Green to file another libel suit

ODESSA — Ector County District Attorney John Green told The San Angelo Standard late Tuesday he will file a \$4.5 million libel and slander suit against the Odessa American this

The suit would be the second one Green has filed. The first, for \$3.5 million, was filed May 12.

Green said this suit is the result of a story run by the Odessa American Tuesday in only part of that paper's "Permian Edition", the early issue of the paper sent to out-of-town sub-

The story was deleted from later copies of that same edition and did not run in the "Home Edition" of Tuesday's publication.

The story reported details of a federal court petition filed by LeRoy Lafoon, a prisoner serving a life sentence in Texas Department of Corrections for murder. The petition was filed in federal court in Midland. The petition, Green said, "accuses

me of conspiracy to commit murder." Green said he had been contacted by several persons saying that the story had run. He did not know about the petition or the story until being contacted, he said.

But, several people brought him information on the plea and copies of the paper since the early edition "hit the street," he said.

"I have not been served with any

pleading," Green reported.

The Odessa American reported that court records in Midland indicated that the service in the suit, filed last week, had not been completed by the U.S. marshal's office.

"I did not know what they (people contacting him concerning the story) were taking about since I had received no pleas," Green said. "I read about it in the paper.

The plea was filed in the federal court last week. Green indicated the possibility of a connection between Lafoon and Johnny Meadows, also serving a life sentence for murder.

"I don't know the man who made the plea," Green said. "I have never spoken to him, seen him, or met him. I haven't even visited the jail and I don't even talk to prisoners here. Green said he had found out about

Lafoon after the story ran and "a man who is convicted of beating a girl to death is accusing me of conspiracy to commit murder "I get sued like this every day,

With legislative term

Farabee, Ezzell basically satisfied

AUSTIN — For the two legislators who represent Big Spring the recently completed 1977 session was marked by big successes and big disappointments.

Sen. Ray Farabee and Rep. Mike Ezzell joined everyone in disappointment that school finance legislation got hung up and will require a special session. And they suffered some personal setbacks in their particular legislative programs,

But basically they expressed a satisfaction with the way things went for them during the past five months.

"Overall I think it has been a good session." Farabee said a few days before the session ended. His view darkened a bit by the time final adjustment came, however.

The final hours saw a medical malpractice bill that he didn't like be approved, the tax relief on utilities he supported die and education financing left hanging.

Farabee played a major role in the medical malpractice fight throughout the session. He had success in his own chamber but was unhappy with provisions demanded by the House of Representatives — provisions he thinks weaken the bill.

"I'm disappointed we didn't make more substantial progress on the medical malpractice question," Farabee said.

Another disappointment was rejection of his proposal for appointment of appellate court judges instead

He can point with pride, however, to legislative approval of his "living will" proposal. That bill will allow a person to legally provide that he or she not be kept alive by artificial means when there is no hope for

He also got through legislation tightening regulation of public grain warehouses. He said this will give

complishment was passage of the Mentally Retarded Persons Act, which he sponsored in the House. It has been referred to as the "mentally retarded person's bill of rights." Ezzell said the bill allows the

Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation to write rules to protect the mentally retarded from exploitation and abuse in state facilities. The new law also makes it illegal for a landlord to turn down a person looking for an abode simply because he or she is retarded.

"What it means is that these are rights that belong to every citizen and should not be denied to these people simply because they are retarded,'

His biggest disappointment of the

session was his failure to pass a bill providing protective services for the elderly. The bill would have allowed the Department of Public Welfare to inspect living conditions of elderly citizens in response to reports of physical and mental abuse or neglect.

Ezzell thinks on the whole the legislature — and in particular the House - handled a number of controversial subjects in a creditable manner. He blames the Senate for delaying up passage of medical malpractice and school finance

In a pre-session poll by the Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau, Ezzell listed school finance as the number one item for legislative action, with highway funding second. The latter got early approval by the legislature, with Ezzell's strong support.

Both Farabee and Ezzell had creditable records in passing legislation this term. Farabee introduced 26 bills and two joint resolutions. He passed 20 bills and one of the resolutions. Three of the eight bills that failed were dropped in favor of similar or like bills. The Senator

passed bills in the Senate and got approval for every one.

Eight of the bills he introduced dealt only with local matters and thus were easily passed.

Ezzell introduced 11 bills and got six passed. Two that failed were replaced by similar or like bills. Only two of his bills were strictly local in nature.

There is always a tendency to measure effectiveness of a legislator only in terms of pieces of legislation passed. Effectiveness can't be measured in such a finite manner, however. It also includes the ability to kill undersirable legislation and work on amendments in committee, and these actions go unrecorded in records available for analysis.

