On the plus side, the centerfold shot did bring Playgirl's 1974, "Man of the Year" some television and commercial parts, friendship with Mae West and a second marriage to a former Miss Arizona. But he says now he'd rather get into show business through an agent.

"I wouldn't pose for another magazine nude," the 35-year-old Apple Valley High School physical education teacher said. "It's OK if it's in statues or museums, but when you do it in the flesh, it doesn't work.'

Zivkovich says he expected some public notice, but nothing like the "disaster" that resulted when the skin magazine arrived on the newstands of

### Defeat proved aood lesson

NÉW ORLEANS (AP) - New Orleans' first black mayor says it was after his defeat for a city council seat eight years ago that he first believed the nation's 20th largest city would be ready to elect a black mayor this year

"But I put that out of my mind for a while after I went on to the state legislature and then the juvenile court bench," Ernest "Dutch" Morial said Sunday following his victory over his white opponent, City Councilman Joe DiRosa.

DiRosa beat Morial by 5,600 votes in the city council election eight years ago. Morial reversed that six weeks ago when he led an 11-man field for mayor by 4,400 votes. In Saturday's runoff against DiRosa, he won by almost 5,500 votes.

Final unofficial totals gave Morial 89,823 votes or 51.5 percent and DiRosa 84,352 and 48.5 percent. Both men are Democrats.

Morial will take office May 1, succeeding Moon Landrieu, a recent president of the U.S. Conference of Mayors who was forbidden by law from running for a third term.

Morial said he decided to run for mayor two years ago when a poll showed him third on a list of potential candidates. He was a state appellate judge at that time.

Morial, 48, received 97 percent of the black vote and 19 percent of the white vote, according to pollsters.

The white percentage was nearly triple what Morial got in the October election and was similar to Maynard Jackson's 1973 total in Atlanta when he became the first black mayor of a major southern city.

The story talks about a "restless" 6foot-4, 216-pound young man who played Canadian professional football, fought off groupies and tried to avoid bar brawls.

The article did not mention Zivkovich's wife and two children. His wife was not amused. They were divorced in 1975.

Some of the centerfold fallout was exciting for Zivkovich. The publicity from the dismissal hearings brought calls from TV figures. He was on "To Tell the Truth.

Actress Mae West got him a Screen Actors Guild card and a bit as a bartender on the "Dick Cavett Show." He also played a crooked health spa attendant in an episode of "McMillan and Wife.'

He said he has some small movie parts coming up, but doesn't really want to be an actor, except perhaps in commercials.

against the fire itself, were hampered by rains brought in by Typhoon Kim. which was passing north of Manila as the early morning fire broke out. Firemen fought winds of up to 50 mph to keep the blaze from spreading to nearby hotels, restaurants, airline offices and shops.

The Red Cross identified four other bodies as those of Ruth Lovelack, an Australian; Romeo Miamoto, a Japanese; and Mary Jane Buhatin and Mary Ann Rufino. Their nationalities were not immediately known

Lt. Col. Agudon, the metropolitan Manila fire marshal, said firefighters had seen more bodies in the ruins of the hotel.

The seven-story hotel on Roxas Boulevard across from the U.S. Embassy and Manila Bay caught fire shortly before 7 a.m. as many of the guests were asleep. Armando Aquino, a 37-year-old roomboy, said the blaze started on the fifth floor, quickly engulfed the top three floors and then moved down.

Aquino said faulty wiring appeared to have caused the fire, but fire department investigators said it would be some time before the cause could be determined.

The number of persons in the building at the time was uncertain. There were reports that about 240 of the 300 rooms were occupied, and 47 survivors were taken to the Hotel Mirador several blocks away. A number of other survivors were reported to have checked in at other hotels.

Meanwhile, Typhoon Kim hit the Luzon coast near the port of Infanta, then veered north away from Manila. Its strongest winds dropped from 128 mph to 103 mph.

### Recording missing

NEW YORK (AP) - Gino Gallina, the lawyer murdered gangland-style on Nov. 5, had told federal officials that he could identify the killers of Teamsters Union boss Jimmy Hoffa, according to Time magazine.

Testifying before a Newark grand jury shortly before his death, Gallina said he had hidden a tape recording that included the killers' voices discussing the murder, and that Hoffa's body could be found from information on the tape, the magazine says in this week's editions. It said the recording has not been found.

Hoffa disappeared two years ago. Time said he was presumed to have been killed for interfering with deals developed with the Teamsters by the Genovese crime family since 1967

Time also said testimony by Gallina, a former Manhattan assistant district attorney who has represented organized crime figures in recent years, focused also on the ".22-caliber hitters. what some authorities suspect may be a mobsters' squad armed with .22-caliber pistols. At least 20 victims, including potential witnesses and six FBI informants, may have been victims of the squad. Time said. Gallina was slain with .38-caliber bullets.

Gallina, 42, who as a mob lawyer defended members of the East Coast Genovese family, also gave testimony concerning reputed family leaders Vincent Gigante, John DeGilio, Salvatore Briguglio and Tommy Principe, according to Time.

It said federal officials blamed Gallina's murder on a leak from the grand jury, and that leaks from sealed court records and other government files have led to the other informants' deaths.

Gallina was shot seven times on a Greenwich Village street. He died 90 minutes later

### New problem arises

SAN YSIDRO, Calif. (AP) - The retiring chief of the busiest U.S. Border Patrol region says a serious new problem is being mounted by young illegal aliens

Allen Gerhardt calls them unskilled, uneducated, 'young and opportunists.'

"I felt for the individual several years ago who had to feed his family," Gerhardt said in an interview Sunday. "Coming here for work in the fields was the only way to accomplish it.

"It was an extreme adjustment to leave a family and come to a foreign country. That's not the case today. The youngsters who come here now have very minimal education and are devoid of skills."

