Jobless rate returns to pre-recession level

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's unemployment rate fell for the fourth straight month in February, dropping to 7.6 per cent from 7.8 per cent, as more Americans found jobs and total employment returned to its pre-recession peak, the government said today.

The Labor Department said total employment, which plunged by 2.2 million during the recession, increased by another 125,000 last month and "has now fully returned to the July 1974, prerecession peak of 86.3 million."

While employment is back to its prerecession level, the work force — the number of people working or looking for jobs — grew from 91 million in June 1974 to 93.5 million now, which is one reason the jobless rate remains high.

Unemployment fell by 150,000 last month to a seasonally adjusted 7.1 million, the Labor Department said. Progress in reducing unemployment and the slowing of inflation provides President Ford with fresh

ammunition for his election campaign and efforts to sell his go-slow fiscal 1977 budget to Congress.

As Ford left the White House for a campaign trip to Illinois, he called the figures "extremely encouraging" and said "they show the trend that we've been predicting."

He also said the jobless report provides more basis for the optimism he feels the public is beginning to show about the economy. Ford laughed when a reporter

suggested the report would not hurt his campaign. "There's nothing political in it at all, but it's very encouraging to the unemployed," the President said.

The last time unemployment has been below 7.6 per cent was in December 1974, when it was 7.2 per cent. It later rose to a recession high of 8.9 per cent in May, 1975.

February's two-tenths of a per cent drop in the jobless rate, though not as large as the five-tenths of a per cent decline in January, continued a declining trend which began last June and accelerated in November.

Most of the recovery in employment has been among women, as employment of adult men was still nearly 700,000 below its peak before the recession, the Labor Department noted.

The government said the February decline in joblessness was spread throughout the work force. The jobless rate for heads of households fell below the 5 per cent mark for the first time since late 1974, dropping to 4.9 per cent.

The jobless rate for married men was unchanged last month at 4.1 per cent, while the rate for all adult men fell from 5.8 to 5.7 per cent. The rate for adult women remained steady at 7.9 per cent. The teen-age jobless rate fell from 19.9 to 19.2 per cent.

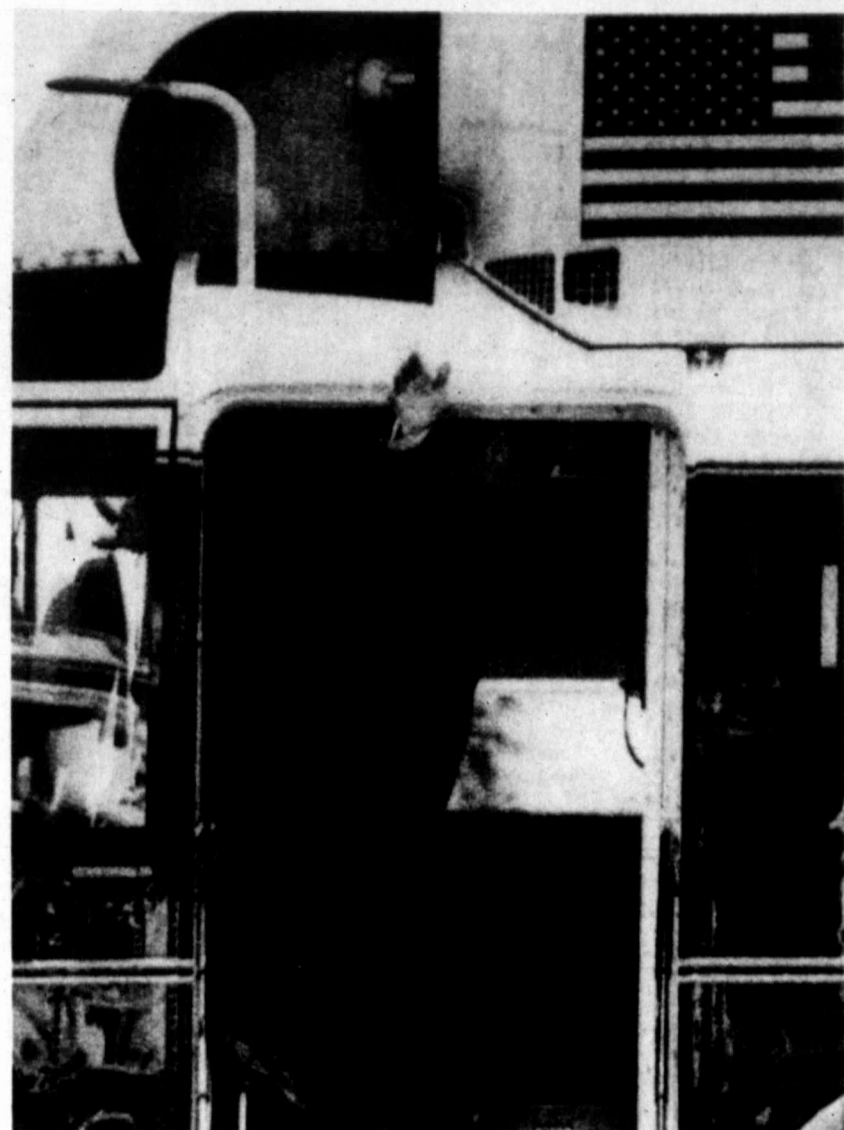
Joblessness among white workers dipped from 7.1 to 6.8 per cent, but the rate for blacks and other minority races rose from 13.2 to 13.7 per cent.

