The unprecedented 7 straight trips to Austin by the State Champions last year was a record. but this year added another year to make it a total of 8 straight years that the Lynxettes have won the Region AA girls basketball tournament in

The Lynxettes opened their regional play against an excellent Friona team winning the hard fought game, 54-48. This was an exceptionally tough game for the Lynxettes, and their sharp shooting at the free throw line was the difference, plus the fantastic guarding that Coach Weese has developed. In the Friona game, Christe Gressett, with her heighth, and Becky Wheeler and Teresa Beck were definitely the key to the victory as they shut down Friona's offense.

In the meantime, Slaton had an easy game with Coahoma, defeating them 62-36; this game was played right after the Spearman-Friona game.

The championship game, between the Lynxettes and Slaton was another "toughee for the Lynxettes, but Shieldknight was hitting so well, she kept the Lynxettes out in front from the beginning, and they

never did really get in trouble the entire game. Shieldknight's 31 point performance combined with the tenacious defense literally shocked the Tigerettes. Spearman, now 31-3, broke their own record for trips to the state meet with the win over Slaton. Out of the 7 trips to the state, Spearman has won 3 times, and lost some of the games, even after the whistle had blown! The Lynxettes have some great wins under their belt, but they have lost some real heart-breakers

in their last 7 years, also! Shieldknight came into this final regional game of her career, with a 36-point per game average, and needed only 22 points to break the 3,000 point mark in her career. She got tallies 3,000 and 3,001 on a jumper with seven seconds remaining in the first half. Shieldknight scored 23 points in the initial half as Spearman blitzed to a 25-15

The game was so furious, at one time the Tigerettes fought within 4 points of the Lynxettes, and this in the last quarter. All of this happened with 3:29 left in the game, but the Lynxettes put on their famous "guard stall" and picked up enough free throws to

intermission.

Slaton team played about the only type of game that you can play and beat Spearman; that is, don't foul the Lynxettes, and stop Shieldknight. They did a fine job, and it was a

great spectators game. Shieldknight finished as the highest scorer in the tournament, and along with Teresa Beck and Becky Wheeler was an all regional selection. Jones hit one field goal, and Floyd hit 2 field goals in the

Nor neither coach sing the blues.


You gave this game your very best, We're proud of you all again, And know you'll be back next To win this region then.



An effort is underway to establish the Palo Duro River Authority again, with the ultimate aim that of building a dam on Palo Duro Creek in Hansford county to impound a sizeable to Austin this weekend. If you body of water. This project was presented back in 1959, and when it finally came to a vote, it was defeated by a one vote total margin in the two counties. At around 9 p.m. Thursday night, that time there was considerable arriving in Austin early Friday rural opposition to the Palo Duro morning. project.

At that time, more than a decade ago, the problem of water was not the same as it is right now. At that time, irrigation was just in its infancy and there was apparently plenty of underground water for municipal use. In this decade, however, irrigation wells have been drilled throughout Hansford and Ochiltree ccounties, with the result a drop in the water table. City wells in Perryton that were originally set at 295 feet for water are now at 360 feet. The drop in the water table is steady, and is measured each year by the North Plains Water District.

So Perryton city officials are taking another look at the Palo Duro dam proposal as a view toward getting a supply of surface water for municipal use in future years. This dam, and the proposed lake, would be relatively close to Perryton, and would provide a lot of water for the city at some future time. Right now, of course, the city has water rights on acreage southeast of Perryton and we are in no immediate danger of running short on water. However, without careful long range planning, we could be in that shape. And if we run out of water, we are in trouble.

Most of us don't have any idea how much water is being consumed in this area. Hansford county now has 1,300 irrigation wells and while they pump water only seasonally, it totals up to a lot of water. We read recently of the controversy at Las Cruces, N. M., where opponents of a proposed refinery were blocking its construction because it consumed too much water. The company responded by stating that their plant would use no more water than a 10-inch irrigation well and there were more than 1,000 of these wells in the area around Las Cruces.



