Ford picks Dole as running mate

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — President Ford today chose Sen. Robert J. Dole of Kansas to be his running mate in the Republican campaign to retain control of the White House.

Ford announced his choice at a news conference less than 12 hours after he triumphed over Ronald Reagan in the balloting for the GOP presidential nomination.

Ford's choice is to be ratified at tonight's closing session of the con-

vention.

Introducing Dole at a news conference, Ford noted he and Dole had served together in the House for eight

"He has been a great team player," the President said. "His philosophy and mine coincide almost exactly. Bob Dole is a great campaigner." Moments before the announcement.

The selection of Dole was somewhat of a surprise. He was not among those mentioned by several sources as the finalists in Ford's search for a

running mate. The names being mentioned most often were Reagan, Sen. Howard H. Baker of Tennessee, Treasury Secretary William Simon, and William D. Ruckelshaus, former deputy attorney general.

But in the end, Ford chose the Kansas senator who has never lost an election since he was elected to the Kansas legislature in 1950 at the age of 26. Dole was elected to the U.S. House in 1960 and to the Senate in 1968.

Dole addressed the convention Monday night and his speech was a hard-hitting attack on the Democrats.

Referring to the Democratic platform adopted at the party's convention in New York City last month, Dole said, "I'd be afraid to

stand on that platform, much less try to run on it...It isn't safe. It is weak. It tilts so far left that any of us would slide off."

One of the first congratulatory calls received by the President today was from Jimmy Carter, his Democratic opponent.

In a telephone conversation from his home in Plains, Ga., Carter told Ford he wasn't surprised that Republicans appeared to be uniting behind Ford.

Car fire kills local baby

By DANNY REAGAN A seven-month-old Big Spring baby was fatally burned Wednesday as it lay unattended in a car behind the

Salvation Army.

Lt. Jim McCain of the juvenile division talked to District Attorney Robert H. (Bob) Moore III Wednesday afternoon about possible negligent homicide charges being filed in connection with the incident.

Moore reportedly agreed to the request and formal charges were expected to be filed this afternoon. At 2:45 p.m. Wednesday, Big Spring police and fire departments responded to an automobile fire report on Aylford Street, near the

Salvation Army Building Capt. Jack Jones of the local police

rushed over to the burning car before official units arrived. Someone from across the street apparently used a private fire extinguisher to fight the blaze, according to Jones, and someone at the scene reportedly pulled the baby out of the car before it was gutted by flames.

According to a witness at the scene, the baby suffered third-degree burns over 100 per cent of his body.

Capt. Jones stated that the fire had started in the right-hand section of the rear seat, and he and the fire marshal theorized that a cigarette may have been thrown out and fell back into the car, smoldering for an undetermined ngth of time and eventually starting

But the definite cause of the fire has not been determined at press time. The baby had been left on the front

seat of the vehicle, and Capt. Jones stated that the mother had been in the Salvation Army approximately 10 The baby was taken to the Malone-

Hogan emergency room in critical condition. At 6:30 p.m., the baby was taken to the airport to be transferred to John-Sealy Hospital in Galveston. A portable suction unit, a device

used in the transportation of badly burned victims, volunteered by Webb AFB, was used in the transfer. The baby arrived in Galveston at 8:35 p.m., was treated by burn specialists there, but died six hours

later. The baby's name was Frank Franco. He had been born Jan. 10 of this year in Big Spring.
Survivors include his parents, Mr.

and Mrs. Ector T. Franco; a brother, Lorenzo Franco; paternal grand-parents, Mr. and Mrs. Santos Franco; and a maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mercedes Randon, of Belton.

Funeral services are pending at Nalley-Pickle Funeral Home

Capt. Jones recalled a similar tragedy in 1971 when one small boy died in a car fire near the Veterans Administration Hospital. Three children barely escaped. He said, Leaving kids alone in a car is a dangerous situation, but it happens all the time. When are people going to wake up to this problem.?"

U.S., North Korean forces put on alert

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - The United States and North Korea today put their Korea in the wake of Wednesday's slaying of two American officers in the truce village of Panmunjom.

'We have taken the precautionary move of increasing the readiness status of the forces in the area," a Pentagon spokesman said in

North Korea announced it had ordered its armed forces into a state of combat readiness because of the U.S. reaction to what American officials called the "brutal murder" of the two officers.