The size of the civilian labor force was unchanged last month at 93.5 million, the government said. It has grown by about 1.9 million over the past year, with adult women accounting for more than 1.3 million of the increase.

Although total employment continued to show gains last month agricultural jobs fell by 170,000. However, non-farm employment increased by 300,000.

The average length of unemployment declined to 16.2 weeks in February, after holding at a high of 17 weeks during the November-January period. Improvement was largely the result of a sharp decrease in the number of persons unemployed 15 weeks or longer, the government said.

Americans who held part-time jobs because they were unable to find full time work, dropped to 3.3 million after rising to 3.5 million in January.

Patty wrote bomb instructions

Notebook ruled admissible

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The notebook page came from the terrorist underground marked with mysterious doodlings about making a time bomb and embellished with a reminder of a meeting to "talk about shooting."

The writer was Patricia Hearst. Jurors in Miss Hearst's trial for bank robbery have not seen the document recovered from the last hideout of two of her fugitive companions — but they will.

U.S. Dist. Judge Oliver J. Carter settled a bitter and protracted legal duel Thursday by rejecting defense attorney F. Lee Bailey's move to suppress the mountain of material taken from the apartment of Symbionese Liberation Army members William and Emily Harris.

With the issue finally resolved, the government prepared to resume its rebuttal case today by calling psychiatrists who will take issue with the findings of defense experts who said Miss Hearst was terrified of her captors and took part in the holdup in fear for her life.

U.S. Atty. James L. Browning Jr. fought vigorously to win admission of the notebooks and papers that Miss Hearst refused to testify about, invoking the 5th Amendment more than 40 times.

Her attorneys spent the better part of Thursday studying the documents after Carter's ruling and conceded in most cases that the handwriting belonged to the defendant.

One of the more startling pages contained apparent instructions for making a time bomb. There are such phrases as "Toaster wire: 10 sec. Timing device w-fuse. Clock or cigarette."

An arrow from the word "clock" points to a notation "set 10 minutes"

and a similar notation near the word "cigarette" reads "Wire in fuse."

A one-line phrase in the middle of the sheet, blocked off by heavy pencil marks, reads, "meet to talk about shooting. 2 bolts. 9:00."

The notebook was discovered by FBI agents in the Harris apartment, about three miles from Miss Hearst's apartment. All three were arrested Sept. 18.

Miss Hearst's attorneys argued that the material was irrelevant and was the product of an illegal search. The judge rejected the challenge but handed Bailey a key victory on one potentially damaging piece of paper.

He refused to accept a diagram of a Marysville, Calif., bank with notes about bank personnel in Miss Hearst's handwriting. The government contended it was a planned robbery that was never realized.

Carter said he feared the use of items linked to Sacramento area banks would "ring bells" in the jurors' minds and they might recall another bank holdup near Sacramento in April 1975 in which a woman customer was killed.

Miss Hearst has been under investigation in that case but has not been indicted. Carter said the whole matter was "fraught with this danger of prejudice."

Browning had argued during the six-week-old trial that Miss Hearst willingly joined the SLA within weeks after the tiny band of terrorists kidnaped her on Feb. 4, 1974. And she freely joined them in the bank robbery two months later for which she is now on trial, he said.

