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Now in Atlanta Cool' gunman holds jet, hostages

ATLANTA (AP) - A "very"calm, very cool" gunman seeking \$3 million and freedom for a jailed friend hijacked a Frontier Airlines jetliner carrying 33 persons at a Nebraska airport today. He forced the plane to fly to Kansas City, released about half his hostages and then flew on to Atlanta where the friend had been held, authorities said.

The Boeing 737 made a normal landing at 12:04 p.m. EDT, several hundred yards in front of the main terminal at Hartsfield Airport. It sat at the end of a cleared runway, then moved off slowly and was expected to go into a freight terminal where the FBI, Federal Aviation Administration and security officers had set up a command post.

FBI spokesman Bill Williams said that while the plane was on the ground in Kansas City, the hijacker, who carried a sawed-off shotgun, released unharmed 18 passengers — eight women, eight children and two men. He kept 15 hostages - two male crewmen, two stewardesses and 11 male passengers, Williams said.

The Federal Aviation Administration in Atlanta said the plane was slightly late getting to Atlanta because of minor pressurization problems which forced it to fly at a slower speed and lower altitude than normal.

The FBI in Kansas City said the hijacker, identified as Thomas Hannan, 29, of Grand Island, Neb. demanded \$3 million, two parachutes, two machine guns, two pistols and the release from an Atlanta jail of his partner in an alleged robbery last month at a bank formerly headed by resigned budget director Bert Lance. The FAA said the plane took off from Kansas City just after 10 a.m.

Police may arrest church arsonists soon

The arrest of the culprits in Monday's arson-burglary of the First Pentacostal Church, 1010 W. 4th, is expected today according to Big Spring Detective Mike Kelly.

Officers recovered \$2,300 worth of merchandise which had been stolen in the church burglary. The six items were found behing nailed doors in the attic of a local home

'We think that several people were involved in this, and hope to make some arrests later today," said Kelly this morning.

Recovered merchandise included a bass guitar, two guitar amplifiers, and three speakers. Investigators believe that after the merchandise was stolen Monday the culprits set fire to a mattress in the sanctuary of the church, resulting in \$30,000 damage to the building and its contents

Asked if troops might be used in an effort to free victims of the hijacking, Bell responded: "I don't have any troops. We would use the FBI and local law enforcement agencies."

Bell noted there are restrictions on the use of troops within the United States. But he noted the FBI has had experience in handling hijackings.

Williams said a high school friend of Hannan's who was on board the plane by chance tried in vain to get him to give up when he commandeered it at the Hall County Airport in Grand Island, Neb. about 6:30 a.m. CDT.

Focalpoint Action/reaction: Official audited

Q. Recently I was told that a public official had formed his own company here dealing with electronic security and para-legal investigations. How can the taxpayers be assured that their tax money is not being spent by this county employe on his own company? A. District Judge R.W. Caton (about whom the questions were not asked) was approached about the matter and issued the following opinion "A public official may engage in outside business activities provided such activities do not interfere or conflict with the duties of his office. There are at least 13 public officers in the courthouse who also have outside business interests in the local community. The office in question is audited on the same basis as all other public offices and has always met or exceeded the standards imposed by all counties within its jurisdiction. The district judge is advised of all outside financial interests of the chief officer as a matter of administrative requirement and monitors office activity daily.

Massive manhunt seeks kidnap-murder suspect

BONN, West Germany (AP) -West German police today launched what they called their most extensive hunt since World War II for six men and ten women sought in the kidnapmurder of industrialist Hanns-Martin Schleyer.

As the search for the 16 began in Germany, violence flared across Europe to protest the prison deaths of three German radicals. German terrorists vowed the violence "has just begun." Bombings and other incidents were reported in Britain, France, Holland, Italy, Austria and Greece.

In Paris, two German tourist buses were firebombed in the Latin quarter and police said two persons were arrested. There were no reports of injuries. Explosions ripped German auto showrooms in a Paris suburb and two southern cities, including a Mercedes-Benz dealership in Moutauban and a showroom in Toulouse. The bombs caused heavy damage but no reported injuries.

