Tropical disturbance watched in Gulf

A rain-laden tropical wave camped over the Gulf of Mexico today as coastal residents and forecasters watched the cloudy weather system to see if it would become a tropical

"We anticipate that it will develop, but if it does it's close enough to land that it won't have time to become a hurricane," said forecaster Miles Lawrence at the National Hurricane Center.

Moving west-northwest at around 10 miles per hour, the tropical wave left behind 31/4 inches of rain at Key West during a two-hour period early today. Meanwhile, a cold front which passed through the Mississippi Valley

over the weekend continued to push eastward, bringing showers and thunderstorms from the lower Great Lakes and Ohio Valley through West Texas. As the front progresses, temperatures behind it have been dropping. Daytime highs were 20 degrees or more lower than the

One question that lies at the very heart of the controvery surrounding One Mile Lake is whether it is a breeding ground for mosquitoes.

The answer: probably not, according to James Lee, Howard County Extension Office entomologist.

"The survey I have done is just preliminary and still inconclusive, but after checking several sites at the lake I could find no mosquito larvae," he said. "The lake seems to have adequate numbers of fish and predaceous insects to eliminate most of the larvae.

Lee has a Masters Degree in Entomology from the University of Arkansas, and has spearheaded two mosquito abatement programs. One was in the central Arkansas rice growing region, the other in the southeast Arkansas delta region.

He has been mainly concerned lately with the control of the boll weevil in the area. In addition to Howard County, he works four other counties, helping cotton farmers to "It is always hard to get the point across about what we do to control mosquitoes. There are so many misconceptions about the insects," he

To begin with, instead of just one type of mosquito, Big Spring has three species to worry about, according to

The flood water mosquito, or Aedes species, causes the most problems here, said the entomologist. This particular mosquito lays its eggs in moist soil, and the eggs lie dormant until the next rainfall.

When it rains the eggs hatch into larvae (what experts call wigglers) in standing puddles. They become adults in from one to one and a half weeks. "Then they go looking for a blood

meal," said Lee. Another common species in this area is the temporary water or Culex species. This species will breed in anything that holds temporary water, from old tires to beer cans.

"This is also called the southern house mosquito because it usually breeds right around the house. It is responsible for the spread of encephalitis," said Lee.

area is the permanent water mosquito that lays its eggs on the surface of any large standing body of water. This type will emerge as an adult mosquito in about two weeks after hatching.

The Anopheles mosquito, prime carrier of malaria, is a member of this species.

"I haven't seen many of these around here, though," said Lee. It seems, according to the insect

man, that the minnows and predaceous insects, such as dragonflies, backwimmers, mayflies and many others, eat the wigglers as soon as they are hatched in the lake.

"Any time you have water that's in a natural drainage system like the One Mile Lake, and you try to drain it completely you will lose the fish and predaceous insects. Then it's possible to have a worse situation than you had

If the One Mile Lake doesn't appear to be a likely source for the mosquitoes, then where do they come

"Probably from the areas adjacent to the railroad tracks on the south side across from the lake," said the en-

present drainage system runs along the north side of the tracks. The tracks, which are built on high ground, provide a barrier between the lake and the low ground on the south

side of the tracks. "I believe that the south side of the tracks is the real problem. That is a temporary water area, a perfect source for a breeding site for the flood water mosquitoes." said Lee.

More evidence was added to this theory after a spot check of the area following this weekend's rain.

Gullies and low spots on the south side of the tracks that had been dry Saturday, had filled with standing water after the rain. An inspection by Lee revealed a number of newly hatched wigglers in the flooded areas. But again no larvae were found in

the lake. 'I'm not interested in getting involved in a crusade," said Lee. "But the lake doesn't seem to be the primary source of mosquitoes. This area on the south side of the tracks is cut off from adequate drainage, and

you get standing water. That's where the problem is," he concluded. Next: Who owns the water?

Fireside chat on Panama Canal

administration, stepping up its taskforce drive for ratification of the new Panama Canal treaty, says opponent Ronald Reagan has raised debate to "a more productive level" by focusing on alternatives to the treaty now in

Carter predicts the Senate will ratify his treaty and says he will use a fireside chat to take his campaign for the pact to the American people. He said the consequences would be very severe if the treaty is rejected.