Miss Hearst spent more than a year with the Harrises, the prosecutor said, "casing banks" and working on a glorified history of the SLA featuring Miss Hearst as the prized recruit.

A portion of the manuscript for that book, called the "Tania Interview," was found at the Harris hideout and has already been presented to the jury as evidence in the trial.

Miss Hearst, whom the SLA called Tania, admitted working on the revolutionary-tinted interview but said the Harrises forced her to cooperate under threat of death.

Carter defended his admission of the evidence against repeated assaults by the defense team. He said most of the material was related to Miss Hearst by either handwriting and fingerprints and left to the jury to determine "how much weight they put on it."

A Superior Court judge in Los Angeles ruled earlier in the week that the prosecution in the Harrises' case could not use evidence seized at their hideout because the FBI did not have a proper search warrant.

Carter said, "Since the search conducted of these premises violated no personal constitutional rights of this defendant, she is without standing to suppress the evidence obtained thereby."

Peach, plum blooms nipped

The promise of some peaches and plums probably died last night, a local agricultural engineer said.

Temperature dropped to 30 degrees and stayed that low until past 8 a.m. today, D. W. (Bill) Fryrear, location leader at the Big Spring Experiment Station, said.

While trees sheltered by buildings may keep their blooms, those in the open were wind-whipped, making the chill factor lower, Fryrear said.

Trees bloom in response to air temperature, Fryrear noted. He mentioned the recent unusually hot weather.

Peach and plum trees primarily may have started to bloom, he said. But homeowners may still wait for later blooms to bring fruit.

Taxpayers finance senators' 'vacation'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress has a six-page report to show for a 15-day tour of the Southwest Pacific by four senators, their wives and at least 15 aides.

No one involved can say how much the January trip cost the taxpayers. The party, which traveled by military jet, visited Hawaii, Saipan, Guam, Australia and New Zealand.

The senators were Senate Assistant Republican Leader Robert P. Griffin, R-Mich.; Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C.; Howard H. Baker, R-Tenn.; and John C. Culver, D-Iowa. Griffin is a member of the Foreign Relations Committee.

In addition to their wives, they were accompanied by 11 committee and personal staff members and four or five military attaches.

The report, issued this week, tells of the delegation's meetings with Australian Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser, New Zealand Prime Minister Robert Muldoon and other top officials.

Discussions were held in Honolulu with top-ranking U.S. Navy officers on security in the Pacific and Indian oceans, the report said.

Publisher bares big rewards for 10 'most wanted' women

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Hustler magazine publisher Larry Flynt says he has offered Patricia Hearst and nine other prominent women \$1 million each to pose for nude photographs in the monthly publication.

Also on Flynt's list of 10 Most Wanted Women are Racquel Welch, Barbara Walters, Caroline Kennedy, Julie Nixon Eisenhower, Susan Ford, Sally Struthers, Mary Tyler Moore, Gloria Steinem and Cher Bono Allman.

Reagan begins attack on Ford

Ronald Reagan has unleashed his strongest attack to date on the Ford administration, as the President prepared to woo the farm vote in Illinois.

There were reports that Ford might choose today's trip as the forum for announcing new sales of American grain to Russia. The disclosure could come during a mid-afternoon speech to farmers in Springfield.

The farmers had been unhappy about last year's temporary embargo on grain sales to the Soviets and announcement of a new deal could gain votes for Ford in Illinois' March 16 primary.

Reagan, meanwhile, was in Florida in his campaign for the GOP nomination, preparing for next Tuesday's primary in the Southern state. He had some strong criticism of the Ford administration, but denied that he was breaking his "11th commandment" against saying nasty things about fellow Republicans.

"It is not easy for me to say the things I must say to you today," Reagan said shortly after arriving in Florida on Thursday. "But I have decided that matters of national security and defense are beyond politics, and the American people are entitled to my assessment of them."

Reagan said Ford, whom he described as a man of "evident

decency, honor and patriotism," had presided over what the former California governor called the country's diplomatic and military decline.

On the Democratic side, Indiana Sen. Birch Bayh, who finished seventh in Tuesday's Massachusetts primary, ceased active campaigning for the nomination and Sargent Shriver, the Democrats' vice-presidential nominee four years ago, indicated his future as a candidate for president is in doubt.

