Budgets, tax rate on council agenda

The Friona city council will meet in regular session Monday September 14 at 6:30 p.m. in council chambers, 619 Main St. All council meetings are open to the public.

The first business item on the agenda is to hold a public hearing to hear comments about the proposed city budget for fiscal year 2015-2016 and comments regarding proposed 2015 tax rate of \$0.7512 per \$100 valuation.

After any public comments the council will consider and take action on approval of adopting the budget and making appropriation for support of city government for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2015 and ending September 30, 2016.

The next item will be discussing the adoption of the tax rate of \$0.7512 to support the city's general fund and sinking fund for the 2015-2016 fiscal year.

The council will consider and take action on approval of awarding the re-roofing bid at Prairie Acres. They will also vote to change the October meeting from October 12 (Columbus Day holiday) to Monday October 19.

Remaining agenda items include Friona police department report, approval of accounts payable for August, approval of the August financial statement, take action to close city

hall Wednesday September 30 for year-end procedures, discuss the capital project fund, and consider and take action on approval of the fiscal year budget for Prairie Acres/Heritage Estates.

Agenda items above are the tentative agenda for Monday's meeting and are subject to change. The final agenda is posted on the front window of city hall 72 hours prior to the Monday meeting.

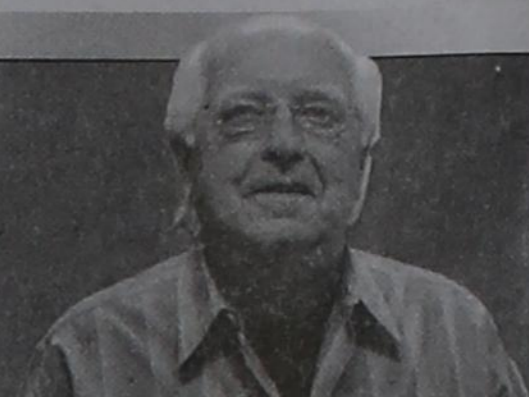

being pejorative

ary Clinton is fading in the polls. There is not enough tax money to pay for all of the benefits Bernie Sanders wants to give away. (There I go with that pejorative thing again. Just can't help it.)

Republicans are being accused of every mean pejorative you can possibly think of. Republicans hate women and Mexicans and Obama. They are not too crazy about Hillary either. They love rich people and hate the poor. They love guns and the NRA and hate Iran.

Republicans should stop trying to win over the low information, uninformed minority voters. The only way they can gain those votes is how much free stuff

