'Peace' plane flies Israelis to conference

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Israel's delegates to the preparatory Egyptian-Israeli peace talks arrived in Cairo today aboard an Israeli jetliner carrying the inscription "Peace" in Arabic and Hebrew. They were followed by American and U.N. representatives.

The three Israeli delegates, their staff of 27, and 35 journalists flew here on an El Al Boeing 707 flying the Egyptian and Israeli flags from the cockpit windows. Written on one side of the fuselage was the Arabic. Salaam; on the other the Hebrew,

"We hope that at the next stage the delegations of other Arab counties will participate in the direct negotiations," said the chief Israeli delegate, Eliahu Ben-Elissar, as he left Tel Aviv.

In Cairo, armed troops surrounded the runway where the Israeli plane

Durwood Blagrave, a farmer in the Ackerly area and active in the Texas Farmer's Union made this statement this morning as he considered the part in the nationwide farm strike

Two farmers from Stratford, up past Dumas, came down as far as the Lamesa area last week pleading their cause. They claim the bankers up there have quit giving them enough funds to farm on, but just enough to

They were pushing and advocating cutting off buying equipment or anything else and going along with the national strike. Although most farmers claim the strike is a voice of the grassroots, there are some who say the whole thing smacks of big union tactics.

Today, at a Christmas reception at the Pioneer Flame Room, sponsored by the Tejas Belles, two of the wives of farmers discussed the matter.

Both claimed they were not knowledgeable enough to have their names used, buy their views were startlingly different. One was in sympathy with the

strike, claiming that the farmer must do something to gain attention soon, before lots of farmers are forced to go out of business. The other took the side that "We

may have to cut the cost of production not buy quite as many new trac-

They both agreed that they wished there was a way to go back and get the government all the way out of the farming business and have free en-

City may form panel to review ambulances

The Big Spring City Council today decided to investigate the possibility establishing an Emergency Medical Service Advisory Council.

Members of the local organization Start Talking Ambulance Today (STAT) presented a proposal to set up an ambulance service review board for the city. Under the proposal, all city ambulances would have to comply with federal specifications, and doctors and patients would be allowed to bring complaints to the

'We would hope the board will work closely with the medical community here. Doctors should document any abuses of ambulance service. STAT hopes that inspection of local ambulances could begin as early as February," said Diana Weir, STAT member.

City attorney James Gregg ex-plained that the board would have to be set up by ordinance, and appointments to the board would be made by the city council as with any board created by the city. Council members expect to offer their decision by the next regular meeting

Council members also approved actions taken during the first official meeting of the Big Spring Structural Standards Board on Dec. 6. Motions had been made at the meeting concerning 13 structures in the city.

All structures considered either constituted an eyesore or a health hazard. In some cases owners were given the option to repair or demolish. while in other instances, owners were simply ordered to have the structure torn down.

In nine of the 13 cases, no one bothered to appear before the board.

Midland College A high-speed chase followed the attack, and Galaviz was mortally wounded while being apprehended.

Hundreds of other residents of Aguinas Hall were forced out into the cold night air after the first alarm was sounded at 2:56 a.m. The fire was controlled about an hour later. Hours after the blaze was

reported at eight, but a further check showed only seven had died. Fire officials said the blaze was limited to the top floor of the fourstory dormitory. One investigator,

who asked that his name not be used, said the blaze apparently started in a closet where a coed was drying her clothes with a hair dryer.

The fire investigator said two of the three girls sharing the room where the fire started jumped to their deaths from a window. The third was rescued by firefighters using a ladder truck "If (the two girls who jumped) had waited five more seconds, they would have been saved," the investigator

SS compromise reached

WASHINGTON (AP) - A compromise was reported reached today to break a stalemate and make possible quick passage of a bill to keep the Social Security system solvent.

Senate conferees on the measure to increase payroll taxes to cover Social Security deficits were reported willing to remove from the measure an unrelated amendment authorizing a \$250-perstudent income tax credit for college tuition.

