JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - A major earthquake was reported in the Indian Ocean today between Australia and Indonesia. Tremors forced hundreds of workers to flee tall buildings in western Australia nearly 1,000 miles away but there were no immediate reports of injuries.

Earthquake monitoring stations reported the strength of the quake at between 7 and 8.9 on the Richter scale, the most powerful quake in the area in years and among the strongest ever

The Indonesian Department of Meteorology said the quake occurred at 1:11 p.m. Jakarta time — 2:11 a.m. EDT — and tremors and aftershocks lasted for more than an hour.

The quake was centered 931 miles southeast of the Indonesian capital of north of Perth, Australia.

There were no immediate reports of damage from Indonesia or islands near the quake's epicenter. There also was no indication that the quake had raised a tsunami, or tidal wave.

Tremors shook the length of western Australia, a distance of about 2,400 miles. In Perth, windows and venetian blinds rattled, chairs slid across floors and frightened workers ran from buildings. Some refused to return even after tremors halted. The biggest impact was in Port Hedland where parked cars were bounced up and down by the quake and buildings rocked and swayed for four minutes.

The closest major land area to the quake's epicenter was the Indonesian island of Sumba, about 200 miles

In 1960 the Fishers moved to Baytown where Mr. Fisher began working in the Baytown refinery.

Reagan Brown says

Nation counts on farmer

"All we have left in America to count on is the farmer. The greatest shortage in the world is food and the only thing other world powers fear is food shortage," Reagan Brown, new Texas commissioner of agriculture told a group of 200 persons at the annual Mitchell County Farm tour

Thursday at noon. Following a light talk filled with humorous farm stories, the new commissioner suddenly turned and came down hard on the importance of farming in Texas and the world.

He stressed that "We must keep the profit in agriculture." Then he added, "Farmers cannot produce themselves into prosperity. We have to market ourselves into prosperity.'

He used nursery rhymes to highlight his points of emphasis. With "Old Mother Hubbard", he pointed out that "The cupboard could become bare in America. We have never had to stand in line or go without food but we must keep profit in the agriculture

"During recent years, farmers have quit farming 400,000 acres and moved to town where workers such as steel industry employes have seen their salaries jump 128 per cent," he added.

He pointed to the importance of the Texas Department of Agriculture which employs 500 people and controls 47 laws involving many facets of state business.

He named a few, such as the fact the department checks every gasoline pump, every butane truck, every antifreeze cartridge, grain warehouses, proper grain and produce scales, flower shops, grading of produce, checking vegetables in the Valley, regulating the egg and dairy industry and many other divisions.

He used "Little Bo Peep" to point out that the bureaucracy regulations were in many cases hurting the farmer and rancher. Brown said, "She's lost her sheep because the coyotes and Golden Eagles killed them. Watching a Golden Eagle gouge out the eye of a baby lamb is almost as bad as a coyote getting shot. And the environmentalists scream when the coyote gets shot.'

He especially lambasted OSHUA, which he claimed spent \$3 million for a study at Purdue to "determine if you fell off a ladder, you would get hurt." He also attacked the hearings in

Lubbock last year where he stated, "OSHUA is trying to have our cotton gins spend from \$100,000 to \$400,000 each to prevent lung disease that has never once occurred in Texas."

He stressed that Congress needed to make the system work and not turn the responsibilities over to bureaucrats.

Brown used the story of "Henny Penny" to point up the gloom casters, in which he included news analysts and do gooders. He used "Pussycat, Pussycat" to point up the fact that many people only see the "rat under the chair rather than the queen's

The commissioner then pointed out the "wonderful things being done in agricultural research which will better production in many fields."

He ended with "Humpty Dumpty" saying that we cannot let our freedoms crash down and "not be able to put it together again.'

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) - A white cross of flowers from his former wife and his daughter stood by the crypt of Elvis Presley today, as outside the mausoleum hundreds of people paid a final homage.

They came in a steady stream from the time the cemetery gates opened to ween and to kneel and to take pictures of the building where the rock 'n' roll superstar was laid to final rest

Florists stood behind ropes to give the mourners flowers from the 3,116 displays that lay like a colorful quilt across the lawn of the mausoleum. None of the visitors was allowed inside the building, but they seemed content just to be outside.

Presley's coffin was sealed behind a slab of concrete and marble in a small chamber near the front of the building. Near a window was a threefoot-high cross of white carnations. decorated with red roses. A silken streamer said it was from Lisa Marie and Priscilla.

Lisa Marie is 9 years old and Presley's only child. Priscilla, her mother, and Presley were divorced.

On the floor of the chamber was the blanket of roses that covered the coffin when it was carried in Thurs-

At the head of the rose display was a crown of velvet with red and white roses along the bottom and red carnations at the top. Above it all was a small golden "X" with a simulated diamond.

There was nothing to indicate the donor or what the "X" meant. The mausoleum was kept locked

because the family was expected sometime during the day and the crowd clearly was too large.

No taxpayer shows up DENVER CITY - Denver for budget hearing

In a short meeting Thursday, the Big Spring School Board of Trustees approved a \$9,013,953 budget for the coming school year.

Either Big Spring residents didn't know that the public hearing was taking place, or they were showed up either to approve or disapprove expenditures.

