Youth admits setting fatal jail fire

COLUMBIA, Tenn. (AP) - A youth who admitted setting a jail fire that killed 42 persons had twice been taken into custody in Wisconsin in connection with arson or a threat of arson, authorities said today.

Andrew Zinmer, 16, was taken to a Nashville hospital in critical condition Sunday after a fire in his foam-rubber padded cell at the Maury County Jail unleashed toxic fumes that killed 34 inmates and eight visitors.

Maury County Dist. Atty. Gen. Robert H. Gay said he planned to charge Zinmer with arson and would ask to have him tried as an adult.

Roy Martinson, police chief in Superior, Wis., said authorities had first picked up Zinmer on Feb. 28, 1975, in connection with a fire at the Board of Trade Building. Martinson said Zinmer did not admit setting the fire and was referred to a guidance clinic in Superior after the incident.

Martinson said the last contact police had with the youth was on June 17, 1976, in connection with a threat of arson. At that time he was taken to a home for problem children, the chief

Attempts to rescue the victims of Sunday's fire were hampered when a deputy sheriff carrying keys to the jail's 12 cells collided with fleeing visitors. He dropped the keys on the floor and was unable to find them for

about 12 minutes, officials said. One husband and wife, who both were prisoners, died in the fire along with his visiting parents and sister. In another family tragedy, a prisoner

Petrochemical plants forced out?

NEW YORK (AP) - President Carter's energy proposal now before Congress includes a tax that would force much of the \$40 billion petrochemical industry out of the country, industry spokesmen warn.

And that would mean the loss of

many of the 390,000 American jobs now directly related to the industry, the spokesmen say.

Administration spokesmen refuse to comment directly on the industry threat. But they say the industry is going to be damaged anyway, if not by higher taxes — aimed at conservation - then by a scarcity of petroleum, the raw material petrochemicals. The policy does not 'attempt to appease one interest or another," a spokesman said. The main petrochemical-industry

Under the President's plan, the first tax, a \$3 levy, would bring prices up to the world level by 1980; the "user" tax applied primarily to the petrochemical industry — would start at 90 cents a barrel in 1979 and increase to \$3 by 1985.

the taxes, currently being considered by the House Ways and Means Committee, would increase "feedstock" costs from \$3 below world price levels now to \$3 above the levels by 1985. Feedstock is oil that is used as a raw material in a refinery or

petrochemical plant

"The question is: What do you do if you're non-competitive?" said Robert Mitchell, executive vice president of Celanese Corp. "The first thing is that we lose our export markets (\$10

sales). Then, the foreign competitor can compete in the U.S.

Officials said there are no plans to protect the industry by imposing quotas on imports of petrochemical products.

Q: With Webb closing and people leaving, which means a loss to tax revenue, how can raises be given to the police and firemen at this time? There is even talk that some city positions might have to be deleted. Is this true? Wouldn't it be better to keep the present positions intact than to raise pay for some and let others go? Wouldn't the tax payer have to bear the burden for such a move if these pay increases are voted in?

A: There are several questions. To answer the first one, raises can be given if approved by the city council. City Manager Harry Nagel said he has made no recomendation at this time and that there are no present funds available and that it would probably mean, along with other proposed projects, a raise in taxes. To answer the second question, the announcement earlier that some positions might have to be deleted in the city if Webb closes, that same announcement pointed out that police and firemen could not be cut back because there would be more empty houses to watch and possibly more fires in empty homes. The cuts would have to come in less necessary departments. No city official has decided at this point which would be best. And the question as to whether the tax payer would have to bear the expense, the answer is yes.



Fina is selling refinery in Mount Pleasant, Tex.

DALLAS - American Petrofina, Inc., and Dorchester Gas Corp., announced here today that they have executed a letter of intent for Dorchester to purchase Fina's Mt. Pleasant, Texas 26,000 B-D refinery and sublease, with a purchase option, an undivided one-half interest in a products pipeline from Mt. Pleasant to Grapevine, Texas. No marketing properties are involved in the trans-


The Mt. Pleasant refinery processes sour crude, and its product output consists of approximately 49 per cent gasoline, 29 per cent asphalt and 19 per cent diesel fuel. Its major facilities include a crude distillation unit, catalytic cracking unit, alkylation unit, hydrotreater, reformer, and a sulphur recovery unit. It will be operated by a wholly owned subsidiary of Dorchester.

