


> LOST WHITE MALE POODLE, ANSWERS TO NAME OF CHAMP.

Gas, Telephone Utility companies Asking Hike

When the Spearman city council meets Monday, December 11, officials from High Plains Natural Gas Company and from General Telephone company will be on hand. Both these utility companies are asking for "rate adjustments.

The Gas Company submitted a rate increase proposal a short time ago which the Council turned down flat. Next Monday night company officials will show up with "an amendment clause" to the City's present contract in the form of a rate adjustment.

City Manager Mike Struve said this amendment would be acted upon by the council Monday night.

Spearman buys fuel from High Plains Gas at the rate of 35 cents per 1000 cubit foot. The company says it is having to pay this amount from its suppliers and officials are asking for a rate adjustment "clause" in their contract and promise that when their costs fluctuate -- up or down--they will pass this on

to the City. General Telephone officials are requesting rate increases on business phones and semipublic phones. They want to increase business telephone rates \$1.70 a month and convert all semi- public phones to regular business telephones. Semi-public facilities are pay phone located at a place of business.

Monday night's meeting is set for 8 p.m. instead of the usual hour of 7:30. At 7:30 the Council will meet with School Board officials to discuss the proposed new

swimming pool. The City Council has approved a "Z" shaped pool with three possible locations at the site of the present pool; at the south end of the football field, or in the Blodgett-Linn park on east 11th street. The City Council wishes

to get the school board's feelings about future plans for a competitive swim program in the school's curriculum, and also to ask what the school plans are concerning the present football field.

The football stadium is located on City property, which is leased to the school. If a new stadium might be in the school's future plans, the proposed swimming pool could be ideally built at the south end of the stadium. If not, this location might not be so good. If the school has a strong

interest (in the next few years) to include competitive swimming as a part of the PE program, the park location could be an ideal spot, just across from the high school building.

Monday night's meeting is merely another step in the City Council's program of planning the best location for the proposed new swimming pool. The pool's location must be cetermined before work on cost estimates can

begin. The Z-shaped pool plan, approved by the Council, features six 7-foot junior olympic size swimming lanes, which make up the middle length of the Z. On one end would be the diving well, and at the other end of the Z, water depth would vary from 18 inches to some 16 feet, or whatever the pool's depth is to be. A separate wasing pool for children is also in the plan. The Council meeting which begins at 8 p.m. Monday night is open to the public.



Some of you may have been wondering if we'd give you a recipe for candied citrus peel.

grapefruit or oranges. Cut into quarters; remove pulp. Put peel in saucepan; cover with cold water. Weigh down peel with a plate. Let stand several hours or overnight. Drain. With scissors, cut peel into strips onefourth inch wide. Cover peel with cold water and slowly bring to a simmer (180 F.) in a saucepan. Remove from heat. cover pan and let stand about one hour; drain. Repeat process until peel no longer tastes bitter. (more often for grapefruit.) Cover again with water and boil until yellow peel i tender. about 15 minutes. Drain well in colander. Press out water. Pack peel firmly into measuring cup to measure. Return peel to saucepan. For each cup of peel, add 1 cup of sug-ar. Place over medium heat: stir until sugar has dissolved (peel forms its own liquid). Cook over medium heat, stirring frequently, until sugar syrup is concentrated; reduce heat to low (syrup should boil gently). Continue cooking until the peel is semi-transparent and most of the syrup has boiled away. Drain in colander. Separate pieces on baking sheet. Let stand until peel feels fairly dry. sprinkle with enough sugar to give a crystalline look. Store in tightly covered container or in plastic bags in the freezer.



A Green Tree is a Safer Tree-Keep the tree green for a much longer period. Eliminate daily sweep-ups of needles on the rug. Use this simple household formula to prolong life of the tree or holiday evergreens.


Household Formula for Keeping Christmas Trees Green-1/4 cup Green Garde micronized iron, 1 gallon hot water, 2 cups light Karo corn syrup, teaspoons Clorox or other chlorinated household bleach.

Mix micronized iron into hot water. Stir in corn syrup and bleach. The Green Garde does not completely dissolve. It makes a bluish, green mixture with particles which settle to the bottom. Saw about one inch from botton of tree trunk to remove any clotted resins and to level the base, Pound or smash the base of the trunk with a hammer or axe to crush the fibers. Stand the tree in a tree holder and pour in the solution. Add warm tap water daily, as needed, to keep it filled. Note: Green



An explosion about 3 p.m. Monday at Hansford Feedyards did extensive damage to truck scales, control room and feed mill buildings.

Belived to have been caused by gas trapped under the truck scales, the explosion blew the heavy scales high up into the air and lifted a 10x50 foot slab of concrete some 12 feet, observers said.

Four men were slightly in-jured in the accident. Oliver Barnes, 41-year old mill operator; Bill Sexton, yard foreman, Eldon Vernon bunk rider and Kelly Mathews, truck driver, were all taken to Hansford Hospital. Barnes was kept overnight for observation. The others were treated and released. The men were in the control room adjacent to the scales at the time.

No fire resulted from the blast. No grain was damaged. Damage estimates were not known as this story was written, but the 'cost will run into thousands of dollars according to feedyard personnel. Repair work got underway

immediately and by 3 a.m. Tuesday the load-out area was resuming normal operations which consists of mixing at least 100 loads of feed daily for the 40,000 head of cattle now penned at Hansford Feedvards.