Announcement of the fireside chat came as Hamilton Jordan, the President's top political aide, mounted an all-out drive for ratification. Jordan put assistant Joe Aragon to work on the effort and enlisted help from virtually every

Jordan heads a task force to win the 67 Senate votes needed for approval. Political and business leaders who have helped Carter efforts in the past are being summoned to briefings and dispatched back to states with

wavering senators. White House officials see Reagan's call for "alternative courses of action" that would "recognize the aspirations of the Panamanian people" as an end to his demand that the United States' present treaty with Panama be maintained intact.

"Even Gov. Reagan is saying the status quo is not a real alternative," one administration official said Sunday. "That leaves the question: Are we better off ratifying our new treaty or tearing up the past 13 years of negotiating and starting the process

The official, who declined to be identified, said he was reporting the views of Carter and his top foreign policy advisers.

"Reagan has elevated the debate to a higher and more productive level," the official said. "Now we'll deliberate alternatives to the terms in the treaty. It won't be a matter of dreams, like keeping the status quo, versus reality, which says we can't.'

Actually, there are two new agreements, one to yield control of the canal in the year 2000, and the other to guarantee the permanent neutrality of the waterway along with the right of the United States to keep it open

The agreements are to be signed here Sept. 7, before the Senate takes up the pact. The signing ceremony, designed to whip up enthusiasm, will be attended by the presidents of South American countries including Chile, Argentina and the Dominican Republic as well as the vice president

FBI file on 15-year-old

WASHINGTON (AP) — Karen DeCrow was linked by the FBI in 1953 to a group trying to save condemned spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg but the former head of the National Organization for Women says she was just 15 and interested in 'clothes, boys and cashmere sweaters' then.

Ms. DeCrow learned of the Rosenberg link in 44 pages of heavily censored FBI files on her that she obtained through the Freedom of Information Act.

Ms. DeCrow, a Syracuse, N.Y., lawyer, says "my memory of myself (in 1953) is that I was completely nonpolitical ... it's possible someone came up to me in the schoolyard and asked me to sign a petition but I don't recall anything like that.'

The memo also said that a suspected security risk whose name was deleted, "received correspondence from Karen Lipschultz'' (Ms. DeCrow's name before she married) in 1955. She said she knows of no New York political figures to whom she would have been writing at the age of 17.

Several of the memos concern Ms. DeCrow's 1969 and 1970 activities in the women's movement, primarily in Syracuse, but there were no entries for the years she was NOW's president.

Ms. DeCrow said her files show "the most incredible waste of the taxpayer's money" in compiling such information.

Ford obituary story

NEW YORK (AP) — Former President Gerald R. Ford has granted an interview to the New York Times for publication upon his death, Newsweek magazine says. The magazine reports in this week's issue that the

Times had been after Ford for a year for the obituary interview but was stalled by Donald Rumsfeld, Ford's former chief of staff, who objected on grounds that it was a "morbid" idea.

Newsweek said Ford enthusiastically ordered approval of the interview, the contents of which will be kept secret until Ford's death. That guarantee allowed Ford to be more candid about such subjects as Watergate and the pardon he granted Richard M. Nixon than he would have been otherwise, the magazine said.

Voyager computer proving stubborn

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) Scientists having troubles with a stubborn Voyager 2 computer are preparing for a new attempt to put scientific equipment aboard the Jupiter-bound space vehicle to work.

Jet Propulsion Laboratory officials here planned to try again today to set off small explosions intended to snap into place the data-gathering boom that has troubled Voyager 2 and delayed the launch of its sister space probe.

The explosions on the craft would blow a dust cover off a mechanical arm that carries scientific instruments, said JPL spokesman Don Bane. Mission officials hope the blasts will help provide enough force to move the pesky 71/2-foot boom one degree and lock it in place.

reported computer problems were responsible for their inability to move the Voyager 2 science arm. They were unable to explain why computer system malfunctioned.