All American military personnel on leave in Korea were ordered to return at once to their units and the United States warned North Korea that the club-and-axe killing of the two Americans 'jeopardized the entire framework" of the 23-year Korean armistice. But Pentagon officials in Washington discounted the possibility of American military retaliation.

A broadcast by North Korea's official Central News Agency said the United States "took a combat posture by issuing an the North Koreans now hold

occupying South Korea.

"This is the prelude to the war adventure that the U.S. imperialist aggressors may perpetrate," perpetrate," it declared, announcing that North Korean President and Communist party leader Kim Il-sung has ordered all North Korean army and paramilitary Red Guard units into combat readiness.

In a series of escalating warnings, the two sides issued conflicting versions of the bloody fight Wednesday over an allied attempt to trim a tree at Panmunjom, each accusing the other of starting it and each side saying its men were outnumbered.

Making no mention of any fatalities: North Korean broadcasts called the clash "a free-for-all," that injured personnel of both sides. It said five of its guards suffered wounds ranging from light to heavy

Allied military sources had said three North Koreans were believed fatally injured.

One Communist broadcast said the allies were falsely accusing the North Koreans of carrying axes but in fact emergency order of alert to as evidence "the axe used by

Carter talked to Ford at 10:20 a.m. EDT and said moments later through a spokes man that President and new Republican nominee said he had been through "a very good convention and a hardfought battle."

When Carter won the Democratic presidential nomination last month, Ford phoned him to offer congratulations.

Today, Carter quoted Ford harmony has been developing since

Carter said he first called the President in his hotel suite in Kansas City at 8:31 a.m. after he heard Jack Ford, the President's son, say during a television interview that his father was up and working.



PORT ELIZABETH, South Africa (AP) - Rioting, arson and looting continued for the third day today in black townships outside Port Elizabeth, Police gunfire killed 10 blacks and wounded 23 Wednesday, the police

announced today.

Angry crowds of blacks
burned two schools, a
hospital and a shopping center early today. Property damage in the three days of violence was estimated at more than a million dollars.

The police said 31 blacks were arrested. However, thousands of black workers poured out of their districts on their way to work as usual, and there was no apparent attempt by

demonstrators to interfere with them. The killing Wednesday increased the death toll in racial violence in South Africa to at least 228, all but three of them black, since the first upheaval in the

Johannesburg in mid-June. More than 1,500 persons are estimated to have been injured in violence in townships across the nation.

The disturbances around industrial Port Elizabeth, at the southeast corner of the country, began Tuesday and escalated Wednesday with a march by 500 high school students in sympathy with blacks killed earlier. The crowd grew to 4,000, and the police opened fire when they refused to disperse.

KANSAS CITY - On a hill just above the Crown Center in Kansas City, where President Ford is staying. are about 250 Yippies with signs protesting the various socio-economic problems of the country. Many of the signs are printed, but not printable, at least not in this paper. Compared to previous conventions the protestors of 76 are only a drop in the bucket, and in some ways look as outdated as the Republicans they are protesting

Can you tell me how, without a biopsy, it is determined that a swelling of this type is of no concern?

The fact that it has not enlarged in three years time would account for his doctors' apparent lack of concern about it. They have probably looked for other nodes in classic locations such as the groin and armpits. Find-

A virus (for example, a flu variety) often will settle in a node in this way and cause infection. The scarring from such an infection would cause a lump to form. However, apart from the lymph node possibility, one must also rule out a possible tumor of the parotid gland. That would be located below the ear. It would be very firm in consistency, fixed in place. A lymph node would be moveable. The parotid glands are the ones involved in mumps.

I would be inclined to have it removed. A biopsy is the only way to determine the exact nature of any tissue. If this matter is causing you distress, you have a right to seek one.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Please tell me just what "spoon nails" are and how you get them. I can't tell for sure, but I think mine are in that category. Am I undernourished or what? - Mrs. T.H.

They are called spoon nails because there is what is called a 'saucerization" in the central portion a gently dip in of the surface.

Nail symptoms are many and varied and they may or may not indicate some underlying disorder. In most cases they merely raise mild suspicions that may or may not be confirmed by further diagnosis.

With spoon nails one might suspect such problems as iron deficiency, perhaps a thyroid disorder - either underactive or overactive. Sometimes spoon nails can mean only that the nails are softer. That could be an inherited quality. Lack of sufficient protein is another possibility.