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

LEGAL NOTICES

GREETINGS. Whereas, the City Councils of Spearman, Gruver and Perryton, Texas and

Whereas, the Commissioners Courts of Ochiltree and Hansford Counties of Texas have severally passed by Resolution a petition to the Texas State Legislature requesting the following Act be legislated into law.

THEREFORE, pursuant to the Laws of the State of Texas, the proposed and requested legislation is published as fol-PALO DURO RIVER AUTHORITY

AUTHORITY CREATED Section 1. By virtue of Sec-tion 59, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, there is hereby created a conservation and reclamation district to be known as 'Palo Duro River Authority of Texas" (hereinafter sometimes referred to as the "Authority which shall be a governmental agency, a body politic and corporate, and a political sub-division of this state. TERRITORY COMPRISING THE AUTHORITY AND BENE-FITS THERETO

Sec. 2. The Authority hereby created and established shall comprise all of the territory contained within the Counties of Hansford and Ochiltree. It is hereby found and determined that all of the land thus included in the Authority will be benefited by the improvements to be acquired and constructed by the Authority, and that the Authority is created to serve a public se and benefit. POWERS OF THE AUTHORITY

Sec. 3. The Authority with-

in its limits is hereby empowered: (a) to develop, construct or purchase dams and reservoirs. The Authority is empowered to construct or to purchase all plants and other facilities necessary or useful for the purpose of providing a source of water supply and storing, processing such water and transporting and distributing it for irrigation, livestock raising, agricultural, municipal, domestic and industrial purposes. The Authority shall at all times have power to develop or purchase additional sources of water and to improve, enlarge and extend its water system. The Authority is also empowered to make contracts for the purchase of water; (b) in order to preserve and protect the purity of the waters of the state and of the Authority and conserve and reclaim said waters for beneficial use by the inhabitants of the Authority, to provide all plants, works, facilities and appliances incident to or helpful or necessary to the collection, transportation, processing, disposal, and control of such waters for agricultural, muniing, mining and industrial purposes; and (c) the Authority is empowered to impound, store, control and conserve the storm and flood waters and the unappropriated flow waters within the limits of the Authority, including but not limited to the storm and flood waters and unappropriated flow waters of Palo Duro River and the tributaries thereof within and without its water shed by complying with the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 128, Revised Statutes of Texas as amended.

Sec. 4. For the purpose of carrying out any power or authority conferred by this Act, the Authority shall have the right to acquire land and easements, by condemnation in the manner provided by Title 52, Revised Civil Statutes, as amended, relating to eminent domain. The amount of and character of any interest in land or casements thus to be acquired shall be determined by the Board of Directors. The Authority shall have the same power as is conferred upon ater control and improvement districts by Section 49 of Chapter 25, Acts of the 39th Legislature, with reference to making surveys and attending to

other business of the District. Sec. 5. No dam or other facilities for impounding water shall be constructed until the plans therefor are approved by the Texas Water Rights Commission. The Authority is not authorized to develop or otherwise acquire underground sources of water. The Authority may sell, trade, or otherwise dispose of any real or personal property deemed by this Commission not to be needed for Authority purposes, subject to the terms of any deed of trust or other inden-

ture issued by the Commission. Sec. 6. The Authority is authorized to enter into contracts with cities and others for supplying water to them. The Authority is also authorized to contract with any city for the rental or leasing of, or for the operation of the water production, water supply, water filtration or purification and water supply facilities of such city upon such consideration as the Authority and the city may agree. Any such contract may be upon such terms and for such time as the parties may agree, and it may provide that it shall continue in effect until bonds specified therein and refunding bonds issued in lieu of such bonds are paid.

