Odessa wants Southwest

AUSTIN (AP) - Close to 22 per cent of the 43,000 students at the University of Texas-Austin could benefit from the planned expansion of Southwest Airlines, a Texas Aeronautics Commission examiner was told today.

"If this application is granted, almost one in four students at the university would be able to save 41 to 66 per cent over the present airline rates charged," testified Frank Erwin, Austin lawyer and former chairman of regents for the UT

Odessa Mayor Dan Hemphill testified today that his city council had unanimously endorsed the Southwest application.

"We're interested in Southwest stopping at Midland-Odessa today, tomorrow at the latest," he said. "The people have shown by petitions and telephone calls they want Southwest

He said the present air service to Midland-Odessa was "not frequent enough and it's overloaded. We have trouble getting reservations...The planes come in from Los Angeles and they're pretty full when they get

Hemphill was asked what Odessa would do if Continental Airlines dropped some of the flights they have now through Midland-Odessa. "I don't think that is going to happen," he said.

Officials said the 12-foot wall of water unleashed by the flood was so powerful that many of the dead were found with their bodies stripped of clothing. One body was found 15 miles downstream from the canyon mouth.

"All the bodies will never be recovered," said Watson, who earlier had refused to estimate how high the death toll might reach, saying he feared public "panic and hysteria. President Ford declared the 2,700square mile county a federal disaster

area Monday, making local residents eligible for federal relief assistance. But Colorado Gov. Richard Lamm said it would take three years and \$10 million just to rebuild U.S. 34, the once-scenic route that wound 30 miles down the canyon from Estes Park east to Loveland. The road ran beside

the Big Thompson River, and little

Russian defector left family for U.S. girl?

- Sergei MONTREAL (AP) -Nemtsanov, the 17-year-old Soviet diver who defected during the Olympics, did it for the love of an American millionaire's daughter, the Montreal Gazette reported today.

Quoting immigration and police sources, the Gazette said Nemtsanov met the girl during a diving meet in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., last year and thought he would never see her again. But a last-minute change in the Soviet Olympic team brought him to Montreal, and he seized the opportunity to renew his romance.

The girl was not identified. But the Gazette said Nemtsanov may be hiding at the Montreal home of a friend he made in Fort Lauderdale.

The paper said its sources reported Nemtsanov wants to live in the United States with his sweetheart, but his Montreal lawyer, Alex Paterson. denied that.

"From the information I have, he wants to stay here and has never mentioned going to the United States," the lawyer said. "His prime interest is diving and eventually he would like to be a trainer. I think he will spend the remainder of this year trying to become fluent in English."

He added that the Royal Canadian Mounted Police "have him under their protection."

The tall, blond athlete left the Olympic Village Thursday night and asked Canadian officials to let him stay in Canada. Soviet officials failed to convince him to return home at a meeting in the presence of Canadian officials Sunday.

The youth apparently was unmoved by telegrams produced by the Soviets from his mother and grandmother urging him to come back to Russia. The Gazette said one source reported that Nemtsanov "doesn't believe it was his grandmother and mother who wrote the telegrams to Prime Minister (Pierre Elliott) Trudeau

Flu-like disease kills 16

taken the lives of 19 persons who attended an American Legion convention last month and hospitalized 52 others, a state official said

Health Secretary Leonard Bachman told a news conference that doctors and researchers still haven't identified the disease, which has symptoms of fever, headaches, chest pains and lung congestion.

"I think it is most likely a virus, but virus pneumonia is the closest I'd call it now,' Bachman said.

But Dr. Jay Satz, head of the state health department's immunology division, said a bacteria could have caused the illness

Other authorities have suggested swine flu as the possible cause, and investigators from the federal Center for Disease Control in Atlanta were here trying to isolate the cause of the deaths

Bachman refused release the names of the three latest victims.

"It may take some time to find all the victims," Bachman said earlier. "I don't think we've gotten all the deaths yet.'

The ages of the 16 dead identified earlier ranged in age from 39 to 82. At least one death has been recorded as pneumonia. Autopsies have been ordered in many of the deaths.

All of the victims suffered the same symptoms, which included fever of up to 107 degrees.

"I've never seen anything like it." said Bachman.

