- 'Press the World Bank and other credit to those nations that acquire nuclear weapons.

'Decrease the number of nuclear warheads in national arsenals by substituting a certain number of "dud" warheads on actual missiles. Since the enemy won't know which warheads are duds, a nation could have the same deterrent with a reduced number of live warheads."

Still others offered ideas on prohibiting production or shipment of nuclear weapons materials, shutting existing nuclear power plants and strengthening international inspection and enforcement powers.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Some Amtrak commuters found their regular trains canceled today as the national passenger rail service began making budget-dictated cutbacks, mostly in the Northeast.

An Amtrak spokesman said Sunday four trains were being cut this week and others tentatively are scheduled for elimination on Nov. 6. He said the lines might yet be saved if Congress

A Senate Appropriations subcommittee voted last week to give Amtrak an additional \$18 million to keep the trains running, but final congressional action still must be

The planned cutbacks would hit the busy Washington-to-Boston corridor hardest with an average of 22 daily trains serving those routes being

The trains canceled included two of eight regular Turboliner runs between Chicago and Milwaukee and the "Clamdigger," a weekday commuter service between Providence and New Haven, the spokesman said.

Metroliner service between New York and New Haven also was terminated due to a change in the line's

15,000 Lithuanians give Soviet police headaches

MOSCOW (AP) — An estimated 15,000 Lithuanians streamed out of a soccer stadium in Vilnius, ripped down propaganda posters, overturned cars and set police vehicles afire in some of the worst rioting since the Soviet Union took over the Baltic country in 1940, dissident sources

A spokesman for the Interior Ministry in Vilnius (Vilna), the capital of Soviet Lithuania, admitted there was a "disturbance" after/a soccer match between a Lithuanian and Russian team on Oct. 10. But he said it was not serious

"As often happens, several teenagers got into a fight after the game. he said. "Four of them were detained, spoken to and let go.

One dissident, ambulance medic Alexander Podrabinek, said he visited Vilnius and was told the trouble began when the crowd at the match began to shout "Russians go home" "Katsapy," a derogatory term for Russians

When the game ended the spectators started their rampage through the streets. Militiamen, security police and auxiliary policemen tried to control the rioting, but when they

said today. The statement was made by Vicki Tyler with the Oklahoma Child Protective Unit of the Institutional and Social Rehabilitative Services department. Ms. Tyler told the Herald that Oklahoma was just "going to let

it ride for a while. The statement followed an unannounced interview with the daughter, who is a freshman at a Tulsa high school, by Ms. Tyler and Tulsa County

According to Ms. Tyler, the daughter was upset that she had been located with her mother. The daughter spoke of the indictments as "hanging over her" and "wanting to start a new family and a new life. Ms. Tyler said that the department and the school would keep an eye on the girl and that the girl had ac-

cepted information about where to turn in case of trouble. The interview followed a tip passed to the Herald by the police reporter of the Tulsa Tribune, who also notified Oklahoma authorities that the Freeman girl was possibly living in

Tulsa with her mother. Mrs. Freeman is under twin indictments in 118th District Court on charges of rape of a child, incest, injury to a child, and indecency by exposure. The first indictment, filed February 25, 1976 named her natural son and daughter as victims. The second named the natural children of Harold Roy Freeman, who also faces sex charges in 118th District Court. The second indictment was filed June 14, 1977. She has posted \$40,000 bond

on the two indictments. Custody of the girl and her younger brother was removed from the Freeman's by District Judge Ralph Caton following a January, 1976 arrest of the couple on the sex crime charges involving the children. The custody was first un-successfully placed with a San Angelo couple, and then transferred to the

children's natural father in New Hampshire. According to authorities, the children had run away from their New Hampshire home at least once. According to Martha Weston of the Child Protective Unit of the Oklahoma Department of Institutional and

Social Rehabilitative Services.

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands (AP) — Police today circulated a composite drawing of a blackhaired, mustachioed suspect in the kidnaping of Maurits Caransa. The Dutch millionaire's family said, meanwhile, none of the many ransom demands telephoned to newspapers seems genuine.

The drawing, published in the mass-circulation newspaper De Telegraaf, was based on a description provided by a woman who witnessed the abduction last Friday.

Police said an alert also has been issued for a stolen red Fiat sedan that may have been used as

The Caransa family has appealed by radio to the kidnapers to make their demands known.

