Over the years, the Big Spring ISD has been able to build a cash reserve. More recently, however, revenues have been less than necessary expenditures. For that reason, the reserve has been diminishing.

On Sept. 1, 1976, the local maintenance fund had a balance of \$830,000. By Aug. 31, 1977, the reserve will be reduced to \$459,740. Likewise, the interest and sinking

fund will be reduced from \$205,000 to

Since the district has been operating on a deficit basis, in order not to boost taxes, it is estimated that the reserves will be depleted with the 1977-78 budget. School officials reassure the supporters of the school district that

Under existing operations, it is highly questionable whether the 1977-78 budget can balance, even with reduced expenditures and depletion of the reserve funds. Jack and Jill plans \$250,000 school building

The Jack and Jill School will contween 17th and 18th Streets on Nolar St., hopefully for occupancy by September 1.

While real plans have not been made yet, Truett Thomas, chairman of the board of the school, said the new building would encompass 12,000 square feet, and accomodate up to 200 students.

The new building will also have a basement type storm shelter, six classrooms, a lobby, main office, a large cafeteria, and a gymnasium. It has been estimated that the build-

ing will take up to 120 days to build, and cost somewhere in the area of \$250,000

The pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, and first grade, has been rated the finest of its kind in the state of Texas, said Thomas,

Miss Arah Phillips, principal of the school, said that tuition would remain the same as it has been at \$4 a day, and \$2.50 for half a day.

Miss Phillips explained that the school was non-denominational, and that children of any race or creed were welcome.

She also said that the school would incorporate the same summer program this year as it has in the past with the YMCA. The program includes courses in swimming, arts and crafts, and gymnastics, for children up to twelve years of age

Looking at enrollment decline as an economic matter, there are two First, state financial concerns. support decreases as the number of pupils decreases. Second, there are certain "fixed" costs to maintaining and operating a campus often without regard to its enrollment. Such costs include administrative and clerical salaries, cafeteria, utilities, custodial and maintenance costs.

Beginning with the 1954 United States Supreme Court decision which outlawed segregated schools, a number of government institutions have been empowered to deal with desegregation. Since the United States Congress enacted the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Federal Court System, the Justice Department, and the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare have been involved in the desegregation of

schools by law. In 1970, a Federal Judge placed the Texas Education Agency (our state education department) under court order, requiring Texas Education Agency to monitor desegregation activities of every school in the state.

In essence, TEA is required to withdraw accreditation and state funds from any district operating one or more campuses comprised of more than 66 per cent minority pupils. Big Spring has three such campuses; Bauer, Cedar Crest, and Lakeview Another campus, Airport has recently increased to 63 per cent minority

In 1973, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare initiated proceedings against Big Spring to cut off federal funds because, as HEW alleged, Big Spring was not in compliance with desegregation requirements. The school board, through its legal counsel, fought to oppose the contention of HEW.

CARRIZO SPRINGS, Tex. (AP) — The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. (FDIC) has filed 12 suits to recover more than \$1 million in outstanding loans from the defunct Citizens State Bank of Carrizo Springs.

The suits were filed in state district court in Dimmit County. The Citizens State Bank was closed last June by the state banking commissioner.

The FDIC took over the bank and reimbursed depositors up to a maximum of \$40,000 for their money in the bank. The federal agency is now seeking to recover loans which are due the bank. The suits, filed individually, name Willard Mertz,

San Antonio, \$131,307; William T. Harris, San Antonio, \$109,367; Joseph E. Brodigan, San Antonio, \$27,360; and Ron Bramble, San Antonio, \$24,000.

The four are members of a previous ownership group that sold the bank to Eagle Pass businessman Enrique Salinas in late 1975, about seven months before it was closed.

The diesel gives between 10 and 50 per cent better mileage over a comparable gasoline engine, depending on how you calculate and

who you talk to. That's the beginning and the end of its advantages,' says one auto man. every other criterion, it does a lousy job for cars.'