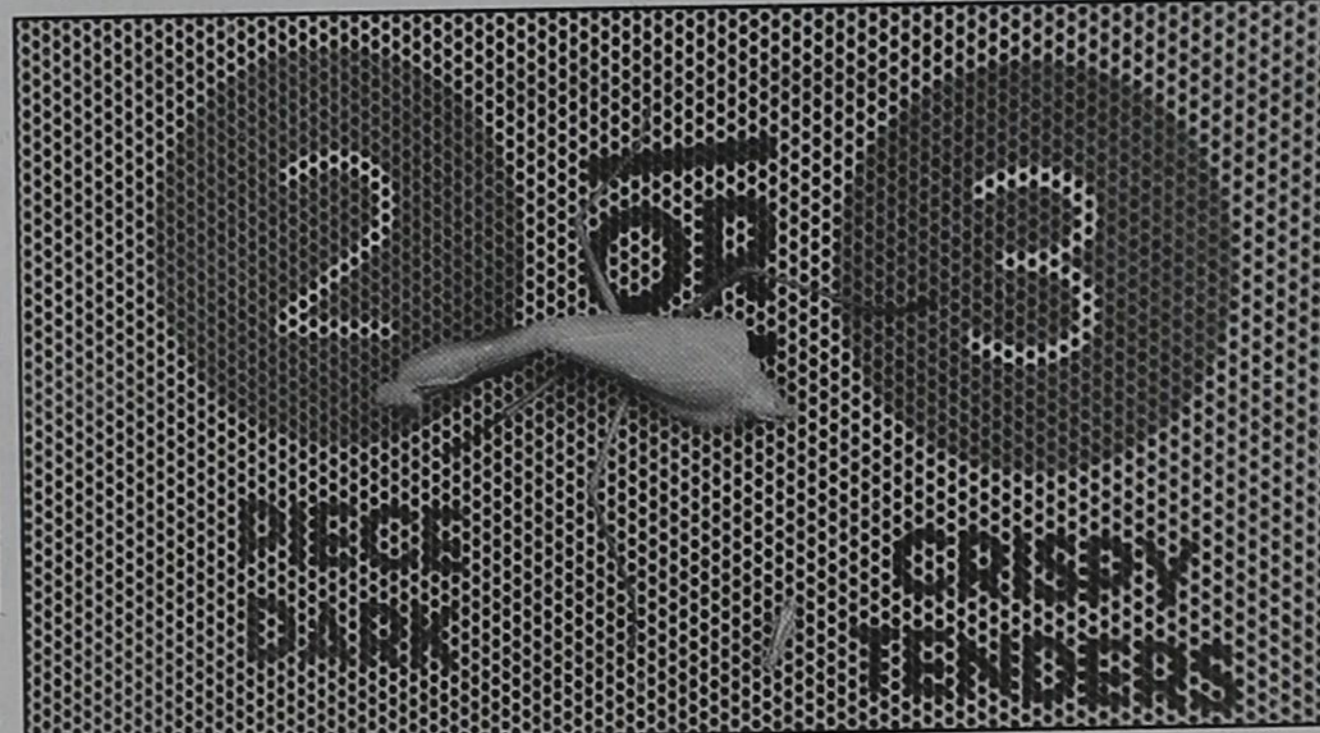

Run and hide! Fair food season is here!

Fair season is here. With it comes the new foods that can be sold on a stick, deep-fried, and clogs every artery in your heart. At the Iowa State Fair this year there is a half-pound Ultimate Bacon Brisket Bomb. It is smoked brisket infused with jalapeno, cheese, onion and seasonings wrapped in bacon. Everything is better with bacon...right? If you want dessert with the Ultimate then slide on down the way for apple pie on a stick served with a side of caramel and apple wedges. This is somewhat healthy...an apple a day? Thirsty? You can imbibe an ultra-cold canned beer served at a temperature of at least 27 degrees Fahrenheit. Can everyone say "Brain Freeze"? At the Minnesota State Fair you can find a Grandma Deb's Snicker Bar Salad. This delicious creation is made of chopped Snickers bars and Granny Smith apples tossed in vanilla pudding with whipped cream and drizzled with caramel sauce. Dentists probably love this one because of the cavities it will cause. Yummy! If you are into the savory side there is a Mac & Cheese Cupcake. Mac & cheese is nestled in a breadcrumb crust, then sprinkled with breadcrumbs and frosted with a dollop of Cheez Whiz. This is one that will go good with the toddler set. Just down the way from Mac & Cheese Cupcakes is Stuffed Italian Meatloaf on a stick. This interesting morsel is Italian meatloaf stuffed with Mozzarella, pepperoni, topped with marinara sauce and a Parmesan herb blend and served on...you guessed it...a stick. A good side dish for the meatloaf and macaroni and cheese could be Totchos. This is tator tots smothered in cheddar cheese sauce with seasoned sour cream, bacon bits and green onions. The good news on this one is it is gluten-free. New at the Amarillo Tri-State Fair this year is pecan cobbler and ice cream, strawberry puff pastry, deep fried pickles, deep fried jalapenos, fried potato chips, fried okra, and strawberry and banana smoothies. Nothing too outrageous to report this year. There are the usual deep fried goodies of ice cream, banana splits, hand-dipped corn dogs, jalapeno cheese on a stick, Snickers, calamari and eggplant. Going to the fair is an adventure in Tasteville. You do not go to the fair to stick with everyday, humdrum foods. You go for the foods that are not the norm and on a stick. Foods like funnel cake in every flavor under the sun from plain with powdered sugar to pumpkin and spice, Cowboy Taters covered in cheese and bacon, corn on the cob still in the husk dripping with real butter and dusted with paprika or garlic, deep fried chocolate dipped cheesecake all topped off with fresh squeezed lemonade await you. Just remember to do the rides before the food otherwise it could be quite ugly. The Tri-State Fair begins on September 18 and runs until September 26. Moreover, if you have not had your fill of fairs and fair food the South Plains Fair in Lubbock is from September 25 to October 3. I am thinking that I may have to go and walk the food court but I will not be eating everything in sight because my eyes and my stomach are just not that big...no one's is!