Police are continuing to handle the abduction of the 61-year-old real estate operator as a criminal case and not as a political kidnaping by urban guerrillas. They said they have no reason to believe any of the calls received so far are authentic and they have received no written demand from anyone with evidence they are holding Caransa.

A police spokesman said the flood of telephone messages to the press making various ransom demands was hampering efforts to find the victim and his captors.

Caransa was overpowered and forced into a car by four or five persons Friday as he left an Amsterdam nightclub.

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Dock strike is crippling

NEW YORK (AP) - The current dockworkers' strike is dealing a severe blow to the nation's economy, hurting many small firms and stymying efforts to trim unemployment, experts say.

According to a report to be released this week by Data Resources, an economic service in Lexington, Mass., the strike will take \$700 million out of the Gross National Product in the final quarter of this year and trim another \$600 million from the GNP during the first three

Data Resources sees \$2.2 billion in U.S. exports not moving overseas and \$1 billion in imports lost because of the strike. As a

result, it expects the Gross National Product growth rate to tumble from the 4.7 percent projected for this quarter to 4.5 percent, then sink from the projected 4.4 per cent for the next quarter to 4.3 percent.

At the same time, small businesses which depend on shipping for their inventory are hurting because they have no goods to sell.

Abe Mokover, a furrier from New City, N.Y., sent President Carter a telegram asking for a Taft-Hartley injunction against the walkout against containerized shipping. Such an injunction would force dockers back to work for an 80-cooling off period, during which time the shippers and the ILA presumably would try to resolve their differnces.

Mokover, an employee of I. Meilch, Inc., a mediumsize Manhattan fur importer, told Carter in the telegram,

"I have merchandise in containers which may suffer both damage and loss of season." He explained that if furs remain in sealed airless containers for many weeks, they risk damage that could run into hundreds of thousands of dollars for his company alone.

'I'm sure that thousands of others are involved in the same situation," Mokover

His plight is shared by thousands of businssmen dependent on goods that cross the oceans in the modern van-size containers that move between rail, highway and ship with negligible need for labor at the waterfront. The selective strike

against container carriers that was launched Oct. 1 by 50,000 members of the ILA along the Atlantic and Gulf coasts has threatened to take all the joy out of the Christmas season for Mokover and others whose sales peak in December.

A series of talks aimed at resolving the month-long selective dock strike are scheduled to begin this week in northern port cities along the Atlantic Ocean.

Negotiations in southern cities along the Atlantic and in cities along the Gulf Coast were initiated earlier.



His new book, entitled "Down the Seine and Up the Potomac,' reestablishes his dominance of the satirical column — just in case anyone had forgotten.

PUBLISHED BY Putnam and available at Big Spring bookstores at the ourageous cost of \$10.95, the book notes Buchwald's 25th year as a columnist. He went to Paris for the old New York Herald-Tribute in 1952, and after a decade of destroying Europe, he turned his prickly pen on

To me. Buchwald is not always funny. His writing is not always varied: it sometimes reflects what I suspect to be an inherent laziness

But when he is good, there is no one better. He may well be the best satirist in the English language since Pope and Swift, as the Chicago Tribute has described him.

While his columns have been combined into 17 books, this one is a premier display of his talent, chosen from the 4,000 he has written.

His best are magnificent. In one column entitled "The Good and the Bad," he attempts to explain to his son after seeing an old World War II movie how the Germans and the Japanese were the bad guys and the Russians were the good guys, but now

the Russians are the bad guys and the Japanese and the Germans are the good guys - except for the East Germans, which are the new bad guys. He gives up in despair: "Well, it doesn't make any difference if you understand it or not. Everyone else does. I never saw a kid who asked so many silly questions.

In another classic, Buchwald imagines to himself what might have happened if Barry Goldwater, the hawk, had been elected president, and he imagines, of course, the same Vietnam War the country found itself in under President Johnson.

DURING THE height of the nation's

phobia about an internal Communist takeover plot, Buchwald wrote a column that laments the shortage of Reds in the U.S. for the growing of anticommunist number organizations to combat. He wrote:

'In Waco, Texas, for example, the nearest card-holding Communist Party member lives in Dallas, a hundred miles away. While Waco stands at the ready to repulse the infidel, the Communist Party member has been warned not to leave Dallas, as the anticommunist organizations there claim that since he lives in Dallas he belongs to them.'

