# India to end Soviet link?

Morarji Desai, 81-year-old leader of the successful fight to unseat the government of Indira Gandhi, was sworn in today as India's fourth prime minister and immediately signaled a possible end to this country's special links with the Soviet Union.

At a news conference after taking the oath of office, Desai said the 1971 Indian-Soviet friendship treaty "must not come in the way of our friendship with any other state .... We won't have any special relations with any

Desai, a veteran of the Indian independence movement and a former leader of Mrs. Gandhi's Congress party, said his government would adopt a foreign policy of "proper

His 59-year-old predecessor, Indira Gandhi, was not present for the the three-minute ceremony in the ornate Ashoka Hall of the presidential palace. But she was one of the first to send congratulations to the longtime foe who led his new Janata party to a stunning election triumph over her and the Congress party last weekend.

Having lost her seat in Parliament in the election, Mrs. Gandhi became a private citizen. However, her successor as the Congress leader in Parliament, Y.B. Chavan, said she would continue to take a leading part

#### Tower asks why NATO not in EIS

WASHINGTON - Sen. John Tower, R-Tex. has questioned the fact that the Air Force's Final Environmental Impact Statement contained no reference to the possible training of North Atlantic Treaty Organization pilots in the United States.

Tower wrote a letter to the Secretary of the Air Force and the chairman of the President's Council on Environmental Quality.

Even if the NATO pilots are not trained at Webb, the additional pilots would increase the pilot load of the Air Training Command, changing Webb's possible role.

Tower also met with Secretary of the Air Force designate John C. Stetson Wednesday afternoon. Stetson will appear before the Senate Armed Services Committee sometime next week for his confirmation hearing. Tower is the senior Republican

member of the committee. "Although "Mr. Stetson has obviously not yet had the opportunity to study the situation in the Air Training Command, I nonetheless wanted to stress to him the issues that in my view are not being adequately considered by the Air Force concerning



In a stinging defeat for organized labor and the Democratic leadership, the common situs picketing bill went down to a surprise defeat Wednesday night on a 217 to 205 vote.

Although it directly af-fected only the building trades, the vote was the first test of organized labor's strength in the new and Democratic heavily Congress.

## Why Rosselli hit?



approached his Miami hideaway, therefore, with some apprehension. He appeared at the screen door to accept their subpoena. "Shove it under the door," he said softly. They

peered through the screen. The sinister Trafficante was pale, and his hands were shaking. HE MAY HAVE had reason to quake. The House Assassinations Committee had taken a sudden in-

terest in the murder last July of mobster John Rosselli. Before he died, the flamboyant Rosselli hinted that he knew who had arranged President John F. Kennedy's assassination. Carefully hedging, he told an incredible story that implicated Trafficante.

The New York Times reported on the front page that Roselli was murdered as a "direct result" of his Senate testimony about the Kennedy assassination.

Twelve days before his death, Rosselli dined with Trafficante at the fashionable Landings Restaurant in Ft. Launderdale, Fla. It is the custom of the Mafia to wine and dine a wayward member before he is

According to the New York Times, Rosselli was lured aboard a private boat by his executioners on July 28. It is also the Mafia practice to assign the murder contract to friends whom the victim trusts.

The Times reported that Rosselli settled down to a glass of vodka with two gangland associates. One unobtrusively slipped behind him and held a powerful hand over Rosselli's nose and mouth. The 70-year-old Rosselli, who had emphysema, was easily strangled. Then the murders sawed off his legs so the body would fit

in a metal drum They cut holes in the drum so it would fill with water. As an added precaution, they weighted the drum down with heavy iron chains. Rosselli should have disappeared forever, in efficient Mafia fashion, on the bottom

of Biscavne Bay But apparently the gases from his body caused the container to rise eerily from its salt-water grave. The drum, with its grisly contents, washed upon the shore, where it was found by fishermen.

Obviously, the unfortunate Rosselli

had been the victim of a gangland execution. This raised some nagging questions in the minds of the committee's homicide experts, who are wise in the ways of the mob.

Why would the Mafia knock off a retired racketeer? The fact that he had appeared before the Senate normally would have deterred the crime lords. They would rather not risk antagonizing the federal government by murdering a celebrated witness unless there were some compelling reason.

The experts doubted the Mafia was upset over Roselli's confession that, as a hit man for the Central Intelligence Agency, he had attempted to assassinate Cuban Premier Fidel Castro. The mobsters hated Castro, who had expropriated their casinos in Havana. So they should not have minded his CIA

We furnished the committee with a more likely motive for the murder. We got the story from Rosselli himself, bit by bit, over the past six years. He had come to trust us during our investigation of the CIA plot to kill Castro. Whenever Rosselli was in Washington, he dropped by. His associates, knowing of his trust to us, called us ahead of the authorities about his disappearance.

The CIA had figured that the Havana underworld must have killers who could eliminate Castro. The CIA, therefore, spoke secretly to billionaire Howard Hughes' chief honcho in Las Vegas, Robert Maheu, about the project. Maheu recruited Rosselli, then the Chicago mob's debonair representative in Las Vegas.