"One-hundred-thousand explosive attacks will destroy the structures of West German capitalism in Europe," said a man who identified himself as a spokesman for the West German Red Army Faction in a call to the Mar-

seilles office of the French news agency Agence France-Presse. The Red Army group claimed responsibility for the Schleyer kid-

naping In Bonn, government spokesman Klause Boelling declared the terrorists "shall not rest. Every citizen in our country will help security officials track down the criminals.

The body of the 62-year-old Schleyer, who was abducted Sept. 5 in Gologne, was found Wednesday night in the trunk of a car in the French border city of Mulhouse. He had been shot in the head. The Federal Criminal Office said it

believed Schleyer's killers were part of the same terrorist cell responsible for the slayings of German banker Juergen Ponto and Chief Federal Prosecutor Siegfried Buback.

At airports, railway stations and shopping areas throughout West Germany, police were distributing 100,000 handbills with the pictures of the suspects.

Police also began spot checks of motorists on major highways in West Germany and West Berlin, and border guards increased their surveillance at crossing points.

Kim said the KCIA reported its progress directly to President Park Kim produced a letter from KCIA headquarters saying "the Patriarch has expressed his satisfaction." Kim said he had been told the letter referred to Park.

"We have been unable to reach agreement," said the Korean Justice Ministry as the three U.S. Justice Department officials left for Washington.

Area doctor supply increasing steadily

The Permian Basin and other areas

Including physicians drawn from other states and foreign countries. Texas granted licenses to a record 1.806 doctors in 1976. TMA supported a bill aimed at getting more family physicians in rural areas. The association is continuing to encourage doctors to settle in under-served

Four escape Ector jail

ODESSA, Tex. (AP) - The escape of four prisoners from the Ector County Jail was discovered early this morning, county authorities said.

Officials said the breakout was discovered at 7 a.m. and theorized the escape was made about midnight.

Ector County Sheriff Elton Faught declined further comment about the breakout

The escapees were identified as Roy Day, 22, held on a theft charge; Robert Lee Dawson, 37, jailed on a burglary charge; Jack Wilson Roman, 26, being held for violation of probation; and Stanley Perrins, 22, who had been sentenced to 14 years in the state prison in Huntsville and was awaiting transportation there.

'It is a win-or-lose suit that will last three years, and will be finally decided by the Supreme Court," said Nagel.

The city manager said that the conference also yielded valuable information about municipal airport operations and a number of other areas of city government.



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Publisher's corner-Voters must make vital decision

A very important meeting between the Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce's Industrial Team and representatives of clubs and organizations took place Monday.

The meeting, conducted by chamber President Roger Brown, explained the local question which will be on the Nov. 5 ballot.

On that first Saturday in November. there will be a statewide vote on seven amendments, but the most important issue for those of us in this region will be a local question.

The question is whether to allow Howard County to contribute to the industrial effort

RESIDENTS OF Howard County will have the opportunity to vote "for or "against" an amendment which will be worded like this:

"Authorizing the County Com-

missioners of Howard County, Texas, if they deem advisable, to appropriate from the General Fund an amount not to exceed five cents (5c) on the one hundred dollar (\$100.00) assessed valuation for the purpose of advertising and promoting the growth and development of Howard County.

Brown wanted to explain the vote to as many organization representatives as possible and to ask their support for the measure. He passed out a copy of the law

which enables counties to participate in developmental efforts - providing the voters approve Brown noted that the vote would

only enable commissioners to participate in industrial development. The law says that following such a vote they "may." The chamber president said the

commissioners could add one cent (per \$100 valuation) or two cents, or whatever amount they felt the county could afford, but the amount by law could not exceed five cents. He said the vote would only be an enabling one and would not guarantee that the county would necessarily contribute to the effort to attract industry.

Brown also emphasized that this vote does not involve an increase in taxes. The commissioners can take from the general fund whatever monies they can afford.