Sec. 7. The Authority is

empowered to obtain through appropriate hearings an appropriation permit or permits from the Texas Water Rights Commission, as provided in Chapter 1 of Title 128, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended. Thereafter such permit, either upon application of the Authority or at the will of the Texas Water Rights Commission, may be modified by said Commission after an appropriate hearing to increase or decrease the amount of water which may be appropriated. and the amount which may be stored by the Authority to meet fluctuating demands, either upon application by the Authority or by its own action the Texas Water Rights Commission shall redetermine the maximum amount of water which the Authority may store in its reservoir and in making such determination it shall consider the needs of the cities and others that purchase water from

the Authority. Sec. 8. The Authority is authorized to acquire or construct within or without the boundaries of the Authority but not outside any county in which the Authority is located, a dam or dams and all works, plants and other facilities necessary or useful for the purpose of impounding, processing and transporting water to cities and others for municipal, agricultural, domestic, industrial, oil field flooding and mining purposes. The size of the dam and reservoir shall be determined by the Board of Directors, taking into consideration probable future increases in water requirements, and the size of the dam shall not be limited by the amount of water initially authorized by the Texas Water Rights Commission to be impounded therein. No dam or other facilities for impounding water shall be constructed until the plans therefor are approved by the

Sec. 9. The Authority is empowered to acquire land within the boundaries of the Authority. and to construct, lease or otherwise acquire all works, plants and other facilities necessary or useful for the purpose of diverting, further impounding or storing water, processing such water and transporting it to cities and others for agricultural, municipal, domestic, industrial, oil field flooding and mining purposes.

Sec. 10. For the purpose of carrying out any power or authority conferred by this Act the Authority shall have the right to acquire the fee simple title to land and other property and easements (including land needed for the reservoir and dam and flood easements above the probable high water line around any such reservoirs) within the boundaries of the Authority, by condemnation in the manner provided by Title 2. Revised Civil Statutes, as amended, relating to eminent domain. The Authority is hereby declared to be a municipal corporation within the meaning of Article 3268 of said Title 52, except that the Authority shall not have the right to so condemn any property which may be owned by any other political subdivision. city or town: provided, however, that as against persons, firms and corporations, or receivers or trustees thereof, who have the power of eminent domain, the fee title may not be condemned, but the Authority may condemn only an easement. The authority herein created shall be and it is MAIN hereby empowered to control, store, conserve, protect, distribute and utilize the storm and flood waters within the area of the Authority for all useful purposes permitted by law; also, to carry out flood prevention and control measires within the Authority and to prevent or aid in preventing daniage to the lands of the Authority and the soil and fertility thereof; to cooperate with all other districts, departments or agencies of the State Government, or any agency, representative, instrumentality or department of the United States Government: and to receive and accept technical and financial assistance therefrom in the accomplishment of said purposes. The said Authority is further authorized and

(a) The Board of Directors of the Authority shall have the power to adopt and promulgate all reasonable regulations to secure, maintain and preserve the sanitary condition of all water in and to flow into any reservoir owned by the Authority to prevent waste of water or the unauthorized use thereof, to regulate residence, hunting, fishing, boating and camping, and all recreational and business privileges, along or around any such reservoir or any body of land, or easement owned by the Au-

the breach of any regulation of the Authority, which pena ties shall not exceed fines of more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.), or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or may provide both such fine and such imprisonment. The penalties hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalties provided the laws of Texas and may be enforced by complaints filed in the appropriate court of jurisdiction, provided, however, that no rule or regulation which provides a penalty for the violation thereof shall be in effect, as to enforcement of the penalty, until five (5) days next after the Authority may have caused a substantive statement of the particular rule or regulation and the penalty for the violation thereof to be published, once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks in the county in which such reservoir is situated, or in any county in which it is partly situated. Texas (b) In December of 1973 and in December of each year hereafter the Commissioners Court of each county contained in the Authority shall appoint a director or directors from such county whose term or terms are about to expire. Any vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired term by the governing body of the appropriate county. Four (4) members of the Board of Directors Commissioners Court of each county contained in the Authority, and each director shall reside in the county from which he is appointed.

