Lance denies having plans to resign

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal bank regulator testified today he might not have lifted the restrictions against one of Bert Lance's Georgia banks last Nov. 22 if he hadn't received a personal visit from Lance two days before Jimmy Carter named him as budget director

But Donald Tarleton, regional administrator of national banks in Atlanta, also told the Senate Govern-

mental Affairs Committee that he did not recall discussing the restrictions against the Calhoun First National Bank with Lance during their hour-long conversation.

Tarleton testified amid increasing congressional demands for the resignation of Lance, former board chairman of the Calhoun Bank.

Lance, who is scheduled to appear before the committee on Thursday, told reporters today he does not intend to resign, either before or after his testimony. "I'm going to keep on doing the job at the office of Management and Budget," he declared

Though Lance was headed to the White House later in the day, he said he intended his meeting with the President to focus on routine OMB business.

Tarleton's testimony conflicted with a statement given by Lance to Internal Revenue Service investigators, in which he said that he and Tarleton did discuss the restrictions against the bank "in an offhand manner" but that he did not ask Tarleton to lift the sanctions.

The statement to the IRS was not sworn to by Lance in the presence of witnesses but the IRS said last week it had been told Lance would do so Monday

A spokesman for Lance said the budget director had not sworn to the statement becase the IRS had not vet followed through on an arrangement for an agent to come by his office and take his oath

Tarleton did lift the restriction against Lance's bank later in the same day that Lance paid him a visit. Since the previous December, the bank had been bound by an agreement with federal bank regulators barring it from allowing overdrafts to Lance and members of his family

Tarleton said the purpose of Lance's visit was to advise him of his pending appointment as OMB director.

Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D-Mo. asked Tarleton whether the subject of the agreement was raised during his conversation with Lance.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Energy Committee, deadlocked on whether to continue natural gas price controls, today sent President Carter's gas pricing plan to the Senate floor without any recommendation of support.

The committee thus set the stage for one of the biggest floor fights on Carter's energy proposals.

On Monday, by a 9-9 tie vote, the committee rejected a Republicansponsored plan for lifting federal price controls on natural gas.

Today, committee Chairman Henry Jackson, D-Wash., said it is clear that a vote on Carter's natural gas pricing scheme would end up the same way. "We're in a deadlock on the major

issues," he said. So when the committee's senior minority member, Sen. Clifford Hansen, R-Wyo., urged that the Carter proposal go to the floor without recommendation, Jackson said he would support it.

The proposal was approved by a 15-2

"The real contest is going to take place on the floor," said Sen. Dewey Bartlett, R-Okla

Under the Carter plan, the present \$1.46 price ceiling on each thousand cubic feet of natural gas would be permitted to rise to \$1.75.

Carter's energy advisers say that is enough to provide gas producers with economic incentives to find new reserves

Before today's committee vote, Sens. Bennett Johnston, D-La., and Pete Domenici, R-N.M., had planned to propose a compromise allowing the natural gas price ceiling to rise to \$2.41 by 1981.

Meanwhile, legislation to ban the production of fuel-inefficient cars after 1979 was headed for final Senate

action. Under the proposal, each 1980 model car would have to get at least 16 miles per gallon of gasoline. By 1985, the minimum would be 21 miles per gallon. Auto makers could face fines of up to \$10,000 per vehicle for not meeting these limits.

On Monday the Senate paved the way for adopting this plan by rejecting on a vote of 55 to 27 a move to

Wall of water leaves 15 dead in Kansas City

KANSAS CITY (AP) - Flash floods left 15 persons dead, an undetermined number of others missing and hundreds more homeless or stranded today after the heaviest rains in the city's history

'We had a six-foot wall of water roaring down Brush Creek ... and it just swept up everything in its path, shoved it aside or rammed its way through," said Frank H. Spink, Jr., director of emergency preparedness for the city, as he described the scene at the Country Club Plaza, a widely known shopping center in the southern part of the city

"Police are checking for possible additional deaths in the cars caught in the wall of water that swept Brush Creek, Ward Parkway and the Plaza shopping area," he said.