Both Farabee and Ezzell are looked upon by the leadership of their legislative houses as members of "the

This acceptance gained Farabee a place on the powerful Finance Committee as well as seats on the Jurisprudence and Natural Resources committees.

A seat on the Finance Committee is highly desirable in the Senate because that is where Senate priorities on spending billions of state dollars are set.


Farabee said his principal disappointment in the area of finance was the failure to get special help for Big Spring to compensate for the economic impact of Webb Air Force Base closing. An attorney general's opinion said such compensation was

not possible. Ezzell got seats on the Administration, Health and Welfare and Judiciary Committees in the House. He was the first representative designated by the House leadership to sponsor major cuts in the appropriations bills on the House floor. He also drew appointment to the medical malpractice conference committees as did Farabee.

Twiggy, 27, and Whitney, a 42-year-old American actor, were married Tuesday in a civil ceremony in this well-heeled suburb on the River Thames.

About 30 colleagues and show business guests helped keep the wedding private, fending off reporters and photographers who turned up at the registry office when word of the marriage leaked

Twiggy, whose real name was Lesley Hornby, was formerly engaged to her agent, Justin de Villeneuve, a former hairdresser and son of a London bricklayer who changed his name from

De Villeneuve guided the skinny teenager to fame in the 1960s. She later starred in the movie, "The Boy Friend," and took up singing.

She and de Villeneuve broke up in 1973 after she met Whitney. De Villeneuve married American model Jan Ward in 1975.

painfully and personally aware of what the planners mean by predicting shortages. Recently, the federal government added 46 West Texas counties to its list of emergency drought areas qualified for federal aid.

Most of the droughtplagued counties fall in the Texas High Plains, the agriculturily-productive Panhandle region likely to be hit hardest and fastest by water shortages. The rest are spread throughout the West Texas area.

TWDB director James M. Rose has a grim prediction for West Texas over the next half century: everything west of Dallas is going to come up short of water. The High Plains will be

hard-hit. especially Estimates show the grain sorghum, cotton-cattle rich area will need seven million acre-feet of water a year more than it will have available by 2030.

Thus the High Plains is the prime impetus and will be the prime beneficiary, of the most ambitious and con-

Three Croatians captured after shooting guard

Yugoslavian government expected an attack on its Fifth Avenue United Nations mission and had warned U.S. authorities, the Yugoslavian U.N. ambassador says.

Three armed Croatians seized an office in the mission Tuesday afternoon after shooting a security guard. They were believed to be members of the same group which hijacked a Chicago-bound airplane to Europe last year and planted a bomb that killed a police

for several hours. One of them apparently used a highpitched voice to convince an officer they had a female hostage, but they were alone

The Croatians vowed to die for their cause but surrendered after hearing a radio report that their demands had been presented to U.N. Secretary General Kurt

Yugoslav U.N. am-bassador Jaksa Petric said in a statement his government had "had very strong indications" that some sort of terrorist action would be taken against the mission this week, timed to precede an international conference starting today in Belgrade.

Petric charged that "this is one more act committed by fascist terrorist groups whose activity has been tolerated on the soil of the United States for many years.

He said his country had They barricaded the office repeatedly warned U.S. officials of such activity and "on the very eve of the attack, we again warned them of the danger of a repetition of terrorist acts."

The ambassador did not say what American officials had received the warning except that it was not the local police. The city has mounted a 24-

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — heir to the Reynolds Metals Former Lt. Gov. Henry Howell and Charles Robb, Del. Ira Lechner. son-in-law of the late President Lyndon Johnson, will head the Democratic ticket in Virginia's elections

Howell, 56, won the nomination for governor over former Atty. Gen. Andrew Miller, 44, by about the same margin he lost the governor's race in 1973.

Nearly complete vote totals in the governor's race gave Howell 253,681 and Miller 240.058

Robb, a 37-year-old attorney from McLean in northern Virginia, had a nearly 30,000-vote edge over his mearest opponent in his first bid for public office.

With 99 per cent of the precincts accounted for, Robb had 185,511 votes, compared to 156,119 for state Del. Richard Reynolds III, mother-in-law, Lady Bird.

State Del. Edward Lane of Richmond easily won a fourway race for the nomination for attorney general.





Beware the quack clinic

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I was very happy to read your article about "cleansing the system." I have discovered the biggest and most dangerous con artist in this country.

