All clinic times are subject to change or cancellation due to weather conditions or scheduling conflicts.

Commissioners meeting report

Parmer County commissioners met in regular session Monday November 23 in Farwell. County Extension Agent James Bridges reported that the recent stock show dinner raised about \$24,000, a record for the event. Money is used to assist the Livestock Show youth in purchasing their animals.

The offer to purchase the Bovina building currently the Justice of the Peace office from Bruce Fleming was declined. The commissioners have made an offer to purchase the former Bovina Medical Clinic building at 509 Avenue I for county offices. The amount of the offer was not disclosed.

A fee requested by the High Plains Water District to be paid to the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) was not approved. The water district wants SPAG to take over water district administrative work, applying for grants, etc. and propose to assess fees on county and city governments. Commissioners declined to pay the fee of \$500+ since it was not in the current budget.

Sheriff Randy Gerries reported that the Parmer County jail population was lower than it has been in a while. He said they were currently housing 24 inmates.

Thanksgiving: History and Customs

On the fourth Thursday of November, Americans celebrate Thanksgiving, a national holiday honoring the early settlers and their harvest feast known as the first Thanksgiving.

Native Americans
Long before settlers came to the East Coast of the United States, the area was inhabited by many Native American tribes. The area surrounding the site of the first Thanksgiving, now known as southeastern Massachusetts and eastern Rhode Island had been the home of the Wampanoag people for over 12,000 years, and had been visited by other European settlers before the arrival of the Mayflower. The native people knew the land well and had fished, hunted, and harvested for thousands of generations.

The Settlers
The people who comprised the Plymouth Colony were a group of English Protestants who wanted to break away from the Church of England. These 'separatists' initially moved to Holland and after 12 years of financial problems, they received funding from English merchants to sail across the Atlantic to settle in a 'New World.' A ship carrying 101 men, women, and children spent 66 days traveling the Atlantic Ocean, intending to land where New York City is now located. Due to the windy conditions, the group had to cut their trip short and settle at what is now called Cape Cod.

Settling and Exploring
As the Puritans prepared for winter, they gathered anything they could find, including Wampanoag supplies.

One day, Samoset, a leader of the Abenaki, and Tisquantum (better known

as Squanto) visited the settlers. Squanto was a Wampanoag who had experience with other settlers and knew English. Squanto helped the settlers grow corn and use fish to fertilize their fields. After several meetings, a formal agreement was made between the settlers and the native people and they joined together to protect each other from other tribes in March of 1621.

The Celebration
One day that fall, four settlers were sent to hunt for food for a harvest celebration. The Wampanoag heard gunshots and alerted their leader, Massasoit, who thought the English might be preparing for war. Massasoit visited the English settlement with 90 of his men to see if the war rumor was true.

Soon after their visit, the Native Americans realized that the English were only hunting for the harvest celebration. Massasoit sent some of his own men to hunt deer for the feast and for three days, the English and native men, women, and children ate together. The meal consisted of deer, corn, shellfish, and roasted meat, far from today's traditional Thanksgiving feast.

Although prayers and thanks were probably offered at the 1621 harvest gathering, the first recorded religious Thanksgiving Day in Plymouth happened two years later in 1623. On this occasion, the colonists gave thanks to God for rain after a two-month drought.

The Myths
Believe it or not, the settlers didn't have silver buckles on their shoes. Nor did they wear somber, black clothing. Their attire was actually bright and

cheerful. Many portrayals of this harvest celebration also show the Native Americans wearing woven blankets on their shoulders and large, feathered headdresses, which is not true. The Englishmen didn't even call themselves Pilgrims.

They played ball games, sang, and danced. Much of what most modern Americans eat on Thanksgiving was not available in 1621.

Native Americans and Thanksgiving
The peace between the Native Americans and settlers lasted for only a generation. The Wampanoag people do not share in the popular reverence for the traditional New England Thanksgiving. For them, the holiday is a reminder of betrayal and bloodshed. Since 1970, many native people have gathered at the statue of Massasoit in Plymouth, Massachusetts each Thanksgiving Day to remember their ancestors and the strength of the Wampanoag.

Modern Thanksgiving
In the 19th century, the modern Thanksgiving holiday started to take shape. In 1846, Sarah Josepha Hale, editor of a magazine called Godley's Lady's Book, campaigned for an annual national thanksgiving holiday after a passage about the harvest gathering of 1621 was discovered and incorrectly labeled as the first Thanksgiving.