Nails are a fascinating subject. The various symptoms and their possbile meaning are discussed at length in my booklet, "Solving Your Nail Problems." Dear Dr. Thosteson: My menstrual periods usually run between 24 and 28 days apart. I am 43. I had my tubes tied so that I wouldn't have any more children. Since then I have not had my period for 42 days. Is it possible that am pregnant? - Mrs. O.H.

It's possible. You may have been pregnant at the time of the operation. Tubal ligation does not interfere with normal menstruation. The ovaries remain and so the hormones that govern it are still produced.

Another possibility is that anxiety over the operation itself may have interfered with your normal menstruation. This can happen. If you are 42 days from your most recent period, a test would confirm pregnancy... suggest you have this done. The tubal ligation would not interfere with a normal pregnancy.

With the major news of the day emanating from Kansas City I feel compelled to make some comparisons (mostly irrevelant and prejudiced) between the Democratic and

ACCORDING TO figures presented the other night on CBS, the average Democratic delegation contained more minorities, women and people under 30 years of age than its Republican counterpart. The average Democratic delegate has also received more formal education than

the average GOP delegate.

About the only area in which the Republican delegate came out on top

was in the size of his salary.

wife as a running mate. The most cogent point made about Rule 16C, requirring the selection of a running mate by Ford before Wednesday, was made by a young woman from Minnesota. She asked, in essence, why the Reagan forces placed so much importance on bringing the delegates into the VP selection process when none of them had had a hand in choosing Sch-

It is ironic that, though the path was a little more convoluted, the only suspense remaining for the Republicans two days into the convention is who Ford will choose as a running mate. (I write this before Wednesday's gathering).

IT IS ALSO ironic that with all the built-in excitement for this year's GOP convention, the delegates still appear to be just going through the motions. This is more evidence of the Republicans' legendary, lackluster heavy-handedness

As one friend (Hey, that's no friend. That's Danny Reagan) puts it, "Kansas City is Pablum City." The Republicans had the making of a real three-ring circus, but again the wet blanket descended and the Grand Old Party proved as dull as this year's Democrats.

The Republicans seem to have a corner on the market of old warhorses of the Goldwater-Landon variety. All the Democratic legends except for Humphrey have gone on to the big baby-kissing contest in the sky. The Republicans can use all the oldies-butgoodies they can find because of an ex-president whom they have rarely and barely will mention. The Demos have finally gotten around to mentioning Johnson

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Finally, this year's award for the man who is in the best spirits with the least justification goes to Vice President Nelson Rockefeller.

In conclusion at this point in time (it's catching) I would like to state that despite the relatively comatose nature of both conventions, they were (are) still the most exciting shows in

The excitement comes from watching a process that often seems to degenerate to a rabble or a scene at a horse race, but where the outcome is always in the hands of the lone

Election strategy

KANSAS CITY — The big question nagging the Republican delegates here is whether all the sound and fury has been worth the aggravation. The GOP is so deep in the hole, according to the polls, that it may not be able to climb out by November

In the smoke-filled backrooms, party leaders frankly doubt that Jimmy Carter and Walter Mondale can be overtaken by election day. But they intend to put up a battle. Here is their secret strategy:

FIRST, THEY must cool tempers and soothe animosities. The party pros believe they can do this. Both President Ford's compaign manager Rogers Morton, and Ronald Reagan's manager, Sen. Paul Laxalt, R.-Nev., have assured us that they will be able to bring their forces together for the

campaign ahead. Second, they must bring the highflying Jimmy Carter back down to earth. The pros say they have no alternative; they must open up on Carter with all their anti-aircraft batteries; he must be riddled full of holes or their ticket won't stand a

The trigger man will be the vice, presidential candidate. The GOP strategists hope their No. 2 man can embroil the Democrat's No. 1 man in a running exchange. The two may scratch and scar one another. But if the strategy works, the Republican presidential candidate will stay above the battle and remain comparatively unscathed.

Some of the party's lesser lights, meanwhile, will concentrate their fire on Walter Mondale. They believe he is vulnerable because of his liberal

The Republicans will try to portray the Democrats as big spenders, as wasters of the taxpayers' hard-earned money. President Ford tried to impose a \$395 billion spending ceiling on Congress for the 1977 fiscal year. But the Democratic leadership added \$18 billion and adopted a \$413 billion

Of course, the truth is that the President caught Congress off guard by requesting a spending ceiling that was unrealistically low. The final figures weren't available on the actual spending in fiscal 1976. Under the law, a spending ceiling can't be set until the previous year's level is determined

So Congress could hardly accept the President's \$395 billion ceiling without the risk of violating federal law. Clearly, he was playing politics when he proposed the ceiling. The higher \$413 billion ceiling was determined, in large part, by the subsequent spending figures.