The credit provision would be attached to another A leadership aide who would not be quoted by name said the House and Senate conferees would

hold a joint meeting late today or Wednesday. The conferees have agreed on all provisions affecting Social Security, but the House members rejected the tuition credit rider, insisting the vote

should come on the Social Security issues alone. The aide said he understood the conferees were prepared to release the bill and that the House Rules Committee was standing by to provide special procedures allowing a vote Thursday. The Senate is expected to act immediately after the House does.

Action on the Social Security bill probably would open the way for Congress to adjourn for the year on Thursday, as leaders have planned.

If no Social Security bill is passed this year, it could delay income-tax cuts next year.

30 convicts freed

SAN DIEGO (AP) — Today is freedom day for at least 30 American convicts, among the first to return to the United States from Mexican prisons under the new inmate exchange treaty.

Up to 44 men and women could be released and issued "suitable clothing" and \$100 for transportation money, said coordinator James Meko of the U.S. Bureau of Prisons.

These are the lucky ones who spent enough time in Mexican prisons to satisfy requirements for the same offenses under U.S. law, Meko said, Nearly all of the 235 Americans who qualified to return were convicted on drug charges, about half for marijuana offenses.

The released Americans must report to parole officers within 72 hours.

A total of 142 prisoners, including 32 women, were in the Metropolitan Correctional Center after two airlifts from Mexico City and the arrival on Monday transferring prisoners from the border city of Tijuana.

Another 93 Americans are still in Mexico City, being processed for two final airlifts before **Christmas**

The exchange to which the United States and Mexico agreed in 1976 began last Thursday with a flight of 36 Mexicans, all men, who chose to move to Mexican prisons.

Three examiners of the U.S. Parole Commission are conducting hearings for prisoners so far ineligible for release. The earliest possible date for their release is in February.

Nine such hearings were concluded Monday, and 28 prisoners were notified that they face outstanding U.S. warrants ranging from drug charges to air piracy. At least four more warrants may be issued, U.S. Marshal Robert Ladoon said.

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - Security officials say "everything you can imagine" is being done to protect the delegates to the Israeli-Egyptian peace talks opening Wednesday from radical Palestinians or other Arab terrorists trying to sabotage Egyptian President Anwar Sadat's peace drive.

New cancer evidence

WASHINGTON (AP) - There is new evidence that DES, a hormone drug which was supposed to prevent miscarriages, may increase the risk of fatal cancer in women. Thirty-one of 693 DES recipients examined in one study developed breast cancer, compared to 17 breast cancer cases among 668 women who did not use the drug, says Dr Sydney M. Wolfe. Twelve of the women who took DES died, while four of the control group died. Wolfe said.

WASHINGTON (AP) -The United States and Japan are apparently still far apart on what to do about a Japanese trade surplus that has forced plant shutdowns and layoffs in many U.S. industries.

The top American trade negotiator, Robert Strauss, said after talks Monday that Japan's initial proposals involving tariff cuts on a number of goods imported into that country fall "considerably short" of U.S. demands.

Japan's minister for external economic affairs, Nobuhiko Ushiba, met with Strauss, Vice President Walter Mondale and Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal.

Nazi aid nips ACLU

CHICAGO (AP) - The American Civil Liberties Union's defense of a Nazi effort to march in a predominately Jewish suburb has created the ACLU's "most serious threat ever" - a sharp drop in membership and financial contributions

The Illinois ACLU has cut its staff by one-fourth and its budget by 30 percent. The national ACLU has prepared a 1978 budget 15 percent lower than the current

budget.
"This is the most serious threat the ACLU has ever said Franklin faced," Haiman, the ACLU's national secretary and a professor at Northwestern University. He said the approximately 15 percent cut in the national budget was caused by "a nationwide

uproar over this case." Skokie, a suburb north of Chicago, is nearly 60 percent Jewish, including thousands of people who survived or lost relatives in World War II German death camps. The ACLU represents the Nazis in three court cases involving attempts to march in Skokie

Death plot witness?