It wasn't until 1863, when President Abraham Lincoln declared two national Thanksgivings; one in August to commemorate the Battle of Gettysburg and the other in November to give thanks for "general blessings."

DPS urges Texans to drive responsibly, sober

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is urging Texans to always travel responsibly and to make safe driving habits a priority during the heavily travelled Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

"As Texans travel to be with family and friends this Thanksgiving season, we urge all drivers to use extra caution on roadways and always drive sober," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The increased traffic and potential for inclement weather and impaired driving can make holiday

travel especially challenging, and DPS troopers will be working nonstop to keep the roads safe for everyone."

DPS troopers will be patrolling Texas roadways throughout the holiday weekend looking for drunk drivers, speeders, seat belt violators and other drivers who are endangering themselves and others.

During the Thanksgiving weekend in 2014, DPS troopers arrested 242 individuals for driving while intoxicated, issued 5,223 speeding citations, 682 ci-

tations for no insurance and 599 seat belt/child safety seat citations. DPS patrols also resulted in 135 fugitive arrests and 97 felony arrests during the same time period.

DPS offers the following tips for safe travel during the Thanksgiving holiday:

*Don't drink and drive. Designate a driver or take a cab.

*Slow down - especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.

*Eliminate distractions, including the use of mobile devices.

*Buckle up everyone in the vehicle - it's the law.

*Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks that are stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated - it's the law.

*Don't drive fatigued - get plenty of rest before trips or take breaks as needed.

*Drive defensively, as holiday travel may present additional challenges.

*Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained before your trip begins.