The sale is subject to the approval of a definitive agreement by the boards of directors of both companies and to appropriate action by the Federal Energy Administration and will be effective when approvals have been obtained.

Fina stated that the sale of this refinery is part of a continuing overall facilities concentration and that the proceeds of the sale will assist its expansion and modernization program. It will continue to operate two other refineries in Texas with a combined capacity of almost 175,000 barrels a day. Fina is presently engaged in two principal lines of business: energy products, and petrochemicals and plastics; and is also engaged in exploration and production activities.

Acquisition of the Mt. Pleasant refinery marks Dorchester's entry into the crude oil refining business and is part of that company's overall expansion program. With operations in the United States, Canada and Turkey, it explores for and produces gas and oil, operates gathering systems, and processes natural gas in 8 gas processing plants.

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP) — President Carlos Andres Perez says he will ask President Carter in their talks this week to get Congress to lift tariff restrictions imposed on Venezuela for the Arab oil embargo in which it didn't participate. The U.S. trade act of 1974 penalized all members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries for the 1973 embargo on oil to the United States and Europe even though Venezuela, Iran and the other non-Arab members did not enforce the ban.

Texas reaps tax bonanza

AUSTIN - Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Friday that Texas recorded the largest increase of any state in sales tax collections last year, except for those states that increased their tax or broadened its base.

Spurred by increased consumer spending and intensified collection efforts, Texas sales tax collections totaled \$1.5 billion in calendar 1976, an 18.3 percent increase over 1975,

Bullock said. Bullock's report, which is contained in the Comptroller's June Financial Statement, is based on a nationwide study of consumer taxes by the Federal Tax Administration.

State revenues for April were \$582.8 million, bringing the fiscal year-to-date total to \$4.4 billion - up ten percent over the same period

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

Director's body stolen

FOREST PARK, Ill. (AP) The remains of movie producer Michael Todd were removed from his grave in a cemetery here sometime over the weekend and police are trying to contact his former wife, Elizabeth Taylor, to see if any ransom has been demanded

Forest Park police investigator Michael Thompson said Sunday that the rubber bag containing Todd's remains was discovered missing from his casket in Jewish Waldheim Cemetery after a woman visiting a nearby grave noticed that Todd's grave had been tampered with.

Todd, who was married to Miss Taylor at the time of his death, and three other men agreed to work on her were killed March 28, 1952 in a plane crash in the Zuni Mountains of western New Mexico.

Authorities knew of no motive in the case. But a spokesman said authorities are trying to contact Miss Taylor, 45, to learn if she has received any threats or demands for ransom.

Police said that someone had to dig about 41/2 feet to reach the casket and estimated that it probably took them several hours. Because of that, authorities have ruled out the possibility that youthful pranksters tampered with the grave, a

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Often, the most divisive force that communities face is the question of who does what at which financial institution

Big cities or small towns, they are sometimes ripped apart by this choosing of sides

It can be especially difficult in smaller towns where the personalities are naturally compressed more tightly than in a city.

I HAVE worked in one little Texas town that had only two banks. The entire town could be divided, and constantly was, by the question of loyalty to this bank or that People in town were often called a

"this banker" or a "that banker." The "this bankers" and the "that bankers" fought not only for business in the town but also for control of the local government and the money of virtually every civic organization.

So split was the town that community cooperation toward any goal was most difficult.

Fortunately, Big Spring is not in

that situation. The financial in-stitutions of our town can unite in pursuit of common goals for the community good.

But I think the danger of splitting a community apart along these lines is always present in a small town.

COMPETITION BETWEEN financial institutions is healthy. It makes the town more aggressive and

However, there comes a time when competition between any types of

businesses should be put aside temporarily for the welfare of the com-

A town's industrial effort, for example, is an endeavor which must be one of cooperation instead of competition.

