Playa Management field day March 23

Landowners, wildlife enthusiast, and anyone interested are invited to attend a Playa Management Field Day on Wednesday, March 23 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. in Dimmitt, Texas. The focus of the event will be improving wildlife habitat in playas.

Activities will begin at the Dimmitt Senior Citizen Center, 218 Jones Street, with coffee and refreshments, then an overview of the day, followed by a presentation by Kevin Kraai from Texas Rarks & Wildlife Department (TPWD) on "The Role of Playas in Waterfowl Ecology and Management."

At 9:50 a.m., the group will depart for a Field Trip to TP-WD's Dimmitt Unit Playa, located 6 miles west of Dimmitt. Out at the playa site, Chip Ruthven, TWPD manager from the Matador WMA, will give an overview of the history of the Dimmitt Unit, followed by short presentations by Manuel DeLeon, wildlife biologist with the Natural Resources Conservation Service, and Don Kahl, TPWD Region 1 Migratory Game Bird Specialist. Both presenters will outline options and programs to help landowners in managing playa restoration and habitat enhancement.

The group will then have time to walk around the playa and discuss key features of wildlife habitat, and actions that could be taken to improve habitat at any playa. Afterwards the group will return to Dimmitt for a sandwich lunch and a final presentation by Kahl on "Playa Conservation in the Texas Panhandle."

The workshop is sponsored by Ogallala Commons and its partners: Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and Playa Lakes Joint Venture.

Those attending are asked to wear clothing, footwear, and a hat suitable for the field tours. There is no charge for the event, though a \$10 donation for lunch is appreciated.