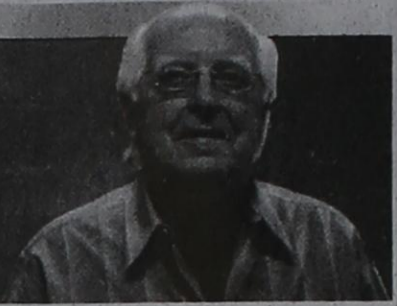

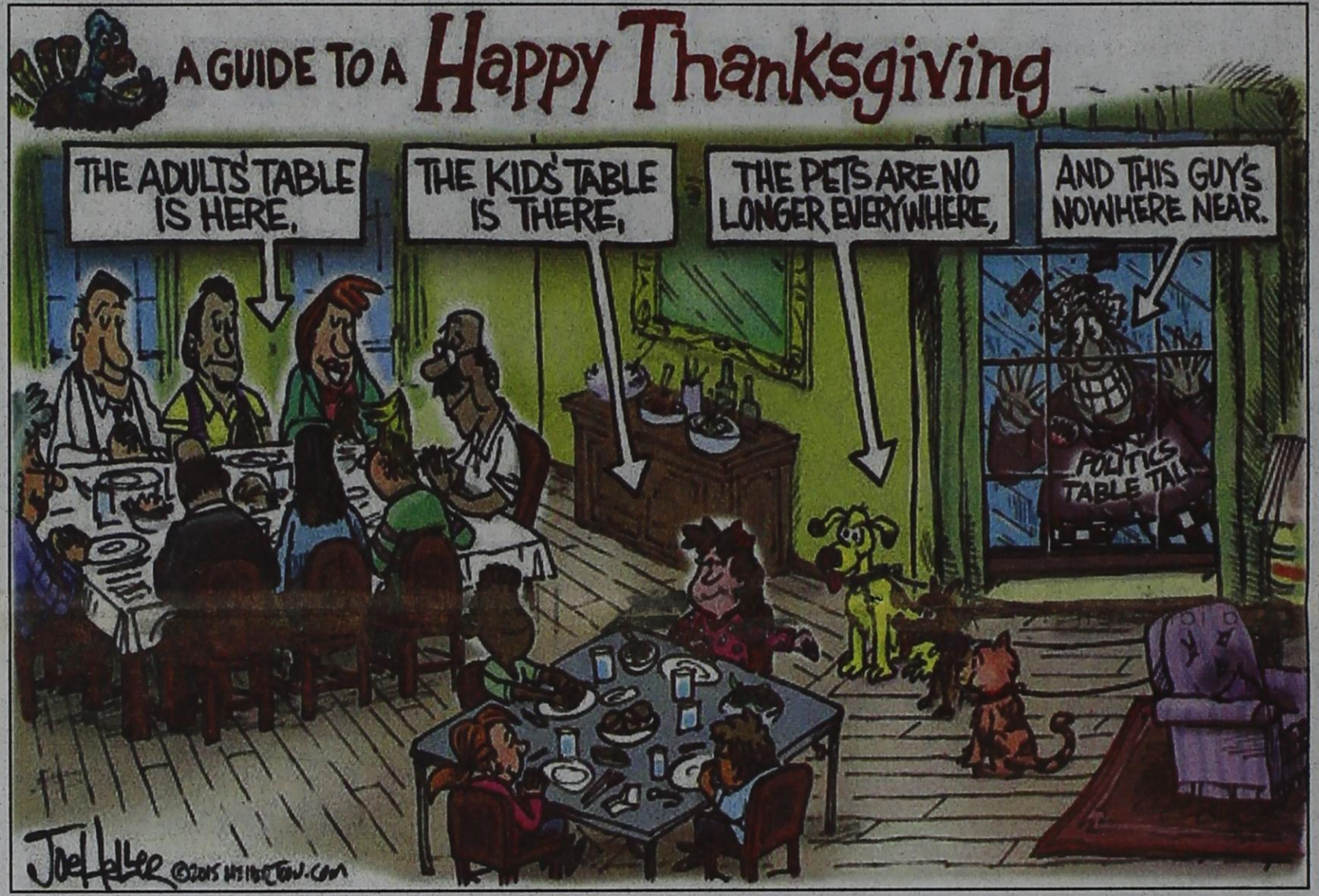
don't talk politics while eating turkey

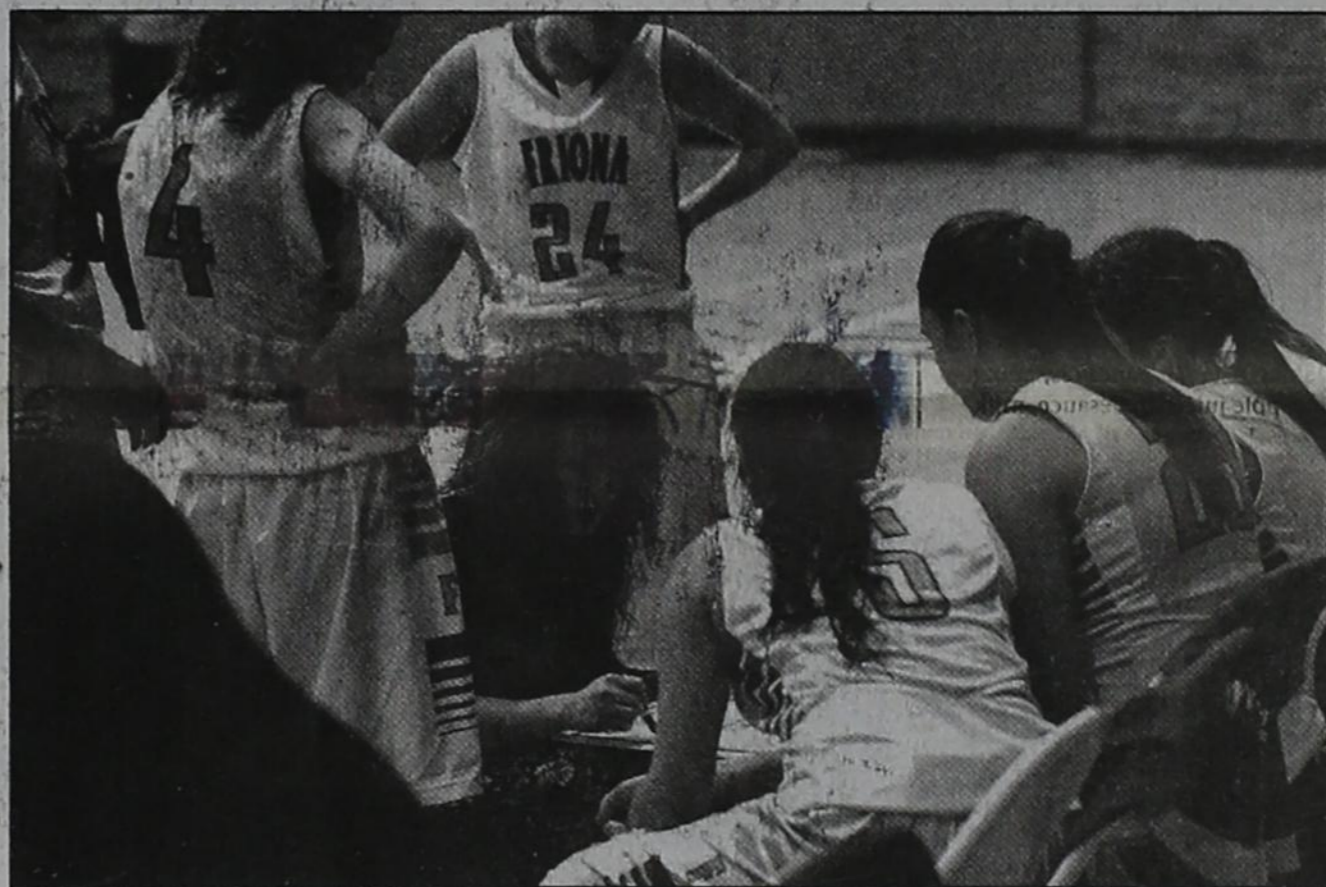
*Tony Perea, who was honored this week as the Fighting Chief in the 1967 backfield, led the team