Blood samples and throat swabbings from the victims were sent to state health laboratories in Philadelphia and flown to the federal Center for Desease Control in Atlanta for tests.

It will take two to three days to grow cultures from the samples. These cultures could lead to identification of the disease.

Cases of the illness were reported throughout the state. All the persons af-fected attended the 10-day Legion convention Philadelphia that ended July 24. The first reports of illness came last Monday; the first death last Friday. It was the mounting death toll Monday that alarmed public health

Bachman was asked if it could be swine flu. "That's a possibility," he said. "We're trying to pin it down, but we don't know right now. But there's no reason to panic everyone should realize

125 Republicans hold out

WASHINGTON (AP) - Only 15 days away from the roll call in Kansas City, 125 Republican partisans clutch the key to their party's biggest prize, the presidential nomination. In two months of intense courtship by President Ford and Ronald Reagan, the ranks of the uncommitted convention delegates have dwindled by more than 50. Both camps claim enough delegates to grab the nomination, but neither candidate has been able to win the hearts — and votes — of the 1,130 delegates needed for a first-ballot victory, according to The Associated Press survey of delegates' legal commitments and public declaration. The AP survey shows Ford with 1,105, Reagan with 1,029 and 125

American doctor helps lessen Lebanon tragedy

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) -Dr. Patrick Marshio deftly tied the sutures, stepped back and signaled the end of the surgery. It was one of 5 to 30 emergency operations performed each day at the Red Cross field hospital in Beirut

On the table was Samar Chami, a 12-year-old Lebanese girl shot by an AK47 automatic rifle. The bullet passed through her midsection and lodged just under the surface on the opposite side.

Marshio, a 37-year-old native of Jersey City, N.J., is the only American among the hospital's 35 to 40 staff members. Most of them are Finns, Danes and Swedes. Marshio said he came from Denmark for a two-month stint as chest surgeon because he had never been in a war situation. "Now I'll stay as long as I

can," he said Most patients who come to the Red Cross hospital are

too poor to afford the established hospitals still because of his Sicilian anstruggling to keep open. Although new to the Arab world, Marshio said he feels a special "Mediterranean kinship" with his patients

cestry The hospital is located in the new annex to a seafront hotel where the Red Cross is based. In a large, garagelike room with bare concrete walls, blankets hung from ropes separate the working areas. A crude handwritten sign designates one space the "Operating Theatre." The only sunlight comes through narrow slits in the windowless walls.

Sanitation is a constant problem. The floor is rough and difficult to mop. The area must be sprayed frequently for flies because of a large garbage dump not far away. In the single 50-bed ward, a

young boy sits up in bed, both legs amputated at the knee because of gunshot wounds. Nearby is a 17-year-old Palestinian guerrilla. A Christian militiaman trapped in the upper story of a building dropped a grenade

that blew off his legs. A Sudanese soldier lies on a cot with his right arm off at the elbow. He was one of seven men of the Arab League peacekeeping force wounded by Christian militiamen on July 24.

Actually, the private companies proposal will cost the taxpayers far less than if the government does it by herself. No one seriously thinks the government will ever deregulate the price of uranium, and if investors are to sink money into revolutionary new processes, the prices of which will be government controlled, they must know that there will be a return.

As for the electric bills, unless action is taken very soon, many consumers may not have electric bills at all in 10 or 15 years.

Another argument which has been made against the measure is it would be more dangerous to have nuclear secrets in the hands of private industry, rather than the government.

I think a good case can be made for it being safer. The Russians were able to steal the atomic bomb from our government, but if they want to d. ink Coke, they have to buy it from the Coca-Cola Company like everyone

The private enrichment plan will be on again Wednesday.

Proponents are optimistic that this time the anti-nuclear forces will not have the upper hand.

If it clears the House, the bill would then go to the U.S. Senate for a vote. The committee hurdle has been cleared in both houses. The nation needs this bill. It would

be terrible to see our government not face the energy problem simply because it is an election year and there is no energy crisis at this precise

On May 7, 1945, Associated Press' chief of war coverage in Europe, Ed Kennedy, picked up an Army phone in Paris and placed a call to his headquarters in London

"THIS IS ED KENNEDY. Germany has surrendered unconditionally. That's official. Make the date Rheims, France, and get it out." Then he dictated the details:

"Rheims, France, May 7 - Germany has surrendered unconditionally to the Western allies and the Soviet Union at 2:41 a.m. French time today.'

