# Jobless rate returns to pre-recession level

nation's unemployment rate fell for the fourth straight month in February, dropping to 7.6 per cent from 7.8 per cent, as more Americans found jobs and total employment returned to its pre-recession peak, the government said today

The Labor Department said total employment, which plunged by 2.2 million during the recession, increased by another 125,000 last month and "has now fully returned to the July 1974, prerecession peak of 86.3

December 1974, when it was 7.2 per cent. It later rose to a recession high of 8.9 per cent in May, 1975. February's two-tenths of a per cent drop in the jobless rate, though not as large as the five-tenths of a per cent

decline in January, continued a

declining trend which began last June and accelerated in November. Most of the recovery in employment has been among women, as employment of adult men was still nearly 700,000 below its peak before the recession, the Labor Department

The government said the February decline in joblessness was spread throughout the work force. The jobless rate for heads of households fell below the 5 per cent mark for the

The jobless rate for married men was unchanged last month at 4.1 per cent, while the rate for all adult men fell from 5.8 to 5.7 per cent. The rate for adult women remained steady at 7.9 per cent. The teen-age jobless rate fell from 19.9 to 19.2 per cent.


Joblessness among white workers dipped from 7.1 to 6.8 per cent, but the rate for blacks and other minority races rose from 13.2 to 13.7 per cent.

The size of the civilian labor force was unchanged last month at 93.5 million, the government said. It has grown by about 1.9 million over the past year, with adult women accounting for more than 1.3 million of the increase.

Although total employment continued to show gains last month agricultural jobs fell non-farm employment increased by 300,000.

### Reagan begins attack on Ford

Ronald Reagan has unleashed his strongest attack to date on the Ford administration, as the President prepared to woo the farm vote in

There were reports that Ford might choose today's trip as the forum for announcing new sales of American grain to Russia. The disclosure could come during a mid-afternoon speech to farmers in Springfield.

The farmers had been unhappy about last year's temporary embargo on grain sales to the Soviets and announcement of a new deal could gain votes for Ford in Illinois' March 16 primary.

Reagan, meanwhile, was in Florida in his campaign for the GOP nomination, preparing for next Tuesday's pr mary in state. He had some strong criticism of the Ford administration, but denied that he was breaking his "11th commandment" against saying nasty things about fellow Republicans.

"It is not easy for me to say the things I must say to you today," Reagan said shortly after arriving in Florida on Thursday. "But I have decided that matters of national security and defense are beyond politics, and the American people are entitled to my assessment of them."

Reagan said Ford, whom he described as a man of "evident

decency, honor and patriotism," had presided over what the former California governor called the country's diplomatic and military

On the Democratic side, Indiana Sen. Birch Bayh, who finished seventh in Tuesday's Massachusetts primary, ceased active campaigning for the nomination and Sargent Shriver, the Democrats' vice-presidential nominee four years ago, indicated his future as a candidate for president is in doubt

Reagan criticized both Ford and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger

"In my view, the policy of detente as pursued by the administration is one of making pre-emptive concessions to the Soviets," Reagan said. 'Under Kissinger and Ford, this nation has become No. 2 in military power in a world where it is dangerous, if not fatal, to be second best.

In Washington, Ford's press secretary, Ron Nessen, said, "The President's recognized leadership in keeping the national defense second to none is so well known that I don't think any response is necessary.

#### Winegrowers mourn riot deaths

NARBONNE. France (AP) — Winegrowers declared two days of mourning in southern France today after a gunbattle with riot police that left one man dead on each side and scores wounded. The gunbattle started when riot police tried to stop more than 1,000 demonstrators from burning a freight train they had halted outside Narbonne by tearing up the track. The southern area, which produces large quantities of low grade wine, about a million gallons a year, has long been the scene of trouble over wine prices. The growers have protested imports of Algerian, then Italian and Spanish wine under European Common

#### U.N. chief looks for peace

UNITED NATIONS, New York (AP) — U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim is sending an envoy to Moscow and Washington to look for ways to get Middle East peace negotiations going again, diplomatic sources say. U.N. Undersecretary-General Roberto Guyer will be in Moscow on Tuesday and Washington later to talk to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger.

#### Foreign aid bill goes to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — An amendment to a House-passed foreign aid appropriation bill could deprive many countries of their aid, handlers of the bill say. Thursday night they predicted that the amendment never would become law. It was added earlier in the day to the \$5.39 billion aid bill, which then was passed. The Senate will have a chance to alter the bill. The amendment would ban use of any of the foreign aid money for countries delinquent for more than a year in repaying any uncontested debts to the United States.