ROSSELLI LOOKED UPON the assassination mission as an opportunity to gain favor with the U.S. government. But he lacked the stature to deal with Santos Trafficante, who controlled the Havana underworld. Rosselli enlisted his own superior. Chicago godfather Sam Giancana, to approach Trafficante.

Giancana flew down to Miami to make the arrangments with the Florida racket boss. Then, with Trafficante's blessing, Rosselli used the Havana underworld to plot Castro's demise. The assassination squad tried to plant poison pills, supplied by the CIA, in Castro's food. Castro became ill but failed to die.

#### Eskimos don't exist on blubber

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: If you doctors think you are so smart, answer this: how come so much is written about cholesterol being so bad, yet Eskimos

live on blubber? - W.M. Some of us doctors are smart, some

iust wish we were. I went to Dr. F.J. Stare, professor of nutrition at Harvard's School of Public Health, for an answer to this one. He would take issue with your statement that Eskimos "live on blubber." In fact, he says, they live largely on the whale and seal meat, which is relatively low in fat, unlike the deeply marbled steaks we relish. Then, too, the fat in whale and seal meat is less saturated, thus less

harmful. The fat intake of Eskimos is about 35 per cent of their diet, that in the average American's diet 40 per cent or more. Studies have shown that the blood cholesterol level of the Eskimo is about the same as that of an

average American. You must take into account that the modern Eskimo gets staple foods (bread, cereals, canned fruits and vegetables) from trading posts, and he eats berries in season that are rich in Vitamin C. He also is a great fisherman and can also hunt birds for sustenance.

In fact, most of the Eskimo's blubber is used to make soap and lighting oil, also dog food. Some is simply discarded

If you are food and nutrition conscious you would enjoy and benefit from Dr. Stare's book, titled. "Panic in the Pantry." It is very readable and informative.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I have sciatica, and the pain is severe around my knee. Hot packs and linaments don't seem to help relieve the pain. I'm hoping you can help me understand this situation and, if possible, tell me how I can get some relief. - Mrs. R.E.

Heat isn't going to help if you have sciatica. The word "sciatica" comes from the nerve involved — the sciatic nerve pain usually originates at a point along the nerve far from the actual place where you feel it, often far up where the nerve emerges from the spinal column. Nerve-related pains are funny that way.

The goal of treat the cause, which is pressure against the nerve. The pressure can be from arthritic changes in the spine or in the

lower back near the spine. This is why sciatica pain is often elusive, appearing mysteriously when a person is in one position, disappearing when in another. X rays often give clues as to where the actual nerve damage is. You need to be examined to determine this. Pressure can be prevented or minimized with back supports or girdles. You may just as well save a lot of money you're spend-

ing on linaments and salves. Has sciatica been diagnosed? My experience is that some folks use the term to describe any leg symptom, just as many use the term 'rheumatism'' to describe any ache or pain. > DEAR R.E.: Whenever our ideas about God conflict with those of Scriptures we need to hurriedly revise our thinking. Many people have allowed their imaginations to form a picture of the god they worship. It is a picture that suits their own minds and one that they are therefore happy to accept. It usually includes the notion that God is all-loving and that He will one day forgive us our sins so that we

may all go to heaven. The Bible is the only basis for our understanding of God. It is only as we accept the teaching of the whole Bible that we will form a correct picture of His Person.

The passage in Numbers to which you refer provides us with a very important aspect of the character of God. To understand the passage you need to refer back to chapter 25. In the first three verses we are told how the

women of Midian and Moab lured the men of Israel into committing adultery and then into worshiping idols. These are two very serious examples of disobedience to God's commands. God pronounced judgment on the sin by sending a plague on the Israelites, as a result of which many people died (verse 9).

Next God turned His judgment upon the Midianite women who died for their sin, and the account of this is in the passage to which you refer in chapter 31. The only conclusion to be drawn from this is that God is going to sit in judgment upon the sins of this world, and He will carry out fully the law that stipulates: "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23). Our only hope as sinners lies in the second half of that verse in Romans, "But the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." The Bible calls on men everywhere to repent of their sin and to receive the salvation provided by Jesus Christ. This is an urgent message for today and one that cannot be evaded by stating that we did not think God was like that

#### Wanda Fergason 1938-1977

My first meeting with Wanda Fergason was back in 1968. That was her first year as volleyball coach at then Howard County Junior College. She also instructed a couple of sections of tennis.

For that reason, I'll never forget her, even though we never spoke after tennis class was over. She introduced me to the game, and taught me the correct skills to eventually learn to love the sport as I do today.

A tennis course at almost any college at the time was just an easy way to get rid of P.E. requirements and card a sure "A." Not so in Wanda's class. She took her job seriously, gave individual instruction to her students and only handed out the grade that

each deserved. I gained respect for my first female instructor very quickly.

This year, she molded together a group of high school athletes in their first season as a girls basketball squad, and probably developed a district contender for next year

in the process The death of an individual that you know, if only casually, is shocking, and that shock is compounded if that person is young.

