Reports linking U.S. Sen. Barry Goldwater, his brother Robert and a close friend to mob figures in Arizona sparked new controversy today. Both Goldwaters have attacked the

"It's notonly ridiculous, it's completely untrue," the senator said today on ABC television's "Good

Morning, America."
Sen. Goldwater said Monday that what he had seen of the stories was "totally false," libelous and was "rather shabby, rather dishonest reporting." His brother called the report "poppycock" and added: "None of my friends will pay any attention to it." attention to it."

A spokesman for the Inventive

produced the series of stories in question, said the group would stand

A 36-member team of journalists from 23 newspapers and broadcast outlets went to Arizona six months ago to investigate organized crime. The group said the aim of the effort was to continue the investigative work of

reporter Don Bolles of the Arizona Republic who was murdered last June. One man has pleaded guilty to second-degree murder in the case; two are awaiting trial.

Sen. Goldwater, a Republican, said Monday that he believed the reporters had gone to Arizona "hoping to solve the Bolles murder." When they found they could not solve the murder, he said, "they set out to do a job on Arizona." He conceded that organized crime does exist in Arizona, "par-ticularly in the field of land sales."

The copyright series of reports by the IRE was released to participating newspapers and broadcasters for use starting Sunday and there were wide variations in the way the stories were

Some papers started the series as scheduled and said they would continue daily articles for the 23-day span of the project. Others said they would delay the series. Some papers, citing the length of the installments — which run several thousand words each cut large sections of the reports. The Arizona Republic and Phoenix

Gazette was one of the participants but decided not to run the entire series. Some 20 placard-carrying demonstrators from a group calling itself Citizens for Freedom marched in front of the newspaper this morning. "Has Barry G. Stifled the R & G?" read one placard. "Whose Truth Does the R & G print?" asked another.

The protesters also handed out leaflets, which said, in part, "The Republic and Gazette ... are covering up the investigative report into Arizona political corruption and criminal wrongdoing."

The report sparked controversy in the Arizona Legislature on Monday. State Sen. Sue Dye of Tucson criticized the Arizona Republic and Phoenix Gazette, while state Sen. Leo Corbet of Phoenix said he supported

the newspapers stance. In the first two days, published accounts of the series said there was widespread organized crime in Arizona, often condoned by political leaders who profited from

Over 400 doctors got \$100,000 in Medicare

Department of Health, Education and Welfare says more than 2,800 of the nation's doctors, medical groups and laboratories received over \$100,000 each in Medicare payments in 1975.

The release of the list Monday, in a reversal of department policy, showed more than 400 individual doctors with Medicare receipts of over \$100,000 for the year.

The list said a small clinic in Minnesota received more than \$22 million, but officials at the facility said the amount was wrong. The government promised to check its

The list showed the Zumbrota Health Facility in Zumbrota, Min., as doing the most Medicare business, but a spokesman at the Mayo Clinic, which runs the facility, said its total 1975 revenues were less than \$1

He suggested the government may have listed all the funds the Mayo Clinic received under the heading for the Zumbrota clinic. The spokesman said the Mayo Clinic operates several local health facilities in Minnesota. The government's list contained no

separate mention of the Mayo Clinic. The reported Medicare income for the Minnesota facility was approximately \$19 million more than the next highest figure. The Scott and White Clinic in Temple, Tex. received 1975 payments of over \$3.3 million, the

government reported. In releasing the list, HEW officials said they were not altering safeguards against disclosure of information on Social Security records about either wage earners or the beneficiaries of Social Security programs.

Medicare is a federal health insurance program for the elderly. More than a year ago, the department turned down a request from The Associated Press for release of its 1974

Medicare payments list. The department said it changed its mind this year because of a Freedom of Information law calling for more public disclosure of government

County okays tax p

County Tax Assessor-Collector Zirah Bednar won approval from the Howard County Commissioner's Court Monday to approach the Big Spring Independent School District and the City of Big Spring about tying tax collections for all three agencies together under the county's tax collection department.

Bednar said she believed that the present triplicate tax collection efforts were an uunnecessary expense to the taxpayer and to the other agencies, and that her present staff and computer could handle the collection for all smoothly and with a minimum of expense.

