



Sunday Shined Boots

There it was in the bottom of my closet, memories flooded in as I opened up the old box. It was my grandfather's shoe shine kit complete with a place to put your boot right on the top. I have had this old shoe shine kit for much of my adult life, and I have learned a few lessons some from the box but more by the man who owned the box.

Lawrence "Barney" Castleberry stepped through the corridor of death in 1998. He liked Red Man chewing tobacco, ice cream at 10 p.m. and Johnny Carson, and on most Saturday nights you could find him buffing up his boots for Sunday. He did not shine his boots to impress anyone, it was a very small thing he did to give his best on Sunday. He was not a rich man, but measured wealth in his faith, his family, his work ethic and his love of my grandmother. I have written before about lessons I have learned from him. He challenged me to think, to study, to learn, and as I looked through that old box I saw several polishes some of them his some of them mine, I am reminded of a few things I want to share.

#1 What you don't use will dry up and fade away. Like some of those old polish cans half used now dried and cracked. If you don't exercise some use in God's Word, it will be the same.

#2 Polish was never intended to stay in the can. It was meant to be put on a boot to make it shine. Jesus was never intended to stay in the pages of the gospels. His best work comes when we let Him live in us.

#3 To get a good shine takes a lot of elbow grease. Don't be afraid to work through a problem. You just might be surprised how good things will turn out if you keep going.

#4 Give your best right down to the shine on your boots. Give your best to God, give your best to your spouse, give your best to your children, simple give your best. Day in and day out.
