Education bill okayed

Senate rejects bus limits

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate today approved a \$35.3-billion, sixyear extension of federal programs for higher and vocational education, after rejecting attempts to restrict court-ordered busing to desegregate

The final vote was 78 to 5, sending the bill to a conference with the House.

Voting against final passage of the bill, all Republicans, were Sens. Paul Fannin and Barry Goldwater of Arizona, Jesse Helms of North Carolina, Paul Laxalt of Nevada and William L. Scott of Virginia.

Among other things, the bill would increase the maximum federal grant for poor students to attend college from \$1,400 to \$1,800 per year. It also would extend eligibility for government-guaranteed student loans to familes with annual incomes of \$25,000. The current limit is \$15,000.

Senate adopted 88 to 0 an amendment to exempt father-son and motherdaughter events in public schools from the ban on sex discrimination in federally supported educational in-

stitutions. The amendment, by Rep. Paul Fannin, R-Ariz., also would waive application of the anti-discrimination law to Boys State and Girls State programs sponsored by the American Legion and its auxiliary.

The House has passed separate bills extending higher education programs for one year and vocational education assistance for six years. The final version will go to a House-Senate conference.

Although the Ford administration has indicated opposition to the Senate version of the bill, Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., Republican floor manager, told the Senate, "We believe and hope that the President will approve the final version.

Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said the bill's \$1,800 maximum basic student grant authorization is misleading, since Congress has never been able to appropriate enough money for the \$1,400 maximum authorized since

The current average grant, Stevens said, is \$680 a year and he expressed doubt that the proposed increase to \$1,800 will raise the average to more than \$700 a year. The rejected busing amendment





COAHOMA - "Coahoma did not threaten to withdraw from the tax appraisal board as reported in the Big Spring Herald Thursday," Mrs. Ina Stout, city secretary, stated here

"We were simply asking that our

portion of the cost of the board be reduced to a cost comparable to other taxing agencies on the board," the secretary added. "Our share per tax parcel was set at \$1.08 and some of the others were as

low as 52 cents per parcel. We asked

that ours be adjusted to 77 cents per parcel," the secretary pointed out. "We think the tax board is doing a great service, both to the taxing agencies and to the taxpayers. The fact that our share was set higher was never done on purpose. It's just something that happened in the first year of operation.

"The board was very considerate in adjusting it to suit our request. Some of the agencies participating have a lot more taxpayers than others." Mrs. Stout concluded.

"Certainly, we never threated to withdraw from the board. Speaking for Coahoma, I simply said that \$1.08 per tax parcel was too high and that we should be able to get it cheaper,' she concluded.

The Big Spring Herald did not report that Coahoma officials were "threatening" to withdraw from the cooperative appraisal program. But, with the Coahoma city secretary saying the method of computing costs was unacceptable and the cost of appraisal separately by a commercial firm being mentioned this appeared

If the Coahoma representative did not present the tax appraisal board with an explicit threat, it was implied.

Q. I understand the Dora Roberts Community Center has been airconditioned, yet the municipal auditorium has gone 40 years without an air-conditioning system. It would probably be used a lot more during the summer months if it were. What is the story here?

A. The Dora Roberts Foundation donated the funds for air conditioning the Community Center, which was greatly appreciated by the city, since it gives the town a meeting place for many different types of meetings. Permian Building tax tiff

A professional real estate appraiser testified the Permian Building was worth \$200,000 at the time local governments set the value of

Flato Realty Investments,.. a Corpus Christi trust, is trying to convince an 118th District Court jury taxes on the building for 1974 and 1976 were too high.

CLARK C. FLATO, general manager of the trust, said his organization rendered six-story downtown office building for \$150,000 in 1974. That was the year local governments set the true market value of the structure at \$430,000.

In 1976, when the trust placed the building's value at \$180,000 according to Flato, the taxing bodies taxed on the basis of a \$295 000 market value.

W. M. (Mike) McClellan, a Member of the Appraisal Institute (MAI) and Senior Real Property Appraiser (SRPA), placed the value of the building Jan. 1, 1976 at \$225,000

While Flato complained about the local economy in defense of the amount of office space unrented, G. Ben Bancroft, an attorney for the defendant governments, pointed the blame at poor management. McClellan agreed in part.