GARY TRIM, who will head a speaker's bureau for the chamber on this effort, told the group that the vote is only a couple of weeks away. A favorable vote would allow the county to reinvest tax money already being paid into the crucial industrial effort,

he said.

The City of Big Spring currently contributes \$23,000 per year toward the chamber's effort to attract industry.

Industrial Team Leader Winston Wrinkle made the point that industrial development in a county saves everyone money. It brings in new jobs and new companies to share in the tax burden, and it helps take tax pressure off the homeowner and the farmer. While this would seem to be one

issue that almost everyone in Howard County could support, there will be some who will remain negative. Because of the expected very light


President Carter's human rights campaign from shrill publicity to quiet diplomacy became evident in one aspect of Mr. Carter's talk with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko Sept. 30.

Although strategic arms and a Mideast settlement were the centerpieces, the President pointedly raised one of the most celebrated Soviet human rights cases, believed here to be a direct violation of the Helsinki accords - the case of Anatoly Scharansky, Scharansky, a leading dissident, was arrested without public charge in mid-March and, so far as any one in the West knows, is still in jail

ESCHEWING HINTS of threat or retaliation (both clearly in the U.S. arsenal), Mr. Carter repeated privately what he had said publicly on June 13: that the still-unpublished charge of high treason against Scharansky as a U.S. spy is without foundation. He asked Gromyko to convey his strong personal hope to President Leonid Brezhnev that Scharansky be set free.

Mr. Carter's new hush-hush approach to human rights, a keystone of his foreign policy, was dramatically different from the soap-box treatment of earlier days, but so was Gromyko's response. He accepted the Carter thrust without reproach

This toned-down exchange between the two leaders also contrasted sharply with the ferocious exchange between Rita Hauser, a U.S. delegate, and key Communist party leaders at the so-called U.S. Soviet "Dartmouth" conference in Riga, Latvia, last July. When Hauser raised the Scharansky case and asked for an explanation, Soviet members of the conference flared, caustically telling her it was not the business of the U.S. that it was strictly an "internal" matter and that Soviet legal authorities had "evidence" against

The muted publicity now being given the human rights campaign has led many critics toward this angry but unproved conclusion: Mr. Carter, his White House adviser. Zbigniew Brzezinski, and the State Department, stung by the Kremlin's public fury in expressing displeasure over the U.S. campaign have backed away from human rights to reach an accommodation with Moscow on strategic arms and other issues.

The critics may prove right in the end, but evidence is lacking today, as witness the following:

ITEM: IN A high-level session with State Department bureaucrats in the National Security Council's situation room the afternoon of Aug. 23, Brzezinski switched signals on U.S. plans for the second session of the post-Helsinki Belgrade conference. In collaboration with Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher, he recruited Arthur Goldberg as chief U.S. delegate. Middle-level U.S. diplomats, wanting to minimize U.S. Soviet disagreements, backed Ambassador Albert W. Sherer, a Class 1 career Foreign Service officer who headed the U.S. delegation in last spring's preliminary Belgrade session, but clearly lacks Goldberg's stature.

ITEM: GOLDBERG laid down a condition for accepting the post. Sties recur because the germ is not completely eliminated. Warm to hot compresses over the lid in the beginning will reduce the infection and hasten the "pointing" of the sty. A sty begins as small, reddened area on the margin of the lid. It may develop as a tender swelling of the entire lid. In a few days a yellow center forms (pus). It usually erupts a few days later. Sties on the inside of thelids are more stubborn and tend to recur more easily

In stubborn cases, an antibiotic or a sulfa preparation taken by mouth may be needed to halt the infection. Because the staph germ is so widespread on the body, it's essential to keep the hands clean and away later. Sties on the inside of the lids are more stubborn and tend to recur more easily

It's a controllable situation, and there's no need to continue being miserable. Get some treatment.

### Robert Newhouse valuable, but somewhat forgotten

Not necessarily forgotten — but maybe a tad overlooked, Dallas Cowboys fullback Robert Newhouse mentioned in some five or six post-game interviews Sunday "that I'm just trying to stay consistent and healthy

That last word of the comment is the key one. Healthy. That's what Robert Newhouse has to be to be an effective and contributing weapon in the complex Dallas Cowboys offense.