#### Cuba prepares for Rhodesia war

WASHINGTON (AP) - Cuba, fresh from its battlefield successes in Angola, is gearing up to help Rhodesian nationalists trying to overthrow the white supremacist regime of Prime Minister Ian Smith, U.S. officials believe. The Cuban plan, the officials said, probably calls for sending military advisers and training officers to Rhodesia's eastern neighbor, Mozambique. Black nationalist Rhodesian guerrillas have been using Mozambique as a staging area for guerrilla operations in Rhodesia.

### Flu bug killed 26 aged

Bentsen said

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) - A nursing home in which 26 elderly patients have died in the past 14 days will be isolated until the cause of the deaths has been determined, health officials

At least 15 of the patients died after developing flu-like symptoms and officials said Thursday they strongly suspect flu as the cause.

"At this point, we can't rule anything out," said Dr. Tommaney, epidemiologist for the Pinellas County Health Department. "But we do suspect influenza Type-A."

Other officials said the siege of deaths appeared to be restricted to the 120-bed Sunshine Convalarium. The home's administrator, Robert Fellows, said the first death was Feb. 20. Two patients died Wednesday, three more Thursday.

Dr. Tommaney said nursing home patients are naturally more susceptible to flu-like illnesses. But she added that "this number of deaths is extremely rare, even among nursing home patients who are frail."

Using variables of occupancy, size and age, a normal monthly death rate at a home like Sunshine would be eight to 10, she said. Officials had considered closing the home but deferred a decision pending the outcome of tests on the

remaining 95 patients, 10 of officials report.

Fellows said he contacted the health department after the first few deaths but that officials didn't begin imposing restrictions on the home until last Friday.



### Hughes' appointment

WASHINGTON Phantom billionaire Howard Hughes has an appointment with the Securities and Exchange Commission at 10 a.m. on Monday. But no one really expects

The world's most famous recluse has been subpoenaed to answer questions from SEC attorneys about the 1968 takeover of Air West.

THE SEC CONTENDS that Hughes and his associates waged a devious campaign to acquire the financially troubled airline. Hughes originally gave the impression he would pay \$22 a share for the airline, yet he closed the deal for only about \$9 a share.

An army of attorneys, meanwhile, has fought to keep Hughes from being interrogated about the deal. This epic legal battle will be decided today (Friday) in San Francisco.

Even if the judge orders Hughes to appear, he is unlikely to obey. Indeed, the SEC lawyers are beginning to doubt whether he is alive and competent. Therefore, they are bearing down on his associates to find out the truth about Hughes. The SEC has sent interrogators to his attorney, Chester Davis, and to various Hughes companies, demanding to know when and where they last spoke to

His legal battalions tried to keep him out of the litigation by claiming that corporate officers, not Hughes personally, engineered the Air West

However, we have obtained secret grand jury documents, which show how the billionaire personally called the shots during the late 1960s from his penthouse atop Las Vegas' Desert Inn. Here are highlights from the documents:

- In the summer of 1968, Hughes sent a handwritten memo to his deputy, Bob Maheu, outlining his plans about Air West. "I urge you say nothing to (Nevada's then-Gov. Paul) Laxalt about Air West at all. Just I guarantee the service without saying how." Hughes insisted that the deal be held "tightly secret." If information leaked out, he feared, the stock would "shoot up on the market like a rocket and we will not be able to afford a price to satisfy

the stockholders. - Another Hughes memo, this one dated Aug. 6, 1968, dressed down Maheu for assuming too much authority. "Bob," wrote Hughes cantankerously, "what do you mean YOUR insistence not to pay \$22? I am the only one who refused to pay 22 ... Surely you don't think the offer of 211/2 originated with anyone other

SEVERAL ADDITIONAL comment.

memos showed that Hughes was pulling the strings from his penthouse. But on Aug. 9, 1968, Maheu assured his billionaire boss that he was covering this up. "At no oc-casion," wrote Maheu, "have I given the impression of contacting you back and forth. As you know, I am very aware of this situation. I have, however, made reference to contacts with the senior vice president of HTCo (Hughes Tool

Still another associate, attorney Chester Davis, sought Hughes' advice on what to tell the Civil Aeronautics Board. "I really would like to know," Davis wrote, "if I can expect to get additional guidance from you before I have to open my mouth." The attorney was in-structed to tell the CAB that Hughes would not run Air West. As Davis phrased his instructions, "I understand from your last message that my position is to be that (Raymond) Holliday is the chief executive officer ... who makes the business decisions.'