Compared with gasoline engine, the diesel is noisier and smellier, vibrates and smokes more, provides less performance per cubic inch, is harder to start and costs more to build. But fuel economy has

become a precious comin Detroit. Under a modity federal law that goes into effect this fall, the industry's new-car fleets must meet fuel economy standards that grow stiffer each year. By 1985, cars must attain a minimum average of 27.5 miles per gallon - a figure only subcompacts now get.

'Ultimately, it comes down to a basic choice. Either we go on building big cars with diesels or we just make small cars with gasoline engines," says Harold H. Kehrl, a GM executive vice president in charge of research activites.

"To reach that 271/2 figure by 1985 without the diesel we would have to come up with a breakthrough in technology, develop some exotic lightweight materials or make our cars smaller again,

adds Kehrl GM's Oldsmobile division is building 100,000 diesels in the 1978-model year for the full-size Delta 88 car and GM

light trucks. That's a tiny amount considering the industry likely will sell 15 million new cars and trucks in 1978. GM officials acknowledge they are making a cautious entry into the market because they don't know how great a demand there is for the

But growth of the diesel could be staggering over the next seven years. A wellrespected private research firm projects one in five new cars sold in 1985 may come with a diesel. And a top engineer at Oldsmobile estimates the ratio could run

as high as one in four. Initially, VW and GM expect to sell every car diesel they produce, even though consumers will have

to pay more for one. VW, which is charging an extra \$170 for its diesel, says it's been flooded with orders for the 10,000 to 17,000 units it plans to produce this year. The diesel Rabbit would start at \$3,645 and deliver an average 44 m.p.g. based on government testing, compared with 28 m.p.g. for a gasoline Rabbit.

Mercedes Benz, which has been offering diesel cars in the United States for 25 years, says it expects to sell a record 22,000 units this

Nothing in the world can be more fun than youth baseball.

But nothing can be more agonizing. If the parents and coaches which run the programs cannot keep control of themselves, it ruins what is supposed to be a fun and learning experience for our children.

Combatting problem

Around the rim

You are standing in line at the grocery store, and suddenly the man in front of you collapses to the floor. You recognize that he has no signs of breathing, or heartbeat. What do you do before the ambulance arrives?

The number one killer, overshadowing any other cause of death in

America at least by double, is heart attack. It is so common, that every other American can expect to die of it, or some related disease.

YET, MOST OF those who die from heart attack, or any other heartstopping crisis, (such as drug overdose, suffocation, electric shock, or poisonous gas inhalation), could be saved if the right measures were started during the criticial few minutes right after the victim's heart

stops beating.
Someone has to breathe for him, and pump his heart until help arrives. A doctor could do this, but one usually isn't there. A paremedic, or an emergency medical technician could do it, but even they won't arrive until five or so minutes after they are called; often too late.

All that is left then to save the man is you, or some other ordinary person, who hopefully will have had some kind of training in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, the process by which you maintain breathing and circulation after these vital processes have been interrupted.

Performing cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) is as simple as ABC if you have been properly instructed in CPR technique (an untrained person could cause serious injury to the victim by damaging his heart or lungs, or rupturing his liver). Very briefly, the ABC's are airway,

breathing, and circulation.

THE FIRST STEP in saving the person is to clear his airway and start artificial respiration. The second priority is getting the blood circulating, through a massage of the heart, to force enough blood through the victim's body to keep him alive.

If you are the only rescuer you will have to alternate between heart massage, at a rate of eighty times a minute, and two mouth to mouth breaths after every fifteen chest compressions.

What you have to do in a specific emergency depends on whether you witness the person's collapse, or find him after it has occurred, on whether the victim is an adult, child or infant, and on how many people are present to help.

These matters, are taken up in a complete course in cardiopulmonary resuscitation, offered by the American Heart Association. In one or more sessions, lasting four or five hours, you'll hear about CPR from the instructor, see a movie, and practice the technique on a mannequin named Resusci Anne. Having passed a test in the course, you will get a card from the Heart Association saying you've been trained in CPR.