"I am already responsible for collection \$3.5 million for the county," said Bednar, "and the addition of city and school taxes would lift that total to about \$8 million. But I feel we could save several thousand dollars by

avoiding such wasted duplication as three Board of Equalization notices, three tax rolls, and three different returns."

The court passed a motion empowering Mrs. Bednar to offer the service at up to one per cent expense for each other agency. Commissioners Jack Buchanan and Bill Crooker told Mrs. Bednar they would accompany her to visit the city council and the board of trustees. Mrs. Bednar is scheduled to appear at the next council meeting and at the April

14 board meeting. Mrs. Bednar said that she knew of no legal obstacles to the plan, although its approval would make Howard County the first and only county in the state to approve such collections.

Both Assistant Superintendant of Business Don Crockett and Big Spring Finance Director Tom Ferguson said

that they intended to look at the plan closely. But, they continued, if there were no legal barriers and if the plan would produce the savings Mrs. Bednar anticipates, they both expected approval.

"I would want to see the complete plan first," said Crockett, "and I would want to investigate the consequences of several bills now pending in the state legislature, for example the governor's bill on school district funding and certification. But know of no other objections than

"Right now," said Ferguson, "I don't want to say the city will go along, or that it won't. We certainly intend to look the plan over protection of it will depend on what service is offered. But if the city is offered a savings plan like this, we certainly won't turn away.

White nomination okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Texan John White won unanimous approval for the post of deputy secretary of agriculture from the Senate Agriculture Committee today.

The unanimous vote apparently indicated easy confirmation for White by the full Senate. No one asked for an opportunity to speak against him before the committee.

The confirmation hearing was amiable and friendly, starting with personal endorsements delivered for White by Sens. Lloyd Bentsen and John Tower. Four Texas House members also showed up to endorse White, who has served for the past 26 years as Texas commissioner of agriculture.

The questioning was never rugged, and the closest it got to an examination of White's personal affairs was a question from Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan. "Do you own property that might lead to a conflict

of interest?" Dole asked. 'Just some cattle, and I've told them I'd be glad to divest myself of those. I've stood about as much as I can stand of that," White said. His jocular reference to the financial problems of beef producers drew laughter from the committee.

Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., was typical when his turn to question White came up.

Saccharin vanishing

NEW YORK (AP) - Artificial sweeteners and low-calorie soft drinks are vanishing from grocery store shelves as diet-conscious shoppers stock up in the face of a government warning that saccharin may cause cancer. "No one's asking questions. They are just buying," said Jerome Webb, the manager of a grocery store in Cambridge, Mass. He reported sales of diet sodas were about one-third higher than normal.

ALICE, Tex. (AP) — Texas' oil and gas resources will vanish in "about 10 years," says an Alice-based oilman who specializes in reviving long-abandoned



Mechanical heart hopes beat faster

effort, a partial mechanical heart is nearing reality, and researchers are optimistic about the complete one. First of three articles.

WASHINGTON (AP) - On the heart beats of a small herd of calves scattered in research institutions across the country rest the hopes of a \$100 million program to build a device that can take over when the human heart fails

In the calves, at Boston Children's Hospital Center and elsewhere, the heart beats already are produced by an artificial heart. It's still a long distance from calf

to human, but it's narrowing. Some medical scientists long have held that the best way to replace a hopelessly damaged heart would be through a mechanical device rather than heart transplant. But so far, artificial hearts have worked only in calves, up to four months, while some transplants have done much better in human

Still, after years of toil, with more than \$100 million spent over the past decade and \$13 million more to be spent this year, scientists are guardedly optimistic. Some believe a completely artificial heart is less than a generation away.

"I won't name any date, but I think it will be in our lifetime," says Dr. Michael G. DeBakey of Baylor University



The heart is divided into two main pumping chambers called ventricles. The right ventricle pumps blood into the lungs to pick up oxygen. The left pumps the oxygenated blood through the arteries to the body.

The left chamber does four-fifths of the heart's work and is damaged most often in heart attacks

Frommer says an LVAD could temporarily take the pumping load off a damaged left ventricle to allow it to heal. If the chamber is hopelessly impaired, a longterm LVAD might give permanent assistance or take over the ventricle's task

Experimental LVAD's have been used successfully in animals for up to eight weeks, but human tests failed. All of nearly a dozen patients died within a few days after receiving the devices. Frommer said all were patients near death who wouldn't have survived in any case.

