





Football Fest Empanadas

TOTAL TIME: Prep: 30 min. Bake: 10 min./batch YIELD:24 servings

- Ingredients
 - 1 jar (16 ounces) black bean and corn salsa
 - 1/2 cup frozen corn, thawed
- 2 jalapeno peppers, seeded and minced 3 tablespoons minced fresh cilantro, divided
- 2 teaspoons lime juice
- 1 package (9 ounces) ready-to-use Southwestern chicken strips, chopped
- 2 packages (14.1 ounces each) refrigerated pie pastry
- 4 ounces quesadilla cheese, shredded
- 1 egg, lightly beaten

Directions

1. In a large bowl, combine the salsa, corn, jalapenos, 2 tablespoons cilantro and lime juice. In another bowl, combine the chicken, remaining cilantro and 1/2 cup salsa mixture; set aside. Reserve remaining salsa for serving.

2. Unroll a pastry sheet onto a lightly floured surface. Using a floured 4-in. round cookie cutter placed halfway on edge of pastry, cut 4-in. x 3-in. football shapes. Repeat with remaining dough, chilling and rerolling scraps as needed.

3. Transfer half of the cutouts to greased baking sheets. Place 1 tablespoon chicken mixture in the center of each; top each with 1-1/2 teaspoons cheese. Brush edges of pastry with egg. Top with remaining cutouts; press edges with a fork to seal. Cut slits in the tops to resemble football laces. Brush tops with egg.

4. Bake at 450° for 8-12 minutes or until golden brown. Serve warm with reserved salsa mixture. Refrigerate leftovers.

Freeze option: Freeze cooled pastries in a freezer container, separating layers with waxed paper. To use, reheat pastries on a greased baking sheet in a preheated 400° oven until crisp and heated through. Yield: 2 dozen.

Friona Evening Lions Club met Thursday, January 28, for dinner and a program at the Union Congregational Church. Guest speaker was Bruce Fleming, who is president of the Parmer County Historical Museum.

"The museum is located in the old Congregational Church on Sixth and Cleveland Street," Fleming told the group.

According to Fleming, the owners of the XIT Ranch wanted a town so land would sell and a town needed a church. Therefore, they donated the land for Friona's first church. Twenty-one members of the Congregational Church then built the wood frame church.

In 1921, the building burned to the ground. Members borrowed \$12,500 from a bank and rebuilt the church with twelve-inch thick adobe walls and stucco.

In 1969, the Congregational church built a new church at 1601 Euclid and the old building fell into disrepair. Friona Girl Scouts of America owned the building for a time. Ultimately, the church became a property of the county for lack of tax payment.

A committee interested in saving the old church met and plans formed to use the building as a museum for all of Parmer County.

At this meeting in 1995, Bruce Fleming was elected president of the committee.

Fleming said that in 1996, a new roof was added and in 1998, all windows were replaced. In 1999, the group received a grant from the Amarillo Area Foundation. A 2004 grant enabled a redo of all plumbing. In 2012, air conditioning was added Parmer County Historical Museum receives funds from the county for utilities and maintenance. They also receive funding from Friona United Fund Drive.


"We are proud of the museum and we have quite a few visitors," he said. "School children visit regularly. There are permanent displays like the one from the old Friona theater. Then there are temporary displays shown during bock and Brandon and Kim Petree of Acuff. school reunions and Maize Days."

The book of Nehemiah depicts the hard work of rebuilding the wall around Jerusalem after the Jews resettled the area following the Babylonian Exile. This backbreaking task was necessary for the inhabitants there, as they were repairing their January 31, 2016, in Amamain source of protection from invading enemies. The brain of an ant

CalTech's Dr. Ysabel Giraldo wondered "What goes on in ant brains?" and wound up conducting a study that showed worker ants don't age; they just die, reports the Association of Mature American Citizens. In fact, they get better and better at the tasks they perform right up to the last moments of their lives [about 140 days in the laboratory].

Unlike the human brain, it seems ant brains don't age. Barbara Moran of Boston University posted an article about Giraldo's research on the futurity.org Web site, concluding that: "the research is unlikely to produce an antbased anti-aging serum, at least not anytime soon. Rather, the work answers some small questions that may in time answer some bigger questions."

Maybe we can eventually learn "how can we be more like ants, at least in their ability to dodge senescence?"

A new study at Penn State University shows that the elderly are willing to accept robotic helpmates, but they want to be in control, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens.

Seniors do not mind having robots as companions, but they worry about the potential loss of control over social order to robots," reports Professor S. Shyam Sundar. There is no room in their world for so-called autonomous robots. "When interfaces are designed to be almost human-like in their autonomy, seniors may react to them with fear, skepticism and other negative emotions."
