Council approves budget, tax rate

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday September 12. Councilwoman Nancy Davis was not present. Mayor Rick White presided.

Two public hearings had been advertised for comments on the fiscal year 2016-2017 budget and property tax rate. No members from the public were present for comments.

The budget of \$4,434,630 and the 0.7512 tax rate were both approved. The budget includes \$131,780 for the Friona Economic Development Corporation. Some discussions are being held on securing a grant to build restrooms at the Reeve Lake playground. A part of the FEDC budget is to contribute to the construction but any fi-

nal decision is and receiving grant funds is still in process.

Friona Police Sgt. Jesus San Miguel gave a police activity report. In August they made 25 arrests, made 191 traffic stops, issued 79 citations and 110 warnings. There was a total of 363 calls for service to the police and EMS in August.

A new warning siren has

been purchased and is awaiting delivery. The siren will be placed at the Redeemer Center at 13th and Virginia.

City hall will be closed September 30 to allow employees to close the current fiscal year books. They will answer the telephone that day. A variance for a carport at 1608 James St. was approved.

A bid from Fortenberry Roofing for a new roof on the fire department was awarded. The bid amount was \$88,700. For more details on the city business see the Mayor's Minutes on page two.

The next meeting of the city council will be Monday, October 3 at 6:30 p.m. All council meetings are open to the public.

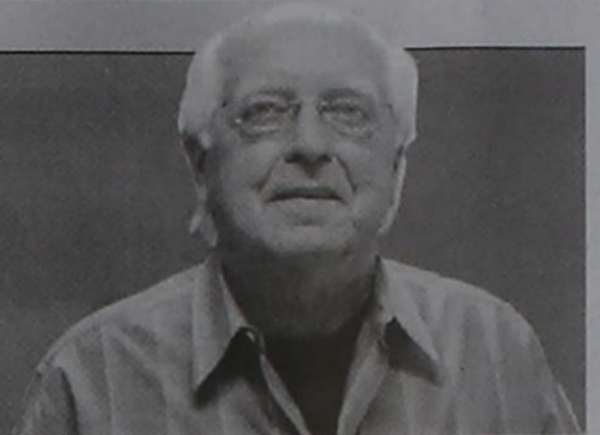

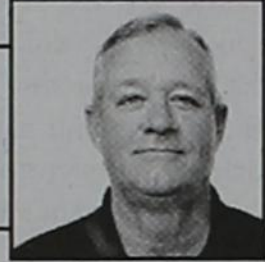
powerful political insight

Mayor's Minutes

Greetings! The city council has approved the budget for this coming year. The total budget for 2016-2017 is set at \$4,434,630. This includes the General Fund, Water and Sewer Fund, Interest and Sinking Fund, Operations and Maintenance Fund and Friona Economic Development Fund. We have been blessed with rain in the past couple of weeks and everything is green and beautiful. With the rain, the weeds are growing and need to be controlled. Please mow your weeds. Your help is greatly appreciated. Public Works employees have done a great job this summer. They have been short-handed for the past couple of months and have stepped up and worked hard to fill the void. The city is in the process of hiring another person in the near future. Thanks

again for your dedication and hard work. The aerator at Reeve Lake stopped working and a new one has been purchased and replaced. The pump was out of commission approximately two weeks and the water turned green. Chemicals have been purchased and the water is being treated. There has been concern about the emergency sirens whether all residents are able to hear the siren when the need arises. A siren will be placed in the same block as the Redeemer Center. This will aid in notifying the residents in the north area of the city of any emergency situation. Judge Campbell had 88 new cases and 19 juvenile cases in August. There were three cases dismissed and 41 cases pleaded guilty. Fines collected were \$8,563.97 and total court

cost equaled \$2,831.03. The Emergency Medical Service was very busy in August. They responded to 34 calls. There were 13 calls for 9-1-1, 16 transfers and 5 calls were "no transport". The payments collected equaled \$16,779.93. The Volunteer Fire Department responded to seven emergency calls in August. There were three wrecks and four fires reported. The wrecks were located 1/2 mile south on Highway 60, another in front of 4-Way Pump on Highway 60 and a wreck at 5th and Grand Streets. The fires consisted of two hay fires, a trailer fire and a right-of-way fire 3 miles east on Highway 60. The Fire Department roof will be replaced in this year's budget. Bids have been received and the city council awarded the bid to Fortenberry

Roofing Company, Littlefield, TX. The bid was \$88,700. Chief Jimenez and the police department responded to 353 calls in August. There were 191 stops made, 110 warnings issued, 79 citations handed out and 23 arrests, 8 no drivers license, 5 warrants issued, 1 driving while intoxicated, 1 driving under influence(minor), 1 unlawful restraint, 1 public intoxication, 2 theft, 2 burglary of building and 1 reckless driving. The patrolmen drove 4644 miles protecting our city. The city accounts payable equaled \$334,334.07 for August. All bills are paid, keeping our city in good standing. The Friona Public Library was visited by 1067 patrons, an average of 48 per day, and was open for business for 22 days in August. There were 162 new items added to the

inventory and 1067 items circulated. The Friends of the Library met in early September to make new plans for the new year. Congratulations to the Friona Public Library for being recognized by the Chamber of Commerce as Business of the Month for September. Your Mayor