WASHINGTON — President Carter has astonished Washington officials with the personal attention he gives to their problems, including some so trivial that they could be handled by White House yeomen.

This has loaded down the president with so much paperwork that he puts in a prodigious, 80-hour work week to keep ahead of the accumulation. He absorbs government reports at the rate of 300 pages a day.

SOME TROUBLED advisors fear that the president is trying to do too much himself, that he isn't delegating enough authority. But others argue that this is Carter's natural style, that he thrives on overwork.

The president pr awesome amount of documents. usually scribbling his comments in the margins. "He will note his approval or ask for more information,' said a top Pentagon official.

State Dept. sources reported, for example, that Carter has lived up to his promise to review all proposals for arms sales to foreign countries. He has examined each one in detail, they said. "The guy is absolutely amazing," said one official. "He's looking at items that other presidents never touched."

Nor does the president rely solely on the facts provided by the bureaucrats; he likes first-hand information. While studying welfare reforms, he became curious about the Mormon church's remarkable welfare system. Aides tracked down the Mormon prophet, Spencer Kimball, in Brazil and invited him to drop by the White House on his way back to Salt Lake City.

Another time, the president located Kimball in the remote town of Fillmore, Utah, and called him to the telephone to discuss the church's voluntary missionary system.

At first, the president insisted on seeing every letter that came to him from Congress. Much of the mail turned out to be routine inquiries from constituents, which the congressmen had forwarded to the White House with a buck slip.

So now, Carter receives a daily log of congressional mail and checks off the letters he wants to read personally. His rule is that every personal letter from a congressman will get a personal response. The replies are rarely dictated; usually, he will write back in longhand.

A FEW WEEKS ago, for example, Rep. Newton Steers, R.-Md., received a complaint from a constituent about a bag of peanuts with the inscription: "Processed by President Carter's peanut plant in Plains, Georgia."

If the president were aware of this, objected the constituent, then "the prestige and integrity of the White House have been brought to a new

Steers forwarded the complaint in a routine letter to the president's congressional liaison, Frank Moore. Back came the letter with this handwritten note scrawled on the bottom: 'Cong. Steers, I know nothing about it." It was signed, "J. Carter."

Rep. Thomas Downey, D.-N.Y., had a similar experience after mailing the White House a copy of a scholarly article he and an aide, Bob Sherman, had written about the arms limitation talks. They received a handwritten note on White House stationery.

"Your article is excellent — very hopeful," said the note. "(State ecretary Cyrus) Vance has a copy —

The president also closely directs the efforts of his five speech writers. He gives them notes on what he wants to say, then carefully edits their drafts. He adds and deletes phrases. He insisted, for example, on keeping the "moral equivalent of war" phrase in his energy speech.

In four quick months, Carter has increased the paperwork of the presidency many fold. Sources close to the White House agree that he is handling it competently. But they are beginning to wonder whether he is getting bogged down in trivia.

Israeli minister, Vance meet again Mrs. Derese testified Tuesday that Mcmanus told

(AP)LONDON Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance meets today with Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon to tell him about President Carter's recent talks with Arab leaders.

'We are briefing him on the latest developments, and he is briefing us on his concerns about what he has been reading in the papers," a U.S. official said.

Vance, in London for the NATO meeting at which President Carter spoke Tuesday, reminded reporters he met with Allon during his trip to the Middle East in February, and Carter since then has talked with Egyptian President Anwar Sadat, Jordan's King Hussein and President Hafez

Assad of Syria "Therefore, I thought it was time for us to meet again, where I could review with him what has come out of the conversations with the Arab leaders and get the question," Vance said.

Israeli officials in Tel Aviv expressed uneasiness over remarks Carter made following his 31/2-hour conversation with Assad Monday in Geneva.