HOUSTON (AP)-A state district court judge says he will rule today whether the surviving family of Dr. John Hill can take a deposition of a North Carolina inmate who claimed to be present when a contract was offered for the slaying of the Houston plastic surgeon

Hill was shot to death at his posh River Oaks home in

His survivors filed a \$7.6 million lawsuit against Ash Robinson, wealthy Houston oilman and father of Hill's

first wife. The trial ended Oct. 21 with the jurors finding Robinson clear of any part in plotting the death of his former son-in-law.

Judge Arthur C. Lesher said he is not sure if has the authority to issue such a motion since the civil lawsuit has been settled.

The Hill family is asking for a new trial based on an affidavit from William Martin, who claimed he was present when Lilla Paulus offered Bobby Vandiver \$5,000 to kill Dr. Hill.

Paulus is now serving a prison term for her part in the slaying. Vandiver was killed by a police officer before he could come to trial. Robinson's attorney, Jess Hall, called the Hill motion



WASHINGTON - Hamilton Jordan, whose regular job is minding the White House store for President Carter, made a clandestine trip to Panama City to spend the Dec. 10-11 weekend with his new companion, Panamanian dictator Omar Torrijos - a visit that might possibly determine the fate of the embattled Panama Canal treaty.

Jordan's trip, so secret that top State Department officials knew nothing about it, was personally arranged in the White House. The explanation given by senior aides is that Jordan was on a tourist jaunt to see the famous canal. But there is suspicion he might have carried secret instructions from President Carter asking Gen. Torrijos to accept amendments to the treaty.

THE AMENDMENTS BEING pushed in the senate deal with "expeditious passage" of U.S. warships in time of war and the U.S. right to intervene in defense of the canal. Unless Panama agrees to them, the treaty may never win the required twothirds vote of approval in the Senate.

Jordan and Torrijos became close "beer-drinking buddies" (to use the phrase of one insider) during the dictator's visits in Washington on treaty matters. Torrijos, called "the Cowboy' by some of his Latin American colleagues, shares Jordan's liking for wearing boots and good-ole-

So, if anyone could persuade Torrijos to accept changes in the treaty, Jordan is regarded as the U.S. official most likely to succeed. On the other hand, some key U.S. diplomats worry whether Jordan's lack of substantive knowledge about the canal negotiations could lead him into

DOBRYNIN FADES President Carter has quietly

reduced the influence of Soviet Ambassador Anatoliv Dobrynin as a channel of U.S. policy to the Kremlin in favor of much heavier use of U.S. Ambassador Malcolm Toon in

THAT MEANS LESS frequent usage of intimate luncheons with Dobrynin, a technique favored in the days of Henry Kissinger, to signal U.S. intentions to the Kremlin. This move is not retaliation against anything Dobrynin has done. Rather, it is a studied effort to reverse the embarrasing disparity in the Nixon-Ford-Kissinger years between Dobrynin's unchallenged influence and the contrasting impotency of the U.S. ambassador in Moscow

"Dobrynin understands the U.S better than anyone in the Soviet Union," a key presidential aide told "But Carter is tired of the Russians downgrading his man in

Pressure by Mr. Carter has had this dramatic impact: three separate meetings between Communist party boss Leonid Brezhnev and Toon in the

Moreover, Mr. Carter is pressing Moscow to give Toon as free a run of the Soviet Union as Dobrynin has of the U.S. He wants Toon to have cultural and social exposure to the Soviet establishment equal to Dobrynin's exposure here (though, of course, that goal cannot be reached).