In a city of the size of Big Spring, we do not have the power to pull in too many directions at once and get anywhere. We either row this ship together, or we sit listless and dead in

CAPE TOWN, South Africa Serious efforts by the ruling Nationalist party's more enlightened leaders to forestall disaster in South Africa are encountering intransigence from party stalwarts and disdain from Washington, building a sense of future tragedy that hovers over this

What is being cautiously advanced by Verligte (enlightened) Afrikaaners would have surprised and pleased the world five years ago: gradual dismantling of apartheid, the institutionalized racial discrimination established by the Nationalists when they gained power in 1948. Beyond that, the Verligtes want to give the country's non-white majority a bigger piece of the economic pie and, ultimately, a slice of political power.

BUT MILITANT blacks here and the Third World-Communist coalition dominating the United Nations reject anything short of strict majority rule - an inflexible closing of the door to moderation apparently concurred in by the Carter administration. The (intractable) Verkrampte Afrikaaners cite this as proof that since only the suicide of white South Africa will satisfy the Americans, why not go into the laager (armed camp)

Certainly, the official U.S. position here belittles the government's hesitant reduction of racial preferences. But a minority view at the American embassy, objecting to Washington's new line, believes these tentative first steps — though largely superficial - ought to be applauded, while further steps are urged.

Pervasive whites — only signs are beginning to come down, most notably in post offices. Regular black vs. white boxing and wrestling marks the beginning of interracial athletics. The country was amazed by a recent announcement that the University of Stellenbosch, intellectual bastion of Afrikaanerdom, is being opened to non-whites on a very limited basis.

STILL MORE hesitant is relaxation of economic preferences. The Old Nationalist pledge that a white man need never take orders from a Kaffir (black) is violated by a few nonwhites quietly given supervisory positions. Interior minister Connie Mulder, a conservative and perhaps the next prime minister, told us racial wage discrimination must cease. More government money is planned to improve living conditions of urban

Even Verkrampte politicians grudgingly acknowledge the need for much of these social and economic changes. It is the question of political participation by non-whites that threatens 29 years of Nationalist party monolithic unity

Dr. Piet Koornhof, the ebullient, English-educated minister of education, is the most daring of Verligte Afrikaaners. He scandalized the orthodox recently by calling for shared decision-making with not only Coloreds (mixed-blood) and Indians but also urban blacks. In a two-hour conversation with us, Koornhof admitted political change should be faster than is expected, while confessing that a formula for such change is not in sight and will be a long time coming - perhaps too long.

THE MAJOR reason for delay is the dominant thinking within the government. Koornhof's suggestion for shared decision-making was repudiated by one cabinet colleague after another (including Dr. Mulder) - but not by the new foreign minister, R.F. (Pik) Botha. Although publicly silent, Botha privately supports Koornhof. Charismatic, flamboyant and probably the first South African politician to use television effectively, Botha is viewed by realistically liberal businessmen as the best hope for the future.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am 73 years old and have been active all my life. About six months ago I began to feel tired in the calf of my left leg after climbing hills. About two months ago it got worse. After walking about 100 yards I have to stop and rest

The doctor suggests a bypass of the artery. He thinks it is a circulation problem. What is the history of this operation? Is it lasting? Does it allow full use of the leg? And are there any Complications? — J.W.

Congratulations on your 73-year-The symptoms you describe add up

to what is called "claudication" pain in the leg that comes on with exercise and is relieved with rest. The cause is insufficient oxygen to nourish the leg muscles when they are called on to do extra work. The insufficiency is caused by blockage in the specific artery serving the area.

The bypass operation, which has been quite successful in relieving such symptoms, allows blood to circumvent the blocked vessel. One can never be definite about such matters. but generally patients can usually expect years of help from the bypass.

If the new vessel graft is successful (and techniques have improved immensely in recent years) you can expect full use of your leg. You ask about complications. There can be complications with any surgery, but if you need it and are in good general health and considered a good risk, then I'd say go ahead with it.

Such surgery might not be advisable for another man of you age, one who has not been as active as you obviously are (climbing hills at 73). You may be the type who would wither on the vine if suddenly forced into inactivity.

