today, Carter acknowledged that he did not know whether the Soviet Union would agree to his proposal for a quick halt that would stop even underground testing. But, he said, "They have sent an encouraging message back."

The fledgling President, meeting in his Oval Office with four reporters for The Associated Press and United Press International, also expressed optimism that there will be "fairly rapid ratification" of a new strategic arms limitation treaty with the

And he said his National Security Council is in agreement on the need to reduce overseas sales of Americanmade weapons, but that he does not anticipate "a moratorium" on such

On strategic arms talks, Carter hinted that he might be willing to bypass for later consideration a longstanding East-West debate over how to deal with the U.S. cruise missile new strategic arms pact. He declared: "I would not let those two items stand in the way of some agreement."

Asserting that he "very deeply" meant what he said in his inaugural address about ultimately eliminating all nuclear weapons everywhere, Carter, in his most detailed national security-foreign policy statement to date, envisioned a three-step effort aiming toward that end. -First, he said, the two super-

powers would have to "put firm limits on ourselves," as the objective of a new Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT). -Then the United States and the

Soviet Union would go a step further and actually reduce their own stockpiles of atomic weapons which would, he said, "demonstrate to the world we are sincere."

-From that point he would seek "reductions including all nations, small inventory now."

"I would like to proceed quickly and aggressively with a comprehensive test ban treaty," he said. "I am in favor of eliminating the testing of all nuclear devices, instantly and completely." He said this included underground testing as well.

And, the President said, the United States will use "every means available to us" to keep nuclear arms from spreading to countries that do not have them now.

Carter's apparent optimism about prospects for negotiations with the Soviets was matched by an expression of confidence that a Middle East peace conference is "very likely this

Asked if he would approve Palestinian representation at such a meeting, the President said the matter has not been decided but that Palestinian participation "would probably be as part of one of the Arab

In a relaxed mood, Carter spoke softly, discussing these other topics, ranging from personnel problems to a self-confessed awe at finding himself living in the home of presidential -"I feel quite at ease about the percentage of blacks" named to high

administration posts, he said, but declared, "I wish that we could get more women, in particular, in the top levels of government.

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Vice President Walter F. Mondale told the North Atlantic Alliance today that President Carter is considering increases in the U.S. contribution to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization despite his plans to cut the Pentagon

Mondale, in a speech to the North Atlantic Council, said the new President is determined to reduce waste and inefficiency in U.S. military spending.

"His new budget and these efficiencies will not result in any decrease in planned investments in NATO defense, and these plans involve some growth," Mondale said. He added that Carter told him he is

prepared to consider increasing the U.S. investment in NATO's defense. The speech, a highlight of the first stop on Mondale's 10-day tour of America's leading allies, was made

behind closed doors, but copies were made available later. Mondale told the council: "It is easy to lose sight of the need for adequate defense," particularly in a time of detente. "But this need is inescapable. It demands continuing efforts in

common," he declared. The vice president's day started with a promise to Belgian Premier Leon Tindemans that the European Common Market would have its own separate representative at the summit economic conference of leading industrial non-Communist

nations this spring. Mondale and Tindemans met over breakfast. The vice president told reporters afterward the Belgian gave him "good wishes and many fine development of our policies.' Mondale's pledge that the Common Market would be represented by its own delegation at the summit and not by its biggest members was in response to complaints of Belgium and other smaller members that they were not properly represented at the two previous meetings held in France

Mondale said this first meeting of his 10-day tour marked the start of a very close, cooperative, respectful relationship with the governments of Western Europe."

The vice president's schedule today also included meetings with leaders of the Dutch government, the Common Market and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Mondale on his arrival in Brussels Sunday night said his mission is to make clear to Western Europe and Japan that the Carter administration seeks "the closest possible cooperative relationship with them."

The new vice president said in his arrival statement that the timing of his trip - less than a week after the inauguration - underlined the importance President Carter attaches to early consultations between the United States and its allies.

'We believe that the security of each of our nations and indeed the preservation of our democratic values rest upon a strong Atlantic Alliance.' he said.

"The relationship that must be established is one in which ideas flow both ways across the Atlantic, and all

are involved in leadership." Mondale was sent on his way Sunday by President Carter, who said trip was designed "to demonstrate immediately and dramatically the high level of importance that the Carter administration places on highlevel continuous, cooperative relationships with our traditional allies and friends."

Mondale said some problems of foreign policy are pressing in on the new administration. He mentioned the strategic arms limitation talks -SALT — with the Soviet Union and the multinational trade negotiations, known as the "Tokyo Round," that are going on in Geneva.