Our Class is best remembered for...

1908-School is organized, 1 teacher Miss Roxie Witherpoon, 1 room building, 15 to 18 students.
1911-1912-First red brick school built at cost of \$12,000, 2 teachers added.
1916-1st graduating class with 5 students, reception held at the Friona Hotel on Main Street.
1916-1st girls basketball team organized. Boys team organized some time before that.
Circa 1922-Basketball, football and track added. W. H. Saffold, superintendent.
1922-23-Bill Guyer suggested the name Chieftains. The colors red and white were chosen as school colors, "red to represent the red-blooded fighting original Americans and white representing the true, honest and clean life..."
Ag and Home Economics added. First red building is destroyed by fire in 1922.

1941-"Chieftain's Fight" School Song is written by Leon Brown and arranged by Glenn Cunningham, who later served as FHS Band Director. School Cheerleaders voted on the song, according to Gertrude Murphree, a former FHS cheerleader, in Friona On Parade by Bill Ellis c. 2006.
1949-Chieftain Band organized and Chieftain Field on Highway 60 built.

2006-07-State Historical Marker added for Lead in Integration, as part of Friona's Centennial. Jim Parker, Superintendent.
2008-Friona Schools Centennial celebrated.
2014-15-Renovations and new additions at High School, Event Center and Concession Stand, Scoreboard. Plant includes Primary School, Elementary School, Junior High School and High School campuses. 230 Staff, including 109 Teachers, 1,041 Enrollment; Kenny Austin, Superintendent.