"I DON'T THINK the building is managed as good as it could be," McClellan

But McClellan figured the building, which had occupancy rates ranging from 54 to 59 per cent for three years, would need 96 per cent occupancy to be worth

From 1960 through 1974. the population of Big Spring 'remained relatively static," the appraiser said.

While he didn't consider the local economy unsound, McClellan saw no indicators Big Spring was "just exploding with growth" like Dallas or Houston.

"I THINK BIG SPRING is very typical of the 30,000 (population) category city in Texas," McClellan

"You were very well diversified economically," McClellan observed.

'It wasn't a depressed (office rental) market or an overbuilt market," he said. As he outlined the method used in determining market value in 1974, McClellan

pointed to increasing fuel costs, a "great inflation spiral" not offset by comparable individual income increases and high interest rates for investors.

AN INVESTOR would not buy the building unless he could make a 12 per cent annual return on his investment, McClellan said.

The part-time under graduate instructor at SMU charted a math formula indicating an investor might hope to make \$24,000 yearly from the \$200,000 structure.



It's Time For Back-To-School.

SUPPOSE THE the scarcity of petroleum is making the cost of chemical fertilizer all but prohibitive and the costs of energy high.

Suppose the world's grain shortfall is millions of tons below what is needed to feed the world, with the U.S. and Canada being the only two countries with grain to export and being forced, OPEC style, to decide

This is a chilling scenario. It is one drawn up by the Wall Street Journal earlier this year as it talked with experts about the year 2000. Unfortunately, the scenario may not

only be possible, it may be likely Such a situation would certainly put a premium on the Big Spring farmer who can produce excellent crops, but he may be trying to produce different

ones in different ways. Grain is the key foodstuff of the world, accounting for 70 per cent of what the world eats. As it becomes increasingly short as world population grows, farmers may be forced to shift to grain as much as possible.

Certainly no grain will be fed to beef cattle. Already this practice has been reduced by higher grain costs.

The Journal predicted that the beef business is here to stay because the steer, an inefficient producer of meat by consuming grain, is an efficient producer of meat by consuming grass. But a return to open range grazing is an almost certainty as grain prices go up. The marbled, grain-fed beef steak may be a luxury indeed.

Grazing animals, the experts say, accounted for half of the beef in the U.S. in 1975, but they may account for 90 per cent by the year 2000.

BUT, EXPERTS note, there isn't enough grass to support the present beef population, so beef production may decline by the year 2000, no matter how high prices go.

The experts also say the hog is endangered as a farm product because of his consumption of grain. A pork chop, they conclude, may be a greater luxury in 2000 than a beef

The worsening energy crisis may force farmers back to the old methods of using less chemical fertilizers and pesticides and more animal manure and natural pest killers. The Journal says farmers may have to resume crop rotation to preserve soil nutrients.

More farm laborers, and maybe even the mule, could make a comeback as gasoline supplies shorten.

The outlook is not hopeless, but it is certainly sober.

Roselli's grisly murder

WASHINGTON - It was a grisly end for John Roselli, the dapper, debonair mobster about town, who had been a familiar figure in the glittering nightspots of Hollywood, Las Vegas and Havana.

His killers shot or stabbed him in the stomach. The autopsy indicates they may have shot him and then dug out the bullet with a knife. Then they brutally hacked off his legs. It is possible that he was still alive when they stuffed his body into a 55-gallon

THEY WRAPPED chains around the drum to weight it down and tossed it into Biscayne Bay. The autopsy suggests he may have died of asphyxiation inside the drum before it hit the water. The gases from the decomposing body floated the heavy container to the surface. It was discovered, with its nightmarish contents, 10 days after Roselli had disappeared from his sister's home in Plantation, Fla.

The police withheld the gruesome details of his death while they searched for his killers. We began our own investigation, meanwhile, after an appeal from his associates.

We first encountered Johnny Roselli more than five years ago. We were investigating his role in the Central Intelligence Agency's plot to assassinate Cuban Premier Fidel

The CIA case officer, William Harvey, told us that Roselli had been the hero of the abortive adventure. Harvey broke his oath of secrecy because he thought it might help Roselli, who was in trouble with the law. The CIA agent had nothing but

praise for Roselli's daring. In the strictest of confidence, Roselli himself confirmed that he had directed six assassination attempts against Castro. We protected his confidence, so he came to trust us. We

So when he vanished last month his associates came to us for help. We were suspicious, of course, that his disappearance was linked to the Castro caper. But our investigation has now produced evidence to the contrary.