Economic problems are among the key topics for the trip, which Mondale considers to some extent a preliminary to the economic summit conference of the major non-Communist industrialized nations in the spring. He said Carter is looking forward to that meeting as a chance to meet world leaders.

"Economics is up front as an issue," he said. "All of our nations are suffering from inflation and unemployment, and if we could work cooperatively on the solution of these problems we'll all be able to do a better job.

Other subjects to be discussed buring the trip, he said, are energy shortages, the dialogue between Communist and Western nations, relations between the underdeveloped and industrial nations and "places where there are diplomatic problems, the Middle East, Cyprus and so on."

After Brussels, Mondale will visit Bonn, West Berlin, Rome, where he will see Pope Paul VI, London, Paris

Work on Carter's emergency natural gas legislation follows his meeting Friday with officials of gas pipelines, energy adviser James Schlesinger, Sen. Adalai Stevenson, D-Ill., and Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., who chair subcommittees responsible for natural gas legislation.

At that meeting, Carter called for all Americans to turn down their thermostats to 65 degrees in the daytime and lower at night.

Legislation which Stevenson sponsored to give the Federal Power Commission the authority to impose mandatory gas allocation on pipelines died in the last Congress. The emergency legislation now being drafted is expected to resemble the earlier Stevenson bill.

But Stevenson aide Les Goldman said there are numerous other "points of negotiation" that have yet to be worked out, including whether the emergency bill should lift price controls from natural gas shipped in interstate pipelines.

"It is really still too premature to say what will be in the bill," Goldman

The natural gas industry has for years been pressing for deregulation, claiming it is needed to provide the extra revenues to finance exporation for new gas fields. The Ford administration unsuccessfully urged Congress to lift price controls on gas, and Carter called for a form of limited gas deregulation during his

campaign. But Stevenson and many other Democrats in both the Senate and the House have opposed past efforts to deregulate natural gas.

Railroad Commission to hear Lo-Vaca offer

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)- The Texas Railroad Commission scheduled an afternoon hearing today to hear a proposed settlement of \$1.6 billion in lawsuits against Coastal States Gas Corp. and its subsidiary, Lo-Vaca Gathering Co.

Austin's utility attorney, Don Butler, said, however, the proposed agreement would not lower natural gas rates "any more than you can put toothpaste back in the tube

Austin utility director R.L. Hancock said the key parts of the plan are separation of Lo-Vaca from Coastal and the formation of a new company and Coastal's financing of a multimillion dollar search for new gas.

In exchange, Austin, San Antonio and other customers would drop their suits for alleged breach of contract. The customers contend that Lo-Vaca failed to deliver low-cost gas as set out in long-term contracts.

Any proposed settlement would have to be approved by the com-mission, city councils and boards of directors of Lo-Vaca's customers, the state attorney general's office, State Dist. Court Judge Charles Mathews and directors of Coastal and Lo-Vaca.

"I don't think the rates will ever be lower than they are now under the circumstances," said Butler. "About the best thing anyone can expect is a better gas supply and a less rapid rate

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have a job that requires a lot of standing for long periods. This has, I believe, contributed to my problem — varicose veins. They're not bad enough yet for surgery, but I'm getting there. Any tips to possibly avoid surgery? — Mrs.

It's true that jobs requiring standing can cause or aggravate varicose veins. This is a matter of pressure on the vein valves, which normally assure that blood flows in only one heart. It's estimated that pressure in the leg veins increases five fold when standing as opposed to lying down.

Am I lacking a certain vitamin or something? I'm really concerned about this. I am a female, age 26, and am not pregnant. I am in perfect health. - Mrs. A.T.

I would challenge your "perfect health" statement. Fume-whiffing is a habit you should break immediately. Fumes of hydrocarbons, as from the gasoline, can damage your liver and blood cells. Ice-eating is a form of pica, a craving for unusual items or certain items in excess. Anemia is a common cause of that, perhaps one stemming from a diet deficiency. There can be a relationship between the fumewhiffing, anemia and pica.

Suggest you at least have a blood count and a review of your eating habits. The only fumes worth sniffing are those from water or home cooking.

This arbitrary FDA action caused the booze barons to start jumping like corks popping out of champagne bottles. Several wine and spirits groups joined in filing a lawsuit. They shopped around for a sympathetic court and chose the federal district court in Owensboro, Ky.