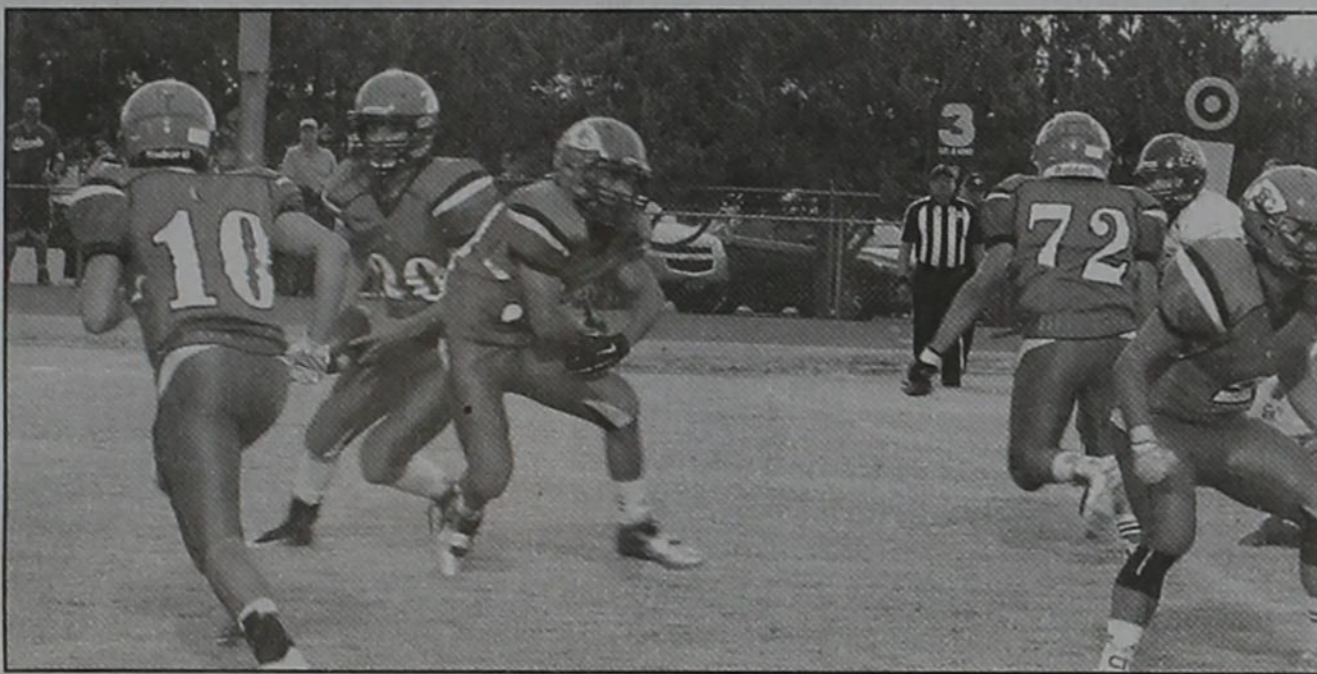

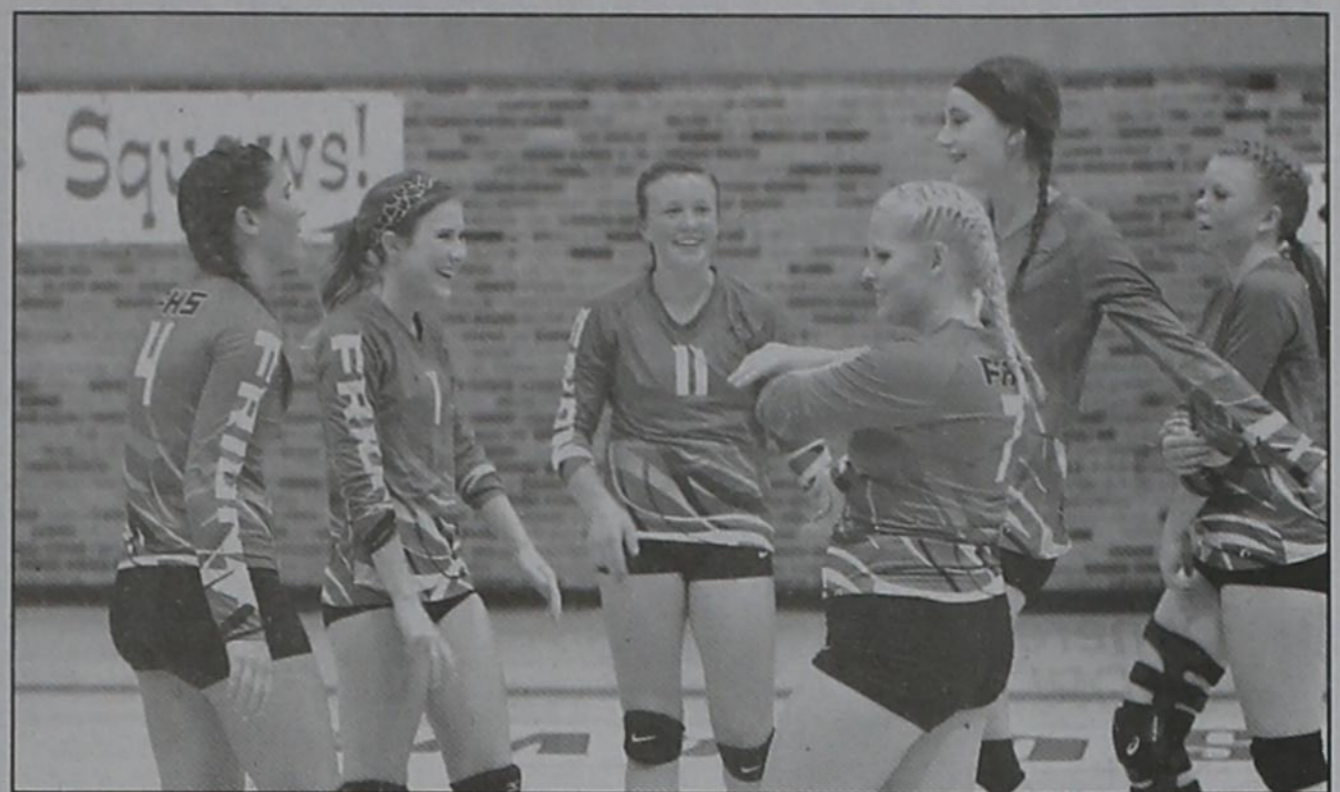

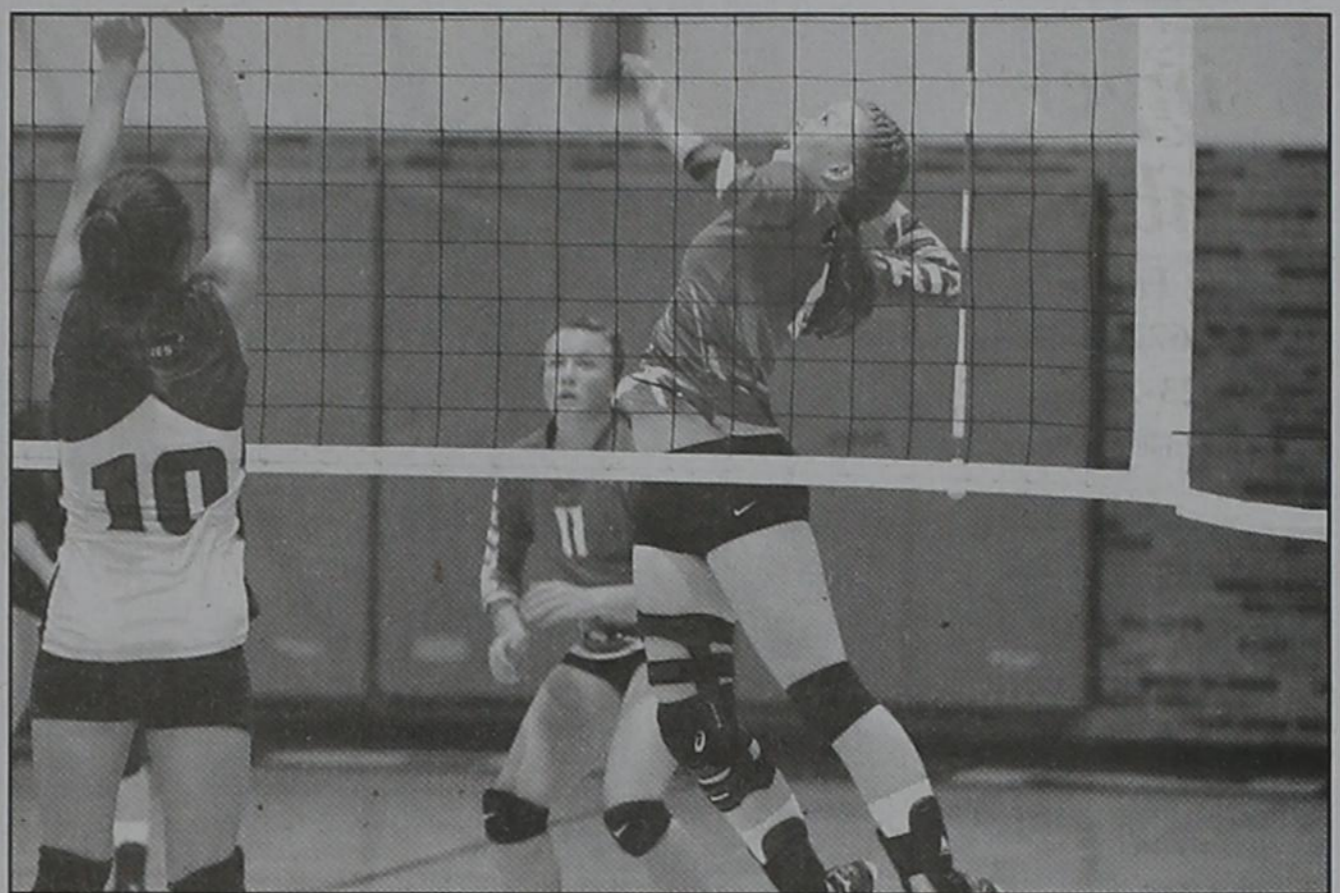

After school snack ideas for your hungry kiddos

Does your child come home and the first thing they say is, "I'm hungry"? The Food Network has a few food ideas how to answer that tough question "What do I feed them that is healthy and won't ruin their dinner?"

