# Police, fire chiefs ask for pay raises

Big Spring Police Chief Stanley Bogard wants \$100 more a month for all department employes, and Fire Chief Alvie Harrison wants equal pay for local firefighters.

The proposed salary increases were submitted to the city council at today's regular meeting, and they will appear formally on the agenda for the next council meeting two weeks from today.

"We must compete with other law enforcement agencies for qualified personnel. Not only do we have to compete with other agencies, we must also compete with the local labor markets. wrote Bogard in his proposal

In addition to a raise in pay for present police employes, Bogard has asked the council for 10 additional officers. One of these would be assigned to the criminal investigation division, another to the identification division, another as a full-time undercover officer and six as patrolmen.

STANTON - A 20-year-old Big Spring man made the mistake of speeding by the police chief's house in Stanton and ended up in a high speed chase all the way into Big Spring Monday night.

was jailed in Howard County He and charged with resisting arrest and fleeing an officer. His bond was set at \$200 for each offense. He was then transfered back to Martin County and charged with excessive speed and an additional charge of fleeing an officer with \$200 set on each offense there.

He was driving back from Midland to Big Spring and went through Stanton on old Highway 80, past the home of Police Chief J. Rogers, and the chief reported that he was "flying low

He contacted his officer, Gilbert Barraza who took up pursuit inside the city limits of Stanton and followed him all the way to Big Spring.

He was going up to 110 miles per hour, according to Barraza. The patrolman also reported that he was passing vehicles on the right shoulder when there were two in front of him.

The police radioed ahead and State **Troopers Bill Jennings and Ken Koyce** were waiting with a road block at the 177 mile marker on IS 20.

He ran through the road block before he came to a halt, jumped out of his vehicle and fled on foot. He was captured by the highway patrolmen and Deputy B.K. McCartney from the sheriff's office.

Since he was unable to make bond here, he was transfered to Martin County on charges there. He is still in Martin County jail, according to Sheriff Dan Saunders

Altogether, the pay increase and added manpower would cost the city \$196,158 more per year, estimated the chief.

Present salary for police officers ranges from \$600 per month for a probationary patrolman I, to \$1,000 for a captain of police. Bogard's proposal would raise the pay scale \$100 per month at each of nine-rank levels

Salaries at the fire department range from \$656 per month for a trainee fireman, to \$855 per month for a fire captain. The proposed increase would bring salary scales to a rough equivalent of those at the police department.


Under the proposal, trainees would make \$700 per month, while step three fire marshals would make \$1,100 per month. Harrison also suggests the addition of four more men to the department, which, including pay raises for the present 47 employes, would cost the city \$164,086.87 more pear year, he estimated.

The commissioners, worried that they could be forced to give up the money even if it meant serious curtailment of the county budget, were reassured by Brown that they need only give the money as it became available in the budget

'If you don't have it, don't give it,' said Brown.

"Well, Roger," replied County Judge Bill Tune, "I'm just afraid that the day that election passes you'll be up there asking for that \$61,000.'

'That could be,'' smiled Brown. He told the court that the election could provide "enabling legislation" for the county. Presently, the county could not contribute to an industrial development board if it wanted to. After the election it will have that capability.

"If you're ever going to walk a bridge, now's the time to do it," said "We're fighting with Brown. everything we've got. This is your best chance to get a return on your investment, because if the money you spend now is successful, you will be getting back cash in taxes from the industries which locate here.

The Court held a long discussion with Jimmy Ray Smith and Jack Watkins over the structure of the tax assessment program. Smith and Watkins were protesting a move by the tax appraiser's office which they contended would have Smith paying increased taxes four years before some others in the town.

The argument revolved around a 'depth scale'' used by the Appraisal office to provide a percentage adjustment for irregularly sized lots. The scale was dropped, apparently at the behest of the Tax Appraisal Board, for the 20 per cent examined this year. Smith, who owns property affected by the move, maintains it is unfair for him to pay the changed values before the rest of the community

Watkins told the Commissioner's Court, now in session as the county Board of Equalization, that although he had no property involved in the new taxes he was not there to stir things

up. ''I'm just interested in what's fair,'' said Watkins.