Spink said nine of the confirmed deaths were in the city itself, four occurred in southern suburbs and two in eastern suburbs.

The plaza was one of the hardest hit

TESCO wants new pricing system

(Special to the Herald)

Texas Electric Service Company proposed a new electricity pricing system for residential customers in testimony today before the Public Utility Commission in Austin.

Chuck Johnston, TESCO rates manager, detailed the proposed rates began its second week.

Under the proposed rate structure, the residential electric bill would include three parts:

-A fixed monthly "customer charge," which would recover costs to the company that exist whether or not a customer uses any electricity. This includes the cost of meter reading, billing, and costs connected with meters, service lines and other distribution equipment.

-A "fuel charge," would recover the cost of fuel used to generate a customer's electricity

-A flat "kilowatt-hour charge," which would recover all other costs of supplying a customer with electricity.

'The new rate structure is designed to make electricity pricing more understandable for our customers,' Johnston said during a recess in the hearing.

The customer charge would be a fixed monthly amount. The "killowatt-hour" and fuel charges would be recovered on a "centes-perkillowatt-hour" basis.

Under the rates proposed by the Company, the customer charge would be \$4.65 per month for "Rated R" residential customers. The "kwh" charge would be 2.92 cents per kilowatt-hour in summer months and 1.82 cents per kilowatt-hour in winter months.

The fuel charge would be calculated each month to follow the ups and downs in the price of fuel. Texas Electric has asked for a 23.6

per cent overall increase in rates to support its fuel-changing program. The company is building lignite and

nuclear-powered generating plants to reduce its use of expensive and scarce natural gas.

Johnston was the last witness presented by TESCO. Four PUC staff witnesses will take the witness stand next, followed by witnesses for the intervenors in the hearing. The hearing is expected to end late

this week, with a ruling coming in about a month.

Former coach to appear before TEA in Austin

Former Big Spring basketball coach and teacher James Griffin will appear in Austin Friday at 9 a.m. at a motion to dismiss filed by the Big Spring School Board.

The motion to dismiss was filed by Big Spring Independent School District attorney Mike McKinney on Griffin's petition to the Texas Commissioner of Education, alleging discrimination as the reason his contract was not renewed this year.

Griffin's petition reads, "I have asked for just reasons why my contract was not renewed. I did not receive a written order, nor did I receive a specific reason regarding the termination of my teaching and coaching contract.

"I feel I have been discriminated against and treated unfairly because of my race. . . I have been a teacher and basketball coach here at Big Spring for four years."

McKinney's motion to dismiss is based on the fact that Griffin "failed

to provide notice of intent to appeal to the Respondent or to the Board of Trustees, individually or as a group, within 30 days from the decision.

Griffin also failed, according to McKinney, to supply either McKinney or the district with a copy of his petition.

Interim Superintendent Lynn Hise said that the only communication he had received from Griffin was a request for some documents. "I sent him copies of some things he should already have had," said Hise.

Griffin is apparently not represented by an attorney at this time.

If the motion to dismiss is upheld, Griffin will probably be able to appeal the decision to the Texas Board of Education. His original petition was delivered to the Texas Education Association dated July 1, 1977. The association did inform the school district that the appeal had been filed.



Tax limit proposed

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - The Texas Conservative Union announced today it is helping to form a special committee to consider the feasibility of placing a constitutional limit on taxes.

"The average citizen now works the first five months of the year just to pay all of his taxes, and they are still increasing with no end in sight," said Coby Pieper of the conservative union.

A constitutional amendment - which must be submitted to the people by a two-thirds vote of both houses of the legislature — is the "last ray of hope for the otherwis dismal future of the taxpayer," Pieper added in a statement.