Reagan criticized both Ford and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger.

"In my view, the policy of detente as pursued by the administration is one of making pre-emptive concessions to the Soviets," Reagan said. "Under Kissinger and Ford, this nation has become No. 2 in military power in a world where it is dangerous, if not fatal, to be second best."

In Washington, Ford's press secretary, Ron Nessen, said, "The President's recognized leadership in keeping the national defense second to none is so well known that I don't think any response is necessary."

Of the four Democrats actively pursuing votes in Florida, three were tangled in disputes of their own Thursday.

Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington, winner of the primary in Massachusetts, charged that former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter made contradictory statements in Florida and Massachusetts about the location of a proposed federal solar energy center.

Jackson, stopping several times for hand-shaking, said he is the only Democratic candidate familiar with Florida's energy and ecological problems. And he chided Carter for repeatedly referring to Florida's primary as a Wallace-Carter affair.

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Don't tamper with Webb AFB, Bentsen writes defense chief

WASHINGTON — Sen. Lloyd Bentsen told the Defense Secretary, Donald Rumsfeld, that Webb AFB performs its primary function of training pilots with unequaled excellence and should not be tampered with.

The Department of Defense is presently evaluating all domestic bases with an eye toward consolidating and strengthening the nation's military system at home.

Bentsen said that

department findings may drastically affect some facilities and their host communities.

In a letter to Rumsfeld, the Senator detailed Webb's strong points and urged that they be carefully considered during the base's evaluation period.

"This year, 163 Air Force personnel and 205 foreign students are participating in the undergraduate air training program at Webb, and the base has a capacity

to train even greater numbers," Bentsen said.

"Webb is ideally suited to the pilot training program or any other flight oriented mission. That part of West Texas offers excellent flying conditions with just enough adverse weather to test flying ability.

"The air space is unobstructed by airways or population centers. Webb controls the entire area up to 10,000 feet and provides it with full category 6 service,

which is essential to the safe and effective use of the air space.

"Moreover, Webb has the most modern surveillance radar available to the Air Force. Webb also has a fine physical plant and major projects are now under way to further upgrade the facility. A new \$2.6 million bachelor enlisted quarters, for instance, will be completed this summer."

Bentsen also stressed the warm and cooperative relationship which exists between Webb AFB and the citizens of Big Spring.

"The Base-Community Council has a number of committees working to strengthen those ties and Big Spring residents continually strive to make airmen and their families welcome and part of the community.

"Local efforts to settle more than 100 Vietnamese refugees during the past year are only further indications of Big Spring's interest and hospitality.

"In short, Webb is excelling in the performance of its assigned mission and has the capacity to do much more. Any review of the Air Force base must include consideration of all these strengths," Sen. Bentsen said.

Flu bug killed 26 aged

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — A nursing home in which 26 elderly patients have died in the past 14 days will be isolated until the cause of the deaths has been determined, health officials say.

At least 15 of the patients died after developing flu-like symptoms and officials said Thursday they strongly suspect flu as the cause.

"At this point, we can't rule anything out," said Dr. Willa Tommaney, epidemiologist for the Pinellas County Health Department. "But we do suspect influenza Type-A."

Other officials said the siege of deaths appeared to be restricted to the 120-bed Sunshine Convalescent home's administrator, Robert Fellows, said the first death was Feb. 20. Two patients died Wednesday, three more Thursday.

Dr. Tommaney said nursing home patients are naturally more susceptible to flu-like illnesses. But she added that "this number of deaths is extremely rare, even among nursing home patients who are frail."