1. Sweet Bagel Chips-Slice stale cinnamon-raisin bagels crosswise into thin rounds. Brush the tops with melted butter and sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Bake 10 minutes at 325 degrees F; flip, brush with more butter, sprinkle with more cinnamon sugar and bake 10 more minutes.

2. Garlic Bagel Chips-Melt 3 tablespoons butter with 2 chopped garlic cloves in a saucepan. Make Sweet Bagel Chips (No. 1) using plain bagels and topping with the garlic butter and grated Parmesan.

3. Fruit Dip-Mix 1 cup low-fat sour cream and 2 tablespoons each brown sugar and lime juice; sprinkle with cinnamon sugar. Thread fruit onto skewers; serve with the dip.

4. Cheesy Chex Mix-Toss 3 cups Chex cereal, 2 cups mini pretzels and 1 cup cheese crackers with 3/4 cup grated Parmesan, 1/2 stick melted

butter and a pinch of garlic powder. Spread on a baking sheet and bake 15 minutes at 325 degrees F, stirring.

5. Caramel Popcorn-Melt 1/3 cup butter with 1 tablespoon honey and a pinch of salt. Toss with 12 cups popcorn and 1 cup pecans. Spread on a parchment-lined baking sheet and bake 15 minutes at 325 degrees F, tossing. Cool.

6. Sesame Potato Chips-Preheat 2 baking sheets in a 425 degrees F oven. Toss thinly sliced russet potatoes with olive oil and salt. Spread on the hot baking sheets, sprinkle with sesame seeds and bake 10 minutes.

7. Curry Potato Chips-Make Sesame Potato Chips (No. 6); toss the potatoes with curry powder before baking. Omit the sesame seeds.

8. Salami Snails-Top strips of refrigerated breadstick dough with 1 strip each of provolone and salami; roll into pinwheels. Brush with olive oil and sprinkle with dried oregano. Bake as the dough label directs.

9. Pita Nachos-Split a whole-wheat pita into 2 rounds, then

cut into wedges. Broil until golden, then sprinkle with grated cheddar and salsa and broil until the cheese melts. Top with sliced scallions.

10. Apple Quesadillas-Melt some butter in a skillet, then lay a flour tortilla in the pan and top with grated cheddar and thinly sliced apple on one side. Fold the tortilla in half and cook until golden on both sides. Cut into wedges.

11. Granola Bars-Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a saucepan with 1/3 cup each honey and brown sugar, and a pinch of salt. Mix in 2 cups rolled oats, 1 cup each chopped nuts and dried fruit, and 2 tablespoons wheat germ. Press into a parchment-lined 8-inch-square pan and bake 30 minutes at 300 degrees F. Cool, then cut into bars.

12. Fruit Smoothie-Puree 1 cup vanilla yogurt, 1 cup frozen strawberries, 1 frozen banana and 1/4 cup orange juice in a blender until smooth.

13. Ham Pinwheels-Spread scallion cream cheese on a sun-dried-tomato tortilla and top with thinly sliced ham.

Roll up the tortilla and cut into 1/2-inch pieces.

14. Pepperoni Pizza Bread-Halve a small loaf of Italian bread horizontally and toast under the broiler. Brush with olive oil, then top with tomato sauce, grated mozzarella, Parmesan and sliced pepperoni. Broil until bubbly. Sprinkle with dried oregano.

15. Granola-Mix 3 cups rolled oats, 1 cup mixed seeds, 1 cup chopped mixed nuts, 1/4 cup shredded coconut and a pinch each of salt and cinnamon. Toss with 1 tablespoon vegetable oil and 3 tablespoons honey. Spread on a baking sheet and bake 25 minutes at 325 degrees F, tossing. Cool; stir in 2 cups mixed dried fruit.