"The surrender took place at a little red schoolhouse that is the headquarters of General Dwight D.

Across the Atlantic the story sped to appear in banner headlines of 2,500 newspapers, including the Big Spring Herald. At AP, his superiors were rejoicing. Kennedy had scored "one of the greatest beats in newspaper history.

None of the other wire services had "discovered" the news.

It seemed as if Kennedy would be honored as a war hero for getting the news to the people before his competition, but he wasn't.

The full story was slow in coming out, but when it did, it was a storm that Ed Kennedy would never live

THE STORY was factual, Kennedy had witnessed the signing of the surrender agreement only minutes

But, so had 15 other newsmen. He and the others were summoned suddenly and secretly to Rheims to

witness the surrender, but they had been sworn not to release their stories until the respective governments on both sides had announced the surrender.

All the reporters kept their word

except Kennedy.

The result was that Kennedy was ordered back to the United States by the authorities. At first, AP defended him, then fired him. Fifty-four of his fellow correspondents had branded Kennedy as a doublecrosser.

KENNEDY'S ONLY defense was that he had simply refused to go along with bureaucratic red tape, that the world had a right to know and that he

had acted with conviction. Kennedy dropped out of sight and worked anonymously for several small newspapers until he was killed in an auto accident several years

Thirty-one years later, some reporters still brew and debate over the pros and cons of Ed Kennedy's call from Paris.

As a reporter Kennedy was torn between his promise not to release the story of the century and the right of millions of Americans, English, French, and other across the world to know that the hated Third Reich had ended.

On an ordinary story, Kennedy would have certainly kept his word, because it is by the trust of his sources that he gets any stories.

But Kennedy knew that the story of the end of fighting in the European Theater, fighting which had claimed millions of civilian and military lives, could not be kept back.

WASHINGTON - One of the big surprises of last week's dramatic political events was the sudden decision by John Connally to come out in support of President Ford. Mr. Connally visited Mr. Ford on Tuesday, the day after Ronald Reagan announced he had chosen Sen. Richard Schweiker as vice presidential candidate.

There were some cynical people in Washington who thought that Connally, who had remained neutral up until that moment, made the hurried trip to Washington after he was eliminated as running-mate on the Reagan ticket.

THIS, I HAVE been assured by Connally's people, was not the case. Connally has always been "secretly" for President Ford, but he was just waiting for the most opportune time to out for him publicly. The timing of it was sheer coincidence.

This is what really happened. On Friday, three days before Reagan dropped his bombshell, Mr. Connally said to his wife, "Honey, I think we ought to fly up to Washington and tell Gerry Ford we support him.

"That's fine, John," his wife said. "But one of the calves is sick and we can't leave him today. Can't we go

"All right," Connally said. "I don't imagine one day's delay in coming out for Ford will make any difference.

ON SATURDAY Connally said, "Honey, are you packed so we can go to Washington and tell Gerry that we have decided he would make the best candidate for the presidential

"My dress hasn't come back from the cleaners," Mrs. Connally said. Well take another dress

"I will not," Mrs. Connally said, "I selected this dress especially for the moment that you would announce your support for the man who could lead the Republican Party to victory in November.

"Daggonnit," Connally said. "I want to come out for Ford in the worst way and the cleaners are holding up my endorsement." "We can go tomorrow," Mrs. Connally said.

"There are no reporters at the White House on Sunday," Connally said. "They're all in church."

"Well, then we'll go Monday. What's the big rush? You've been sitting on the fence for so long a couple of days won't matter." "I guess you're right," Connally

said. Monday morning the Connallys took off from Houston. But when they got to

Washington their plane was stacked up over National Airport for two hours. When they finally landed a reporter told the former Texas governor that

Ronald Reagan had just announced that he had selected Richard Schweicker to run with him if he was nominated on the Republican ticket. . CONNALLY WAS furious. "If it

wasn't for that sick calf and your dress," he told his wife, "we could have come out for Ford on Saturday. Now it looks like I'm coming out for Ford just so he'll make me this Vice President.' "Nobody who knows you would

dream that, John," Mrs. Connally said soothingly, "leastwise the President. In his heart he knew you were for him all the time. Connally immediately called the

White House and asked to see the President that afternoon. One of the President's aides told

him, "I think you better see him tomorrow. If you saw him today people would think that you were too anxious to get on the Ford bandwagon. By tomorrow they'll know your endorsement of Mr. Ford was sincere.

