PLO, Syria say 'no'

Israel accepts invitation

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Menahem Begin announced Israel's acceptance today of an invitation to the preliminary peace conference in Cairo next weekend and named two senior officials as Israel's negotiators.

negotiators.

Begin told Parliament he personally signed the Israeli reply, which would be transmitted to Egypt through Israel's ambassador to the United Nations, Chaim Herzog.

In Cairo, acting Egyptian Foreign Minister Butros B. Ghali said an invitation had been sent to Yasir Arafat, head of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

The invitation to the PLO was handed to Ahmed Sidky Dajani, a member of the PLO central committee, Ghali said in a telephone interview. Palestinian sources confirmed that Dajani left for Beirut with the invitation.

PLO spokesmen have declared they will not attend the Cairo meeting, but there has been no direct response from Arafat. A spokesman for Begin said Sunday Israel will not go to Cairo if the PLO does.

Begin went before the Knesset, or Parliament, to discuss Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's call for the preliminary conference and to recapitulate the events of Sadat's historic visit to Israel.

Begin said that after receiving an invitation to the conference through his U.N. ambassaador, he consulted by telephone with Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, on a visit to West Germany, and then named the Israeli

delegates.

"Last night," Begin said, "two ambassadors met, shook hands and said shalom to each other. They were the Egyptian and Israeli ambassadors to the United Nations. The first gave the second a letter, and this is its content."

Begin then read the content of the invitation from Ghali and announced his acceptance.

Syria, Israel's other military adversary, joined Libya and Algeria in lining up a rival meeting of Sadat's Arab opponents. The Egyptian president said he would negotiate "with the Israelis alone" if other Arab nations refused to come to Cairo.

Israeli Prime Minister Menahem
Begin accepted Sadat's invitation
before receiving the formal bid. But
he warned that no Israeli delegation
would negotiate with the Palestine
Liberation Organization "whether it
is in Geneva or Cairo or the moon."

McCLELLAN — Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., died in his sleep early today at his Little Rock, Ark., apartment. He was 81. McClellan is shown last Monday, Nov. 21, at a news conference announcing that he would not seek another term in the U.S. Senate. He has served in the Senate for 35 years.

Served 35 years in Senate

Sen. McClellan dead

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Sen. John L. McClellan, who had served in the Senate for 35 years and ranked second in seniority, died today in his sleep, his office announced. He was 81.

The Arkansas Democrat had announced one week ago that he would not seek another term when his sixth term expired Jan. 3, 1979.

McClellan's office said the senator's

body was found by his wife about 6:30 a.m. at their Little Rock apartment.

The senator would have been two months from his 83rd birthday when

his Senate term ended. He had been in

McClellan had a pacemaker implanted to regulate his heartbeat last summer. Last Monday when he announced his decision to retire, McClellan said his health was not a factor in his plans. He said it would

As hea'd of the Senate Appropriations Committee, McClellan oversaw billions in federal spending. The defense budget usually fared well under him.

have been a major concern had he

chosen to seek re-election.

McClellan's law-and-order reputation grew in the 1950s when he took over the Senate permanent Investigations subcommittee on the death of Sen. Joseph McCarthy.

McClellan was second in seniority in the Senate to James O. Eastland, D-Miss. Both men were sworn in the same day, but a Senate rule gives higher seniority to the senator from a state in the union longer. Mississippi became a state before Arkansas.

McClellan was known during his long career in the Senate as a law-and-order man and as a relentless investigator of wrongdoing in and out of government.

McClellan was first elected to the Senate in 1942 after two terms in the House. He was chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee since August 1972

The time-consuming responsibilities of that post forced him to give up the helm of the Senate's permanent investigations subcommittee, which he had chaired for a record 18 years, from January 1955 to January 1973.

In that span he directed headline-

making investigations into labor

rackeetering, organized crime, securities thefts, the TFX aircraft contract, illicit operations in military service clubs overseas, the rash of riots that erupted in big cities and on college campuses in the late 1960s, and in many other areas.