During the period of violence at the nation's college campus, Buchwald writes of a father and mother who are weeping because their son has been accepted into college. They pleaded with their boy to go into the Army for four years before going to school to see if the campus fighting wouldn't die down, but the youth said he felt a responsibility to go where his friends were fighting.

Buchwald's humor strikes across political ideologies and at the soft spot in every issue.

Even with the comic touch, his is tough writing. For example, Buchwald claims to have discovered some verse President Nixon composed to his rival poet Mao in China. Nixon's poem went

'There are no clouds in the sky, the wind is but a whisper in the trees, lakes sparkle as birds sing. It's a good day to bomb Cambodia.

JERUSALEM - Although resumption of the elusive Geneva conference is closer than ever before, the decision of Prime Minister Menahem Begin to exclude any semblance of the Palestine Liberation Organization (PLO) is not subject to change whatever the Arabs and President Carter say

That determination helps explain the bunker mood here that the U.S. and Israel may be on collision course.

WHAT'S MORE, the new leader of Israel is supported by politicians of Outside the handful of Communists in the 120-member Knesset, the exceptions are a few brave, unconventional politicians who feel that 'discussing" the future of the West Bank with non-PLO "notables" without the PLO present is like a wedding with no bride, only bridesmaids.

"Discussing" - not negotiating -West Bank was a limitation agreed to in the U.S.-Israeli working paper earlier this month. Israel is ready for "negotiations" leading to final peace treaties with Egypt, Syria and Jordan — but as regards the West Bank, the operative word is

'discuss Foreign Minister Moshe Davan put it explicitly to the Knesset: "We will discuss the issues of the West Bank (formerly under Jordanian rule) and the Gaza Strip (formerly Egyptian) not a peace treaty and not the establishment of a state,

"Jimmy Carter's notion of the Palestinian issue is one that we cannot stomach." one highly-informed official told us. Mr. Carter has long favored a homeland for the nearly 1.5 million Palestinian Arabs, but Israeli leaders feel they have not foiled that objective and blunted his flirtation with the PLO

But in addition to Israel's determination to insulate Geneva from any taint of the PLO, Begin is pushing an Israeli formulation covering future status of the West Bank that defies definition. The government describes this future status as a "functional" arrangement," including vague ties to Jordan but no Jordanian or any other sovereignty.

WHEN THIS formulation is affixed to the ban on the highly politicized PLO, what emerges can be called a political entity by a long stretch of the imagination: murky autonomy for the Palestinans, local administration under Jordanian law, possible seats in the Jordanian parliament, possible membership in the Jordanian cabinet, Israeli defense lines on the Jordan River and down the spine of the Samarian Hills.

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

'hosteson: Can you tell me something about polps in the lower colon and rectum? I would also appreciate anything you can tell me about a diet to help prevent them.

Some people are polyp formers. In fact, there is a condition in which there are polyps throughout the intestinal tract. It may run in families. But about half of all polyps are found within reach (by way of the rectum) and can be readily removed, as yours

Polyps with little stem-like attachments to the wall are usually benign. Broad-based ones are more suspicious. Those under a half inch in size (1.2 centimeters) are usually

Polyps in the gut beyond the reach of the instrument can be checked periodically with a flexible viewing instrument (a fibroscope) to see if they change in size or appearance

of strangers bearing gitts. WASHINGTON — Several of the nation's most high-powered corporations have joined in a conspiracy to kill the unborn Consumer Protection Agency. An awesome

agency for more than eight years. They include such companies as Armour, Armstrong Cork, Bethlehem Steel, Exxon, Firestone, Georgia Pacific, Maytag, Shell, Sun Oil and United Airlines

They have formed a pressure bloc which they call the Ad Hoc Consumer Issues Working Group. This lobbying force has pulled wires, scratched backs and twisted arms on Capitol Hill. It has also provided blistering, anti-consumer speeches for willing congressmen.

Despite these efforts, the consumer legislation squeaked through the House Government Operations Committee last May by a 22 to 21 vote. It would create a small, independent, nonregulatory agency to represent the consumers in the policy councils. BUT THE horrified business nabobs

saw it as an institutionalized Ralph Nader, with all the harassment powers of the federal government. They got busy behind the scenes, therefore, lining up votes to strangle the agency in its crib. But the pro-consumer congressmen

engaged in some backroom strategy of their own. They worked out an agreement to modify the legislation to satisfy some of its critics. This might get the bill past the formidable opposition that the Big Business lobby has organized in the House. Word of the compromise leaked out

and the alarmed corporate powers called an emergency meeting the other day at the Washington Hilton. There was much bellyaching and backbiting. Some businessmen complained that no one let them know what was going on. Others cursed the Carter administration for trying to sneak the hated legislation past them. Armstrong Cork's bluntspoken

Emmett Hines, who presided over the secret session, was not interested in a compromise that would satisfy both sides. He just wanted to bury the Consumer Protection Agency. "The better the bill," he snorted, "the worse it is for us.