 The grand jury documents show that on July 21, 1969, Maheu asked 'immediate permission'' from Hughes to issue a public statement thanking then-President Richard Nixon and the CAB for approving the Air West purchase. But Davis obected, writing that he wanted Hughes' views before making any comment.

ALTHOUGH THESE documents clearly prove that Hughes was in full control of his \$2 billion empire in 1969, SEC investigators aren't so sure he is still making the decisions today. But they are determined, before this case is closed, to find out whether the mysterious Howard Hughes still really exists.

WASHINGTON favorable New Hampshire poll results a week before the primary led Ronald Reagan into miscalculations that magnify the impact of President Ford's eyelash win Tuesday and dictate tactical campaign changes that may appear

a policy of desperation. The eleventh-hour poll results, showing an eight-percentage-point Reagan lead, promptly leaked throughout Republican political circles. More important, that seemingly comfortable cushion persuaded the Reagan high command not to retaliate in kind against the President's surprisingly cutting anti-Reagan remarks on his nationally televised news con-ference Feb. 17.

THE IMPACT OF those decisions could be fateful. By exciting such high expectations, the Reaganites have puffed up the President's twopercentage-point squeaker. Con-sequently, by Wednesday morning Reagan supporters - both on and off his campaign staff - were pleading for Reagan to asault the Ford presidential record between now and the March 9 Florida primary. But criticism that might have been effective against Mr. Ford in New Hampshire last week may seem a desperate last stand in Florida today.

Desperate or not, such a tactical change was being urged by Reagan advisers in the small hours Wednesday at the New Hampshire High-

NEW YORK (AP) - When stocks soared during the 1960s, mutual funds soared with them. They turned in big year-to-year gains. And the number of funds and the money invested in them

swelled In the first half of the 1970s the mutual funds, which pool well in stocks

At best, the market has dawdled about, and as a consequence, so have most of the mutual funds. Every time prices rose, so did redemptions; old investors saw the rise as a chance to

bail out. The industry watched enviously as their former investors deserted them for the high interest rates of-

fered by certificates of deposit and Treasury Bills. And then they followed.

The emergence of the socalled money market funds. which took their profits from short-term interest rates. was the biggest innovation in the industry since World War II, when it was just a baby.

The money market funds didn't offer the possibility of spectacular gains, but in an unstable economy they did seem to offer a modicum of stability. The money market funds grew from experiment to thriving business in just a few months

Now, according to the Investment Company Institute, the industry's trade association, another innovation might soon appear: the municipal bond fund. Never before has the industry as a whole considered this outlet.

### Hunt on for those exposed to fever

WASHINGTON (AP) -Three hundred persons will be contacted daily for the next two weeks by U.S. health officials seeking to determine if they are infected with the rare, and often deadly, Lassa fever as a result of exposure to a recently returned Peace Corps nurse.

"On the basis of what we know about Lassa fever, we believe the risk to those who came in contact with this patient is very small," said Dr. David Fraser of the U.S. Center for Disease Control.

The deadly, contagious virus has sent health officials in 20 states and in Washington searching for the nearly 300 persons who had come in contact with the Africa-based Peace Corps

Lassa fever is named after the area by that name in northeast Nigeria where it was first identified.

#### Agent 'saves' alien, nabs him

DALLAS (AP) - A dozen illegal Mexican aliens, who all worked in a West Dallas steel plant, were being processed for a return trip to their country today, including one man who was from possible drowning by a federal im-

migration agent. Agents of Immigration Naturalization Service (INS) rounded up the 12 aliens Wednesday following a tip that they were working at high paying jobs at the steel plant, said Joseph A. Mongiello, chief of the Dallas INS office.

Mongiello said INS criminal investigators went to the steel company and arrested eight illegal aliens inside the plant. Five others

Two of those who fled were taken into custody at a nearby residence, Mongiello

INS agent William Holly Jr. found two other aliens hiding in a creek bed. They fled into a nearby lake and began swimming toward an island. One of the aliens floundered in the water and appeared to be drowning, but Holly stripped down, swam after him and pulled him to the island.

Tealer, indicted Wednesday by a Bexar County (San Antonio) grand jury on a charge of aggravated rape of another nurse at the same hospital in San Antonio last Feb. 16, made two appearances under guard at Franklin's trial Thursday.

The first time Franklin pointed out Tealer as the man he knew as "Smoky," who he said had his car that

who, at the start of testimony in the case, identified Franklin as the man they saw in the hospital parking lot at the time Mrs. Moran was kidnaped. Presence of those two