16. Salsamole-Mix 1/2 cup salsa, 2 smashed avocados, 2 tablespoons each lime juice and chopped cilantro,

and salt to taste. Serve with tortilla chips.

17. Mango Salsa Scoops-Toss 1 cup each diced mango and black beans with 1/4 cup diced red onion. Add 2 tablespoons each chopped pickled jalapenos and the liquid from the jar, chopped cilantro and lime juice. Season with salt. Serve in tortilla scoops.

18. Chocolate Chow Mein-Microwave 1/4 cup each peanut butter, chocolate chips and butter until melted. Put 3 cups each chow mein noodles and Chex cereal, and 1/2 cup each chopped peanuts and raisins in a resealable plastic bag; add the chocolate mixture and shake to coat. Add 2 cups confectioners' sugar and shake again.

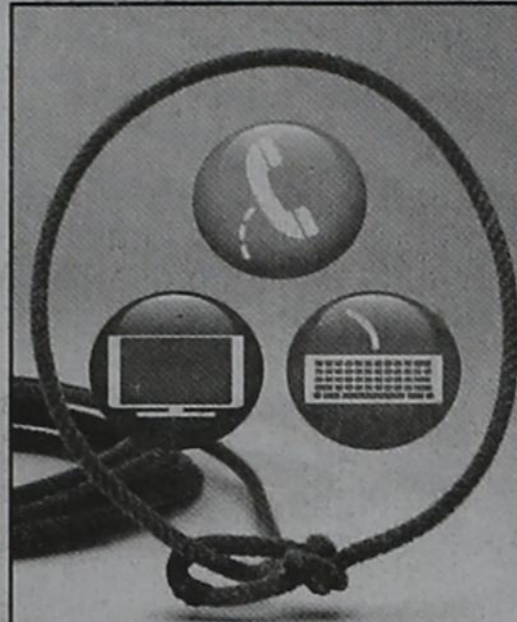
19. Nutella Egg Cream-Mix 2 tablespoons room-temperature Nutella and 3/4

cup milk in a glass. Quickly stir, then pour in 1/2 cup cold seltzer.

20. Bean Roll-Ups-Spread bean dip on a flour tortilla, top with shredded cheddar and roll up. Brush with vegetable oil and bake 10 minutes at 400 degrees F. Serve with salsa.

21. Crunchy Chickpeas Cook a 15-ounce can drained chickpeas in an ovenproof skillet with 2 tablespoons olive oil and 1 teaspoon each cumin and smoked paprika, 2 minutes. Season with salt, then bake 20 minutes at 425 degrees F.

22. Cinnamon-Sugar Sticks-Beat 1/2 cup softened cream cheese with 1 tablespoon cinnamon sugar until smooth. Spread onto strips of refrigerated breadstick dough. Twist and stretch into 12-inch sticks and bake as the dough label directs. Brush with melted butter.