He took over the chairmanship of the subcommittee from the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., after the

Republicans lost control of the Senate. He had led a Democratic walkout in protest against what he called McCarthy's oneman rule of the panel, staying out for nearly six months until he won concessions.

McClellan hired Robert F. Kennedy as the subcommittee's counsel.

Kennedy later was to become attorney general when his brother John became president.

Lohn Kennedy was then a senator.

John Kennedy was then a senator and a member of the subcommittee and took part in its probe of the Teamsters Union.

Q. A civilian worker at Webb AFB said notices had just come out for a big layoff effective Jan. 13. After a privately-owned dam collapsed in Georgia earlier this month, killing 39 persons, Carter said he would step up federal inspection of non-federal

The president also is meeting this week with Joseph A. Califano, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, and James McIntyre, acting director of the Office of Management and Budget, to talk about reorganizing HEW's education effort.

Carter promised during the presidential campaign to create a separate Department of

But Claudia Townsend, an associate White House press secretary, said there was "lots of room" in the president's schedule to arrange meetings with members of Congress trying to resolve House and Senate differences over energy legislation. "It's not such a crowded schedule that he couldn't

get those thigs in," Ms. Townsend said.

House and Senate conference committees are negotiating tax and price portions of the energy program. And it appears likely that energy will keep the lawmakers busy until close to Christmas.





Some feedback on nursing homes

Dr. G. C. Thosteson

I'm always pleased to get professional feedback from my responses to readers' letters. Here's a case in point, a note from a nurse at a nursing home:

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Your answer to the family trying to select a nursing home really was good. Your first priority - a home close enough for easy visits by the family members should be at the top of any list.

There are a couple of other things families can do to help.

1. Supply long-sleeved shirts, or blouses, or flannel PJ tops that open all the way down the back for those chilly days and nights. Older people get chilled from air conditioning, even though the staff might not.

2. Sew labels into clothing 3. Remember that older people don't raise their arms above their heads when dressing, so front and back openings are helpful for them. Replace bra and slip straps with the soft lace-type elastic bands. Makes

bedtime removal much easier 4. When you visit, take along a sewing kit for missing buttons, a loose zipper, or other necessary stitches in time. Patch pockets on lap robes help, and watch for missing tie strings on the robes.

5. Remember small things your relative liked before - lemonade, a manicure, pretty powder, hair rib-

bons, lace hankies 6. Try to supply large-print books, magazine, etc., where they would

7. If the person has food favorites. as special family dishes, ask the staff is you can bring some with you on occasion.

These may sound like minor or unimportant matters, but in such situations small things help.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is it true that I can have the sex of the fetus determined? — Mrs. O.T.

Yes. It's done by amniocentesis extracting (with a long aspirationtype needle) some of the sac fluid. Cells in the fluid can be examined to tell if the fetus is male or female. It's useful to know this if there are hereditary problems in which sex plays a major role. Otherwise, I think it takes a lot of the fun out of the whole business. The liver has great "regenerative" powers, but nature requires an even break in the matter. Incidentally, with alcoholics it is not a problem of alcohol exclusively. Poor nutrition plays an important role. If your husband follows his diet and avoids alcohol, the liver should recover

we are still sinners, although God has now made us His children. When we sin we do not lose our relationship as children, but we do lose our close fellowship with God. WASHINGTON - Balding, babyfaced Sen. J. Bennett Johnston Jr., D.-La., a darling of the oil industry, would like to remove some of the oil

stain from his public image. This may be difficult to pull off for a senator who has consistently protected oil privileges on Capitol Hill. Only last month, he performed a major act of devotion to the oil and gas interests during the energy debate. Now he's afraid he may have too much oil on his face as he prepares

to confront the voters next year. The senator from Shreveport has decided, therefore, to strike a noble, new pose as a champion of the elderly. Accordingly, he dispatched his press secretary, Kirk Melancon, to develop the new image.

HUDDLED MELANCON PRIVATELY with Marcia McCord of the staff of the Senate aging subcommittee. Immodestly, the press agent said it had been his idea to wipe the oil off Johnston's face. "I've told him," said Melancon, "he's got to change his image from all this energy stuff." Melancon felt the "old people issue" would be an ideal way to do it.