Carter told reporters that all the Middle Eastern leaders with whom he has conferred - including Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin — agreed to a general concept peacekeeping forces in demilitarized zones along Israel's borders. The president also said it was possible that a final peace agreement would contain provisions for Israeli defense or observation posts beyond the borders.

Israeli Foreign Ministry officials said demilitarized zones and observation posts could not replace the "defensible legal borders" latest thinking of the Israelis that Israel insists must be the Middle East part of a peace treaty.



The actress was claimed by a heart attack Tuesday in the bedroom of Manhattan apartment. She had not been ill and had no history of cardiac trouble.

An aura of glamor surrounded her throughout her career, and she conformed to that image, once confessing that "if I'd ever been seen on the Sunset strip with bare feet and my hair uncoiffed, I would have killed myself.

"She believed in the Hollywood legend, and she was a creature of it," said George Cukor, who directed her in three of her 80 films.

"She represented the best in the golden period of Hollywood. She started as a personality girl, a dancing flapper, and made herself into an excellent actresss.'

Funeral services were yet to be arranged. Miss Crawford's attorney, Edward Cowen, said her wish to be cremated would be carried out.







None of the officers. including Denton, have had disciplinary action taken against them previously.

Police sources said Torres. a karate expert, was arrested Thursday night following a fight in a tavern. He was taken to the downtown police station where the jail supervisor refused to allow officers to book him because of his condition. The supervisor ordered the

officers to take Torres to a hospital for treatment, sources said. Bond told newsmen he had

been advised by the district attorney and by the city legal department not to reveal details of the case.





Guest Columnist How do you like the sound of those games? No, they're not contests from a bygone era. Let me begin at the beginning.
There's no doubt about it; if misery loves

company, the Steers will never be lonesome. And it's time someone does something about it. I mean there's no way some of these small 4-A schools can compete against thier larger brethren.

First, schools such as Big Spring are trying to knock heads with counterparts who have about twice our enrollment. (Big Spring High has some 1,800 students with the minimum enrollment for 4-A being 1,200).

Secondly, all schools should report their headcount uniformly. Some choose to give only the enrollment of their top three grades because their freshmen classes attend a junior high. Others, again such as Big Spring, report enrollment for all four grades (because freshmen attend that particular high school).

Here's what that means in Big Spring's case. The latest enrollment is approximately 1,800, but without freshmen, (510 students) we really have only an enrollment of 1.300. Others in our district

. Abilene, Angelo, Midland, et al, claim their enrollment is approximately 2,000 . . and that's only for sophomores, juniors and

In other words, our top three grades total some 1,300 pupils. We're doing battle with student bodies of 2,000, 2,100 and higher.

But, as I said, we're not by ourselves. Take for example, the poor Pearland Oilers. Their enrollment is 1,500 and their football team has won the grand total of three games in the last two years (same as the

And how about the once mighty Wichita Falls Coyotes? They've also fallen on hard times. Enrollment there is just 1,800 and the Coyotes won the staggering total of three games in 1976!

Even Amarillo Tascosa has problems. A student body of 1,700 has produced three gridiron victories in each of the past two

So, as I said, it's time all schools report enrollment figures for just the top three grades. Then new classifications can be drawn up. Until that's accomplished, the game of football will really be like the game of life. The rich get richer and the poor get

Ralph Walker, 1900 Runnels, 267-8078. ment said Tuesday that this year's harvest, based on May 1 computations, will be almost 1.48 billion bushels, down 6 per cent from 1976 production but 3 per cent more than the department initially predicted last December.

An estimate of 1977 springplanted wheat production will be announced in July, but officials think that if farmers get good weather an output of around 500 million bushels is possible.

So, if things go right, total wheat production this year could be close to two billion bushels, not far below the record harvest of 2.1 billion bushels in 1976, and add further to the growing U.S. wheat stockpile.

Last year's record wheat corp included about 1.57 billion bushels of winter Boats