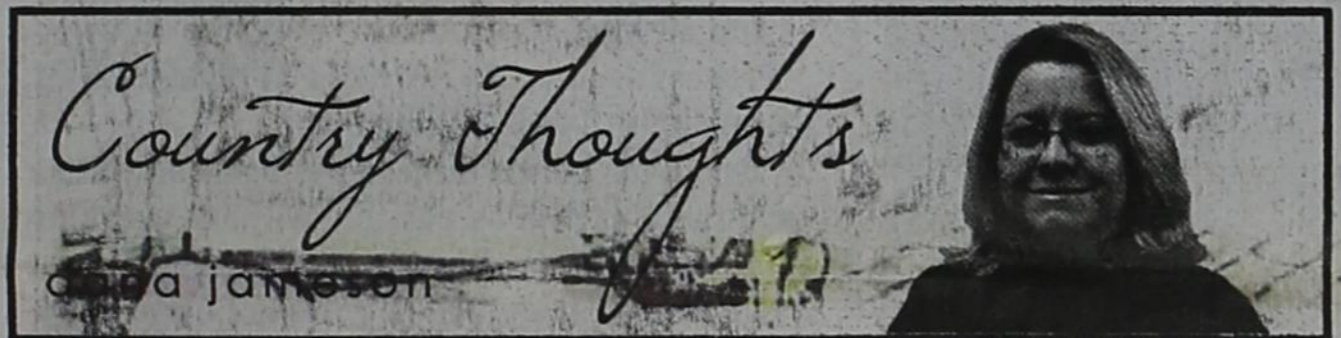
JV Squaws coach Cindy Moreno goes over a play during a timeout of the Lazbuddie game.

DPS I-40 holiday challenge

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) joined city, state and federal officials to announce the "Interstate 40 Challenge: The Drive toward Zero Fatalities" traffic enforcement campaign during the 2015 Thanksgiving holiday period.

The challenge was issued to seven other state police or highway patrol agencies as well as all city police departments, in Texas, along the IH-40 corridor over two 12 hour periods on November 25 and November 29 - the busiest travel days during the Thanksgiving period - to help achieve the safest possible holiday travel. Law enforcement officials from Texas, California, Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas, North Carolina and Tennessee have accepted the challenge and will participate in the IH-40 challenge.

Each agency involved has been tasked to strategically assign troopers and officers on the IH-40 corridor from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. on Wednesday, November 25 and from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Sunday, November 29. Interstate 40 runs 2,555 miles through eight states and dissects the northern Texas panhandle from Oklahoma to New Mexico.

DPS troopers will emphasize their efforts to identify traffic violations such as speeding, seat belt usage, moving over or slowing down for emergency vehicles, following too closely, unsafe distracted drivers, intoxicated drivers and criminal activities on Texas highways. Troopers will be assisting stranded motorist and travelers who become lost or confused on their route of travel.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TXDOT) is prepared and ready to move into action in the event of inclement weather during the holiday. They are prepared to start clearing highways, assisting stranded motorists and law enforcement agencies who request their services.