I all began about two months ago when we learned my mother-in-law, who had a mastectomy, now has cancer in the hip and right leg. My father-in-law heard about this practitioner who runs a facility and takes so-called tests involving the saliva and urine of the patient. This tells him if a person has a certain illness, where it is located and — get this — if he is on the verge of getting a disease or condition.

Much against our protests they made arrangements for the \$400-aweek per person fee and went to this clinic. They met hundreds of people there from all over, some with cancer, some diabetes, others with such conditions as hypertension, hypoglycemia, colitis, and so on. Treatments consisted of fasting for three days and drinking lemon juice and water every half hour, colonic enemas, etc. Then there was a diet of nothing but vegetables, celery, fruit, celery and carrot juice, and various

He also tells the people such things as that soap robs your body of vitamin C, and aspirins make you lose six teaspoonfuls of blood every time you take them, also that cookies cause polio in children, and so on.

After three weeks ther my in-laws now argue about the use of chemotherapy for cancer. They are convinced they are doing the right thing by following this clinic's advice. It's a very sad situation. My motherin-law claims she feels good except she still has pain in her lower spine, hip, and leg. She can hardly walk on the leg. The clinic says this is normal, "poisons" are leaving her

My mother-in-law greatly respects your opinion, and she reads your column faithfully. Is this man giving false hope to people and robbing them of their life's blood? Please comment.

Your last question expresses my views on the matter. I would add that this nonsense is also keeping them from proper medical attention they apparently do need.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am a nervous person and I find that, when I rush and severe cramps and diarrhea. I had a GI series and all came back negative except for a slight diverticulosis. Could a nervous system cause this? It doesn't happen too often.I am 51. -Mrs. M.D.P

You've diagnosed your own problem, so why not act on that? I suggest you begin your meal by relaxing over a glass of milk or whatever beverage you prefer. Tension and "nerves" are more your problem than mild diverticulosis. Nerves do not cause diverticulosis it is fairly common at your age.

Dear Dr.: Do you recommend use of sugar to help cure bedsores? - R.E.

Sugar (grandulated) apparently causes tissue changes that can bring healing in some cases. It is an oldfashioned remedy, but there's nothing wrong with old-fashioned remedies if they work. You sprinkle it on the sore and cover with a tight sterile bandage. Daily application is suggested.

Finally it was my 16th birthday, and it was my turn to take into my own hands the wheel of a car and establish

myself on official paper. It was a fairly simple ordeal; taking the drivers education courses, passing the driving examination, and finally, after proving my age with a birth certificate, and my identification with a Social Security number, I received the document which granted me the right to drive a car in the United

NOT ONLY did the slip of paper, signed by the registrar of motor vehicles in Ohio, give me the right to drive, but, in a couple of years, gave me access to many thrills that without proof of age were previously denied

I was a cinch, flash the slip of paper and I was instantly permitted to enter an X-rated theatre, enjoy 3.2 beer, open several bank accounts, write dozens of checks, and even manage to break the law a couple of times with traffic citiations.

What a wonderful world the identification qualities of the drivers license opened up. There I was, substantiated in official black and white; my Social Security number tucked up in one corner, and birthdaye inscribed across the center, with a complete discription of my physical characteristics in typed detail along the bottom.

Soon, most everything I did required at least a flash of the document. The Schoalastic Achievement Tests, those absurd mind benders once believed to be an indication of one's overall knowledge of everything, were compulsory material for those who were college bound, and required a positive identification in the form of a Social Security number.

Positive identification was required to enter college, and to hold down jobs during the school year and in the summer, and eventually to receive the certificate of graduation.

And finally the old S.S. number was needed in Big Spring to validate my existence to a couple of banks, my employer, and the credit union from which I borrowed a couple hundred dollars.

Everything seemed okay up until today. I had established an identity as Bill Werrell, holding down a job as S.S. number 521-24-0871 (the same as my Ohio driver's license) and even, (admittedly needing a reminder from mom and dad at times) making my own living.

AND THEN the letter arrived at my home from the IRS. It was addressed to James M. and Eloise G. Werrell, (my parents) but the postal address was correct. Never believing for a moment that I could owe anyone that much money, I finally came to the alarming conclusion that the Social Security number I had always assumed was mine, was actually my

How strange it must have seemed to the Social Security department, that my father (S.S. 521-24-0871), all the time a fairly successful stock broker. managed to go back and get another B.A. degree, delivered papers, and worked summers as a trash man - all at the same time.

Not only was he able to get an education while working full time as a stock broker, and recently a newspaper reporter, but he was able to establish residences in Ohio, and Texas at the same time, working 40 hour weeks in both places.