Watkins told the commissioners that he was "tired of all the innuendoes, hanky-panky, and ripoffs." Watkins said the Tax Appraisal Board needed to be open to review and protested that it and its actions were not. "I'm tired of talking to people who don't know what's fair," he said.

Zirah Bednar, a member of the Tax Appraisal Board, pointed out that the 20 per cent method had been upheld as fair in other Texas cities, including Dallas, Houston, and Waco. She told the commissioners that if they acted without coordination with the cityschool Board of Equalization it could seriously impair chances of a joint collection agency being established.

The commissioners agreed to meet Wednesday at 2 p.m. to further discuss the problem.

Two persons were injured, and were taken by helicopter to New Orleans.

The Coast Guard said the platform had an 11-degree list, but was holding steady in that position.

Winds were reported at 10 to 20 knots, with four-foot waves.

# Congress deals second setback

WASHINGTON (AP) - A House committee dealt another setback to President Carter's energy program today, voting to continue work on a controversial nuclear breeder reactor which the administration had proposed cancelling.

Across Capitol Hill, backers of legislation to remove price controls from natural gas pressed their attack in the Senate on the Carter administration's plan for continued regulation. They had won a preliminary victory on that issue in a House subcommittee last week. Continued work on the Clinch River

breeder reactor project near Oak Ridge, Tenn., was approved by the House Science and Technology Committee today on a 19-11 vote. The committee agreed to authorize

\$150 million to begin actual construction on the reactor, which will produce more nuclear fuel than it consumes Carter had asked Congress to phase

out the project, claiming that the fuel it produced, plutonium, could too easily be diverted for use in atomic weapons by terrorist groups. However, the committee rejected.

17-11, an amendment by Rep. Thomas

J. Downey, D-N.Y., that would have accomplished what the administration sought by ending work on the breeder project.

Meanwhile, Senate Republican Leader Howard Baker told reporters he feels there is a good chance that the Senate would also vote to restore funds for the Clinch River plant.

As White House energy adviser James R. Schlesinger sought to defend the Carter plan before a House panel, the Senate Energy Committee was considering a rival plan to deregulate newly drilled natural gas. The Senate voted 58 to 32 in 1975 for

a form of natural gas deregulation similar to that approved last week by the energy and power subcommittee of the House Commerce Committee. Schlesinger's appearance before the committee's investigations subcommittee is part of the administration's effort to have the full committee reverse last week's deregulation vote.

The investigations panel also wants to ask Schlesinger about a new congressional study which says the administration overestimated the number of plants that would switch from oil or natural gas to coal under the energy plan.

# College getting less

AUSTIN - Thanks to decisions made by the 1977 Legislature, many of the state's junior college may face problems the next two years in dealing with inflation and growing student populations.

Called by supporters the best deal in education for Texas, the junior college system came out short when funding decisions were made.

Howard College came out of the 1977 session with a total appropriations of \$2,501,286, including \$1,288,247 for academic courses and \$1,213,039 for vocational courses. This is for the two fiscal years beginning Sept. 1.

The college had requested a total of about \$3.2 million for the biennium. Its appropriation for the present biennium was about \$1.8 million.

State appropriations for junior colleges are determined by a formula using the total number of contact hours taken by students multiplied by a fixed amount per type of course.

### Federal funds set for schools

Congressman Omar Burleson announces a tentative entitlement of \$388,562 to the Big Spring Independent School District for fiscal year 1977 by the Office of Education under public law 874 providing financial assistance for schools in federally affected areas.

\$271,993.58 has been certified for immediate payment and the check should reach the school district within the next week

In addition the Coahoma Independent School district has been approved for a tentative entitlement of \$8,553 with a check in the amount of \$5,987.49 to go out shortly for immediate payment.

Big Spring School interim superintendent Lynn Hise detailed the funds, explaining that they are "impact" monies, intended to replace the revenue lost through the students whose parents are living and working on Webb AFB, and thus are taxexempt.