Because of the uncertainty over the space probe's problems, scientists have indefinitely postponed a had been scheduled for Sunday. But Bane said the delay in

In Cape Canaveral, Fla., space agency officials say they may be able to launch Voyager 1 on Sept. 5 or 6. The scheduled Sept. 3 launch was delayed Saturday night so that extra springs could be installed in the booms that

malfunctioned on Voyager 2. Voyager 2, which took off Aug.20, and Voyager 1 are designed to take pictures and measure temperatures, radiation and atmospheres of Saturn, Jupiter and possibly Uranus, before hurtling out of the solar

Voyager 1 is expected to Jupiter first, sometime in early 1979.



As we were talking in the lobby of the post office, I was dropping letters into the wall slots. We noticed that I had addressed one bill to "J. Tom Graham" instead of putting the right name of the town.

I changed the address to make it correct, wondering aloud how anyone could do something that stupid. Hardesty noted that the worst part

was that when my creditor failed to receive his check, I very likely would blame the postal service.

"I put the check in the mail," I would tell the creditor. "That dadburn postal service must have lost it." "Sure, sure," the creditor would think.

HARDESTY INVITED me back to the cubbyhole where postal employes take their coffee breaks, and we began to talk about flak that the postal

The postmaster related a typical story to me:

A Big Spring woman called him one morning and chewed him out something terrible because a check she had mailed failed to reach its destination.
Hardesty, accustomed to being considered guilty until proven otherwise, apologized to the woman, but she remained mad. He looked everywhere for the lost letter in vain.

By 99 per cent efficiency, he means that a letter is handled correctly 99 per cent of the time. It's the other 1 per cent that you hear about.

He claims the Big Spring office does even better. Postmen here handle 70,000 pieces of mail per day. If only 1 per cent were mishandled, it could produce 700 complaints and 700 griping customers walking the streets

Actually, he said the daily complaints average about 15, with the post office not at fault on a dozen of those.

BUT HOW about the letter that was mailed in Stanton and takes a month to be delivered to Big Spring?

Hardesty said this is almost always the old empty mail sack problem. A postal employe believes that he has gotten all the mail from that sack, so it is rolled up and perhaps not used again for several weeks. When it is used, out falls the lost letter.

The postmaster said that most of the small offices operate very well, but some of the larger ones in the North have had problems. He mentioned the Chicago incident a few years ago when the post office there got so far behind that huge stacks of advertising mail had to be taken out and burned

WASHINGTON - The House Narcotics chairman will soon disclose that the flood of cocaine into the United States has reached epidemic proportions.

While on an investigative mission through South America, Rep. Lester Wolff, D.-N.Y., and his committee members found the flow of cocaine crossing U.S. borders is at least twice the highest estimate of narcotics officials

WOLFF WILL also charge that U.S. diplomats have been encouraging the arrest of amateur drug dealers while the ringleaders in Latin America go largely unprosecuted. This, Wolff discovered, has become a source of friction between the federal Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the State Dept.

Wolff will disclose the details of his probe, we have learned, at a press conference before the Overseas Press Club in New York on Monday

U.S. narcotics officials have estimated that 30 to 70 tons of cocaine are being smuggled into this country annually. These figures are based on the soutmoded assumption that 10 per cent of the illegal traffic is intercepted.

Wolff, however, found that 200 tons of cocaine a year are being shipped out of Bolivia and Peru alone. Eighty per cent of this, or 160 tons, eventually reaches the United States. The congressional investigators

also discovered that the peasants of Bolivia and Peru are getting \$60 a kilo for cocaine which, when purified and 'cut," sells on the streets of New York for \$600,000. Some major cocaine merchants in Latin America. moreover, are hoarding the narcotic in an effort to drive the price even

U.S. DIPLOMATS, primarily interested in the statistics they report to Washington, have been applauding and assisting in the arrest of smalltime traffickers, Wolff found. This has encouraged Latin American government officials, many of whom are on exceedingly friendly terms with the big dealers anyway, to ignore the

major traffickers. In Brazil. Wolff discovered that DEA agents' hands were being tied by U.S. diplomats who do not want to rock the boat. The diplomats, for example, told Wolff there was little concaine trafficking from Brazil. The congressman independently determined that at least a ton of cocaine a year was moving through Brazil to the United States.