WASHINGTON — The president's pollster, Patrick Caddell, apparently has been granted his own personal patronage. He interviewed the candidate for census director and then recommended that the appointment, go to one of his commercial clients.

With Caddell's endorsement, the prestigious post was awarded to Manuel Plotkin, a top Sears Roebuck executive. The company was an early subscriber to Caddell's \$20,000-a-year polling service. And it was none other than Plotkin, as the company's reasearch director, who urged Sears

THE BRILLANT, 27-year-old pollster told us he had undertaken the search at the request of the White House. He said he recommended Plotikin for the census post after interviewing half a dozen candidates. Applicants were told by a transition official: "Pat Caddell's handling that

one."
The Census Bureau falls under the urisdiction of the Commerce Dept. Yet the department's top officials never spoke to Plotkin until Caddell had already selected him for the job. As Caddell recalled it, he mentioned about six prospects to Commerce officials and told them: "You might as well start with Plotkin; I think he's

Plotkin was then interviewed by Commerce Secretary Juanita Kreps and other department bigwigs. "Plotkin was Caddell's recommendation," one high official told us. By the time the secretary interviewed him, he was pretty well chosen."

The pollster was more modest. "I helped with the search," he conceded, 'but it was their decision.'

He told us that he met with Plotkin every few months to discuss his



High hopes for recovery dashed by death

DALLAS (AP) - Hopes ran high this past weekend for Dallasite Julie Lavvorn and her family. The 19-yearold mother of two, stricken with a deadly form of anemia, was in Los Angeles for a bone marrow transplant that might help her beat the odds.

But late Monday, eight days before the scheduled surgery, the disease won. She died in the Los Angeles hospital. Physicians a brain suspected hemorrhage caused her

death. Mrs. Lavvorn's mother and two of her sisters had made the trip with her. One sister was to be the donor in the marrow transplant and the other was to donate blood.

The young mother had said she was "going to fight this thing through" in hopes of seeing her two children go to

The aplastic anemia she was stricken with caused the marrow in her bones to stop producing necessary blood components. Doctors had told her she had only a 30 per cent chance of survival.

GI loans at record pace

Wide interest in GI home loans continued at a record pace in March, Jack Coker, Director, VA Regional Office in Waco, has revealed.

VA received 71,136 appraisal requests in March, the highest monthly total in nearly 21 years. The March 1977 figure was 22 per cent higher than February's and 12 per cent above the March 1976 totals. A VA appraisal of a house is the first step to applying for a VA guaranteed loan.

March's heavy volume pushed the total appraisal requests received for the first half of fiscal year 1977 to 328,608. This is 15 per cent higher than the same period a year ago.

Applications for GI home loans also reflected the surge. VA received 40,979 applications in March, 35 per cent above February and 16 per cent higher than a year

Loan applications during the first half of FY 1977 totaled 205,256, 22 per cent over the same six months a year ago.

VA loan guaranty officials attribute some of the new business to a 1975 law that eased GI loan eligibility.

Prior to January 1, 1975, a veteran who had once used his GI loan eligibility could have it restored only under special circumstances

VA had to be relieved of liability and the property had to have been disposed of for "compelling reasons," Coker said

Congress removed the "compelling reasons" restrictions, allowing en-titlement to be restored if the property has been disposed of and the loan satisfied. This means most veterans with service since September 19, 1940, are potentially eligible for a GI loan.

The law also provided the original veteran's liability be removed automatically and eligibility restored if another veteran purchases the property and substitutes his VA loan eligibility for that of the seller.

Since June 22, 1944, more than 9.5 million veterans and service members have borrowed \$129 billion under the VA loan guaranty program. The VA guarantees a loan up to 60 per cent or a maximum of \$17,500.



None caused detonation of a nuclear weapon, SIPRI said. But some released large amounts of radiation, it reported.

\$12 Million Katy loan guarantee

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Federal Railroad Administration today awarded a \$12-million loan guarantee to the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad to improve 154 miles of track in Texas and Oklahoma.

The guarantee is the first to be approved as part of a \$400 million program under the Railroad Revitalization and Regulatory Reform Act

In signing the agreement, Transportation Secretary Brock Adams said it "signifies both my personal commitment and the dedication of the Department of Transportation to carrying out major rail improvement programs.

Also signing were Bruce Flohr, deputy administrator of the railroad administration, and Reginald N. Whitman, chairman of the board and president of the railroad.

The funds will be used for improvements along the main line tracks and sidings between Durant, Okla., and Whiteboro, Tex., and between Fort Worth and Waco,

Three other railroads have loan guarantee applications pending.