School assis .nt superintendent for business Don Crockett presented the 76 page budget to the Board with only minor explanations, as the Board had tenatively approved the identical budget the week

Roy Watkins, Board president, went through the formality of asking the few newsmen and school employes in the audience "The only things left to do whether they had any

According to the budget, a A permit for the \$20,000 deficit of approximately \$265,886 will run, despite the fact that the tax rate was not increased from its present level of \$1.70 per \$100 valuation. The assessed tax roll was estimated at

The budget will be \$199,150 less than last year's.

Crockett pointed optimistically to the \$400,00 deficit projected for this year's budget and explained that those estimates had been high. He said that he hoped that the \$265,886 estimate for the upcoming year would be high also.





Planning blocked

WASHINGTON — President Carter is scrambling desperately to get ahead of the paperwork being piled on his desk. Sources close to the president acknowledge that he has become too bogged down in details and deadlines to see beyond the immediate crisis.

His view of the problems on the horizon, they say, has been obstructed by the mountains of paperwork on his desk. "There has been very little longrange planning in the White House, one top presidential adviser told us. "It's all crisis management. Nothing solved until the deadline ap-

Carter has advanced from one crisis to another since he concluded his inaugural walk down Pennsylvania Avenue seven months ago. He hadn't finished unpacking before he was confronted with a critical shortage of natural gas. "The president should have been told in November that he'd be facing a natural gas crisis in January," complained one adviser.

The recent steel price increases also took the White House by surprise "That could have been predicted six months ago," grumped the adviser.

BUT SOME CATER AIDES are now trying to anticipate the problems before they become disasters. The president's pollster, Patrick Caddell, is trying to devise statistical measures that can predict trouble in

Stuart Eisentat, the overworked domestic policy chief, is also trying to plan for the future. But his staff has been overwhelmed with immediate problems. "We've had to deal with energy, tax reform, welfare, economic stimulus package, aliens, minimum wage, urban problems, reorganization and social security. Eisenstat told us. "These are critical problems that the Republican administrations just didn't deal with."

There were spaces for Carter to approve or disapprove the options. Attached were lengthy memos and charts from Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, Health Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph Califano and budget boss Bert

Some Carter staffers argue that the only way to achieve any action in bureaucratic Washington is to set deadlines. The president, for instance, waited to get involved in the congressional wrangling over auto emission standards until two weeks before Detroit's threatened shut-down of production. This was a calculated strategy to force Congress to pass the auto pollution legislation, a top aide told us. Contingency plans were hurriedly drawn, nevertheless, to allow continued production while slapping fines on the polluting cars.



'You fake it until you make it'

DALLAS (AP) — Starting and maintaining your own business in today's economy is risky enough. For minority businesses minorities with more ideas than dollars, the prospect is akin to winning at Monopoly

without passing "Go." Jay Lansford, chairman of the National Service Corps of Retired Executives Council said "50 per cent of small businesses fail within the first two years of operation. And 90 per cent fail within the first five years. If 400,000 small businesses fail this year, that's a loss of about 1.6 million jobs.

Henry Zuniga, regional director of the federal Office of Minority Business Enterprise in Dallas, said minority-owned firms record an even lower survival rate the normal because problems associated with starting a new business are

magnified. "What we are encouraging is getting into the growth fields like energy and pollution," he said. "Normally, minorities don't do that. We generally go into old, established fields and we're 20 years behind and

have to play catch up." Zuniga said due to its budget, the OMBE is only able to assist about 5 per cent, or 23,000, of the minority businesses nationwide. Of that figure, he said the failure rate is about 4 per cent annually.

Although the 1977 census is not yet out, Zuniga said 1972 figures show only 381,935 operating nationwide.

"The agencies under us try to assist them by putting together a business plan, including a loan package. They also provide assistance in marketing the products. This year, the Minority Purchasing Council has said it will spend a billion dollars pocket.





AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The State Insurance Board has decided to experiment with offering premium discounts as an incentive for homeowners to burglarproof their houses.

'This pilot project will give crime prevention units that can be opened in broad in about a dozen cities a daylight without attracting chance to demonstrate attention," he said. whether an insurance discount is workable for the entire state," Board Chairman Joe Christie said.

The board suggested a five per cent reduction in homeowners insurance premiums for participating policyholders.

No start-up date was set. The board asked the Texas Crime Prevention Institute at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos to work out details with the board's staff.

A homeowner would have to install about \$170 worth of Herrera of Chicago and solid core doors, deadbolt locks, special window catches and other devices to make his or her house harder Herrera are Mexican to burglarize in order to get the discount.





Bob Curley, an editor for the Orlando Sentinel Star, keeps it locked in a cabinet in his home. The scuffed and slightly torn ball has been bad news twice.

The ball which killed Raymond Johnson Chapman 57 years ago was given to Curley, then a sports writer, by one of the players who took part in the game. Chapman, shortstop for

the Cleveland Indians, was struck in the temple by a pitch thrown by Carl William Mays of the New York Yankees Aug. 17, 1920, at the New York Polo Grounds.

Curley reported that Cleveland centerfielder Chuck Jamieson put the ball in his back pocket after it struck Chapman. He said Jamieson gave him the ball 27 years ago.

Jamieson died in 1969. Curley says he placed it temporarily in the glove compartment of his car. He was then a coach at St. Luke High in Ho Ho Kus, N.J.

The next day, a group of his players discovered it and used it in infield practice, the first time it had been used since striking Chapman. Curley says a com-

paratively soft bouncer was hit to the third baseman. As he reached for it, it took a bad hop and hit him on the right eye, shattering his cheekbone.