A year ago Newhouse was hamstrung by groin problems. After rushing for a career-high 930 yards in 1975, "House" fell off in 1976 to 450 yards while playing hurt throughout the year.

Just prior to the start of the '76 season, it was discovered at the Cowboys training camp in Thousand Oaks, Calif., that Newhouse's pelvis had been cracked from an automobile accident that had occurred in the fall of 1971. The injury had still not healed properly some five years later

"The wreck was between my junior and senior seasons at the University of Houston," explained Newhouse, "and after the ambulance crew took me to a Polk County (near Lufkin, Tex.) hospital, I was released the next day. I had some cuts and other injuries but I came out of it okay. I thought.

"My parents took me to a doctor the next day and he turned out to be a quack. I didn't receive the proper treatment. Then we found out last year that the pelvis had never healed properly and was aggravating my groin. It was a miserable season last year and the only way the pelvis and groin area were going to heal was with time."

Now Newhouse is making up for lost time as the 27-yearold running back has rushed for 73, 67 and 71 yards in the Cowboys' latest three wins — over the Buccaneers, Cardinals and Redkins. Against Tampa Bay and Washington, it was Newhouse who led the Cowboys in rushing for the day - not the more-written-about Tony Dorsett or Preston Pearson.

Does Newhouse resent the attention that his running mates at tailback are getting, a reporter wanted to know? "Not at all," he said smiling. "I have a great deal of respect for both our halfbacks. This is a halfback-oriented



team. And they're both great runners. They help me, and I them. I'm just trying to do my job. This is a great place to play because everybody's playing as a team. A lot of things are working well this year. I want to stay healthy and continue contributing."

There's that word again. Healthy.

Used in a different context it helps translate a difficult first quarter situation the Cowboys found themselves in against the hard-hitting Redskins in a game eventually won by Dallas, 34-16. Call it an unhealthy situation. One that Newhouse helped create.

Just three minutes into the game, the diminutive (5-9,

205) fullback fumbled to the Redkins at the Dallas 11-yard line while struggling for extra yardage. "We had quite a few mistakes out there for awhile," said Robert, "in a game we knew we couldn't make too many. It was tough. They came after us. It looked real rough for me when they scored after the fumble (a 25-yard field goal), but I was able to come back and score two TDs."

Newhouse's first touchdown, a seven-yard run in the second quarter, gave the Cowboys a 14-6 lead. It was his only carry of the scoring drive as he blasted into the end zone standing up.

Newhouse capped the Cowboys' longest drive of the day by pounding into the end zone on third and goal from the six-yard line with 1:12 left in the game to finish an 83-yard scoring drive, that saw the little man from Longview, Tex., gain 22 yards, all inside where the going was most difficult.

"The key phrase in the National Football League is getting the job done," says Newhouse. "People have questioned my size. I think being a running back - big, small or whatever - the thing is getting the job done.

"Size doesn't play that big a role. Ever since I was in college, I realized I wouldn't grow any bigger, so if I was going to play pro ball, I had to get out there and do it. That's what I'm trying to do.

"I want to help this team get back to the Super Bowl. I was there once and I want to go back and win this time. I'm trying to stay consistent. And healthy.' There's that word again.

Foxx's variety show. James and Pauline Fawcett of Houston filed the suit Wednesday against the American Broadcasting Co and Houston television station KTRK-TV

The Fawcetts claim in the suit that the skit, aired Sept 22. depicted them in such a way to cause them damage ridicule embarrassment and humiliation. The suit seeks \$2 million in actual damages and \$5 million in punitive damages.

An ABC spokesman in New York described the skit as one that fictitiously depicted an interview with Mr. and Mrs Fawcett. The spokesman said Redd Foxx portrayed Mr Fawcett and wore a Farrah Fawcett wig, as did his dog and bird.