Hise said that, with Webb closing, the funds would not be available next vear.







Right now, a rookie patrolman makes about \$600 a month at the BSPD. That's not bad for a job of this kind, but the most a patrolman can make is \$820.

**ONCE A PATROLMAN advances to** the \$820 level, he's worth about \$1,000 to \$1,200 a month in Midland or Odessa (these figures are according to Police Chief Stanley Bogard).

It would benefit the city to raise the top pay levels for patrolmen to about \$900 to \$950 per month to give the patrolmen something to work for. This pay raise would benefit all

concerned in several areas:

-the cost of training rookies would be reduced, because theoretically, there would be a lower turnover rate among patrolmen.


WE HAVE now obtained documents and testimony showing that Yugoslavia's UDB, the feared secret police, installed its choice as head of the church in 1958. Authoritative U.S. intelligence sources have told us that priests are cleared and briefed by Communist officials before they are sent to America. Some may be little better, said our sources, than spies in frocks

the vote on the new patriarch, as one eyewitness described it, a carload of UDB agents roared up to the monastery and demanded Father Makarije's ceremonial vestments. Frightened priests surrendered the sacred articles to the secret police.

Broken by mistreatment, the jailed Makarije obediently dressed in his formal cassock and donned the vestments. Then he was hustled from prison to participate in the voting. He followed the UDB's orders and voted for its candidate, Bishop German.

But afterward, an anguished Makarije returned to the monastery and tearfully produced 200,000 dinars (about \$666) that the UDB had paid him for his vote. "I feel like Judas," he cried. He tried unsuccessfully to give the money away to his fellow monks

Four years after the partiarch had consolidated his hold on the church in Yugoslavia, the secret police turned their attention to the United States and began a backstage effort to oust the presiding authority, Bishop Dionisije. The FBI learned about the plot from a confidential source, whom we have now identified as an important UDB official. 

WHAT MAY be the semi-final round of negotiations on the treaty is now underway here, but lack of preparation of Congress for an eventual loss of U.S. control over the canal is definitely hurting the treaty's chances. Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker, the senior U.S. diplomat who began the negotiations in the Nixon administration, is highly regarded on Capitol Hill, but Mr. Carter's assignment of Sol Linowitz, a liberal, as his top man on the new treaty weakened the negotiations in the eyes of congressional conservatives, however unfairly.

A footnote: Mr. Carter surprised his congressional audience when he cited the attack on him by TASS, the Soviet news agency, the day before the White House session. The President said it proved that Moscow was "feeling the heat" from "world" criticism of its human rights violations. He carefully refrained from giving the Carter administration's human rights crusade any credit and said that soviet concern over its human rights violations had been achieved without any "internal interference" in Soviet affairs.

I'll discuss y our specific reading first. The 158 over 84 reading would be considered borderline or mildly hypertensive. More important is the sudden rise from the nice 136 over 80. which was well within normal. A variation of this kind can result from temporary anxieties or tensions in everyday living. I suggest you have further tests to determine how permanent this reading is

Now to the other parts of your letter. There are three kinds of strokes. One type can be caused by brain hemorrhage as a result of high blood pressure. Another type may be caused by an artery obstruction (deposits) which can be related to high cholesterol in the blood. A third type may result from a blood clot in an artery

Ordinary activity should do no narm but in light of your recently increased pressure strenuous exercise should be avoided, at least until you get a better fix on the blood pressure status. Your weight does not seem to be a problem, but salt should be avoided.

Your first order of business should be to follow up with further blood pressure readings to ease your mind and to get treatment if needed. Blood pressure such as yours can be easily controlled. You will find this subject covered in more depth than is possible in this space in my booklet, "How to Control Your Blood Pressure." The gland activity during pregnancy causes pigmentation on the body where it may never have appeared before (as in nipple color, for example). The skilled pediatrician can detect specific abnormalities quite early in life, when corrective surgery is most effective.

I hope you're getting your share of sympathy - retroactively. Thanks for the nice note. Pyelonephritis is a serious form of kidney infection.

