Hustle 3

Lots of goodies

Down at the Chamber office we do lots of good things for people — one of those good things is to sell tickets to various activities here in our community.

Right now we have some tickets that will help kids — crippled kids and burned kids — and they'll also help to make all kids smile and laugh and have a happy time. These tickets are for The Annual Shrine Circus to be held here in Big Spring on September 19th. I hope you'll have a few minutes to stop by and pick up a couple of Shrine Circus tickets.

SHOP BIG SPRING FIRST

Let's take a look at a vital subject this week, and one that's often misunderstood; American Economics! For most of us, economics is a complicated subject consisting of charts and graphs, formulas and equations, and some very speculative predictions seasoned with a fair amount of mysticism.

Well that's more on the theoretical side — on the practical side, economics are pretty basic. They apply directly to you and me and our acceptance is generally scaled to how well off we are. In answer to some of the questions we get at the Chamber Office we'll spend a few minutes discussing some very elementary information which is easily understood and yet in some ways is pretty startling.

Three killed in plane crash

CANYON, Tex. (AP) — Federal Aviation Administration officials were expected today to investigate the crash of a single-engine plane that killed three Roswell, N.M., residents.

The Piper Comanche aircraft was en route from Roswell to nearby Amarillo, Tex., when it went down Sunday in a field seven miles northwest of this Texas Panhandle city.

The Texas Department of Public Safety identified the pilot as William Martin Lea, 75, and the passengers as Marion D. Hopkins, 34, and William P. Kurtz, 33.

First of all, our American system is founded on a basic premise called the "law of supply and demand". Essentially that means that when there is plenty of something — value of that item is less than if it was in short supply. And of course, when an item is scarce — it increases in value. An example — gold and precious stones are not abundant in our civilization so these items are priced rather high. The same goes for star athletes, Rolls Royce automobiles, and anything else of limited production. When commodities exist in great quantities, the price is comparatively lower — as another example of this, look at the cost of color TV sets twenty years ago and the much lower price of color TV sets today. An even better example would be the price of cotton just one year ago compared with the market price today, which of course, is affected by 1977's predicted record production.

Ok — that's supply and demand. Now let's take a look at the motivator — the element in our system that makes things happen. It's called PROFIT. Profit is a good word. It means the difference between prosperity and poverty. It is the element which creates jobs — which in turn enriches our communities across the nation. Without profit the economy stagnates, jobs dry up and folks do without — or even worse businesses fail and the entire economy suffers a severe recession or even depression. We need profit to help us continue enjoying the things we often take for granted — enough good food to eat, a comfortable place to live, transportation, clothing, entertainment and on and on!

Here are some supporting facts which may help us to understand our system. These facts are based on averages across the nation. Sixty-seven cents of every corporate dollar go to pay wages, salaries and benefits. Sixteen cents go to pay taxes, eight cents to buy new tools and machinery and that leaves nine cents to be split

up between the company and stockholders and to pay for expansion which of course creates more jobs. Speaking of expansion it costs one hundred thousand dollars to create one new job in the oil industry. Other industries vary, with one job in steel production requiring a two hundred thousand investment. Of course, we're speaking of establishing new plants. Takes a lot of profit, doesn't it? In 1974 the cost of living went up sharply. Know what the big increase was for?

Taxes — social security taxes jumped 21.6 per cent and personal income tax rose 26.5 per cent while housing only increased 13.5 per cent and food went up 11.9 per cent. I wasn't surprised by the increase in taxes. With all the spending going on in Washington, I'm surprised it wasn't more. Oh that brings out a good point — all those federal funds, revenue sharing, school lunches, "grants" etc. — that money isn't generated in Washington it comes from the taxes that you and I, our employers, business people, manufacturers, ranchers, and farmers pay each year.

And while we are thinking taxes, here is another fact. For each dollar of our national income — that's the total amount of earnings of our American system which includes everything from those corporate profits to renting a house or a section of land — 37 cents goes to taxes 25 of those cents goes to Washington.

What can we do about this economic crocodile? There are several things, first ask our elected officials in Austin and Washington to put some restraint on government spending. Second take a firm stand for our system — stand up for business and profits, for without them we'll have nothing more than a socialistic economy, poorly run by big government.

And thirdly promote the American work ethic, give a full measure on the job for the wages received. And finally, we better not wait too long on any of these actions — before it gets too late — we'd better Hustle! Hustle! Hustle!



NO BEE HIVE — Don't expect to find a bee hiding in this hive. That "honeycomb" you're looking at is the product of man-made technology — metal cans. Some 83 billion of them were produced in the United States last year and at least that many will be used this year to package some 2500 different products. The sealant used to keep a tight lid on these cans is also a product of a highly-specialized technology. Scientists at W.R. Grace & Co., a major producer of specialty chemicals, develop new sealants for the insides of can lids and seams to keep freshness and good taste under a tight lid.

Purported cancer cure worthless?

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal officials are mapping plans this week for conducting case studies of several hundred cancer patients who claim the controversial substance Laetrile helped them.

The officials believe the patients' experiences will confirm their diagnosis that the purported cancer cure is worthless.

They said, however, that if the review does not conclusively support their stand, the government would consider testing Laetrile for the first time on volunteer cancer patients.

The director of the National Cancer Institute, Dr. Arthur C. Upton, said Sunday the government will decide how to pick the cases it will review in a meeting among representatives of his agency, the Food and Drug Administration and the Center for Disease Control.

He did not say when the meeting will be held.

Warning that the government still sees no evidence of Laetrile's usefulness, Upton said, "the only basis on which one would decide to do a trial comes from anecdotal information about patients who have received the drug" — in other words, the patients' own stories.

Upton was questioned on NBC's "Meet the Press." Laetrile is banned from

shipment across state lines by federal law. A dozen states have legalized its sale, however.

Upton's deputy, Dr. Guy R. Newell, said public pressure played a part in the decision to study human cases.

In a telephone interview Sunday night, Newell said the planned review hopes to "collect cases of people who have been treated (with Laetrile) to collect objective information, so we can determine whether there are some bona fide remissions."

The government has said its reviews of Laetrile supporters' claims show the proponents "do not provide the kinds of adequate and self-controlled studies needed to show the effectiveness of a drug ..."

Newell said the government may study X rays, slides and charts of several hundred patients who used Laetrile.

Investigators would try to confirm that the patients actually had cancer, if their tumors were reduced and whether they had conventional cancer therapy that could have been responsible for the change.

If improved patients had conventional treatment, it would be "difficult to prove the effects were from Laetrile," he said.