We have learned, for example, that Roselli was not the amiable, retired old duffer he pretended to be. He began in the big time as a bookkeeper for Chicago's notorious Al Capone and became a specialist in white-collar crimes. It's a profession, apparently, that he never gave up.

COMPETENT SOURCES say that, between rounds on the Florida golf courses, Roselli was involved in stolen securities and financial swindles. His operations reportedly were resented by Santo Trafficante, who has been identified in Senate testimony as the Mafia chief in Florida.

Roselli came to Florida from Las Vegas, where he allegedly represented the Chicago mob. Our sources say that he handled millions in illegal gambling money which he forwarded to the Chicago underworld. There are reports that Chicago crime lord Tony Accardo felt he had been short-changed by Roselli

Still earlier, Roselli spent time in the slammer; first, for extortion and, later, for a card swindle. Those who know him say he had developed a taste for the good life. He dressed in the latest styles, dined at the best restaurants and dated beautiful women. The thought of going back to prison, friends say, horrified him.

To avoid prison, Roselli began to talk to the government as early as 1970. He gave information, according to our sources, which resulted in a grand jury confrontation for Tony Accardo. The surly mobster took the fifth. But Accardo grumbled to associates that he would pay back Roselli some day.

Teenagers are all welcome to use this facility and arrangements have been made for such. We have organized programs - sewing. cooking - to which teenage girls are welcome. The library is always open and at one time we had a tutor to help them with their homework, but this drew no interest whatsoever. We sponsor a going Boy Scout troop and help send them to the Davis Mountains each year. We paid the signup fee of \$15 each year for nine boys to play teenage baseball. We also sponsor an entry in the Big Spring

Not only do we sponsor a Brownie Troop, we have a Jr. Girl Scout Troop as well. And most people over town are aware of our outstanding choir and the interest some teenagers have in the Bell Ringers. We have not left out the men either, as we sponsor a men's softball team, which last year brought in a trophy which is displayed

evening of each month we also offer a blood pressure check to all adults. And getting back to smaller children, we have a girls' arts and crafts class and a separate boys' arts and crafts There is no catch whatsoever to any of the these programs as they are all free to the residents of the Westside

Community Now programs have to have instructors and leaders and people in authority. The only paid personnel we have is the couple who live there and one lady to clean and assist when necessary. The rest of these programs are carried on by volunteers, as is every member of the Board of Directors. Each serves without a thought of reimbursement — and each takes money and time from their own

families to do this. Initially the new building which was moved in from Webb was refurbished by citizens doing the labor from other communities over town - very few from the Westside Community. We have also just finished refurbishing again, this time by paid labor, yet the Board gets calls from some members of the Westside Community complaining because we haven't paid to have the weeds cut around the basketball court so they could use it. If they are truly interested in the center they could have cut the weeds themselves since it is a Community Center.

And in regard to the couple running the center at the present time, they are the same ones who supervised it for 12 years and that includes the time in the smaller building.

We think we have a good program and feel we have touched base - at least the corner - for each group living in the Westside. We cannot be all things to all people. We do not believe we have to prove our worth to the community and if a small portion of the residents wish to try to undo the good of the center, they are only hurting their neighbors

Hope for Rhodesia?

WASHINGTON - The State Department is considering quiet U.S. support for a desperate last-hope plan, backed by a few influential Rhodesian blacks and whites, to attempt quick black-majority rule in Rhodesia without mass killings in an escalating guerrilla war and without flight of white economic resources and skills

The heart of the plan: a system of rich economic rewards to persuade the country's 270,000 whites to stay in Rhodesia after black-majority rule

THE HOUR is late and the odds are long. Any compromise is opposed by increasingly powerful black guerrilla leaders who refuse to guarantee anything for the whites and by militant whites dominating Prime Minister Ian Smith's government who respond by promising never to give an

Nevertheless, the plan is backed by one key faction in the African National Congress (ANC), which represents most of the country's 7 million blacks, and by a small in-fluential group of whites who hope ultimately to convince Smith. Unlikely though the plan's chances are, high U.S. officials take it seriously enough to consider backing it with money and prestige as the only alternative to bloody tragedy