(c) Each director shall serve for his term of office as herein provided, and thereafter until his successor shall be appointed and qualified. No person shall be appointed a director unless he resides in and owns taxable property in the county from which he is appointed. No member of a governing body of a county, and no employee of a county shall be appointed as director. Such directors shall subscribe the Constitutional oath of office. and each shall give bond for the faithful performance of his duties in the amount of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000). the cost of which shall be paid by the Authority. A majority shall constitute a quorum. If any director moves from the county from which he is appointed or otherwise ceases to be a director, the Commissioners Court of such county shall appoint a director to succeed him, for the unexpired

(d) Each director shall receive a fee of not to exceed Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.) for attending each meeting of the than Fifty Dollars (\$50.) shall be paid to any director for meetings held in any one (1) calendar month. Each director shall also be entitled to receive not to exceed Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25) per day devoted to the business of the Authority and to reimbursement for actual expenses incurred in attending to Authority business provided that such service and expense are expressly

approved by the Board. Sec. 18. The Board of Directors shall elect from its number a president and a vice president of the Authority, and such other officers as in the judgment of the Board are necessary. The president shall be the chief executive officer of the Authority and the presiding officer of the Board, and shall have the same right to vote as any other director. The vice president shall perform all duties and exercise all powers conferred by this Act upon the president when the president is absent or fails or declines to act except the president's right to vote. The Board shall also appoint a secretary and a treasurer who may or may not be members of the Board, and it may combine those offices. The treasurer shall give bond in such amount as may be required by the Board of Directors. The condition of such bond shall be that he will faithfully account for all monev which shall come into his custody as treasurer of the Authority, and the Board may adopt a seal for the Authority.

Sec. 19. The Board of Directors, from time to time. shall be authorized to make or cause to be made surveys and engineering investigations for the information of the Authority to facilitate the accomplishment of the purposes for which the Authority is created; and may employ a general manager, attorneys, accountants, engineers, or other technical or non-technical employees or assistants; fix the amount and manner of their compensation: and may provide for the payment of expenditures deemed essential to the proper maintenance of the Authority and its affairs. The power to employ and discharge employees may be conferred upon the general manager.

AUTHORITY MAY ISSUE BONDS Sec. 20 (a) For the purpose

of providing a source of water supply for cities and other users for agricultural, municipal, domestic, industrial, oil field flooding and mining purposes, as authorized by this Act, and for the purpose of carrying out any other power or authority conferred by this Act, the Authority is empowered to issue its negotiable bonds to be payable from revenues or taxes or both revenues and taxes of the Authority as are pledged by resolution of the Board of Directors. Pending the issuance of definitive bonds the Board may authorize the delivery of neotiable interim bonds or notes, ligible for exchange or substitution by use of the definitive

The term "net revenues" as used in this Section shall mean the gross revenues and income of the Authority from all sources after deduction of the amount maintaining and operating the

Authority and its properties. (e) The Authority is also empowered to issue bonds payable from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable property therein, or to issue bonds secured by and payable from both such taxes and the revenues of the Authority. Where bonds are issued payable wholly or partially from ad valorem taxes, it shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to levy a tax sufficient to pay the bonds and the interest there on as such bonds and interest become due, but the rate of the tax for any year may be fixed after giving consideration to the money received from the pledged revenues which may be available for payment of principal and interest to the extent and in the manner permitted by the resolution authorizing the issuance

of the bonds. (f) Where bonds payable wholly from revenues are issued, it shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to fix, and from time to time to revise, the rates of compensation for water sold and services rendered by the Authority which will be sufficient to pay the expense of operating and maintaining the facilities of the Authority and to pay the bonds as they mature and the interest as it accrues and to maintain the reserve and other funds as provided in the resolution authorizing the bonds. Where bonds payable partially from revenues are issued it shall be the duty of the Board to fix, and from time to time to revise, the rate of compensation for water sold and services rendered y the Authority which will be sufficient to assure compliance with the resolution authorizing

the bonds. (g) From the proceeds from the sale of the bonds, the Authority may set aside an amount for the payment of interest expected to accrue during construction and a reserve interest and sinking fund, and such provision may be made in the resolution authorizing the bonds. Proceeds from the sale of the bonds may also be used for the payment of all expenses necessarily incurred in accomplishing the purpose for which this Authority is created, including expenses of issuing and selling the bonds. The

