


"The Supreme Court has abandoned its role as an impartial judicial arbiter and has become an unelected ninemember legislature. Five Justices on the Supreme Court 18 have imposed on the entire country their personal views on an issue that the Constitution and the Court's previous decisions reserve to the people of the States.

"Despite the Supreme Court's rulings, Texans' fundamental right to religious liberty remains protected. No Texan is required by the Supreme Court's decision to act contrary to his or her religious beliefs regarding marriage.

"The Texas Constitution guarantees that '[n]o human authority ought, in any case whatsoever, to control or interfere with the rights of conscience in matters of religion.' The First Amendment of the U.S. Constitution guarantees the free exercise of religion; and the Texas Religious Freedom Restoration Act, combined with the newly enacted Pastor Protection Act, provide robust legal protections to Texans whose faith commands them to adhere to the traditional understanding of marriage.

"As I have done in the past, I will continue to defend is the religious liberties of all Texans-including those whose conscience dictates that marriage is only the union of one man and one woman. Later today, I will be issuing a di- " rective to state agencies instructing them to prioritize the 4 protection of Texans' religious liberties."





The second Independence Day

The Association of Mature American Citizens reminds us that the nation will celebrate two Independence Days this month-the 4th of July and the 25th anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act. The law was enacted on the 26th of July 1990 and it promised independence for those with physical disabilities.

A quarter century ago such things as access ramps and handicapped parking spots were rarities, AMAC says. Today, access design - particularly in public buildings - is commonplace and hardly noticed.


The Easter Seals organization was instrumental in the passage of the law, launching an ad campaign to drive home the need for the legislation. "They were motivating to the advocates and policymakers across the country who were dedicated to the enactment of the ADA... reinforcing why the ADA was necessary and why discrimination on the basis of disability was wrong and should be outlawed," according to Katherine Neas, the advocacy group's Executive Vice President. She notes that back then "there was a lot of ignorance about the interests and abilities of people with disabilities."