Whatever your decision, I wish you the best of health, and good climbing. Dear Dr. Thosteson: My daughter, who is three, has diarrhea once a week when she comes back from seeing her father. "These are men who have legitimate doctorates recognized universities, who have publicly conducted research into ESP. The most well known of these is Dr. J.B. Rhine, formerly of Duke University, who conducted and compounded simple statistical probability card tests for some thirty

"To his satisfaction, he proved statistically that ESP is fact. His results are looked upon dubiously and for the most part unacceptably by the majority of psychologists and psychiatrists in the United States.

"THERE ARE OTHERS in the same category. Andrija Puharich, J. G. Pratt, Robert Crookall, Hornell Hart, Gardner Murphy all come under this classification. If you are a member, these are familiar names."

The preceding quotes were taken from Robert A. Monroe's "Journeys Out of the Body." Monroe, in his modest way, could not include his name among the hierarchy in the psychic circle, but he will be placed among those pioneers before long.

Monroe realistically states that the mass underground looks to the professionals for information and guidance, and gives them something akin to hero worship.

The "Professionals" are those who have written books, organized a foundation, conducted research, had a major experience, studied with a great professional, gives psychic readings, conducts class in mind and - or soul development, heals by faith, is an accredited astrologer, minister of Divine Science or Spritualism, trance medium, outer-space saucer

devotee or hypnotist.

Monroe reports that all or part of the professionals' income derives from their psychic activity. "Many have deep professional jealousy for each other, and often are inclined to be suspicious of techniques and theories propounded outside their particular activity. They may even subtly deride or look with tolerant, superior amusement at results unrelated to their specialty," the author suggests.

AT LEAST 50 new underground books are published each year, many by the professionals, others by people such as Monroe.

The money involved in the psychic circle no doubt makes some people . the non-believers. "Another

rip-off of those poor fools," many people say. But contrary to what one might expect, Monroe states, the mass of this underground is not merely a

'conglomerate of silly, uneducated, superstitious, unreasoning misfits. 'True," Monroe continues, some of the like are included, but at no greater percentage than is found in the general population. As a matter of fact, if it could be surveyed, it is quite probable that their average IQ would

be far above that of a general cross

section of Western humanity.' The common bond or cause that draws them together is simple, so states Monroe. "All have a belief that (1) man's Inner Self is neither understood nor full expressed in our contemporary society; and (2) this Inner Self has capabilities to act and perform mentally and materially to a degree unknown and unrecognized by

WASHINGTON — Shortly after Los Angeles Times correspondent Robert Toth was arrested and harrassed by the Soviet KGB in Moscow, one of our own reporters was picked up by the Hungarian police outside Budapest, escorted to a police station and interrogated about his news work.

Michael Viner and his actressmodel wife, Deborah Raffin, were detained and questioned for seven hours. Their passports, camera and private notes were seized by the

The couple was accused falsely of taking unauthorized pictures of a military truck. Indeed, Deborah had pointed her camera at a nearby road but had snapped no pictures. It is possible, therefore, that the police mistakenly thought she had photographed the truck.

YET A STRAY truck is hardly a secret weapon that must be hidden from the West. The incident was also the first of its kind in the memory of diplomats, whose experience goes back for years. And strangely, two carloads of policemen materialized at the scene.

Later, it became clear from the questioning that the police not only had been keeping a close watch on Viner throughout his stay in Hungary but was fully aware of his reporting activities. At one point, an interrogator demanded harshly: "Why s Jack Anderson interested in

It may also be significant that the incident immediately followed Toth's ordeal in Moscow. Toth's chilling encounter with the KGB was taken in Washington as another blunt signal that Moscow is displeased with President Carter's human right campaign. This Kremlin attitude, presumably, has not gone unnoticed in the eastern European satellites. Viner is our Hollywood reporter,


who also sends us dispatches from overseas when he is traveling. He recently provided us with first-hand accounts of the political turmoil in India. In Yugoslavia and Hungary, he was doing similar research for us.

He put through an emergency call to us after the first of two sessions with the Hungarian police. We made a number of phone calls to Budapest. From Viner and diplomatic sources, here are the details of his experience:

VINER AND HIS actress-wife were apprehended in the outskirts of Budapest by an armed motorcycle policeman, who menacingly opened his holster to free the pistol. The pair was ordered to hand over their passports and the camera.