Thanksgiving Leftovers Monkey Bread


- 2 pounds frozen bread dough, thawed
- 1 cup chopped cooked turkey
- 1 cup prepared stuffing
- 1 cup prepared mashed potatoes
- 1/2 cup mixed vegetables
- 1/2 cup shredded Cheddar cheese

Add all ingredients to list
Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.

Break off 2-inch pieces of dough and flatten each piece as thin as possible without breaking using a rolling pin. Spoon about 1 teaspoon turkey, 1 teaspoon stuffing, 1 teaspoon mashed potatoes, and 1 teaspoon vegetables onto each piece of flattened dough. Gently close dough around filling, sealing edges together and forming a ball. Arrange filled dough balls in the prepared baking dish; sprinkle with Cheddar cheese.

Bake in the preheated oven until dough balls are cooked through, 30 to 40 minutes. Invert monkey bread onto a serving dish.

What to do with those leftovers?

Melissa d'Arabian, host of Ten Dollar Dinners on the Food Network, makes the most of Thanksgiving leftovers with the following ideas:

Use Up Your Turkey
Sweet-and-Spicy Pitas Toast 1 1/4 teaspoons curry powder in a skillet 20 seconds; let cool. Mix with 2 tablespoons cranberry sauce and 1/2 cup plain yogurt in a bowl. Add 2 cups chopped leftover turkey and 1/4 cup each chopped celery and scallions. Season with salt and add some toasted walnuts, if desired. Stuff into pitas lined with lettuce.

Asian Ginger Salad Combine 2 cups chopped leftover turkey with 1/2 cup mandarin oranges, a handful of slivered almonds and half of a thinly sliced red onion in a bowl. In a separate bowl, whisk 2 teaspoons grated ginger, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 2 tablespoons rice vinegar and 1 teaspoon each red pepper flakes, sugar and sesame oil. Whisk in 1/4 cup vegetable oil and season with salt and pepper. Drizzle the dressing over the turkey salad and toss.

BBQ Sandwiches Mix 4 cups chopped leftover turkey, 1 cup barbecue sauce, 2 minced garlic cloves and the juice of 2 limes in a slow cooker. Cover and cook on low 2 to 4 hours. Shred with a fork, then add cider vinegar and salt to taste. Serve on soft buns.

Nutty Noodles Microwave 2 tablespoons chunky peanut butter 20 seconds. Stir in 1/4 cup salsa, 1 tablespoon each mirin and soy sauce, and a splash of water. Toss with 2 cups cold chopped leftover turkey, 2 cups cold cooked spaghetti and 1 chopped scallion.

Use Up Your Cranberry Sauce
Quick Crumble Mix 1 cup cranberry sauce, 2 pounds sliced peeled apples, 2 tablespoons each flour and granulated sugar, a pinch of salt and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla in a buttered baking dish. Dot with 2 tablespoons butter. Mix 1 stick softened butter, 1/2 cup brown sugar, 3/4 cup each flour and chopped pecans, and a pinch each of cinnamon and salt in a bowl. Crumble over the fruit and bake at 375 degrees F until browned, 40 to 45 minutes.

5-Minute Appetizer Toast baguette slices under the broiler. Top with cream cheese or goat cheese and dollop with cranberry sauce.

Simple Sundaes Heat 1 cup cranberry sauce in a saucepan. Spoon over scoops of vanilla ice cream.

Festive Cocktails Stir a dab of cranberry sauce into a glass of seltzer, or mix with sparkling wine for a kir royale.

DIY Fruit Yogurt Spread a 1/2-inch layer of cranberry sauce in an empty yogurt container or shallow cup; top with plain Greek yogurt to make your own fruit-on-the-bottom yogurt.

Use Up Your Mashed Potatoes
Sweet Spread Mash a stick of softened butter with 1/2 cup mashed sweet potatoes and 1 tablespoon brown sugar or maple syrup (skip this if your potatoes were already sweetened). Chill until firm, then spread on scones or waffles.