Behind the plan is the conviction that black rule is inevitable, and will come in one of two ways: from Communist-supported guerrilla war destorying the white-controlled economic structure; or from blackwhite cooperation preserving the benefits of an extraordinarily rich economy for the new black government and for whites who are persuaded to remain by economic rewards. The former avenue is the overwhelming probability today

If this trend continues, with black Africa committed to a military solution in Rhodesia, the entire Western position in southern Africa will be threatened. The defeat of the U.S. and Western Europe when power was seized by Soviet-backed black nationalists in Angola last spring did not approach the political potency of a Communist-backed victory in

TO AVOID that calamity, the plan now under scrutiny here sets up a Western consortium, headed by the U.S., to guarantee Rhodesian whites on two major points: first, no expropriation without fair compensation; second, the right of whites to remove proportionally more assets from the country the longer they stayed.

One new political factor giving the plan an almost desperate urgency is the rising power of black nationalist guerrilla leaders trained, and equipped and supplied by Peking or Moscow-bloc Communists. military men are submerging the political leadership of the two main nationalist factions: ZANU (the Zimbabwe African Natiional Union) and ZAPU (Zimbabwe African People's Union).

The guerrilla leaders want total power and military rule. The black politicians claim a much-different objective: the right of blacks to vote and hence to take majority power, with the whites remaining as a vital force in the economy.

more and more toward military solutions, political progress obviously gets much more difficult. Nevertheless, the alternative to political progress in Rhodesia is a long, mutually destructive war.

Asian returnee gets double whammie

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My grandson, who is 21, has serum hepatitis. This is

He remained in Southeast Asia following his duty in Vietnam. Then he returned home five months ago by way of India and Africa. A week after his return he was told he had infectious hepatitis. After several weeks in the hospital he began college

A month later he developed serum hepatitis. The doctors think he got that virus when he was inoculated for cholera while in India

After another (short) hospital stay he was told he could return to classes. I know the seriousness of serum hepatitis. Do you think he should have a longer period of rest? - H.M.

Serum hepatitis is usually more severe than the infectious type and it normally requires a lengthier recovery period. Your grandson's case is an intersting one.

Let's distinguish between the two types of hepatitis - "infectious" and 'serum." Both produce inflammation of the liver, and both produce similar flu-like symptoms and the charac-

But there are, as you indicate, different viruses involved in each. The serum hepatitis virus enters the blood either through infected donor blood or through the use of contaminated hypodermic needles. The virus that causes the infectious type uses the more traditional modes of infection contact with the feces of an infected

person, infected food, etc. Your grandson apparently had a double whammy on him, contracting the infectious type and then the serum type, apparently through his inoculation.

The timing makes sense. The incubation time for the infectious type is from two to six weeks, shorter usually than for the serum type. This would account for his first (infectious) hepatitis bout shortly after returning to this country.

The incubation period for the serum-type ranges from several weeks up to a year. That would account for the longer delay before onset (after his return).

Antibodies used to combat the infectious type (his first one) are not effective against the serum hepatitis

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

Pulitzer Prizes have long been the most sought-after award of reporters. Much attention has been paid this year to the two reporters who wrote the Watergate scandals for the Washington

parole violations following a bank robbery They have been featured in movies and books, since their receiving of the Manson is serving a life term for the 1969 slayings of Pulitzer Prize. actress Sharon Tate and six

Texas has only had a couple of Pulitzer Prize winners in the field of journalism. One of course, was Oscar Griffin, who was news editor of the Pecos Independent at the time that the Billie Sol Estes scandal broke in 1962.

This summer for the first time in many, many years, my son and I stopped to visit with our good friend, Oscar, his wife Pat and their children in El Campo.

Oscar was 29 - going on a 100 when he was working on the Estes case. I was 35. There were a couple other folks around bogged down in that boondaggle of a national scandal and all of the things that went with it. We think we dreamed part

of it - kind of an unbelievable nightmare. The paper was set on fire twice -Oscar's wife was threatened with a gun. I can remember in the aftermath and the trials that followed, having a brick thrown through the front bedroom window, and a snake put in the car. And one recruited to help in the drive Christmas I opened a Christmas package with a tag inside that said. "This could have been a bomb. Have fun opening all your presents this year.