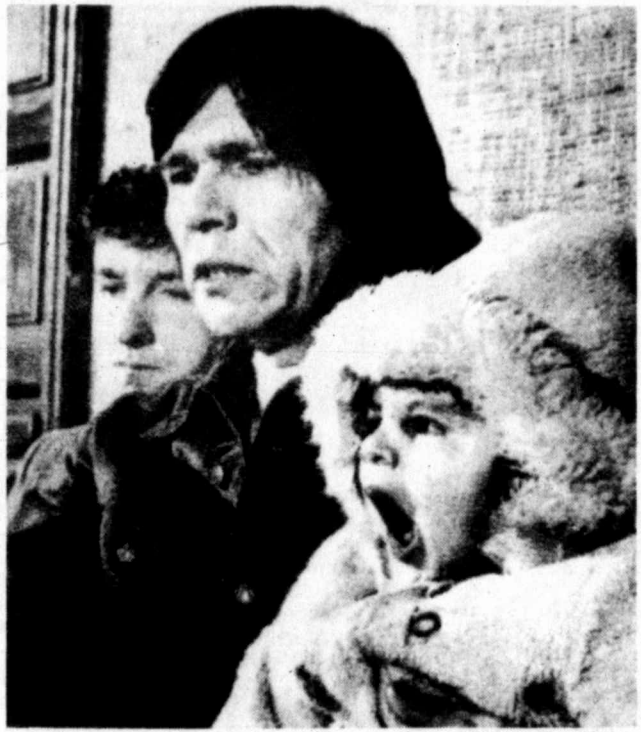
Using variables of occupancy, size and age, a normal monthly death rate at a home like Sunshine would be eight to 10, she said.

Officials had considered closing the home but deferred a decision pending the outcome of tests on the remaining 95 patients, 10 of whom were reported ill Thursday.

"It will probably be the middle of next week before we get results that are meaningful," Dr. Tommaney said.

In the meantime, there will be no new admissions and visitors are being barred, state health officials said.

Fellows said he contacted the health department after the first few deaths but that officials didn't begin imposing restrictions on the home until last Friday.

Whooper chicks feared killed

DENVER (AP) — Two of six rare whooping crane chicks being raised in a unique foster parent program may have died on their northward migration, officials report.

It now seems likely that one of the chicks died with its foster parent sandhill cranes in a snowstorm last October, said Violet Solt, an information officer for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The three haven't been seen since then when they took to the air from their nesting ground at the Grays Lake National Wildlife Refuge in Idaho to begin their southerly migration through Colorado to New Mexico.

Similarly, the second sandy-colored chick and its two sandhill parents haven't been confirmed alive since last fall when they began the flight to New Mexico.

The whoopers, which have come to symbolize North America's endangered wildlife species, were hatched from among 14 eggs taken last May from the nests of the last surviving wild flock of whoopers in Canada. The eggs were transplanted in sandhill crane nests in Idaho and, of the nine which hatched, six survived.

The aim of the spoof on mother nature is to establish a second flock of whooping cranes to supplement the existing covey which numbers a mere 57.

Four of the chicks and their battleship gray foster birds have stopped at the Monte Vista refuge on their way back to Grays Lake.

The possible losses haven't dampened the excitement which has surrounded the American-Canadian experiment.

Scientists had worried that the whoopers might have been kicked out by the sandhills as they wintered along the Rio Grande in New Mexico.

However, it seems the parents have treated the new kids on the refuge like sandhills, though the chicks now stand a fourth taller than their 40-inch-high foster parents.

A major question now is whether the whoopers will mate among themselves or interbreed among the sandhills and, if they interbreed, whether the federal wildlife scientists allow young hybrid birds to hatch. If the whoopers keep it in the family, it will have to be seen whether the parents teach them the sandhill migration routes they learned as chicks.

Meanwhile, the coordinator of the experiment, University of Idaho wildlife researcher Rod Drewien, has spent considerable time searching for the missing whoopers, Mrs. Solt said. Drewien has scoured the New Mexico border by airplane, scanning the fields for the plumage of a whooper among groups of sandhills.

BOSTON (AP) — A doctor says he has developed a machine that can drastically cut the death rate among patients hospitalized with moderately severe heart attacks.

The device, which puts pressure on the patient's legs to force blood to the heart, cut in half the number of deaths among heart attack victims examined in a two-year study, Dr. John S.

Banas said. In the treatment, the patient's legs are placed inside a large metal and plastic envelope that is lined with a water-filled bladder. The water pressure is increased in rhythm with the patient's heartbeat.

Each time the heart is relaxed between beats, the machine produces a spurt of pressure, forcing blood to flow through the arteries

supplying the heart, the doctor said.

All the patients studied had had what doctors describe as "Class 2" heart attacks, which means mild to moderate congestive heart failure.

Seven per cent of the patients who got the new treatment died, compared with 15 per cent among patients given traditional care, Banas said.