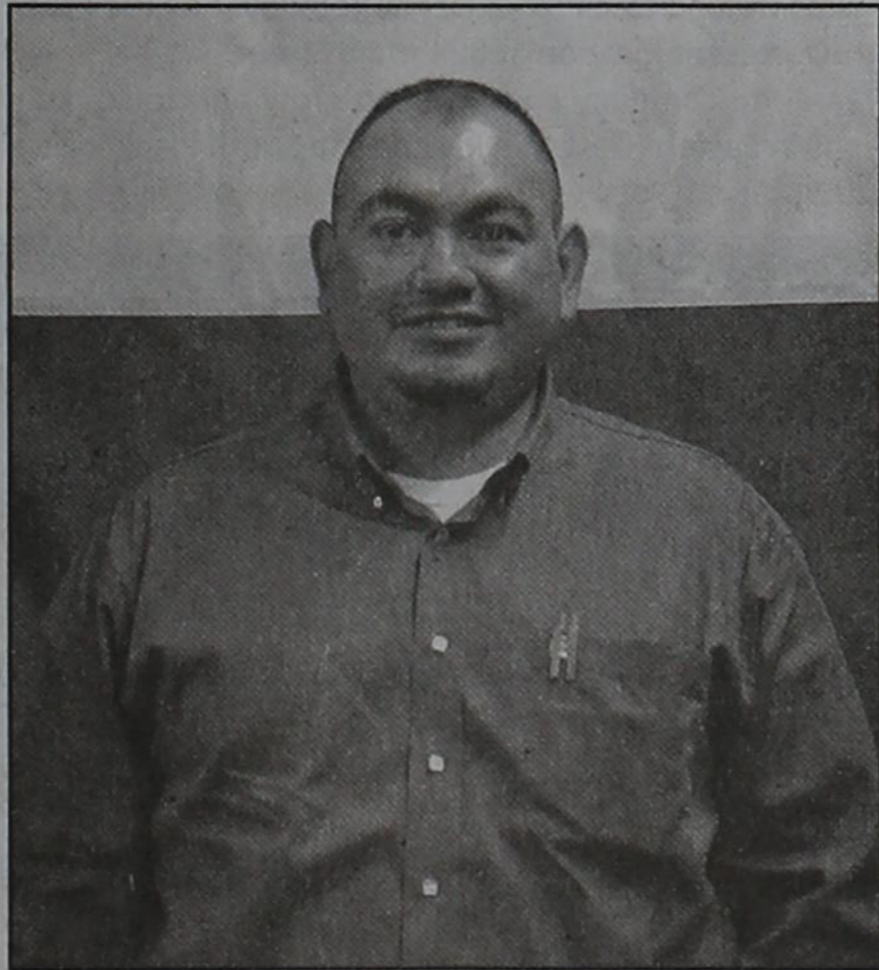

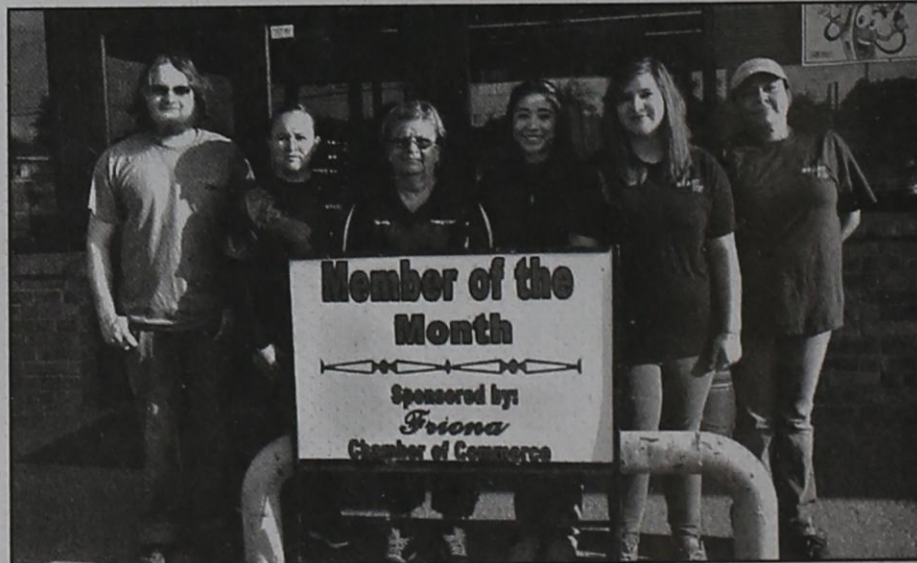
Danny Kendrick, Owner



Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015. In order to reflect the increased exemption on the homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or a disabled person, the proposed amendment would provide a reduction to the current limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes. The proposed amendment would protect school districts from all or part of the revenue loss by authorizing an appropriation of funds according to formulas set by the legislature. In addition, the proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision from reducing or repealing a homestead exemption adopted by the political subdivision. Finally, the proposed amendment would prohibit the imposition of a tax on the conveyance of real property, but would not prohibit the imposition of a business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on the issuance of title insurance, or a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption amount, authorizing the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the amount of or repealing the

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)

HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related debt.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."