Dr. C. Grant LaFarge, senior associate in carat Children's diology Hospital Medical Center in Boston where some of the human LVAD surgery was performed, says future operations should bring better results.

"In Phase One, we got the most difficult patients who were almost dead," he says. 'We are moving into a phase where we'll get patients in better shape. Hopefully, we'll get the survivors we

LVAD's are, in effect, custom-made laboratories. One commonly used is built by Thermo Electron Corp., of Waltham, chamber, J-shaped pump weighing one pound. It is externally powered by forcing air through a tube in

What's fair about subsidized rate?

The energy crisis which left much of America cold for the winter of 1977 is past, so I suppose it is time to forget about the problem until next year. But I am moved to discuss it again after seeing a speech by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas in the Congressional Record and reading some of his comments.

Perhaps the editors, like most of the voters, apparently thought that Ike deserved a plum for winning World War II. That plum was the

Communists weren't left out either. "Reds try to put the snatch on some great minds of the past" was a

headline which brought to mind communist troops kidnapping retired scientists. Instead, the headline was for a story about several celebrations in Russia in which the Russians claim the achievements of Leonardo da Vinci and a few other brilliant men, all dead.

The Korean War was going on, but you had to look closely to find anything about it. About the biggest stories related to the war were about the cutback in production of guns, jet engines and other necessary warmaking items because of a steel workers strike and the takeover of a U.S. prisoner of war camp by the North Korean and Chinese prisoners. Oh yes, they held the camp commander hostage.

EVEN THEN. THE magazine predicted in editorials that the U.S. would run out of oil, along with other essential resources

It also predicted that by 1975, the domestic production of raw materials would fall short of the demand for those products by 20 per cent. Considering that we actually were importing foreign oil, along with other things, that figure may have been pretty close to correct.

Probe urged

WASHINGTON - Sen. George McGovern, D.-S.D., has dispatched a secret letter to the Senate Intelligence

Committee urging an investigation of 'unresolved questions' about CIA dirty tricks in support of the nowfallen Greek dictatorship.

SUCH A PROBE could spark more fireworks in the already volatile U.S.-Greek-Turkish situation. It could also prompt official interrogation of such former Washington stalwarts as President Richard Nixon, Vice President Spiro Agnew, Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, Atty. Gen. John Mitchell, and CIA director William Colby. Millionaire oil man Thomas Pappas, a former Nixon fund-raiser, might also be queried.

McGovern, chairman of the Near Eastern Affairs subcommittee when he sent the October 29 letter to Intelligence Committee chairman scenario of intrigue at the highest

Inouye had pigeonholed the letter until he learned we had obtained a bootlegged bopy. Within hours after our call, he agreed to meet with McGovern.

In his missive, McGovern asserted that the CIA's involvement with the Greek dictators between 1967 and 1974 and in the Cyprus coup of 1974 "merits . a careful investigation by your committee.'

McGovern quoted Kissinger, Colby and former CIA special counsel Mitchell Rogovin as saying that "our covert involvement in Greece was substantial enough to endanger our present relations with the restored democratic government of Greece."

MOREOVER, wrote McGovern, Spiro Agnew offered to restify in 1975 before the Church committee on charges that he changed his position from one of "neutrality" toward the Greek military dictatorship in 1968 to support the junta.

But the reason for the switch "has never been investigated" by U.S. officials, said McGovern For a while. wrote the senator, the Greek government had planned to study the junta's ties with the CIA but had dropped the idea "at the request of the CIA station chief in Athens.

An investigation is also needed, claimed McGovern, to determine the truth concerning charges that CIA funds were sent to Greece and then "funneled . . . back to the U.S. for use in the 1968 presidential campaign.'