LAST AUGUST, Judge James Gordon ruled that the ATF, not the FDA, had exclusive jurisdiction over the labeling of alcoholic beverages. This is precisely how the alcohol industry wanted the judge to rule, since the ATF was willing to let the whiskey makers keep their ingredients hidden But the FDA's chief counsel,

Richard Merrill, fired off a confidential memo to the Justice Dept., requesting that Judge Gordon's decision be appealed. The memo charged that the decision "negates Congress' determination that consumers are entitled to know the composition of the products they consume. The memo also warned that, if the

decision isn't challenged, the FDA will be powerless "to bring misbranding charges" against miscreant liquor companies.

Yet antitrust chief Baker, after meeting with the alcohol representatives, recommended letting Judge Gordon's ruling stand. It's now up to the Solicitor General, who has the final say

WORD OF the backstage manioulations reached Rep. Ben Rosenthal, D.-N.Y., chairman of the House Consumer Subcommittee, who protested privately to the Justice Dept. He wrote bluntly that "the consumer community believes the ATF has shirked its consumer protection responsibilities" and that 'allowing Judge Gordon's ruling to stand will undermine greatly the consumers' faith in . . . government"

Footnote: A Justice Dept. spokesman said Baker would not comment because his recommendation was before the Solicitor. At press time, the Solicitor's office had made no final decision. An attorney for the liquor companies said the cost of listing ingredients would be prohibitive. The present regulations, he insisted, are adequate to safeguard the drinking public.



Big Spring's Nellie Gray, who went away many years ago after graduating from high school and working at the former Bombardier School here, is now head of the national "March for Life" which held a demonstration in Washington Saturday to support a constitutional amendment to ban abortions.

Olfficials of the "March for Life" estimated the number of protestors Saturday at 100,000. Capitol police estimated the crowd at 35,000.

Saturday was the fourth anniversary of the Supreme Court decision that eased legal restrictions on abortion

The marchers bundled themselves against temperatures and winds in the 20s and waved signs such as "Give Life a Chance" and "Life Not Death" and "Life Ain't Peanuts, Jimmy." Nellie J. Gray, raised in Big Spring,

is national president of the group, said she met Saturday with Jack Watson, an aide to President Carter and urged that no federal funds by spent for abortions and that Carter "establish a pro-life leadership.

Ms. Gray graduated from high school here in 1943 and went on to work at the bombardier school before going "back east to college."

She became an attorney and remained in the Washington D.C. area most of her life and now owns a home there. Two years ago, when she returned to Texas for her mother's funeral, she visited old friends in the Big Spring area.

Among those friends were Mrs. Helen Green, whom Nellie had known at the Catholic Church; Mrs. Lillian Jordan, who was her high school home economics teacher and Ms. Jeanette Barnett, who had worked with her sister, Mrs. Marie Ledbetter, at the gas company here.



WASHINGTON (AP) -The Pentagon will pay more to retired military personnel this year than the Army pays to all active duty soldiers.

This growing pension expense is more than the Air Force has budgeted this year to buy planes and missiles. And it is more than this year's Navy budget for shipbuilding.

Since 1962, the total defense budget has almost doubled, rising from \$51.1 billion to this year's \$100.1 billion. But the cost of military pensions has grown nearly tenfold to \$8.2 billion. In 1962, military pensions amounted to 1% per cent of

the Defense Department budget. For 1977, the pensions amount to 8.2 per cent of the defense budget. In the next fiscal year, the cost will probably reach \$9 billion, and it will be pushing

DOD recommends standby draft, lottery revival

The Defense Department is months after mobilization. recommending that President Carter create new standby draft machinery, including revival of an annual lottery for young men, to determine the callup order in case of a national emergency mobilization.

The recommendation was sent to the White House in the final days of the Ford administration for consideration by Carter's National Security Council.

A year ago, then-President Gerald R. Ford reduced the Selective Service System to a small Washington planning staff and ended registration of 18-year-olds. He also halted the annual lottery, which determined the callup order based on birth dates.