FORD HAS refused to cooperate, meanwhile. with the new congressional budgeting process. Yet when he was still a congressman, he fought for a better budget system. Now that Congress has one, he is bucking it.

I called the hospital about an hour and twenty minutes after the baby had been taken there. The hospital informed me that it


had done everything that it could do, and that the child was being sent to the burn center. I can't say what the baby's chances



engraving, patches, jewelry and other merchandise. Several radio clubs will also have booths displaying merchandise.



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Earthquake activity Iull shattered in 1976

WASHINGTON (AP) Earthquakes have killed tens of thousands and wreaked devastation on three continents this year, making 1976 the deadliest year for quakes since 1970,

U.S. experts say. The U.S. Geological Survey said Wednesday the number of severe quakes doubled since June, indicating that 1976 may reverse the apparent worldwide earthquake activity lull reported since

Survey scientists said 10 major earthquakes and three great quakes already have occurred this year. The long-term average is for about 16 to 18 major and one great quake a year.

A major quake registers magnitude 7 or greater on the Richter Scale. A great quake, registers 8 or more. Every increase of one number on the scale means the ground motion is 10 times

The USGS National Earthquake Information Service in Golden, Colo., reported only 11 major shocks in 1973. There were 12 in 1974 and 13 in 1975. The first great quake since 1971 also occurred last year.

Earthquakes have taken more than 27,000 lives, and possibly many thousands more so far this year. This makes 1976 the deadliest year for quakes since 1970

Amarillo is truly Helium Capital

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) — You might call Amarillo the Helium Capital of the World. According to a leaflet put out by the Amarillo Convention and Visitors Board, 'Today in excess of 90 per cent of the free world's known helium supply is to be found within a radius of 150 miles of Amarillo."

Although the city of 143,000 people was once a center of research in and production of the lighter-than-air gas, it is now principally the focal conservation program. Helium produced at plants as far away as Kansas is piped or shipped by train to the reservoir at the Cliffside Gas Field about 15 miles northwest of Amarillo.

The helium is stored in porous rock about 3,500 feet below the surface. About 38.4 billion cubic feet of helium has been put in storage there by the federal government and slightly less than one billion cubic feet of helium is stored there by private companies.

Couples who conceive a child before they wed do not have a significantly higher breakup rate than those who wait until after the marriage ceremony to start a family, a government report shows.

The report said that 81.6 per cent of women in the last half of the 1960s who married after becoming pregnant still were with their husbands at the time of the 1970 census, compared to 85.5 per cent of women who were not pregnant when they

MOSS CREEK LAKE Ed McCain reports "fair" fishing this week. The catfish are biting some, and a few black bass have been taken out. Jessie Bedwell caught a five or six pounder on artificial bait, a plastic worm.

Most fishermen are having bad luck this week. "A good rain would help everything,"

McCain estimates the lake is going down at a rate of about two or three inches a day. Two more 14" walleyes were pulled out of the lake this past week, so at least they're still in there growing.

LAKE SPENCE The stripers are running in 40-ft. water. Most are being caught about 20 to 30 feet deep on slabs. But they are still hitting top-water baits early in the morning and late at





'As an associate professor of brush control and range improvement," said Dr. Carl S. Menzies, resident director at the center, "Dr. Ueckert will conduct research in three areas: rangeland seeding, control of noxious rangeland plants, and rangeland insects — all primarily in the Edwards Plateau.

Farmers home broadens home loan program'

WASHINGTON (AP) -Farmers Home Administration broadened one of its programs to help more low income families qualify for housing loans.

Effective Aug. Agriculture Department agency said Wednesday, applications will be considered from families with incomes up to \$10,000 a year. The previous limit was \$8,500 annually. The ceiling in Hawaii was raised to \$12,200 from \$10,700 and in Alaska to \$15,000 from \$13,500.

Federal law authorizes the agency to make loans to qualified rural and smalltown families at reduced interest rates of as little as one per cent, depending on family income and size of the loan.