Hitler, revisionists

John Lukacs has written a strirring message to American conservatives warning against a massive attempt to rehabilitate Adolf Hitler. This effort has been undertaken by the British writer David Irving, in the book "Hitler's War," which is the cause of a roaring controversy in Great Britain and Europe and a considerable controversy here. John Lukacs is a greatly talented historian, a man of conservative disposition who feels he has a stake in the hygiene of the conservative movement and worries that such a book as David Irving's will have a harmful influence on conservatives.

Why? Because — he explains most conservatives of the older generation opposed American intervention in the Second World War. In the group that opposed that intervention there is a division. One set did so because they were traditionally opposed to meddling in foreign wars, had not forgotten the futility of the first world war, and were horrified at the thought of an alliance with the Soviet Union. But a few others — and John Lukacs names Charles Lindbergh among them - admired Hitler's regime, and thought it simply a bad idea to make war on it.

THIS IS CLEARLY the position of historian David Irving. His book, in the opinion of Lukacs, is a major of historical irresponsibility. "Hitler's War', unlike Irving's earlier earlier works, contains hundreds of errors; wrong names, wrong dates, and, what is worse, statements about events, including battles, that did not really take place. These errors, however, are not the result of inadequate research; they are not technical mistakes or oversights.

David Irving denies there is any documentary evidence linking Hitler directly with the program to exterminate the Jews.

An Israeli strike?

WASHINGTON — The avoidance of collision with President Carter over Israel's latest afront on new West Bank settlements may encourage Prime Minister Menahem Begin to escalate his game of "chicken" with a daring raid into southern Lebanon.

Diplomatic experts give odds of just under 50-50 for a swift Israeli move accross the border against Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) guerrillas, under the attractive guise of protecting Lebanese Christians. The raid would last no longer than 24 or 48 hours and would have to come soon — before the planned evacuation of PLO guerrillas from their southern Lebanon bases

THE PURPOSE OF such a raid: undermining the U.S. effort to persuade the PLO to accept Israel as a permanent state under terms of United Nations Resolution 242. If Begin sabotaged U.S. policy so frontally, Jimmy Carter would face his toughest choice between swerving or accepting the political consequence of a painful head-on collision with

against PLO concentrations, intended to destroy as many guerrillas and installations as possible, also would serve some less obvious purposes for Begin. It would heighten PLO hatered of Israel and weaken the PLO's moderates, including Yasser Arafat, who are believed ready to go along with the U.S. plan.

An incursion of the type successfully employed on earlier occasions against the PLO in both Lebanon and Jordan would follow three successive Israeli affronts to the Carter peace plan:

First, Begin's "legalization" of three Jewish settlements on the Palestinian West Bank; second, a major tightening of Israel's occupation policies over 1 million Arabs in the West Bank and Gaza, the government's approval last week of three new Jewish settlements.

Besides hardening PLO resistance to Israel as a state, each of those steps was calculated to send Mr. Carter this warning: do not keep trying to bring PLO into the center of peace efforts.

DIPLOMATS HERE WITH access to Israeli thinking say nothing has so infuriated Begin as the "unfriendly" moves of Mr. Carter in trying to give international credibility and respectability to the PLO. Thus, each time the U.S. steps up its efforts to convert the PLO from outsider to insider -- as a trusted party to Mideast negotiations — Begin counters with a new move against the Carter peace plan.

This game of chicken appears to be working to Israel's advantage. Every time he swerves to avoid the collision, Jimmy Carter looks weak and vacillating. On July 28, the President said he had told Begin "very strongly" of his "deep concern" that no new settlements be established. Yet, the administration's reponse to three new settlements was couched in flabby diplomatic language and was delivered not by the White House but by State Department spokesman Hodding Carter Jr.

Vaseline helps situation

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Our four-year old daughter has a skin condition diagnosed as ichthyosis. We have taken her to doctors and the answers have all been the same — incurable, will lessen with age, heredity is the source, etc.

They've advised infrequent bathing, use of oils and lotions. As a mother I just don't want to accept the fact that my little girl will have to go through life with such dry, scaly skin. I know there are worse things she could have, but the tought isn't much reassurance. I don't make her selfconscious about it.

I'd give anything to clear it up. Do you have any further information on this? - P.J.

This is an unsightly skin disorder, the word ichthyosis meaning "fish skin." The cause is unknown, but it is frequently inherited and can occur very early in life. The problem is that the outer layers of skin do not retain water and the horny layers are not shed properly, hence the scaling.