A FOOTNOTE: THE expected departure to Moscow of Dobrynin, 58, probably for grooming to take over as Soviet foreign minister, has nothing to do with Mr. Carter's demand for reciprocity. Dobrynin is in his 15th year here as Soviet ambassador

Dear Dr. Thosteson: What are the rules for treating a person who has been poisoned by carbon monoxide gas, the kind you breathe from a leaky automobile exhaust? And just what happens when a person breathes it? -

The general rule is to keep the victim guiet and warm and removed from the source of the gas. He should under, but not so far as to hinder breathing. If breathing has stopped, artificial respiration should be used. A supply of pure oxygen should be obtained and medical help summoned quickly. Pneumonia, a common complication, must be guarded against.

Carbon monoxide is released when any material is not burned completely, be it gasoline, natural gas, or other fuel. The gas is dangerous because its molecules attach easily to blood cells, depriving them, and hence body tissue of oxygen. In severe cases it may be necessary to bleed the victim and substitute fresh blood.

Headache and drowsiness are the common early symptoms of monoxide poisoning, whether from a faulty furnace or car exhaust. While the gas itself is odorless, if one smells fumes in a car, it's wise to open the windows.

Other symptoms of poisoning include muscle twitching, fast pounding pulse, throbbing in the temples labored breathing, dilated pupils, and high blood pressure. In later stages the skin may turn dusky and the lips blue. Paralysis and coma may follow.

The symptoms don't have to be dramatic, but a low level of exposure over a long period can create serious problems. One woman wrote me of her experience, in which she was slowly poisoned over a 1,500-mile car trip. Only at the end of the trip did she display the accumulated effects of a leaky exhaust. Beware heaters and furnaces, especially in bedrooms. They should be checked periodically to make sure combustion is complete. That goes for any such

The thalamus (a tiny segment of the mid-brain) can be affected by stroke, either from hemorrhage or blockage of a vessel. Because it is the "pain center," knocking it out of kilter can result in pain, as a burning or extrasensitivity to mild stimulation. The pain is in the limb affected by the

Pain-killers seldom help. Only time brings relief, and some degree of irritability may remain. In some, the entire side of the body can be affected. I've had good comments on my new stroke booklet. Dear Dr. Thosteson: I seem to be hyperventilating. Will tranquilizers help relieve this? — A.V.

First, you should be sure you know what you mean by hyperventilation. Breathing is controlled by the amount of carbon dioxide in the body. This substance is released when we exhale. Sometimes "overbreathing" as with vigorous exercise can reduce the amount of carbon dioxide in the blood, make us grasp for breath. That's hyperventilation

Tranquilizers can help if the cause is emotional, as it can be in some people. But there are other causes of the carbon dioxide imbalance in the blood and those would have to be investigated. Anxiety can be a cause.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I understand that the phrase "myocardial infarction" means the death of the heart muscle. The heart being a vital organ, how do some people survive myocardial infarction? - J.S.

The word "infarct" means death of tissue due to interrupted blood supply. It doesn't necessarily mean death of the entire muscle. A small part can be affected and the rest of the heart muscle can go on performing. Most

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I hear that there is cosmetic surgery to remove stretch marks. Is this true? I am 28 and pregnant with my second baby. How long after the baby is born can I have this done? What kind of doctor would I see? — Mrs. B.B.

A plastic surgeon can improve the appearance of the stretch marks, but you should delay surgery until after you are finished having babies. Some skin is more prone to these marks than others. If you are referring to marks on the abdomen, obesity can cause them as well as pregnancy. They may fade in time or become less pronounced.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My mother is old-fashioned and insists that epsom salt is the best cure for constipation. What do you think of it? - Mrs. O.S.

It used to be an old standby in grandmother's medicine cabinet, like sulphur and molasses. Today, there are less harsh but reliable cathartics (purgatives). I recommend them instead of the salts. That's if a laxative is needed at all, which in most cases is not.

New Mexico does a brisk business keeping many Texans happy, either in

the mountains or at the race tracks. I won't say anything about race tracks here, but I will take a long, hard, look at the mountains (my favorite part of the state).