Then the policeman signalled the eight men who apparently had been trailing Viner. The strange caravan proceeded to local police station where a series of mysterious phone conversations were held. Eventually, a slovenly man appeared and introduced himself as the interpreter. "You may be in serious trouble," he

began ominously. This was followed by four hours of grueling interrogation. Then the couple was permitted to return to their hotel, under virtual house arrest, until the following morning.



Court on abortion

York Times editorial, that the Supreme Court of the United States had just voted, 6-3, to authorize the spending of public money on concentration camps. The sheer hysteria with which the Court's abortion decision is being met by this tuning fork of eastern seaboard liberalism sometimes makes the impious wonder where was abortion when we needed it

People should calm down and listen carefully to the facts of the matter. 1. Do we believe in selfgovernment? The answer is of course, yes.

2. Do we believe that constituted political authorities — for instance, the state of Connecticut, the state of Pennsylvania, the city of St. Louis should decide how to spend tax

THE ANSWER is a qualified yes. It is a routine exercise in political democracy to take funds from the entire community for the benefit of certain members of the community for specified social purposes. There is often disagreement about what social purposes are desired, and in some cases there are constitutional prohibitions. A community cannot, for example, declare that education in the dogmas of Christianity can be subsidized by public funds. Public funds can be used to buy electric chairs, but people who occupy them are selected by a different process.

3. Along comes abortion, and the political entities listed above decide that elective abortion is something public money will not be used to subsidize. That would seem to be a decision entirely within the competence of the respective jurisdictions of Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and St. Louis: and that is all the Supreme Court said. The abortion-hungry press has transmuted the Supreme Court decision of 1973 (which was bad enough as it stood) into something entirely different. An analogue is Brown vs. Board of

Education. In that decision, the Court ruled in 1954 that no state could discriminate in education based on race. Before long every state was being urged to discriminate in education based on race - only they call it affirmative action.

In the abortion decision of 1973, the Court said that no state could forbid abortion. That decision was transformed, by the abortion lobby, into an obligation by the states - and the federal government — to subsidize abortion.

Hope for paralysis remedy Waldrep hopes for freedom in USSR

FORT WORTH (AP) -Former Texas Christian University running back Kent Waldrep, paralyzed since a 1974 football injury, hopes there is more freedom of movement behind the Iron Curtain - for his withered

Waldrep, who suffered the spinal cord injury in a game chance to walk again if he can get to Lenningrad, Russia, where Soviet scientists are using experimental techniques on such injuries.

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



The great American tennis boom has produced some startling U.S. successes at the centenary Wimbledon tennis championships, which enter their second week today.

Record crowds at the All-England club were kept buzzing last week by the brilliance and composure of 14year-old Tracy Austin, who doublebackhanded her way into a secondround clash against defending women's singles champ Chris Evert.

The center court contest drew some remarkable tennis from the spindlylegged youngster although the more experienced Miss Evert won 6-1, 6-1.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) -Chris Evert, the defending Wimbledon champion, routed Billie Jean King 6-1, 6-2 today to reach the semifinals of the 100th All-England tennis championships.



The average price of regular gasoline in Texas mororists who pump their has passed the 60-cent-pergallon level, and further price increases are coming at many service stations before July Fourth Weekend.

A survey of 231 service stations conducted by the American Automobile Association, Texas Division, revealed average gasoline prices per gallon of 60.2 for regular, 63.0 for unleaded and 64.6 for premium.

While these prices represent an increase of only about one-half cent per gallon over the prices revealed by AAA's survey just before the Memorial Day Weekend (59.8 for regular, 62.7 for unleaded and 64.6 for premium, many station operators told AAA that their prices would be going up 1 to 2 cents per

gallon around July 1. A comparison of AAA's study with one made at the same time last year shows that the average price of regular gas has risen 3.9 cents a gallon in the past Unleaded averages 4.7 cents a gallon more, and premium has

gone up 4.2 cents a gallon. Motorists should have few problems finding an open station during the July Fourth Weekend. All but one of the 231 stations surveyed will be open Saturday, while 72 percent will be open Sunday and 85 percent on