Stuffed Peppers Cut off the top inch of 4 green bell peppers; scoop out the seeds. Mix 3 cups mashed potatoes, 8 slices crumbled cooked bacon and 3/4 cup shredded cheddar cheese in a bowl; stuff into the peppers. Top with more cheese, then replace the pepper tops. Arrange in a baking dish, cover with foil and bake about 45 minutes at 375 degrees F.

Potato Pockets Combine 1/2 cup mashed sweet potatoes, 3 ounces softened cream cheese and 2 1/2 tablespoons brown sugar. Dollop in the center of wonton wrappers, moisten the edges with water and fold into triangles, pressing to seal. Fry in hot vegetable oil and dust with confectioners' sugar.

Magic Muffins Mix 1/2 cup each sugar and unsweetened applesauce, 2 beaten eggs, 3/4 cup mashed sweet potatoes and 1/3 cup vegetable oil in a bowl. In another bowl, whisk 1 cup all-purpose flour with 1/2 cup whole-wheat flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon each baking soda and salt, and 1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice. Mix the potato mixture into the flour mixture, then stir in some mini chocolate chips. Spoon into greased mini muffin cups. Bake 12 to 13 minutes at 375 degrees F.

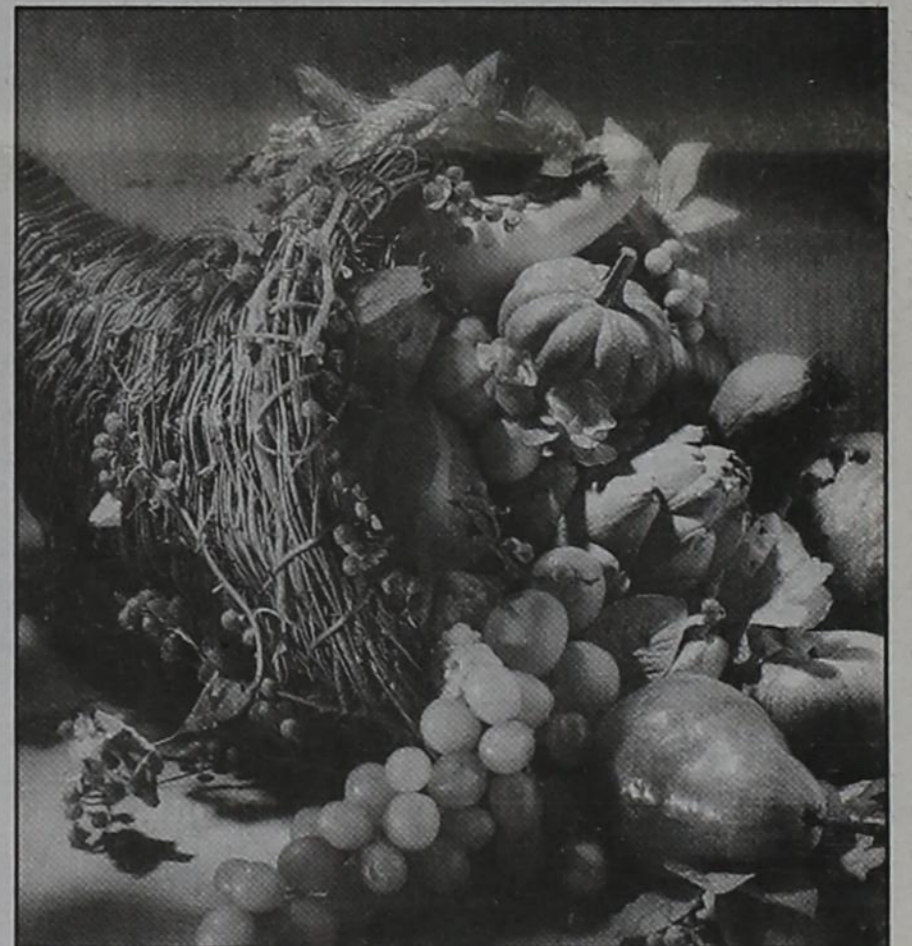

2/3 cup whole milk

Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

1/3 cup leftover Turkey Gravy

2 teaspoons hot sauce

5 cups leftover Cornbread Stuffing

2 cups leftover Roasted Vegetables

2 cups 1/2-inch-diced leftover Turkey Breast

1/2 cup cranberry sauce, optional

Open Faced Turkey Stuffing Patty with Gravy and Cranberry Sauce

4 slices bacon

2 cups Turkey Stuffing

Canola oil, if needed

12 fresh sage leaves

8 ounces leftover turkey meat

1 cup leftover turkey gravy, heated through

1/2 cup Cranberry Sauce

Cook the bacon in a cast-iron skillet over medium-high heat until extra crispy, about 10 minutes. Transfer the bacon to a paper-towel-lined-plate to drain and reserve the fat in the skillet.