proceeds from the sale of the onds may be temporarily invested in direct obligations of the United States Government maturing in not more than one (1) year from the date of investment. (h) In the event of a default

or a threatened default in the

payment of principal or of interest on bonds payable wholly or partially from revenues, any court of competent jurisdiction may, upon petition of the holders of ourstanding bonds, appoint a receiver with authority to collect and receive all income of the Authority except taxes, employ and discharge agents and employees of the Authority, take charge of funds on hand (except funds received from taxes unless commingled) and manage the proprietary affairs of the Authority without consent or hindrance by the Directors. Such receiver may also be authorized to sell or make contracts for the sale of water or renew such contracts with the approval of the court appointing him. The court may vest the receiver with such other powers and duties as the court may find necessary for the protection of the holders of the bonds. The resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds or the trust indenture securing them may limit or qualify the rights of less than all of the outstanding bonds payable from the same source to institute or prosecute any litigation affecting the Authority's property or income.

Sec. 21. The Authority is authorized to issue refunding bonds for the purpose of refunding any outstanding bonds authorized by this Act and interest thereon. Such refunding bonds may be issued to refund more than one (1) series of outstanding bonds and combine the pledges for the outstanding bonds for the security of the refunding bonds, and may be secured by other or additional revenues and mortgage liens. The provisions of this law with reference to the issuance by the Authority of other bonds, their security, and their approval by the Attorney General and the remedies of the holders shall be applicable to refund-ing bonds. Refunding bonds shall be registered by the Comptroller upon surrender and cancellation of the bonds to be refunded, but in lieu thereof, the resolution authorizing their issuance may provide that they shall be sold and the proceeds thereof deposited in the bank where the original bonds are payable, in which case the refunding bonds may be issued in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and the interest on the original bonds to their option date or maturity date, and the Comptroller shall register them without concurrent surrender and cancellation of the original bonds.

Sec. 22. Any bonds (including refunding bonds) authorized by this law, not payable wholly from ad valorem taxes, may be additionally secured by a trust indenture under which the Trustee may be a bank having trust powers situated either within or outside of the State of Texas. Such bonds, within the discretion of the Board of Directors, may be additionally secured by a deed of trust or mortgage lien upon physical properties of the Authority and all franchises, easements, water rights and appropriation permits, leases and contracts and all rights appurtenant to such properties vesting in the trustee power to sell the properties for the payment of the indebtedness, power to operate the properties and all other powers and authority for the further security of the bonds. Such trust indenture, regardless of the existence of the deed of trust or mortgage lien on the properties may contain any provisions prescribed by the Board of Directors for the security of the bonds and the preservation of the trust estate, and may make provision for amendment or modification thereof and the issuance of bonds to replace lost or mutilated bonds, and may condition the right to expend Authority money or sell Authority property upon approval of a registered professional engineer selected as provided therein, and may make provision for the investment of funds of the Authority. Any purchaser under a sale under the deed of trust lien. where one is given, shall be the absolute owner of the properties, facilities and rights so purchased and shall have the right to maintain and operate the same. Sec. 23. (a) No bonds pay-

able wholly or partially from ad valorem taxes (except refunding bonds) shall be issued unless authorized by an election at which only the qualified voters who reside in the Authority and who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation and unless a majority of the votes cast in each city contained in the Authority is in favor of the issuance of the bonds. If a majority of the votes cast in any city contained in the Authority are against the issuance of the bonds, the Board of Directors may adopt a resolution detaching the territory of such city from the Authority if the Board finds that it is to the best interest of the Authority to issue

onds payable wholly or partially from taxes, but no territory shall be detached from the Authority after the issuance of bonds which are payable from revenues or taxes or both. Bonds not payable wholly or partially from ad valorem taxes may be issued without an election.