Hunt on for those exposed to fever

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three hundred persons will be contacted daily for the next two weeks by U.S. health officials seeking to determine if they are infected with the rare, and often deadly, Lassa fever as a result of exposure to a recently returned Peace Corps nurse.

"On the basis of what we know about Lassa fever, we believe the risk to those who came in contact with this patient is very small," said Dr. David Fraser of the U.S. Center for Disease Control.

The deadly, contagious virus has sent health officials in 20 states and in Washington searching for the nearly 300 persons who had come in contact with the Africa-based Peace Corps volunteer.

Margaret Coe of Mason City, Iowa, is reported out of danger today by her doctors, who hope to determine this week if she is still in the infectious stage of the disease. Meanwhile, she remains in tight isolation at George Washington University Hospital here.

While she recovers, officials are searching for the 300 persons who might have had brief encounters with

Mrs. Coe — including 220 passengers on Pan Am Flight 107 from London to Washington's Dulles International Airport last Saturday and another 60 persons in Washington.

The 14 Pan Am crew members have been grounded until they're determined to be clear of the disease.

All contacts will be checked daily in person or by phone for the next two weeks to see if they have any Lassa fever symptoms such as general discomfort, headache, sore throat, cough, vomiting, muscle pain, diarrhea, chest or abdominal pain and fever.

Lassa fever does not appear to be as contagious as first thought in 1969 when it was identified, said Fraser. But he said that serious, hospitalized cases are fatal 30 to 50 per cent of the time.

The disease is spread from the saliva and urine of infected rodents and humans. Since 1969, epidemics have occurred in Liberia, Nigeria and Sierra Leone and at least 20 medical workers have been stricken. Lassa fever is named after the area by that name in northeast Nigeria where it was first identified.

'Parenting' conference lures local delegate

With its emphasis on the prevention of birth defects, the National Foundation-March of Dimes joined in sponsoring the conference which covered such subjects affecting birth defects as genetics, high risk pregnancies and nutrition.

Tire plant hostages freed

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Two American executives of a Firestone tire plant, held hostage by leftist workers since Monday, were freed unharmed early today after Firestone agreed to begin talks over a pay dispute.

Martin W. Brunson, 52, manager of the plant at

Alcochete near Lisbon, and 32-year-old R. James Roney, the factory's production manager, had been held at the plant by a Communist-dominated workers' commission pressing wage demands.

Roney, of Wabash, Ind., had been held hostage twice

before, and Brunson, of Asheville, N.C., had been a hostage of plant workers once before. The men were said to have been well treated and were allowed to move freely within the plant and communicate with their families by telephone.

Schnabel hearing delayed

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The pre-trial hearing for Senate Secretary Charles Schnabel has been postponed from March 17 to May 10.

District Judge Mace Thurman granted the delay Thursday.

Schnabel's lawyers asked for the postponement, for a minimum of 60 days from the day Schnabel was arraigned, Feb. 19, on the ground that they needed more time to prepare a response to the six indictments against their client.

Three indictments were returned against Schnabel on Dec. 30 and three more on Feb. 10. One of the earlier indictments was incorporated into one of the later ones, but the earlier one has not been officially dismissed.

The judge set May 3 as the deadline for the defense to file pre-trial motions.


Actually, I don't care what Romeo and Juliet did. I don't want my son to marry any 13-year-old girl.

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Texas attorney joins battle

Death penalty nears court fight

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Lawyers for five states defending new death penalty laws expect the "gut issue" of capital punishment to be finally settled by U.S. Supreme Court rulings on the legal fight.

Representatives of Texas, Georgia, North Carolina, Florida and Louisiana met in a private session Thursday to coordinate their legal strategy.

In a news conference afterward, they said the 1972 Supreme Court ruling that derailed the death penalty cost a lot of people their lives.

"There has been a tremendous escalation of homicides in our state since the last execution in Florida, in 1964," said Florida Atty. Gen. Robert L. Shevin.

"If you want to talk about villains, talk about the Supreme Court," said Atty. Gen. Rufus Edmisten, in reporting North Carolina serious crime up 31 per cent last year.

Georgia was represented by Senior Asst. Atty. Gen. Tom Davis, who made little comment, and Louisiana by Atty. Gen. William Guste.