Meanwhile pack a 1 cup dry measure tightly with a 1/2 cup of the Old Fashioned Turkey Stuffing. Dump the stuffing onto a baking sheet and press down into a 4-inch-wide-cake, using a flat spatula. Repeat until you have 4 patties.

Heat the reserved bacon fat in the skillet over medium heat. Carefully lay 2 patties in the skillet and cook until golden brown, 3 to 4 minutes each side. Transfer the patties to a plate and repeat with the remaining 2 patties.

Add oil to the skillet if needed. Add the sage and fry, about 30 seconds. Transfer the sage to a paper-towel-lined-plate using a slotted spoon.

Divide the turkey meat onto each patty and pour gravy over top. Crumble 1 crispy bacon slice over the turkey. Dollop with the Cranberry Sauce and garnish with the sage.

The program will offer an in-depth look at the advantages of proper management of range and income, said Austin Voyles, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Potter County.

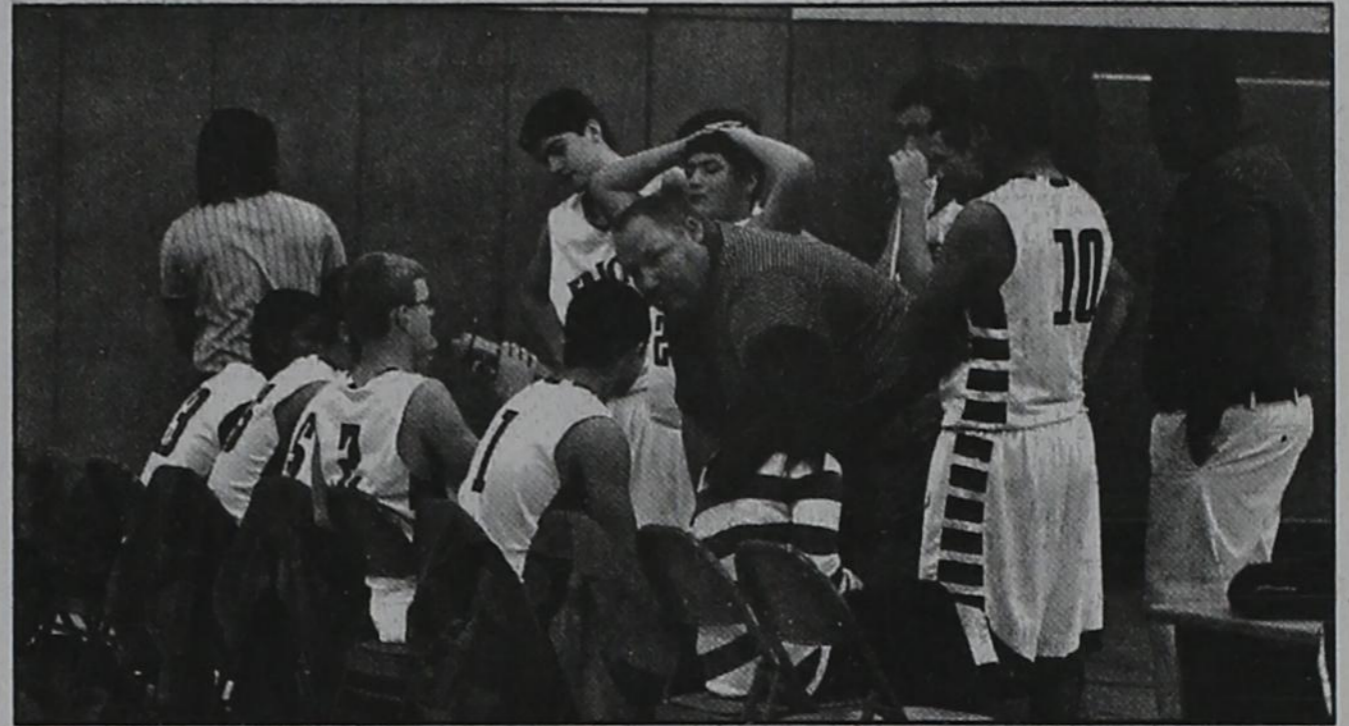
"We want to educate our producers on how to ensure a sustainable operation for