They include: Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad Co., \$17.7 million, and the Chicago and North Western Transportation Co., \$16 million. The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad Co. has two applications, one for \$81 million and another for \$7.2



tobacco lobby wants smokers to fight.

The airline will guarantee a "nonsmoking" seat for any passenger who requests it, even if it means banning smoking in part or all of the smoking section. The move comes as part of

settlement with antismoking groups that may industry-wide set an precedent.

Eastern also agreed to pay a \$10,000 fine for denying passengers seating in nonsmoking areas.

Tom Seaver has found somebody who wants him. The fans. The teams he says he'd like to go to don't want him, at least not at a fair-value price, but the Mets fans do.

They rocked Shea Stadium with shouts of "See-ver See-ver" while he blanked the well-muscled Reds the other night, and when it was flashed onto the scoreboard that he had just passed Sandy Koufax in career K's they held up the game for three minutes or so by standing up and pounding their hands together, while the next batter deferentially stood outside the box, bat on shoulder, and Tom Terrific stood behind the pitching rubber, soaking up the adulation.

There couldn't have been a more ironic touch. The next batter, the man kept waiting, was George Foster. Seaver fanned him, too.

It was George Foster the Mets wanted if they were to give up Seaver. It was George Foster, outfielder, .300hitter, 100-plus ribby man, MVP, the Reds wouldn't give

The Mets had a second choice, Ken Griffey, .336-hitter, near batting champ, beaten out of it on the final day by Bill Madlock. Again the Reds said no.

'Why?" Why wouldn't you take the best pitcher in baseball for Foster or Griffey?" Sparky Anderson was

"Let's put this in the proper perspective," he said. "One guy goes once every fifth day. The hitter goes every day?" This is not any starter," I said. "This is Tom Seaver. For years, you have been telling me how great he is."

"Even a great starter like that goes to the post 38 or 40 times. There is no pitcher living who is worth as much as a good, regular ballplayer.''
"Not even for Griffey?'' "Maybe I'm wrong, but I think

Griffey is going to be the best player in America in two years," said Sparky Anderson.

Sparky Anderson is the manager of the Reds, and a dandy. In the Cincy scheme of things, the manager runs the team on the field and has very little else to say

Hill calls televised executions 'nonsense

Atty. Gen. John Hill says televised executions would "utter nonsense", but Dallas attorney Tom McCorkle argues that the banning of TV cameras from the death chamber is restriction on the freedom of 'the electronic media.'

A three-judge federal court panel heard arguments in Houston Tuesday on whether an execution in Texas can be filmed by television and shown to home

Hill told the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals judges that the state has the right to prevent a return of public executions. Public hangings once was a form of entertainment. But now





Conviction overturned

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals today overturned a 30-year sentence for burglary because it found that a 1967 conviction considered in setting the sentence was void.

The conviction and sentence assessed Harold Henderson in Potter County were reversed and the case was returned to the county for possible prosecution.

The appeals court said that the record reflects that Henderson pled guilty to burglary in 1961 and was placed on probation, which was subsequently revoked. It noted, however, that Henderson had not been represented by a lawyer.

In 1967 Henderson was found guilty of burglary, and the 1961 conviction was used to enhance his sentence.

On Henderson's motion, the court held a hearing and wiped out the 1961 conviction, but denied his motion to strike the 1967 conviction, which was used in setting the 30-year sen-

The court repeated an earlier ruling that, "No part of the (1967) conviction can stand because of lack of counsel in one of the prior



Camp's safety factors Ridin' fenceshould be checked out

The state health department licenses more than 700 youth camps in Texas. Church camps, day camps and similar facilities all should be inspected by the state but parents themselves need to be aware of certain safety factors, the Texas Medical Association says.

The law says camps should be inspected often but it is difficult for health inspectors to regularly visit all camps. Parents themselves should look for violations and encourage children to report problems. Here are a few of the almost 75 regulations to watch for

-Each youth camp must be under the direction of a qualified adult with at least two years experience working with children. All recreational activities must be supervised directly by a qualified adult.

-There must be one adult supervisor for each 10 —At least two people, including one trained lifeguard, must be on duty when children are using a camp swimming pool. Staff "engage recreational boating or swimming" while they are on duty, state regulations

-A physician, nurse or person with a Red Cross Advanced First Aid Certificate or its equivalent must be in camp at all times. -Every child 12 years of age and under must wear a

watercraft. Some of the regulations do not apply to certain camps but violations that endanger children could indicate a lax attitude that possibly would let other injuries occur. Camp dangers should be reported to the General Sanitation Division, Texas Department of Health