Agent 'saves' alien, nabs him

DALLAS (AP) — A dozen illegal Mexican aliens, who all worked in a West Dallas steel plant, were being processed for a return trip to their country today, including one man who was saved from possible drowning by a federal immigration agent.

Agents of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) rounded up the 12 aliens Wednesday following a tip that they were working at high paying jobs at the steel plant, said Joseph A. Mongiello, chief of the Dallas INS office.

Mongiello said INS criminal investigators went to the steel company and

arrested eight illegal aliens inside the plant. Five others fled.

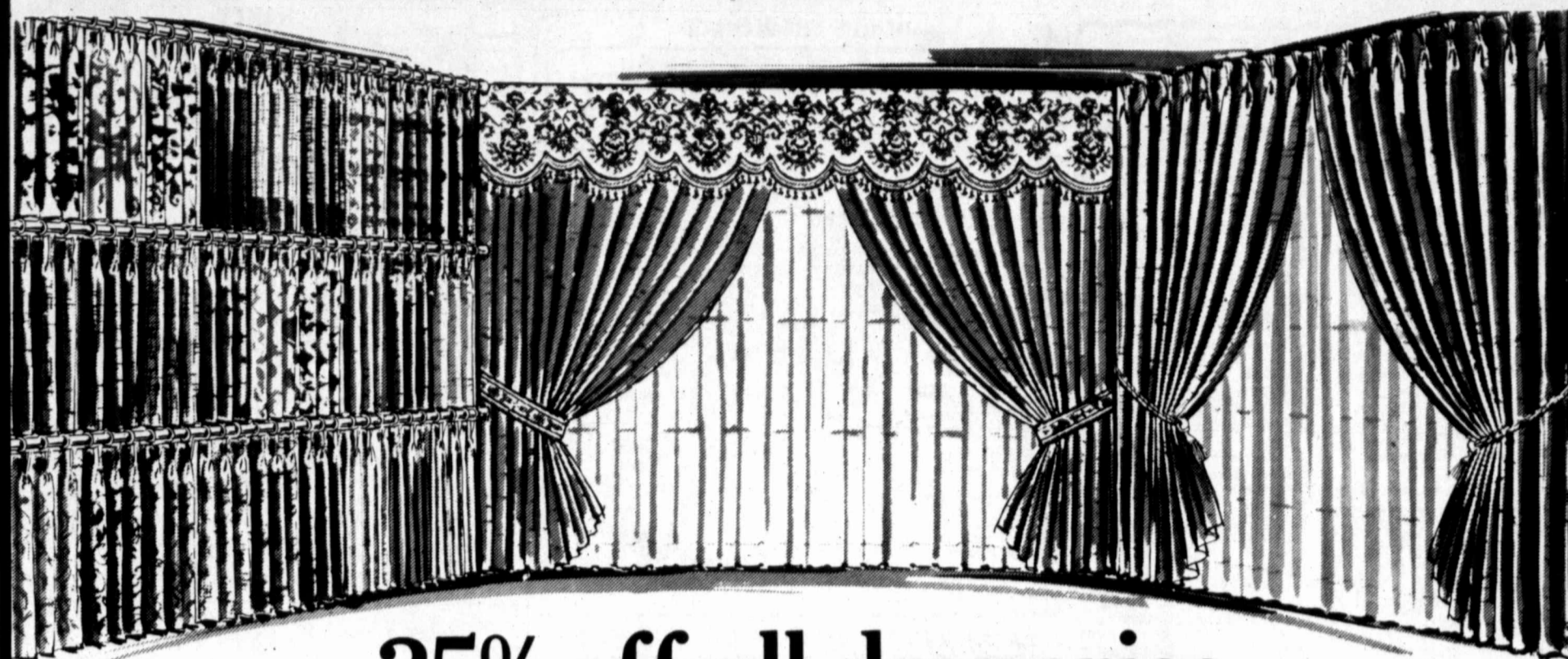
Two of those who fled were taken into custody at a nearby residence, Mongiello said.

INS agent William Holly Jr. found two other aliens hiding in a creek bed. They fled into a nearby lake and began swimming toward an island. One of the aliens floundered in the water and appeared to be drowning, but Holly stripped down, swam after him and pulled him to the island.

A Dallas Fire Department rescue boat brought Holly and the two aliens back to safety from the island.