The two aides discussed having Johnston join Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D.-Mo., in holding congressional hearings. Urged Melancon eagerly: "We've got to find a good place — a community center, a nursing home or a big nutrition project.

He paused. "Now, it can't be too depressing," he cautioned. Ideally, he said, it should be only moderately depressing.

"We'll have the senators eating lunch with old people," the press aide suggested. "The media loves that." McCord agreed. "The media will come," she predicted. "Eagleton's attractive. They love to see the

senator eating with old people. Of course, all would be lost if the momentous event wasn't covered on the network news shows. SHAH'S SOLICITOR: In an earlier column, we reported that the shah of Iran has left President Carter with a shopping list for additional jet fighters, radar planes, military transport planes and patrol boats. He is prepared to spend about \$8 million in solid petrodollars for the new weaponry

He probably will get his dangerous new toys, although his military forces have been unable to absorb all the modern weapons that the United States has already delivered to Iran. Indeed, Iran has received more U.S. military equipment than any other nation. The huge arms shipments and technical aid are helping the shah transform his country into a world power.

The shah's military build-up has upset neighboring Saudi Arabia. whose oil is vital to U.S. security. The Saudis have sought responsibly to to hold down world oil prices. In contrast, the shah originally pushed harder than any other oil potentate for stratospheric oil prices.

Yet despite the misgivings of the Saudis and the economic damage the oil squeeze has caused the United States, the policymakers in Washington have courted the shah obsequiously. The shah, in turn, has courted U.S. policymakers. No other embassy throws more dazzling parties for Washington officialdom than does the Iranian embassy.

THE SHAH HAS ALSO developed an intimate personal relationship with the high and mighty in Washington.

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

Mail order precautions needed

By LOUISE COOK

'Tis the season when holiday catalogues appear to visions of mail order merchandise which add up to a multibillion dollar industry.

Although December is not the biggest month for the mail order business -January sales are actually the largest — it does bring an supplements to Sunday newspapers.

Consumers planning to shop by mail should take precautions, however, to avoid disappointments. Mail order firms consistently rank high on complaint lists. The federal Office of Consumer Affairs says that 8.1 percent of all complaints received from February through December 1976 concerned mail orders. Only automobiles drew more



Exercise good, golf, bowling

MIAMI (AP) - Really strenuous exercise is good medicine for your heart, but sports like golf and bowling aren't enough, a new study finds.

The study also indicates that a high amount of energy spent each week in physical activity, including walking, could provide insurance against premature heart attacks.

Spending a high total amount of energy and calories is significant, especially in excercises that demand bursts of energy output, says Dr. Ralph S. Paffenbarger Jr. of University of California at Berkeley

But the risk of heart attacks was lower for men engaging in "strenous sports," while "casual" sports seemed to have no influence, Paffenbarger said.

Among strenuous sports, he listed swimming and running, basketball, handball and squash. "Casual" sports included golf, bowling, baseball, softball and volleyball.

As for tennis, he said it depends on how it is played.

"Batting the ball around on Sunday with young children generally isn't strenuous, but a stiff competitive game of singles

is," he said Paffenbarger made his comments in remarks prepared for delivery at a scientific session the American Heart Association today.

He told of research involving some 17,000 male almuni of Harvard University, aged 35 to 74, studied periodically for six to 10 years. In all, they suffered 572 heart attacks, 257 of them fatal.

The research focused on the energy the men spent, in terms of activity such as the number of blocks walked, stairs climbed, sports engaged in and estimation of total calories "burned" each

"Heart attack rates declined with increasing activity, whether measured as stairs climbed. blocks walked or strenuous sports. This trend held for all ages and for both non-fatal and fatal attacks.

The more calories the men spent in total activity in a week seems to relate to less risk of heart attack, he added.

He said the protective effect from being active seemed to hold regardless of whether the men had other risk factors, such as "cigarette smoking, high blood pressure, obesity, parental heart attacks and prior athleticism.