Oscar was hired immediately after the arrest of Estes by the Houston Chronicle. After he was presented the Pulitzer, he

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



Rubber strike end nearing

More than half the 70,000 rubber workers who have been on strike for four months are expected back to work by next week, but the new contract bringing them back will be costly to consumers.

The Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. reached tentative agreement Thursday with the United Rubber Workers. The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. reached had agreement Tuesday. Together, they employ 38,000

"Consumers should expect tire price increases as the direct result of this settlement because it is clearly expensive and unavoidably inflationary," said Mario A. DiFederico, Firestone executive vice president.

Industry sources have predicted price hikes on tires ranging from 12 to 17 per cent because of the contract settlement. The strike wiped out the summer production of winter tires, and a shortage of snow tires is also expected.

DiFederico said Firestone would concentrate on the production of winter tires

(AP) - Internationally famed opera singer Lotte Lehmann, once banned by Hitler from singing in her homeland but who vaulted to acclaim in the United States, has died after a long illness.

The 88-year-old Germanborn artist died in her sleep here Thursday.

Her creativity spanned the realms of music, theater, literature and painting, bringing her recognition in Europe between the world wars and fame on this side of the Atlantic since 1930. Shortly after the Nazis

came to power in Germany, she was offered the title of prima donna on the condition that she perform only in her homeland. When she refused, the government Vietnam service as a Navy forbade her to sing in Germany. She renounced her nation and settled in Austria, then fled when that nation fell to the Germans.

She moved to the United States in 1938 where she was acclaimed as one of the greatest singers of all time.



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

A Pentagon spokesman said that, "it is clear that including the hymn ... was a mistake," but he said no order would be given to excise the hymn.

Several weeks ago the for a replacement hymn to Veterans Administration appear in subsequent verappear in subsequent versions of the hymnal."

That could be a long way off. Prior to 1974, the hymnal had not been revised in more than a decade.

The hymn also has its defenders. Officials of the United Church of Christ and American Baptist Churches have protested Chaplain Rogers' decision to tear the hymn from the VA's books.



It doesn't mean anything, standings-wise or moneywise, but Saturday night's nationally-televised (ABC, 8 p.m., CDT) game between the Pittsburgh Steelers and Dallas Cowboys will no doubt be played with all the intensity of Super Bowl X. when the Steelers beat the Cowboys 21-17.

The intensity will be provided by pride - and some long memories. The Steelers are deter-

"While most homeowners consider modernization costs primarily in the light of the enjoyment to be received from them, it is also important to consider how much of the outlay can be recaptured, if and when the house is sold," Young said.

The TRERC researcher noted families are finding it easier to get home improvement loans. Lenders have ample money and like the shorter term, higherinterest loans. She added that in some cases lenders may be willing to shave interest rates a little or offer a longer repayment period.

"The location of the property and the character the neighborhood have much to do with the return on on the investment," Young "If renovating increases the cost of the home out of the price range of other nearby houses, it is difficult to recoup the remodeling expense. If the heighborhood is declining. a major renovation project is likewise risky.

ing advised would-be vators of older homes to der whether or not the changes will affect architectural style.

"A popular improvement is to enclose an open porch or breezeway to make a family room," she said. "Yet, if the change affects the style of the house, the improvement might be questionable."

The research associate cautioned against hasty conversion of a garage or carport into a room.

"Once you have the new room, you are without a garage and the storage space it affords," she said, and the old driveway may be a problem.

Kitchen modernization is generally a wise investment, continued Young. If not more than 10 per cent of the house value is spent on kitchen remodeling, the money can usually be recovered when the home is sold.

The addition of another bathroom can be a very good investment, especially if there is only one existing in the house initially. If there were already two or more each addition adds less to the resale value. The cost of building a new bathroom in an existing area runs from \$1,500 to \$3,500

"The law of diminishing returns also applies to adding bedrooms. The cost of a third or fourth bedroom may be recaptured, while the fifth or sixth probably cannot be," she said. "Remember the importance of having a nearby bathroom. There should also be an entry into the room from a hallway, not through another bedroom.

"Renovation projects should be planned in great detail prior to obtaining bids from contractors," Young advised. "Any change made after work begins will
