Panhandle Parables Facing Fear With Faith Part 4

I am not a big fan of spiders. In fact, even though small they seem very fast thus adding to their terror. I have had a few encounters, never bitten mind you, but there is something about a spider that tends to make me move. So if you see me walking along and suddenly begin flailing my arms don't worry, I just happened into a spider web and am making sure I don't get trapped.

I guess you could say, I hate spiders. Hate is often the result of fear unchecked. We tend to hate what we fear and often we fear because we do not know. We make judgements, form racial opinions using broad stereotypical strokes of a brush that need not be in our hand. Jesus response to fear is walking in faith in love. Our hatred is often based on very narrow self-interpretation of things that many times are not true. We have seen it explode on the streets all across the U.S. By making police officers something to fear. Or religions that have radical expressions, or political parties or... We fear what they may or may not represent and before long hatred sets in and chaos follows. This is Satan doing his best work to make us afraid, because he knows that fear is a very powerful motivator. Yet God chose love as a key ingredient to responding to fear. If we are honest we know that love requires faith.

So my challenge for us as we move through September is to seek opportunities to show our faith in how we love. How we love can disarm the darkest enemy. John in 1 John says God is love and in Him there is no darkness at all. Real love covers sins, dispels the darkness where fear likes to lurk and shows us a better way. Paul would say, "a more excellent way."

Get to know your neighbors, grow in understanding and be patient. Life is way too short to hide from all that God can offer if we will face our fears with faith.



With 3 out 4 child car seats improperly installed, the Texas Department of Transportation encourages all caregivers to make an appointment for a free inspection at the agency's 25 statewide district offices. TxDOT reminds all Texans that properly restraining their children while riding in vehicles is an everyday, year-round responsibility. It's also the law.

"We are determined to educate parents and caregivers in Texas about the importance of buckling their child into the correct car seat for their age and size," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "It's not only the law, but we're also trying to save lives through proper use of safety seats."

As part of national Child Passenger Safety Week, Sept. 18-24, TxDOT reminds drivers that Texas law requires all children under 8 – unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches – to be in a car seat whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle. Failure to properly restrain a child can result in a ticket of up to \$250. In 2015, 83 children younger than 8 years old were killed in crashes in Texas. In 2014, that number was 81.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 3 out of 4 child car seats are not properly installed. Common child safety seat errors include: installing the seat too loosely; putting the harness straps through the wrong slots; leaving harness straps too loose; positioning the chest clip incorrectly; and using the wrong seat belt path.

Drivers should refer to their specific car seat manufacturer's manual for instructions on how to install the safety seat. The vehicle owner's manual also includes information on the proper placement of the car seat and proper use of the seat belt or LATCH system.