(b) Such election may be called by the Board of Directors without a petition. The resolution calling the election shall specify the time and places of holding the same, the purpose for which the bonds are to be issued, the maximum amount thereof, the maximum maturity thereof, the form of the ballot, and the presiding judge for each voting place. The presiding judge serving at each voting place shall appoint one (1) assistant judge and at least two (2) clerks to assist in holding such election. Notice of the election shall be given by publishing a substantial copy thereof in one (1) newspaper published in each city contained in the Authority for two (2) consecutive weeks. The first publication shall be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the election. In any city in which no newspaper is published, notice shall be given by posting a copy of the resolution in three (3) public places.

(c) The returns of the election shall be made to and canvassed by the Board of Directors of the Authority.

(d) The General Laws relating to elections shall be applicable to elections held under this Section of this law except as otherwise provided in this

Sec. 24. After any bonds (including refunding bonds) are authorized by the Authority. such bonds and the record relating to their issuance shall be submitted to the Attorney General for his examination as to the validity thereof. Where such bonds recite that they are secured by a pledge of the proceeds of a contract theretofore made between the Authority and any city or other governmental agency, authority or district, a copy of such contract and the proceedings of the city or other governmental agency, authority or district authorizing such contract shall also be submitted to the Attorney General. If such bonds have been authorized and if such contracts have been made in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas he shall approve the bonds and such contracts and the bonds then shall be registered by the Comptroller of Public Accounts. Thereafter the bonds, and the contracts, if any, shall be valid and binding and shall be incontestable for any cause.

Sec. 25. All bonds of the Authority shall be and are hereby declared to be legal and authorized investments for banks, savings banks, trust companies, building and loan association, savings and loan association, insurance companies, fiduciaries, trustees, guardians, and for the sinking fund of cities, towns, villages, counties, school districts, or other political corporations or subdivision of the State of Texas. Such bonds shall be eligible to secure the deposit of any and all public funds of the State of Texas, and any and all public funds of cities, towns, villages, counties, school districts, or other political corporations or subdivision of the State of Texas; and such bonds shall be lawful and sufficient security for said deposits to the extent of their value, when accompanied by all unmatured

coupons appurtenant thereto. Sec. 26. The accomplishment of the purposes stated in this Act is for the benefit of the people of this state and for the improvement of their properties and industries, and the Authority, in carrying out the purposes of this Act will be performing an essential public function under the Constitution. The Authority shall not be required to pay any tax or assessment on the project or any part thereof, and the bonds issued hereunder and their transfer and the income therefrom, including the profits made on the sale thereof, shall at all times be free from taxation within this state. Sec. 27. Small School Districts to be Phased Out

AUSTIN -- A request for legislation which would authorize the State Board of Education to develop an overall state plan for school district organization is being submitted to both the Governor and 63rd Legislature.

Under the proposal, the State Board of Education would submit a plan specifically setting out district realignments and legal requirements for adequate school districts to the 64th Legislature in 1975.
Procedures for involving

school officials and local citizens in the organization plan would also be included, according to the proposal sent to Capitol Hill by Ben R. Howell of El Paso, Board Chairman.

The new proposal follows two earlier requests concerned with school district organiza-

tion in Texas. The first would declare dormant all school districts except those which are countywide but do not provide an accredited program in all 12 grades this year. These school districts would be attached to existing districts which do provide accredited 12-grade programs. In most cases, they would be the units now offering high school programs to students from the incomplete districts.

The second proposal would phase out state support for county superintendents and county school boards.

A number of these small. incomplete idstricts have extraordinarily high valuation per student, the Board's request for legislation points "These tax haven districts

contribute substantailly to the unequal distribution across the state of fiscal capability to support sound educational programs, " Howell adds.

Currently, 122 Texas counties have elected county school superintendents, 109 have county judges serving as ex officio superintendents paid from local funds, and 21 have neither an elected nor ex officio superintendent.

There are now 230 county school boards supported by \$3.2 million in state funds budgeted for county school administration.