Well, the rest is history. Connally and the President came out of the White House arm in arm on Tuesday and despite snickering from the White Houe Press Corps about the timing, President Ford believed everything Connally told him. That's the kind of man Gerry Ford is, and that is why Connally made his decision long ago to support him 1,000 per cent.

But if Haiti is a tropical paradise for the foreign tourists, it is a land of luxury for the ruling class. They are dominated by the amazing Duvalier family, who have amassed a pirate's fortune since the late "Papa Doc" Duvalier seized power in 1958.

His place has now been taken by his 24-year-old son, Jean-Claude Duvalier, more affectionately known as "Baby Doc," who governs under the watchful, maternaleye of his mother, "Mamon Simone" Duvalier.

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

Smallest branch leads in abuse

The Marine Corps, smallest of the armed services, reported more than twice as many incidents of recruit abuse as the combined incidents reported by the Army, Navy and Air Force over the past two years.

The Marines listed 234 confirmed incidents in fiscal 1975 and 1976 while the other services registered an over-This was disclosed in a

report by Pentagon manpower officials to Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld who ordered a review of all service recruit training after allegations of Marine brutality arose earlier this year. The report was made available Monday.

Pentagon investigators found current service policies are generally adequate. They said that comprehensive data on how scrupulously these policies are followed has been difficult to obtain.

'Some cases of abuse undoubtedly occur which do not come to light," the report





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
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Better a late wedding than an early divorce

SAN ANTONIO, Tex. (AP) The Air Force will begin training women this summer for jobs that once were considered for men only, and which may some day expose

them to combat situations. The first 20 women of the Air Force WAF pilot candidates are to begin flight screening program Aug. 26 at Lackland AFB Officer Training School here.

The Air Force also hopes to recruit 100 enlisted women for its rugged antiterrorist course conducted by the USAF Security Policy Academy at Lackland.

Antiterrorist training had been given previously only to men in security and law enforcement specialties. The students receive academic training at the police academy, and then spend two or three weeks at Camp Bullis, Tex., learning combat tactics under field conditions.

Security personnel are responsible for guarding base perimeters, flight lines and missile sites — all possible targets for terrorists, the Air Force says.

The female security recruits will complete the normal six weeks of Air Force basic training and then enroll at the police academy before starting the antiterrorist training

In the antiterrorist training, the women will be required to complete aircraft. The Lackland involving programs throwing hand grenades and firing the M16 rifles, M60 machine gun and M79 grenade launcher. They also will learn how to use mines and will be trained in map and compass reading, land navigation camouflage concealment, combat tactics, counterattack techniques and riot control.

During the final week of training at Camp Bullis, the women must undergo a 24hour exercise where they put their knowledge to work.

Instructors, playing the roles of heavily-armed terrorists, do their best to wipe out the trainees' positions. Around the clock there is little rest as fire fights erupt, ebb and break out again in new locations.

Lt Col. William Rector, acting head of the program, said he liked what he has seen of the women so far. He predicts the 100 female recruits who will go through

When they arrive they find the one advertised is stripped of everything, and the seller then offers another, more fitting

example, for sale. The antibait section says bait advertising "is an unfair and deceptive practice, and shall not be used by any licensee." It then says such is an "insincere offer" and bars advertising for sale a motor vehicle "at a price which does not include certain standard equipment

Basically, the rules would require the dealers to give prospective buyers a true picture of what they're being

asked to buy. Bob Hays of Dallas said he wanted to continue advertising the way he had in the past, that his base price was below the base price of all others. He doesn't discount the price for the various options.

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Harding said that was a problem in that the price he advertised as the base price had little or no relationship to the price that was the actual price to the customer, since options often add up to nearly the base price.