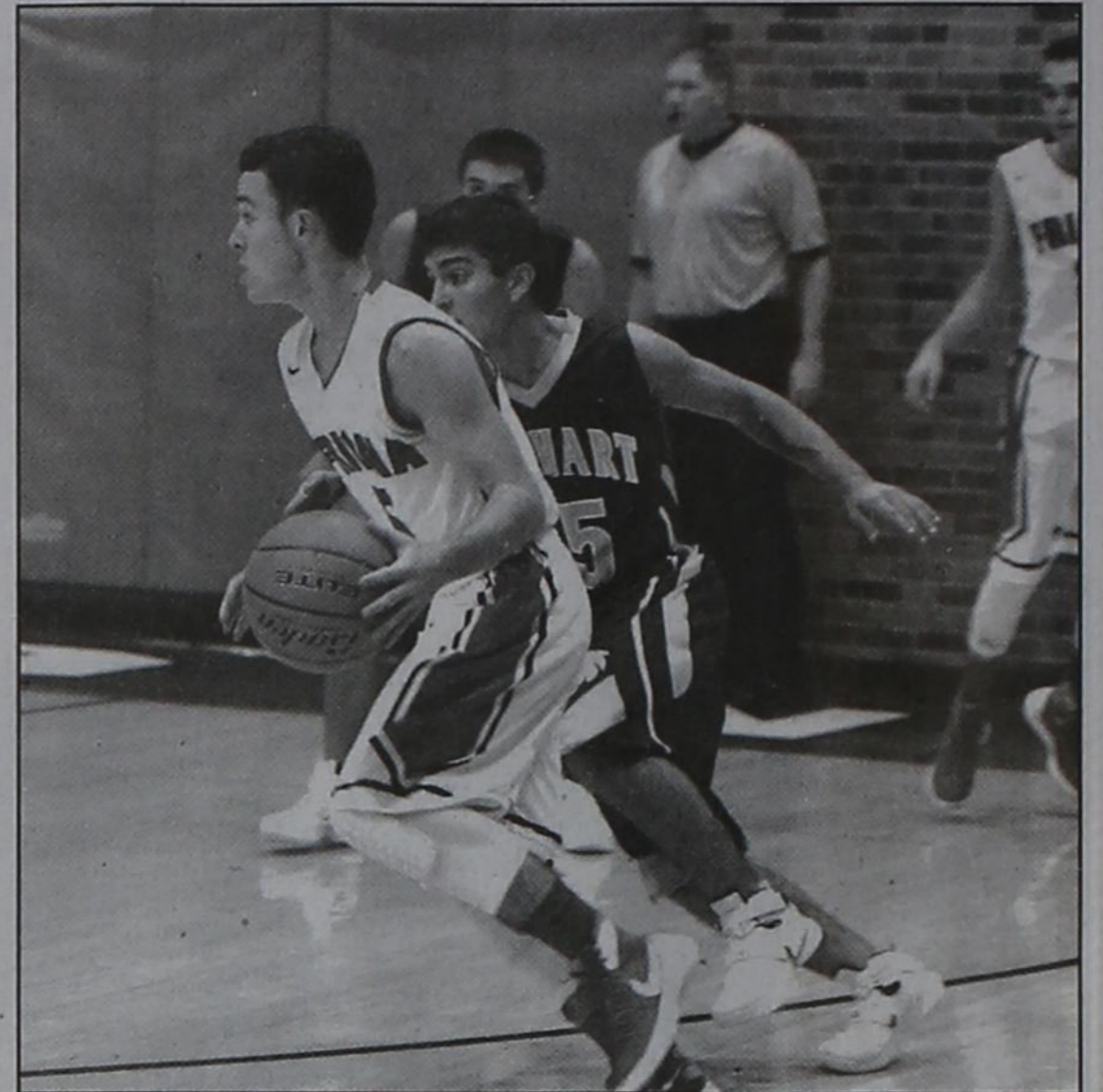