You say you were advised infrequent bathing. This is contrary to the data I have wherein a good soaking in warm water for a half hour a day is recommended. There is a chance you misunderstood the advice on this. Check back with your doctor.

After daubing the skin dry, plain (non-medicated) vaseline is applied. This is messy, and done before bedtime. Put cotton pajamas on the youngster. Along this same line is the use of 40 to 60 per cent propylene glycol solution in water. This is followed by dressings applied for the night. Thin plastic sheeting is used for coverings. After three to four daily treatments the applications may be used every three to five days. The treatment is reported by Drs. Goldsmith and Baden of Harvard

It is true there is no sure cure for ichthyosis, and any parent will understand your feelings. But if the scaling and roughness can be minimized you will have gone a long way toward teaching the child how to

live with it. Dear Dr. Thosteson: Everytime I wear any type of eye makeup, about three hours afterward my eyeilids start to swell. It seems to happen after I remove the makeup.

This has been going on for so long that I have remained in the house like Howard Hughes, a recluse. I look like a drinker, which I am not. The swelling is enormous. Going without makeup would be for me like going without my shoes. So what can I do? -Mrs. R.W.R.

Many women have reported such reactions, so many, in fact, that there are now non-allergenic brands available. Have you tried to find one?

Since you report reactions from all the brands you have tried, it must be a substance common to all of them that bothers you. One of the non-allergenic brands may solve your problem. Otherwise no eye makeup. Dear Dr. Thosteson: Sometimes in

the past two months I awaken to find I have blood in my throat and mouth.

This happens only every few days What is your advice on this? I am 81

I couldn't begin to speculate, and can only urge you to have this looked into. Could be a minor noseblood, bleeding from gums, or biting your Dear Dr. Thosteson: I'm 60 and my

nails are like tissue paper. I have to keep trimming them as they just keep tearing. Now they are splitting all the way down the center. I have to keep them bandaged. Does this indicate some lack in my diet? — Mrs. It might — possibly of protein, iron

(anemia), or vitamin B

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is there anything to be done for those unsightly veins running alongside the nose? I feel sick about them. I'm starting to lose sleep over them. --

If they are the usual spider veins, they can be removed with a tiny electric needle. If you are losing sleep over them, I suggest you have this done. Ask your doctor to refer you to a specialist.

When rabid skunks are a source of human rabies. 'Rabies virus may be excreted in skunk saliva as much as 18 days before death, and the animal might not even show any signs of sickness until the last day.'

Dr. Bilderback said. 'Anyone who plays with or pets a skunk that looks well but is shedding rabies virus, is in danger and often doesn' know it. He could have a cut or small scratch on his hand which could cause an exposure to rabies."

Dr. Bilderback cited a recent example of the problems that pet skunks can cause both the public and the Department. > The ecology of skunks make them a particularly likely source of human exposure to rabies. The majority of rabid skunks are caught in the summer, a time when human activity outdoors is also high.

Usually nocturnal and shy, rabid skunks may be seen in the daylight, and attack rather than run away. At night they may enter campers' tents and sleeping bags and bite without provocation.

Rabid skunks often do not scent, eliminating another factor that might reduce human exposure. Even in the wild, skunks tolerate close proximity to man, often living near houses or suburban homes. Moreover, their tolerance for man is reciprocated, and the skunk has been brought into the home as a favorite exotic pet. All of these factors combine to enhance the likelihood of human exposure to rabies.

"If skunk bites caused only pain, local infection, and tetanus, one would wonder if keepingskunks as pets makes sense. But since skunks not only can but often do get rabies, and since we still have no absolute post-exposure treatment for rabies in man, I think there is a strong argument for prohibiting skunks as pets," Dr.



Self-help books good?

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -The millions who are buying self-help books may be helping themselves to the harmful therapies of charlatans, a panel of psychologists said Saturday.

The psychologists, including one who has written self-help books, suggested that a guide for consumers should be circulated to "check up in a scientific way" on authors' claims.

They were very careful to say that even the most irresponsible books - such as those which promise instant happiness or a better sex life overnight - should not be banned.