The lottery had been continued for contingency purposes after the end of the draft in 1973.

for close to 30 years on the Spade Ranch. He came to Colorado City in 1925 and went to work at the ranch. "I helped haul the rock for that rock bunkhouse on the

ranch," McClellan recalls. "We brought that rock from Ilanthia. There was lots of rock out there on a hill. It's right on the divide where the rain waters divide and go in two different directions. Part of them go to the Concho and San Angelo and the others go to Beal's Creek and the Colorado River and Big Spring," he recalled. He also said that Gerome and Louis Pond laid the stones in that house. Fred used to help drive the cattle across the big Spade Ranch to the loading pens.
"I never did take part in a

real cattle drive. That was cattle drive enough for me," he recalled. "At one time, the Spade had over 200 sections. They also had land over near Hyman and over in Sterling County. We'd drive those cows down the Robert Lee road to the pens," he

Mrs. McClellan's father ran the Price Tractor Company and had an even earlier hardware store. She recently came across a picture of her father, clerking in a Colorado City

store in 1908. It showed the tall shelves of stacked cans behind the counters, not easily accessible to the customers. There were glass cases with other items displayed and bins full of seed for various vegetables and flowers out front. In the

back of the store was a big old pot bellied stove. Colorado City was the earliest center for civilization between Fort Worth and El Paso in 1880. It much earlier settled than Big Spring, and cer-tainly earlier than Midland





"I don't read sports sections in the off-season. I am a businessman. I am so totally out of football now I couldn't tell you who is where or when. I'll leave that to people in the taverns.
"I don't need to answer

the Pro Bowl. His explanation was that there was a chance for a guy

when he was seen briskly walking the fairways of the Tucson National Golf Club as a TV commentator the day before the Pro Bowl and swapping quips with Bob Hope on a postbowl television special.

Tarkenton's contemporaries weren't particularly happy, insisting that he owed it to the game to show up at the Pro Bowl, a sort of consolation which raises money for the players' pension fund.

Tarkenton can shrug off the Super Bowl disaster and his detractors as of no earthshaking consequence. But there are deeper implications to the postseason

Statistically, Tarkenton is pro football's No. 1 quar-terback — King of the Hill, most pass attempts, most completions, most vardage. most everything. Yet he was more of a technician than an inspirational leader in the title shootout - tentative, at times frantic as the Oakland Raiders crushed the Vikings







Florida freeze damage \$120 million

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) pastures Agriculture experts meeting here Monday will officially estimate the damage from Florida's worst freeze in 15 years. The figure is expected to be well over \$120 million.

The experts, meeting as Board, will forward their report to Gov. Reubin Askew and recommend whether he should ask U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Robert Bergland for a disaster declaration and federal aid.

'We'll probably be putting a dollar loss on the sum total of the whole thing," board chairman Frank Pope said Sunday. "In all likelihood, we will ask the governor to ask the secretary to declare an agriculture disaster in

Askew, considering the more than 100,000 farm workers who may be without jobs, declared a general state of disaster Saturday. Aides said he was still pondering whether to ask President Jimmy Carter for similar federal declaration, separate to any made by Bergland.

Besides Pope, state director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Stabilization and Conservation Service, the board is made up of the heads of seven other USDA agencies

The tomato loss alone will probably hit \$43 million, Pope said. He said the total could top \$150 million with the addition of reports on crops ranging from beans, squash and other vegetables to sugar cane around Lake the Florida Emergency Okeechobee, valuable seed corn grown south of Miami and tobacco seedlings in North-Central Florida.

"I don't know how they'll estimate the cost of damage to young wood on the citrus trees," Pope added. "That will affect production next year and possibly for two or three years afterward.'

Florida's last comparable freeze, in 1962, cut production severely. The annual citrus production had been about 125 million boxes of citrus, 85 or 90 pounds to the box. Production in 1962-63 fell to 107 million boxes, then skidded to 89 million the next year.

The value of this year's citrus crop was estimated \$490 million, but picking had begun before Christmas. Pope said he's been told 40 per cent of the crop had been picked, but Florida Citrus Mutual, a growers' Mutual, a growers' organization, put the figure somewhat lower

Citrus Mutual and the Florida Citrus Commission have not made any dollar estimate on the citrus loss.

River strollers stop barge traffic on Ohio

CINCINNATI (AP) - As Capt. W.A. Boudreaux bulled his way up the Ohio River, trying to get 12 barges of oil products to Pittsburgh, he was concentrating on the ice blocking his way. He wasn't expecting problems with pedestrians

But when his towboat, the City of Pittsburgh, got to the stretch between Cincinnati and Covington, Ky., several hundred people were out for a Sunday stroll on the frozen river - and they were reluctant to see their promenade broken up.

Boudreaux said strollers ignored his whistle, and when he took to his loudspeaker to warn them off the ice, they "cussed us out. So he came to a stop, 50 feet away

What came up to my mind was they are more stupid than I am," he said. showed by Button Senter His towboat was pushing 12 barges in a convoy 105 feet across and 1,100 long, and was cracking the ice from shore to shore, he said. The barges were the first to go upriver past Cincinnati since Monday. Boudreaux said he was delivering fuel