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### Dead baby's mom enters guilty plea

NEWKIRK, Okla. (AP) -A plea of no contest has been entered by a 23-year-old Texas woman, charged with misdemeanors in connection with the discovery of an infant's body in a trash can near Tonkawa a week earlier

District Court Judge Lowell Doggett gave Susan Thomas, 23, of Nocona, Tex., a two-year deferred sentence with supervised probation.

The woman appeared with her father in Kay County District Court and entered the pleas to charges of neglect of burial and concealing the death of a child, said Dist. Atty. Joe Wideman.

She had been brought back to Oklahoma after waiving extradition from Minnesota where she had gone following the birth of her baby June 4, Wideman said.

The mother was also ordered to pay triple damages for the cost of burial, amounting to \$450, obtain a delayed birth and death certificate and erect a suitable marker for the infant's grave in Tonkawa.

Wideman said it was apparent from doctor's reports that the child died minutes after birth of a blood clot in the head caused by trauma during natural childbirth.

The woman had been treatment at a under hospital in Waseca, Minn., for severe infections which set in after the baby boy was born at a Pauls Valley motel, Wideman said.

Wideman said the woman had just finished school and had been on her way to a friend's home in Minnesota to have her baby when she stopped at the motel in Pauls Valley

The district attorney said the woman panicked after the baby died and disposed of the body in a trash can at a rest area near Tonkawa. A truck driver found the body the next day.

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

#### 'Shipwreck'

#### sites searched

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Tex. (AP) - State archeologists are out in strength this summer, searching the sea bottom for shipwrecks, probably remnants of ships that went down in the last century

Twenty to 30 possible shipwreck sites are under examination near the point where Laguna Madre empties into the Gulf of Mexico, says Barto Arnold.

Arnold is director of the Texas Antiquities Committee's Underwater Archeological Research Section.

Fifteen professional and student archeologists are at work under his supervision in the TAC's summer operation, which began June 1 and continues through mid-August.

A machine sucks in clear water from the surface and shoots it at the selected location on the sea bottom, gently cleaning an area from 10 to 30 feet across. Divers then work the area in 30-to 45-minute shifts. They bring up the small objects and attach bouys to the heavy ones, which will be raised by lifting machinery.

Sites were located with magnetometers that register the presence of metal.

The initial summer projects focused on a 1554 Spanish shipwreck.

This year, Arnold says he believes the sites "may be found to represent 19th Century Anglo shipwrecks.'

### Midland swimmers set World records MIDLAND, Tex. (AP) - Seven members of the City

of Midland swim team swam a total of 436 miles, 900 yards in seven days to set a new world swimming endurance record.

The week-long swimming session ended Monday with four new world swimming endurance records. No member of the seven-man relay team slept more than a total of 28 hours during the marathon that set the new Guiness Book of World Records marks.

The seven days in the water earned the team a record for the longest time swimming by a relay team, breaking the old mark by 24 hours, coach Doug Ingram said

The team also set new speed marks for the 100-mile and 300-mile swim and a record for the longest distance covered by a relay team in a 24-hour period - more than 70 miles.

The team got help from 13 other team members in setting the 100-mile record, but established the others

The Expos scored three runs in the fifth inning off Houston starter and loser Mark Lemongello,1-10, on runscoring singles by Tony Perez and Andre Dawson and a sacrifice fly by Gary Carter.

Lemongello's loss made him the first pitcher in the National League to lose 10 games this season

"All the time I worry when I pitch," said Alcala, who came to the Expos after the season started from Cincinnati. "Tonight I just said, if you beat me you have to hit my fast ball and I didn't worry. I relaxed and just pitched.

Kerrigan, pitching in his fourth game in three nights. preserved Alcala's victory after loading the bases. He struck out Howe on an outside pitch "that sank pretty good and he went for it.

"The three and one pitch to Boswell was the toughest pitch of the game," Kerrigan said. "I thought he would take it. It was a borderline pitch. It could have gone either

But for Alcala, the evening was a double pleasure "Tonight it was two happy times," he said.