CINCINNATI (AP) - "It looks like the judicial system really works," said Sara Scheuer, whose daughter, Sandra, was one of the four students killed in the May 4, 1970, confrontation with Ohio National Guardsmen. The 6th U.S. District Court of Appeals granted parents of students killed and wounded in the Kent State antiwar demonstrations a new trial in their attempt to collect \$46 million from Gov. James Rhodes, state officials and National Guardsmen who are subject of the suit.

Shuttle flies again

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) o astronauts steered the Space Shuttle Enterprise through a winding five-minute glide today in a successful second free flight test of the craft designed for once a-week space commuting in the

The airliner-sized space plane lifted cleanly from its carrier plane a few minutes behind schedule and touched down in a rooster tail of sand on the desert floor exactly as planned.

"Looking great," came the word from Houston, where the flight was directed and controllers watched on TV monitors.

"Lauks beautiful from chase," radiced the pilot of one of four sleek jet chase planes accompanying the massive Shuttle





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Publisher's corner **Big Spring energy security in peril?**

The Farmer's Almanac says this coming winter is going to be another bad one, for whatever that's worth.

The almanac, which correctly predicted the severe winter of last year and the hot summer that followed, says the 1978 one will not be as cold as 1977, but more than average chilly nevertheless.

This is important to Big Spring for lots of reasons, not the least of which is the nationwide natural gas shortfall almost certain again this winter.

Officials say that the country will have 4 per cent less natural gas than it requires this winter if the weather is only average cold. If the winter is again severe, the shortfall could be much more

SOME TOWNS in West Texas are already screaming. An example is Kermit, served by El Paso Natural Gas. El Paso Gas is an interstate company; that is to say, its pipelines cross state boundaries and can therefore be regulated by the federal government

The Federal Energy Administration has already given these towns allotments on the amount of natural gas that they can use. Their use cannot be more than 1974 levels, or the townspeople will have to pay penalties up to 500 times their regular bill.

Kermit folks are protesting, and they made national television last week with nictures of their town sitting among an endless horizon of oil wells but short on energy for the winter

Can it happen here in Big Spring? Dearl Pittman, local manager for Pioneer Natural Gas, doesn't think so. He says that Pioneer has ample gas reserves at this time, and he doesn't believe its system will be faced with anything like allotments limiting use to levels of three years ago.

Pioneer is an intrastate (wholly within one state) system, and the government in the past has had no authority to regulate these systems.

BUT THE possibility remains. I talked to Sen. John Tower's office last week, and the senator's energy aides are concerned.

that the Carter They say Administration energy package, if passed as proposed, would give the FEA not only the authority to regulate intrastate natural gas at the wellhead but also to take natural gas supplies away from one system and give it to another, interstate or intrastate. I think this could likely mean that if the winter is cold in the North, the FEA could dictate use allotments to

Big Spring In effect, the government would force our town to share in the nationwide shortage. If schools are closed in the North, they may also be closed here. If homes in the North are forced to lower thermostats to 62

degrees, we may be required to do so too For years Texans have paid higher prices for energy than persons in the North to insure our supplies. Soon they may be taken from us anyway. I'm not certain that this is wrong. I

think Texas should conserve when the

rest of the nation must too. No Texan wants to see elderly people freeze in their homes in Brooklyn or anywhere. But I am sure of one thing: This course of action is the worst possible one for solving the natural gas shortage.

The immediate answer to more natural gas supplies is a free market. We need less federal control of the prices and not more. Natural gas must be allowed to seek its own level in the marketplace.


If the government "solution" continues to prevail, soon no one will have natural gas or coal or any other form of energy.