An increasing number of such foreign youths are slipping into the United States from cities to the south, Gerhardt said,

After 33 years in the Border Patrol, the last 11 as chief agent of the Chula Vista sector, he is retiring Dec. 31 at the age of 60. His 350 officers apprehend about 40 percent of all illegal aliens and outnumber the entire Border Patrol strength along the Canadian border.

Gerhardt plans to live in retirement in San Diego and his native town of Fredericksburg, Tex.







ANDERSON SAID that when he left the airport, the wind was blowing from the west which is favorable for the crosswind runway still lighted. He




No, not the Lawrence Welk Show. Look, we're talking desperate here, not crazy. (Oops, I can tell I just lost the readership of everyone over 35.)

It's called "undescended testis," or "cryptorchidism." It's found in about 4 per cent of full-term babies (about 20 per cent of prematures). Usually, a single testes is involved.

It is congenital (pre-birth) defect. As the fetus develops, the testes first appear in the abdomen. At about the seventh month they descend to the groin and from there out into the scrotum by way of a certain canal (inguinal).

If the testicle fails to descend into the scrotum within two to three months after birth it rarely will later. Because of the higher temperature inside, the sperm-manufacturing mechanism is damaged, and if both testes are involved infertility results. If one testicle descends it can produce sufficient hormones and sperm to avoid infertility.

Surgery to lower the testicle is called orchiopexy. It must be done prior to puberty, but it is best done before the beginning of school and after the child has been toilet trained. A hernia is often involved, and this

is usually taken care of at the time of the orchiopexy.

Your doctor seems to have a good handle on the situation, so I would follow his advice about timing.

True cryptorchidism must be distinguished from a condition called "hypermobile testes." In this the testes may lie within the scrotum (as during a hot bath) but retract afterward. Normal descent usually occurs at puberty.

If allowed to remain undescended, the danger of tumor of the testes must be considered.

WASHINGTON — The Soviet Union and China are secretly shipping weapons to black Rhodesian guerrillas in an effort to gain new influence in wartorn Africa

The tenacious guerrillas are fighting Rhodesia's white minority government from bases in Mozambique, across the country's eastern border, and Zambia, to the north. They are waging their hit-and-run war with light weapons, such as rifles, mines and plastique bombs, which according to U.S. Government sources, are being provided by the Soviets and Chinese

The communist weapons are shipped by freighter to the official military forces of Mozambique and nearby Tanzania. Some of the arms are siphoned off by those countries, according to competent sources, and the rest are tucked to the guerrilla bases

THE NATIONALISTS, split by a power struggle, nevertheless fight for the united cause of displacing the white Rhodesian regime. The two main factions don't receive the same weapons, our sources said. Peking sends the bulk of its support to the Zimbabwe African National Union (ZANU), while the Kremlin ships its arms to both the Zimbabwe African people's Union (ZAPU) and the ZANU.





British firemen strike LONDON (AP)

Britain's firemen walked out of their station houses today an unprecedented nationwide strike for more pay. Union leaders claimed the action was nearly total.

But the first few hours of the strike brought less the the normal number of emergency calls, and of-ficials said a hastily trained backup force of servicemen and civilian volunteers was coping well.

The strike was the most serious challenge so far of the Labor government's determinationn to maintain its 10 percent, anti-inflation ceiling on annual wage increases, now in its third year.

The firemen, whose weekly pay base averages \$115, are demanding a 30 per cent increase.

Richard Foggie, assistant general secretary of the Fire Brigades Union, claimed nearly 100 percent of the nation's 43,000 firemen were supporting the strike, expected to last at least a week. 'It is solid," he said. "The

British fire service is in limbo. We have only a handful of firemen showing reluctance to join the strike. This is a massive response.' But officials in special fire control centers around the country said citizens were apparently taking extra precautions and that there were relatively few emergency calls.

The reason is that by Nov. when the department made its monthly survey of crop prospects, most of the corn harvest is usually completed. Thus, the nearer harvest is to being finished the more accurate is the November estimate.

An annual summary of 1977 crop production, including corn, will be issued in January. There will be no further corn estimate by the department until then.

In announcing its estimate last week, the department's Crop Reporting Board said that the difference between the Nov. 1 estimate and the final figures over the last 10 years have averaged 96 million bushels, ranging from 6.5 million to 243 million bushels





NEW YORK (AP) - To Carla LaMonte, de la Renta is "Oscar" and Blass is "Bill." She has climbed to the top of one of the most slippery heaps in the world to earn \$100 an hour as a fashion model

But all is not soft swirling fabrics, gentle background music, wealth and fame long-limbed this daughter of a Holyoke, Mass., factory worker is realistic: it could all end tomorrow, she says.

"At first I just wanted to make a living. Then I wanted to be one of the top 10 models. Then I wanted to be one of the top five. But once you're on top, what's next? "Down. So I can't turn down a job - I always think it might be the last.'

She works virtually 365 days a year, often for as long as 16 hours a day. No matter what havoc it will wreak on her personal plans, Carla almost never turns down a

job. "If I find out I've been left out of a show I call my agents and ask why. They say, 'because' you're too busy,' and I say, 'but did they want me?"

So most of the time Carla La-Monte runs from job to job - dashing for subways, flagging taxicabs. Her thick brunette hair askew, she bulky tote bags clutches filled with the paraphernalia of her trade spare stockings and shoes, makeup and bobby pins, and an hour-by-hour enormous, appointment calendar.

Carla has been modeling for 10 years, but her age is a mystery. She won't tell because, she says, each designer has a different notion of who Carla LaMonte is: Blass sees her as a sophisticated woman in her 30s: Clovis thinks of her as 25-ish. Carla LaMonte intends to keep working for both.