Under the State Board of Education plan, county school administrations would no longer be supported by the state. However, local citizens could finance them with local money. State fiscal support would be phased out over "a reasonable time" with provision for converting common and

rural high school districts to independent school districts. A total of 154 school districts which do not now offer full 12-year accredited programs would become dor-

The new state plan for school district organization, which would be sent to the 64th Legislature in January, 1975, would take Texas one more step along the road to truly efficient public education, Howell said.

"Demands of modern education have increased and expanded while shifts in population have created a number of problems both in school programs and in district organization," the Board chiarman added.

"It appears that the time has come when a decision should be made with respect to responsible organization of school districts in Texas." The Board's plan would be

Two new special passports are available for sale or issuance at the Spearman Post Office.

Known as the Golden Eagle Passport and the Golden Age Passport, the wallet size, calendar year permits provide en-try to areas of the National Park System where entrance fees are charged.
The Golden Eagle Passport.

which sells for ten dollars, admits the bearer and persons accompanying him in a single, private, noncommercial vehic le to areas of the National Park System, where entrance fees are charged, such as the Everglades National Park in Florida. There are 53 National Park System areas in the United States where federal entrance fees are charged. The permit is non-transferable and does not cover Federal special

recreation use fees that may be charged within the area. The Golden Age Passport is issued free of charge to persons 62 years of age or over. It must be applied for in person so that proof of age can be established. This permit provides the same entry privileges as the Golden Eagle Passport, and in addition, provides the bear-

Proof of age for issuance of the Golden Age Passport may be established by presenting suitable identification, such as a driver's license or birth certificate, or by signing an affidavit attesting that age is 62

or older. The Golden Eagle Passport can save money for the frequent visitor to any one or more of the National Park System areas charging entrance fees. The infrequent visitor may find it to his advantage not to purchase the Golden Eagle Passport and to pay the single-visit entrance fee if the total fees are expected to be less than ten dollars.

Non-Drinking Squirrels survive

Do cat squirrels have to drink water to survive? No. says Bill Wright, Parks and Wildlife Department biologist headquartered at Silsbee.

Texas. During the summer of 1972. two pens of squirrels were tested. Both pens were fed a balanced natural diet insofar as possible. Known squirrel foods -- leaves, stems, buds, mushrooms, and insects-were offered daily. One pen was furnished with a continuous supply of drinking water. The other was not. Recording of periodic body conditions including weights re-

vealed no thirst effects. "At the end of the test period, "said Wright, "There was no apparent difference in the condition of the squirrels. Even though the squirrels in the watered pen took an average of one ounce of water per day during the test and the others had none, there was no significant difference

even in body weight. Wright theorized that most cat squirrels, which range mostly in bottomland, have access to water within their daily range, and probably take it. However this study reveals that the species can survive during periods when surface water may disappear.

He also pointed out that the fox squirrel living principally in more upland range, where water is more scarce. is probably able to survive even better without a drink.

Coyote Control helps Antelope Production

AUSTIN -- There's a longstanding argument between stockmen and conservationists as to what effect coyotes have on livestock.

What effect do the predators have on the Trans-Pecos region antelope herd? Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department biologists under project leader Tom Hailey of Marfa conducted a yearlong study to determine the causes and degree of mortality of the Trans-Pecos antelove herd. During the late fall and early winter of 1971 and 1972,

life in cooperation with local landowners.

It had been noted for the past several years during an-nual antelope census that fawn production in the particular area has been below

Controversial Water Plan Is Resurrected

By CRAIG ENDICOTT

PERRYTON -- Folks in Ochiltree and Hansford counties know the worth of water. Their wells are running dry. Government entities, faced with the stark fact that 105

wells have been abandoned in the two counties in just over two years, have decided to resurrect a highly controversial municipal water plan.

But unlike 1962, when the fighting was so intense that

the measure of defeat for the plan was a scant one vote, opposition to a plan to create dam and reservoir on Palo Duro Creek north of Spearman seems to have mellowed The Perryton City Council, meeting Tuesday night to consider adoption of the plan. which then must win approval of several state and federal agencies before voters once again decide its fate in a bicounty bond issue, is the only local governing unit left to ratify the proposal.