Sure, New Mexico has some of the best mountains in the U.S. But Howard County, Texas has a few mountains even if they don't attract tourists and skiers.

THREE PEAKS IN Howard County are listed in the Texas Almanac under the heading "Altitudes of Principal Mountains of Texas." Not hills, mountains

According to the list, South Mountain is the highest point in the county, although it only juts about 384 feet above Big Spring on its southern outskirts. The official elevation of the mountain is 2,781 feet, while Big Spring's elevation is listed as 2,397.

Even though it is much more noticeable, Signal Mountain is only the second highest point in the county, but just barely. It is 2,741 feet high, 40 feet smaller than South Mountain. Wildhorse Mountain (I must admit I am not familiar with the location of this peak) is the other mountains listed with an altitude of 2,416 feet, a whopping 19 feet higher than Big Spring itself.

Of course, these peaks can't compare with Guadalupe Peak in Culberson County at 8,751 feet. It's the highest point in Texas and also the highest point in the United States east of its meridian

Borden has a mountain listed, also Anyone who has ever been to Gail knows which one it is, too Muchakooga Peak, just outside gail, is listed with an approximate altitude of 2,900 feet. According to the book. the mountain is also called Mushway Peak and Cordova Peak.

THE PEAK TOWERS over Gail by some 370 feet, but the mountain is much more impressive than it seems by looking at the figures. With a little imagination and a little West Texas snow, Gail could begin to look like one of those Austrian Alpine villages.

If you like hilly country, but you are "stuck" in Big Spring, just remember that it could be worse. You could live in Hockley County.

Is trial ahead?

WASHINGTON — With the help of government wrangling and State Department waffling. Andrija Artukovic has been able to bask for more than 25 years in the California sunshine.

Now, the 78-year-old Artukovic, known to his neighbors as a mild mannered senior citizen faces the growing prospect of deportation to stand trial in Yugoslavia as a Nazi mass murderer in World War II.

UNDER HITLER, ARTUKOVIC was interior minister in the Nazi puppet state of Croatia, and thus head of the police and political security forces. Various U.S. government estimates hold him responsible for the deaths of perhaps 200,000 Yugoslavs. Testimony at the 1961 trial of Adolph Eichmann connected Artukovic to the murder of 660,000 men women and

children mainly Serbians and Jews. Artukovic found haven in the United tates under an alias during the confusion following the collapse of Hitler's Third Reich. Down through the years, Yugoslavia has sought his extradition without success. In 1952, an Immigration and Naturalization judge ordered him deported. Seven years later, another Immigration official ruled he could stay

The last ruling held that Arukovic might be "persecuted" if sent back to Yugoslavia. Thus the U.S. system of justice and due process has kept him out of the hands of the Tito regime ever since.

But internal documents in our hands show that the Justice Department has been arguing with the State Department since 1975 to work out a compromise with Yugoslavian authorities to send the aging refugee back for trial as a murderer. Under the compromise the State Department would certify that Artukovic would be subject to legitimate prosecution but not persecution on the basis of "race,

religion or political opinion. The documents show that the State

Once this happens, the Justice Department seems certain to proceed with new deportation action. However, Artukovic will still have recourse to our courts and perhaps could delay matters for a year or so. But time seems to be running out for the 78-year-old ex-Nazi

FOOTNOTE: WITH THE backing of the White House the Immigration Service' new general counsel, David Crosland, has been taking action against World War II Nazis in this country. We recently reported that two suspected Latvian Nazis are being prosecuted. Now, new stops are planned against a suspected Nazi, second only to Artukovic in notoriety. He is bishop Valerian Trifa, whose citizenship the Immigration Service is trying to revoke so he can be deported to Romania.

LUCRATIVE LOBBYING: President Carter has emphatically spoken out against the hiring of expensive private consultants by the government. Nevertheless, the White House has quietly hired a professional management consultant to put some pep into its often amateurish congressional lobbying staff.