The answer is not to keep dividing into smaller and smaller pots the energy we don't have enough of, but to find more energy and make other

forms of it economical. The natural gas shortfall is a government-controlled phenomenon. Government officials say we have a natural gas energy crisis, and they're right. They ought to know. They

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

LANCE HAS been destroyed by suggestions pyramiding wrongdoing without the hint of a trial. This suggests totalitarian-style justice or perhaps a throwback to an early American form. "This is Salem," one White House insider has been telling his colleagues all week 'and we burn a witch a year

Beyond the catastrophe to Lance's personal life and the damaging political impact on President Carter, this assures severe difficulties ahead for conducting the federal government's business. Except for professional bureaucrats or college professors can anyone come to 'Salem'' without the risk of becoming the next "witch"

The process is shown in the role of chairman Ribicoff, long noted as one of the nation's shrewdest politicians. Having defended Lance and attacked a media "smear" job against him only weeks ago, Ribicoff found himself in unusual country: opposing the liberal establishment. He purged himself abruptly with the dramatic holiday visit Monday to the White House, where he and Percy publicly implied grave new developments against Lance.

ALL THAT WAS new in their private report to the President, however, was a Republican staff investigator's interview in a Georgia prison. The prisoner, a bank embezzler, made unsworn and untranscribed accusations against Lance. Otherwise, the two Senators rehashed newspaper stories (concentrating on Lance's questionable use of his bank's airplane) and informed the President that Lance's usefulness was no more

Nor was the committee staff's report on Lance, given behind closed doors to the Governmental Affairs Committee, any more impressive. "It was pretty superficial stuff." one Democratic Senator told us. "It was the kind of stuff a good lawyer on cross-examination could make mincemeat of." Another Democratic committee member said the presentation "certainly contained no grounds for prosecution.

Several Senators accused the staff of "irresponsibility" for interviewing a convict - notoriously sources of self-serving misinformation — and permitting that information to leak into the press

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of taking the readings Doctors who have their patients take their own blood pressure at home between visits take pains to be sure the proper procedure is used. It's best to have the patient take his or her own pressure in the office first. If the doctor's reading coincides with the patient's, then everyone concerned can feel more secure. Unless a person has a known hypertension, the selfreading may be meaningless. For those who do it at the doctor's request, a record is kept by the patient so the physician knows what goes on between office visits.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I've been getting allergy shots for years, but they haven't helped my sinus condition, which is actually getting worse as the years go by.

I'm 58 and I'm ready to grasp at any straw. I'm hoping you can help me. Mrs. M.P

No one could be of much help with the sketchy information you supply. But the message should be getting through by now. The shots, whatever they are, aren't helping. So why continue with them? Tell your doctor they aren't and that you think it's time for a reevaluation of your sinus problem. If you get no satisfaction, it's time to switch doctors. My booklet on sinuses might offer you some leads to follow up. For a copy send 50 cents and a stamped self-addressed envelope to me care of the Big Spring Herald. Allergists are skilled in tracking down the pesky substances at the root of many sinus troubles.

A sleepwalker can do many strange things, including unlocking doors. The commonest theory about somnambulism (sleepwalking) is that it stems from an emotional stress A child may, for example, go to the parents' bedroom in the night for consolation.

If you sleepwalked only once, that occasion may have reflected a temporary disturbance. It may never happen again if that temporary problem was resolved. If it does recur, you may need counseling to resolve conflicts in your life.

Sleepwalkers rarely hurt themselves, but they should not be startled or touched during an episode. The best way to awaken a sleepwalker is to call out his name softly and repeatedly.



Funds to aid displaced homemakers proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) -Congress is studying a bill that would help establish centers to retrain millions of divorced or widowed women who have labored for decades as homemakers and mothers, but suddenly find themselves on their own.

Often spurned by lawmakers, state employment services and the women's movement, these 'older women, whether to support their children or themselves, are often ill-prepared to enter the labor market," the bill's sponsor, Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., told a hearing Monday.

Bayh's bill would give the states \$10 million in the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1 to help them open service centers for the displaced homemakers.

Bayh told the Senate human resources subcommittee that such middle aged women, robbed of their livelihood by divorce or the death of a spouse, get little help from Social Security and job placement programs.

He noted that widows cannot collect on their husband's Social Security until age 60. If these women do "breach