Another participant also rejected any concessions, warning the assembled business tycoons to remember the "Trojan Horse" story. The moral of the story was to beware

Still another warned that the White House would throw its full weight behind the bill because "there is a big need for a White House victory, and this could well be it." array of corporate powers have succeeded in blocking the proposed The assembled tycoons agreed to make a last-ditch effort to defeat the

> consumer bill. Already, congressmen are being bombarded with calls and letters from their friends with corporate connections. THE WRIGHT MAN: Hardworking

> Joe Shosid is a one-man band who beats the drums for House Democratic leader Jim Wright in Fort Worth, Texas. During the past two campaigns,

> Shosid ran Wright's congressional Texas, simultaneously as Wright's campaign treasurer, disbursed campaign funds to his own advertising agency and purchased campaign ads through himself. Here are the fascinating details: Shoside drew a \$27,000 annual

salary from the taxpayers until the end of last year. He also owned a firm called Advertising Unlimited, which handled Wright's political advertising during the two campaigns. He funneled \$42,855 in campaign business through his own agency. Last December, Shosid sold his

advertising agency and gave up the campaign treasurer's post to avoid even the appearance, he said, of a conflict of interest. To ease the sacrifice, Wright quietly increased his congressional salary to \$38,000. AS CAMPAIGN treasuer, Shosid previously helped raise \$132,435 for

the congressman's 1976 campaign, although Wright had an easy campaign and didn't need the money. Many of the contributions came from the aerospace, construction and high-way lobbies that need a friend like Wright on Capitol Hill. Both Wright and Shosid talked to us

at length. The congressman admitted Shosid's juggling act was "unusual" but insisted it was "not unethical." Wright added that he was unaware any income at all had gone into Shoshid's firm.

Shosid claimed that most of the money went to pay for ads and commercials, with only about \$5,000 going to the firm in commissions. His total profit on the campaign, Shosid told us, was no more than \$1,000.

Footnote: Wright himself is a skilled advertising man and collected \$6,000 in fees from the Shosid firm several years ago.







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

Ear damage explored

Studies have shown that humans exposed to rock music sustain temporary hearing losses. A study described in the American Family Physician involves six chinchillas - animals that are slightly more suspectible to inner ear damage from noise exposure than humans. When exposed to rock music, the extent of damage sustained varied considerably.

"This variability comparable to differences in the amount of hearing loss measured in humans after exposure to rock music," the researchers conclude. It 'lends support to the idea the general population, there is a range of susceptibility to noise exposure." They also suggest "extending current damage-risk criteria for human noise exposure to include exposure to music as





Inedible treats could be best

Because many parents are spooked by the idea of poisoned Halloween candy, the occasion may be dying out. But the Texas Medical Association suggests a safer alternative to candy. Giving inedible treats may reassure parents and still let children participate in the excitement of trick-or-treat.

Giving balloons, pencils, coins or other small relatively inexpensive items probably will please children just as much or more than candy. Then parents will not have to inspect and maybe throw out suspicious candy People who give inedible treats also may save children from stomach aches caused by too much candy in one night. Of course it is still fairly

safe for children to have trick-or-treat candy that never has been unwrapped children should wait until parents have had a chance to inspect candy before the kids devour their loot. Parents also should be careful toddlers do not swallow or otherwise injure themselves with inedible treats.

Adults also have some responsibility for avoiding vehicle-pedestrian ac cidents. Many children get excited and dash across streets or they simply cannot see well in their costumes so motorists need to be especially careful at Halloween.

Parents can prepare children for safe trick-ortreating by helping them choose safe costumes. Loosefitting masks or ones with small eyeholes should by avoided. Cosemtics, burnt cork or grease paing can be used as a safe alternative to masks. Costumes should have bright colors, reflective tape or other materials that make children highly visible Outfits should not include hazards such as sharp in struments, candles or loose cloth that could snag on obstacles.