Wanda was only 38. but the worth of that person's life, no matter how brief, is measured by what he or she left behind, the impact that that person made on other people's lives.

She touched my life and I scarcely knew her. Her fellow coaches and students who loved her for the unselfish giver she was, were left with an understandably void in their lives.

When she died, she was helping the other women coaches prepare the girls' track team for Saturday's ABC Relays. Her

positive attitude and devotion to the girls she helped coach no doubt helped in developing the team into the role as a favorite this year.

If the girls on the team can overcome their grief briefly Saturday, they just might have added incentive to perform the best they ever have . . . this one is for Wanda, so to

Wanda had a sense of humor that enabled her to laugh at herself. She could sit across the table at a solemn occasion such as a sports banquet and keep you cracked up with comments about both herself and those

#### Joe Willie is now a Ram

NEW YORK (AP) — Joe Namath, the flamboyant and controversial quarterback of the New York Jets for the past 12 years, has agreed to play for the Los Angeles Rams, the New York Times reported today.

The newspaper said the injury-prone Namath, who led the Jets to the National Football League's Super Bowl championship in 1969 in a stunning upset over the Baltimore Colts, agreed to join the Rams Wednesday

However, the deal reportedly may take a while to complete.

Namath's lawyer, Jim Walsh, told the Times from California that he would talk to the Jets today and tell them: "We'll go along with whatever deal the Jets and Rams can make.

When the clubs work out a trade, the Rams would have 30 days to sign Namath, who earned \$450,000 last season. Namath was in the option year of a two-year contract. If the Jets and Rams could not conclude the deal, then New York would have the choice of picking up Namath's option year. If they did, they would have to pay him \$495,000 for the 1977 season under the terms of the NFL's new player agreeement.

#### Lee's back won't let him come back HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (AP) - Lee Trevino

is skipping the Masters again - and this time it's not his idea "He did this on doctor's orders," a spokesman for

Trevino's office in El Paso, Tex., said Wednesday, confirming a report by The Associated Press that the flamboyant Trevino — deeply troubled by a bad back had withdrawn from the prestigious Masters, the first of the year's four major tests of golfing greatness. In earlier years, Trevino had created a national furor by boycotting the esteemed Masters because, he

said at the time, the Augusta National Golf Club course was not suited to his game. Since winning the PGA national championship in

1974, however, Trevino has called a Masters title one of the prime goals of his career.

"I've got a chance at becoming only the fifth man in history to win all the Big Four," he said. "I'd be foolish not to try to make it. After all, Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan, Jack Nicklaus and Gary Player make pretty good company.'

They are the only players ever to win all four major titles - the Masters, U.S. and British Opens and the PGA. Trevino, one of the game's premier players and among the most popular players golf has ever known, won the U.S. Open in 1968 and 1971 and the British Open in 1971 and 1972.

His ailing back forced him out of a shot at the Masters, April 7-10 in Augusta, Ga. this year. "Following doctor's orders, Mr. Trevino is at home (in Santa Teresa, N.M.) resting and taking whirlpool

treatments," his office said. "He is not available for comment. His office confirmed, however, that Trevino sent a telegram to Masters officials last Friday withdrawing

from the tournament. Trevino underwent major back surgery last year and did not play until the Jackie Gleason-Iverrary Classic Feb. 24. He finished in a tie for 39th in that event, tied for 75th the following week.

## Anti-terrorism bills pushed

By LLOYD BENTSEN Member of U.S. Senate

For almost 40 hours recently our nation's capital was under siege by a small band of terrorists.

One hundred thirty-four people were held hostage, one young radio reporter was killed, others were beaten with pistols and knives, the life was disrupted in three areas of Washington, D.C., when the terrorists took over the City Hall the Islamic Center, and B'nai B'rith Headquarters.

I am grateful that the hostages were released, but I am outraged that the leader of the murderous band of terroists responsible for all this was freed immediately without having to post any

Hamaas Abdul Khaalis, the mastermind of this tragic endeavor, was released on his own recognizance, at liberty with family and friends, even before his hostages were home, even before the funeral of Maurice Williams, the young reporter shot to death during the incident.

What kind of precedent does this set for those who would contemplate future acts of violence? What kind of example does the release of Khaalis set for the rest of the world?

I FIND NO FAULT when authorities make promises to gun-wielding outlaws in an effort to free innocent victims. But a promise made at the point of a gun has no moral force whatsoever. You cannot negotiate in good faith at gunpoint.

Terrorism cannot and must not be accepted as a viable alternative to the logical pursuit of individual goals. Human lives cannot and must not become the medium of exchange for terrorists in search of media coverage.

OUR GOVERNMENT must make it perfectly clear that we will not tolerate violence instead of votes, bullets instead of ballots. Murder is murder; violence is violence; and no political cause or higher belief can justify either.

In order to better define terrorist acts of violence and to clarify the penalties that such acts will evoke, I have introduced two terrorism bills. One of them would suspend all forms of American assistance to countries that harbor terrorists. The other would make terrorism in this


