, now have a median of 12.2 years of formal education. It compares with 11.5 years in the West South Central States and with 11.6 years in the State of Texas.

As detailed by the Department of Commerce, some 50.6 percent of the male population in the local area and 56.4 percent of the female, age 25 or over, are high school grad-

Just how much the added

ing at the present time, financially, is indicated by the gen-eral findings. They show that the median income received by a man who has attended college for four years is approximately 45 percent greater than is paid to a high school

graduate. The high school graduate, in turn, has a 27 percent advantage over one who has no more than an elementary school diploma. For those who did not finish elementary

percent lower, on average. The differentials, over the 40 to 45 years that a person usually works, add up to an important sum.

Because elementary and secondary schools in the United States are handling more pupils, necessitating bigger expenses for salaries, supplies and maintenance, their operating costs in the past year reached \$47 billion, which was 161 percent greater than ten years ago.

TFB annual convention Nov. 12-15 in Houston approved recommendations on a number of national issues.

The TFB is asking for an extension of the Agriculture Act of 1970 and said the set-aside portion of the law should be supplemented by some form of long-term land retirement program.

TFB opposes dollar limitations on government payments. It is also against governmentowned or controlled reserves of farm products.

Restrictions on use of farm chemicals and feed additives should be removed unless they are proved harmful, the TFB recommended. TFB also wants more research by USDA to develop new materials and methods which are "economical and ecologically safe" in controlling harmful insects.

Guest speakers include Governor Ronald Reagan of California and Frank E. Fitzsimm-ons, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters. AFBF president William J. Kuhfuss and Secretary-Treasurer Roger Fleming will also address the convention.





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
