



In case of any rain the county judge has the discretion to lift the burn ban. For now the burn ban is in effect for 90 days.





left with the smells of new chalk and disinfectant. It was a safe smell that meant the new year held the promise of being a wonderful year of



Psalms 7-Conditional Refuge

God is a refuge for all who would run to Him. God is a rock you can lean on, a fortress and shield to protect from trouble, yet, these promises of protection and care are conditional, not automatic for everyone, everywhere.

In fact, Psalm 7 is a psalm of contrasts that makes this clear. On one side, humble David is seeking refuge in the Lord as his enemies close in on him. During such trials and danger David runs to the Lord and takes refuge in the reality that God is a refuge for all who are oppressed because He is also the righteous judge.

In fact, God is a refuge for those who run to Him, but God is a wrathful judge for those who do not repent.

In fact, verse 11 tells us the Lord "feels indignation every day."

Further, verse 12 says "If a man does not repent, God will whet His sword..." which is another way of saying those who don't turn to God in repentance and faith are in massive trouble as they will face the wrath of God.

The contrasts in this Psalm are life and death, refuge and judgment, depending on where you are with God. God is not mocked by nations or individuals, and those who know Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior can experience His refuge from the storms of life, while all who choose otherwise will face the full force of God's indignation against sin.



God Shapes Everyone

Last week, I wrote about praising God for people who have hurt you, and how He is using them to shape your life. While writing last week's column, God simply said to forgive them because they didn't know what they were doing.

Upon further reflection, I have come to realize that sometimes people really didn't know what they are doing. They don't know how their actions/words affect others; they don't know the harm they cause; in some cases, they are so obsessed with what they want or think, they don't care how it affects others.

When God first told me to forgive some people who hurt me because they didn't know what they were doing, I didn't like it. My humanness was asking why this was all on me when they were the ones who did wrong? It made me wonder AGAIN if I had actually forgiven them in the first place.

Our humanness wants God to get back at people for what they have done to us; we want them to hurt or pay for what they have done; we want justice, our kind of justice. I remember Beth Moore saying one time, "Don't you dare pray for something bad to happen to someone," which is sometimes hard not to do, especially when you have been hurt or done wrong (or for me when it comes to sports competitions and I want my team to win).

I believe people sometimes intentionally do/say things to hurt others; other times, I don't think they know better. Maybe they haven't been reared knowing how to treat others; maybe they are so consumed with their worlds they don't care or take the time to consider others.

Sometimes all we can do is what Jesus did on the cross and ask His Father to forgive them, because they really and truly didn't know what they were doing. In so doing, God is shaping us more into the likeness of His Son. And, just as God is using those who hurt us to shape us, He is using us to shape to shape

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

After the technical review is complete the executive director will consider the comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or significant public comments. If only comments are received, the response to comments, along with the executive director's decision on the application, will then be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments or who is on the mailing list for this application, unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING You may request a contested case hearing. 