City councils in Gruver and Spearman and commissioners courts in both counties have given their stamp of approv-The Perryton council is

the resolution reads, the proposed dam will rise from the floor of Palo Duro Creek just northeast of its confluence with Horse Creek, 11 miles north and two miles east of Spearman.

The dam, to be of the earthen-fill variety with con-crete spillways, will back wa-ter 10 miles into the watershed area. The reservoir, to provide municipal water for Gruver, Spearman and Perry-ton, will be three miles wide and about 150 feet deep, according to W. Craig Davidson, executive director of Econom-Development Agency of Hansford County.

No cost estimate has been placed on the proposal, which is similar to the plan offered 11 years ago in the election that called for the issuing of in the neighborhood of \$3 mil lion in bonds.

Davidson said Tuesday he thinks the plan might receive funding through the Economic Development Agency since Hansford County is one of 19 counties in West Texas qualifying under the act, which in part is designed to increase employment in counties lagging behind the rate of growth of other counties throughout a state.

ject as protection from the ravages of runoff water that causes extensive erosion damage in the counties when spring storms hit. Currently, there are no flood control projects in the upper area of the Palo Duro. He also foresees no problem

Ochiltree County Judge Spencer Whippo says the plan now proposed "seems much more favorable — a lot of the kinks and faults have been worked out of the old plan."

Whippo, mayor of Perryton at the time the first plan was put to a vote, joined other leading citizens in campaigning against the plan. He said the reason for much of the controversy was that cities using the water had to finance their own aqueduct systerm in tapping the lake.

The cost for the piping compared to the little amount of water Perryton, 18 miles downhill from the proposed dam site, would require at the time, made the former proposal unfeasible, Whippo

The aqueduct system and dam are to be financed by federal funding under the current proposal.







SCREWWORMS BACK AFTER LULL

MISSION -- After an 18-day lull, screwworms are back. Officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Project announced Monday (Feb. 12) that two samples received over the weekend from Rio Grande Valley locations had been identified as the feared

flesh-eating worms. They were the first positive samples received since January 22 and eliminated any hope by livestock producers that cold weather had killed them off in South Texas.

One was from a cow east of San Manuel in Hidalgo County while the second was discovered in a dog on a ranch east of Raymondville in Willacy County.

"These cases point up the fact that we still have screwworms in South Texas despite the recent run of weather unfavorable to the screwworm, said Dr. James Novy, veterin-arian in charge of field opera-

Despite the setback, Novy stood by his earlier prediction that chances for a light screwworm year appear "very favor-able" because of the low infestations presently in the northern Mexico overwintering

The premises of two latest cases will receive 200,000 sterile flies weekly for six week, s This is in addition to the continuing blanket grid releases which rain 2, 400 flies per square mile each week on the entire area south of a line connecting Laredo and Corpus

Texas has had 48 cases to date in 1973.

Driver Education Program Discriminator USDA Catt

Austin-Children of less afflu-traffic crashes are and crippler of the ent Texas families are being denied the life preserving advantages of Driver Education, according to Robert F. Miller, Dallas Vice President for Traf-fic Safety, Texas Safety Association.

Speaking before the Educa-tion Committee of the House of Representatives, Mr. Miller urged adoption of HB 222 that would place driver education in the foundation school program.

"Because Driver Education in Texas is not a part of the foundation school program, the cost to the student is prohibitive in many cases, " Miller states. "There is no set fee. Some students pay as much as Announced \$60 to take the Driver Education course, and others as little as \$15. This is the worst kind of economic discrimination.

"The size of fees charged in many school districts in the state are keeping teenagers from lower income families from enrolling in Driver Education courses. Because of this. many young drivers and the people they meet on the highways are more vulnerable to traffic crashes. The size of the fees currently charged could well be one reason why only 61% of eligible Texas teens take Driver Education. This could also be the reason that

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