In addition, "the extensive and longstanding ties of (Thomas) Pappas to the Greek junta . . . and the intelligence community. . indicates a need for a thorough investigation of his activities

The wealthy Greek-American businessman, McGovern pointed out, 'was the first person named by President Nixon in the White House tapes as the man to be approached for money to satisfy the demands of

Watergate burgiar E. Howard Hunt." Although there is no evidence Pappas provided the hush money, he was a prominent Nixon contributor and also served on President Ford's Finance Committee

McGovern also charged that Greek journalist Demetracopoulos, one of the dictators' most effective enemies, was harassed by the Justice Dept., the FBI

DEMETRACOPOULOS, WROTE the senator, was threatened with deportation by John Mitchell; his Wall Street employers were visited by FBI agents; "slanderous raw material and disinformation from CIA operatives . . . was given to reporters and free-lance writers like Russell Howe and Sarah Trott' for their book 'The Power Peddlers'; and a plot by Greece to kidnap him and take him back to Athens was hatched with possible CIA collusion



COLLEGE STATION Michael G. Hillers of the Big Spring Police Department is in training at Texas A&M University that will enhance Big Spring's traffic accident investigation.

Instruction and field work in a three-week school will thoroughly ground him in techniques and procedures of digging out causes and facts behind traffic ac-

Thirty police officers in the in depth accident investigation school are expected to train additional nvestigators back at their departments. Training ends

The school is hosted by the Law Enforcement and Security Training Divison of the Texas Engineering Extension Service. EES is part of the Texas A&M University System.

Charles R. Kenner, division training specialist, coordinates instruction. It also involves specialists with the Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Transportation Institute and accident investigation divisions of the Houston and Dallas police departments.

Classroom work will cover civil and criminal law medical injuries and examinations. and photography, math and other specialties that support investigation. A third of the instruction is planned in field problems. In the latter, trainees will make speed estimates from skid marks and scaled sketches of accident scenes. Use of roadway marks, measurements sketches, photographs and other data will be related to

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — Hungarians are second only to Americans in the smoking of cigarettes, according to statistics published here. The annual per capita consumption in this country of 10.5 million is 3.750 cigarettes.

The statistics, compiled by Dr. Laszlo Vertes and Dr. Nandor Kun, put Canada in third place, followed by Switzerland, Britain, Poland, Japan and Bulgaria. The United States and Bulgaria were listed as the leading producers of tobacco, with an average of 4.1 million tons of tabacco leaves being harvested

annually worldwide. Hungary has a "Society of Opponents to Smoking, with a membership of some 4,000 which seeks to promote a ban on smoking in offices and certain catering establishments.



If 1977 is an average year, Texas can expect 113 torfirst ones are likely to come this spring.

While nothing can stop these tornadoes, experts have learned several lifesaving facts from past tornadoes, including the nation's worst flock of storms in April, 1974.

In fact, findings from the rubble in the 13 states ravaged by 148 tornadoes on April 3-4 changed the thinking of experts on several points.

For instance, the southwest corner of a building is probably the wrong place to during a tornado. Engineers who sifted the wreckage in Xenia, Ohio, and other cities learned that tornadoes moving from southwest to northeast blow south and west walls into buildings and north walls away from the building.

This deflates the long-time belief that a tornado's greatest threat is an explosion of walls outward. created by sudden differences in air pressure. It's still a threat, but driving winds are equally or more devastating, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration

Where should a person seek shelter? It depends on where you are, the experts

Belive it or not, you will be safer lying face down in a ditch than you will be in a car or truck, a mobile home, under a large-span roof, or in a room or hallway with lots of windows.

Vehicles can be literally smashed against trees, poles and buildings. If there's time, drive away from the

the storm's path. If there's basement, according to nadoes this year. And the not time, leave the vehicle and lie in a ditch. Mobile homes "offer not

opportunity for occupant protection," according to engineers. Residents should leave their mobile homes and go to a substantial structure. If there is no shelter nearby, they also should lie flat in a ditch, preferably outside the mobile home park.

Buildings with large roofs supported by the walls such as gymnasiums or auditoriums - are often lethal during tornadoes. Load-bearing walls can be blown in, especially with the lefting effect a tornado creates on a large roof. The roof generally crashes down to the floor. If the building has no shelter, get outside in a ditch.

Rooms with windows and doors are subject to the shattering action of a tornado. Glass, dirt and debris of all kinds, "act like shrapnel," according to researchers. And corridors in line with a tornado's path can turn into wind tunnels for the shrapnel.

In buildings with a lot of glass, the most protected spot is in the basement, although not necessarily the southwest corner because of the findings cited earlier. Next best shelter would be in interior corridors perpendicular to the path of the

If you're in a public building or large office building, there should be signs pointing out shelter areas. Interior corridors or small interior rooms on the lowest floor possible are