"Nobody really wants this stuff to be censored," said Dr. Perry London of the University of Southern California, at the American Psychology Association's 85th annual meeting here. "What this organization could do is support a consumer's guide, making very clear it was trying to offer a public service, not trying to establish standards, London told a news con-

In recent weeks such titles as "How to Take Control of Your Life," "Looking Out for Number 1" and "I'm OK You're OK," have been on best seller lists all over the country. The panel did not single out any specific book for criticism.

The APA's concern is prompted by books and tape recordings that encourage mental self-help - sidestepping the psychologist or psychiatrist.

While it might seem selfserving for psychologist to criticize the trend, many of the authors are APA members themselves.

"The material being produced now has an aura of respectability it never had before," London noted.

Dr. Albert Ellis, author of many such books. said consumers have little to judge a book by - mostly blurbs on the cover and advertisements.

"It's time we did something to validate the testimonials and check up in a scientific way," he said. Alpha Kappa Ellis said there is significant potential for harm in some of the books. Omicron meets

Dr. Cail E. Thoreson of Stanford University noted that many of the books oversimplify by holding the person totally responsible for his life and master of his fate. The books "have overlooked the interaction with the social vironment," he said.

.A popular belief among those in the health food movement is that doctors cannot attempt to prescribe vitamins and proper diet methods because they know nothing about nutrition.

It has become a wellknown fact that doctors do not learn about nutrition in medical schools in the United States. In Europe, more studies are currently being made, so medical students there are learning about the subject. Many say that for the American diet to become of better quality, doctors here should learn nutrition values and help to prevent medicine, rather than to treat an illness after it happens. A very famous children's

Many more doctors and pharmacists across the country are gradually learning more about vitamins and health foods. and are trusting them to be of value.

years experience, Bob Pearcy, said he is selling more and more vitamins to persons who come to his pharmacy than ever before. "We are just now beginning to find out a lot about diseases and how it

has to do with our current diet," Pearcy said. "A good basis in nutrition can help to prevent illnesses," he said.

"The only things I can think of besides this are a one-hitter, a nohitter and a perfect game," the slender left-hander said after hurling the New York Yankees to a 1-0 triumph over the Texas Rangers, keeping them two games ahead of Boston in the American League East.

To go along with his two-hitter-Jim Sundberg's two-out first-inning triple and Bert Campaneris' leadoff single in the seventh provided the Rangers' only baserunners- Guidry also went home with a huge bottle of champagne, courtesy of owner George Steinbrenner

"I don't really like champagne, but I'll drink it anyhow," Guidry said, the lilting accent of his upbringing in Louisiana's Cajun country still discernible.

With an 11-6 record, Guidry, who began the season in the bullpen, has been the bellwether of this year's injury-riddled pitching staff. Sort of a 1977 version of Dock Ellis, who surprised everyone except Dock Ellis by winning 17 games and helping pitch the Yankees to the 1976 pennant.







Also included in the annual report is a financial report breaking down the expenditures of the agency for he fiscal year.



Living Will'

bill in effect (Special to The Herald) AUSTIN - Today, Texans will have the right to die. The Texas Natural Death Act

goes into effect, today, which allows persons to direct in the form of a legally binding document that their death be prolonged by machines

Nicknamed the "Living Will" bill, the law is most similar to the pioneer "natural death" law passed in California in 1976. Texas was fourth among the flurry of states that passed natural death legislation this year, which include Idaho, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon and Nevada,

Arkansas. National attention has been focused on the need for such laws since the wellpublicized tragedy of Karen Quinlan, whose New Jersey family took their appeal to disconnect her respirator to the state's Supreme Court. Natural death bills were introduced in the lawmaking bodies of 41 states last year.

Sen. Ray Farabee, D-Wichita Falls, the bill's sponsor, said response to the new law has been excellent. "There is sufficient latitude in the law for the patient and physician to employ it without difficulty but it also provides adequate safeguards against abuse," he said.

The new Texas measure allows a person who is at least 18 years old and of sound mind to sign a Directive to Physicians which asks that in the event of terminal illness or injury, life-sustaining procedures not be utilized when their use would only prolong the process of dying.

The directive cannot be honored unless two physicians, of whom one must be the attending physician, have personally examined the patient and determined his or her condition is terminal and death Enrollees are needed in would occur regardless of whether life-sustaining