He is Len Hirsch, a high-powered consultant who is collecting \$125 a day in public funds for his efforts. He began work last April because President Carter's lobbying team, headed by Frank Moore seemed to step on congressional toes every time they tried to get a bill passed.

A White House spokesman insisted the Hirsch offers no advice or how to lobby on Capitol Hill even though he heads a private firm called Congressional Management. But our sources say he devotes some time to keeping communications open between the White House and the Hill

HIRSCH SUGGESTS WAYS for the Carter lobbyists to work more closely with the president's policy advisers and to butter up congressmen by arranging White House tours for their constituents. He is trying to speed up the flow of paperwork and even make the secretaries more efficient in answering congressional mail

"It helps our lobbying only to the extent that it makes our job easier," a White House staffer explained. A spokesman said Hirsh has worked only four or five days, but sources tell us he has already been paid thousands of dollars.

Footnote: Hirsch would not discuss his duties with us. But Rep. Robert Drinan. D-Mass. is demanding an accounting from the White House.

MILITANT DISABLED: President Carter may soon find himself confronted with a political handicap by disgruntled disabled Americans. The American Coalition of Citizens with Disabilities is angered by Carter's failure to follow through on his campaign promises to the nation's 36 million handicapped.





DES may increase risk of fatal cancers

WASHINGTON (AP) -DES, a drug taken by about two million expectant to avoid miscarriages, may increase the risk of fatal cancers. especally of the breast, new evidence indicates.

That suggestion comes 61/2 years after findings that about 200 daughters of women who took the drug in the early 1950s developed vaginal and cervical cancer.

Two years ago, researchers also found that thousands of sons of DES mothers suffered lowered sperm counts and other birth defects of the reproductive

The latest evidence was revealed Monday when Dr. Sydney M. Wolfe, director of the Ralph Nader-financed Health Research Group, wrote a letter to Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph A. Califano asking that doctors alert their DES patients of the possible cancer hazard.

DES is a hormone that was widely prescribed until the early 1970s for its presumed antimiscarriage benefits.

But Wolfe says research cancers done by the University of Chicago over a 20-month period ending in November. 1952, showed the drug didn't significantly lower the incidence of miscarriages.

That research did not stop automatic

doctors for their pregnant patients, he said. Follow-up checks on the

women involved in the Chicago research also showed that 31 of 693 DES patients developed breast cancer compared to only 17 of 668 in non-DES women. Among those patients, 12 DES users died. Only four of the control-group cancers were fatal.

"These preliminary findings strongly suggest that there is an increased amount of endocrin-related cancer. especially breast cancer, in DES mothers." Wolfe wrote in his letter to Califano.

Wolfe suggested more study of the drug, with financing coming from the profits of the drug's makers. The drug also is used as an morning-after birth control pill, a practice Wolfe said should be abandoned except

in cases of rape and incest. Dr. John C. Bailer, editor of the Journal of the National Cancer Institute, called the cancers in DES mothers "killers." He said the frequency of death indicated the the drug might trigger that are less

In addition to use as an antimiscarriage drug and for morning-after birth control, similar synthetic estrogen products are used for treatment of postmenopausal women and as a food additive for cattle prescription of DES by some







Sulfa drugs info sought

WASHINGTON (AP) The Agriculture Department has officially announced that a public meeting will be held Jan. 16 "to seek more efficient means" of reducing illegal quantities of sulfa drugs which have been showing up in the nation's pork supply.

Sources indicated last week that the government was about ready to talk over the problem with the swine industry and that a meeting was in the works for mid-January. The department announced the meeting Monday

In addition to department officials, the Food and Drug Administration also will be represented, Assistant Secretary Carol Tucker Foreman said.

The FDA has the responsibility of enforcing regulations to keep additives from exceeding specified limits, while the department is supposed to monitor meat supplies for the chemicals during meat and poultry