Here at the Star office we have had a front row seat for the Milk House Market

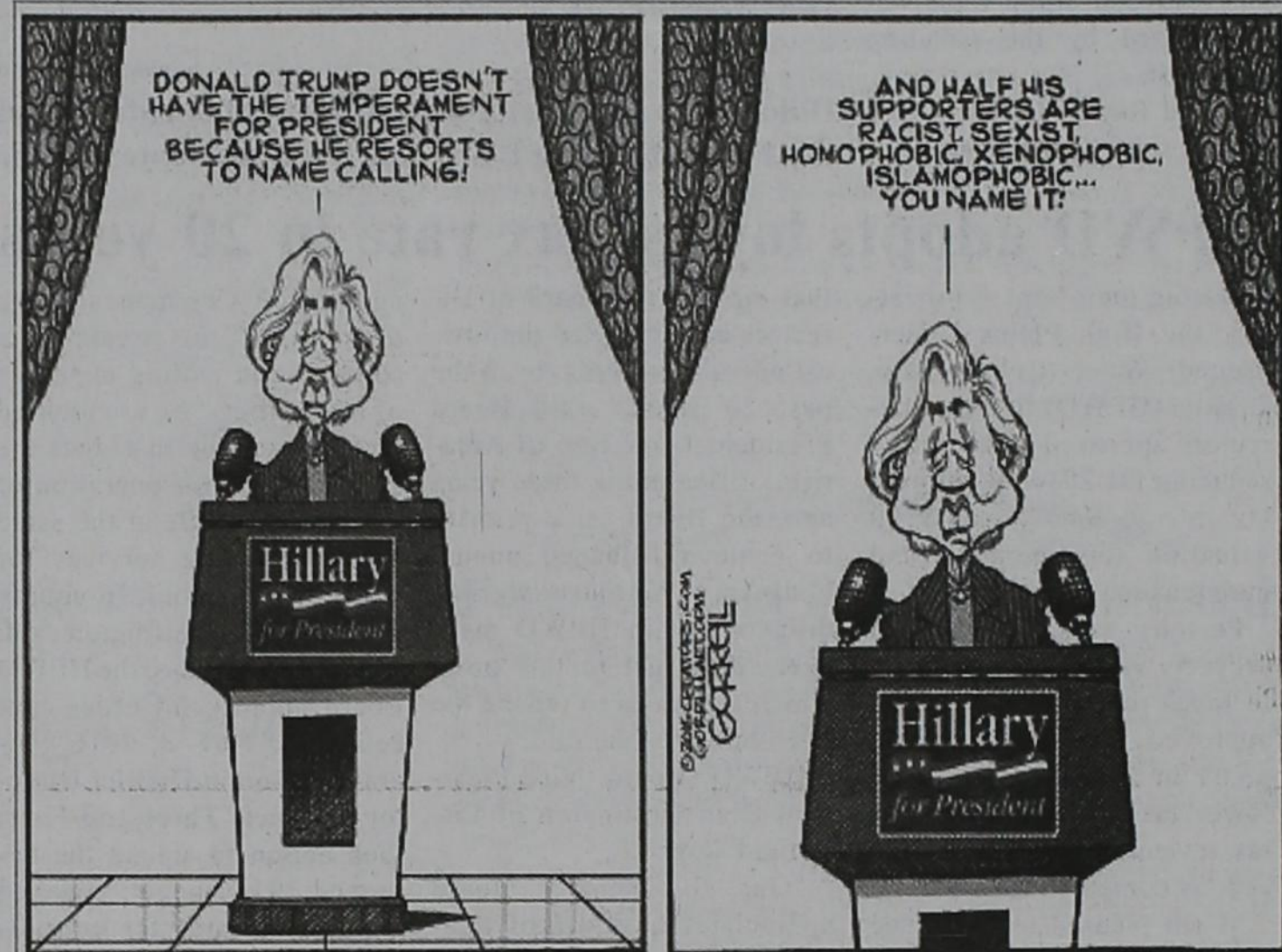

A time when my biggest worry was what flavor of popsicle I would get from the ice cream man.

I am LONG past that time in my life but I miss it occasionally when life gets too overwhelming and there doesn't seem to be enough hours in the day to get everything done.

As Mr. Cricket continues his opera, I am taken back to vacations spent in Arkansas on my Aunt Eula and Uncle Carl's farm. They lived on top of a mountain with their land surrounding their little farmhouse. They were so rural that they did not have indoor plumbing until the mid-70's. Their

closest neighbor was about five miles away on a one-lane dirt road.

We would go for family reunions and stay in our camper in their backyard. I guess it was their backyard. Their house was surrounded by fields of corn and blackberry brambles. Aunt Eula always had a garden just outside her backdoor and whatever you ate at her table she had grown. The meat that she served was raised or hunted by Uncle Carl.

And, you guessed it, they always had crickets chirping around their house. Aunt Eula would hum while she worked around the house and the crickets were her backup singers.

I had another aunt and uncle in Arkansas that lived on the river. Capt. John was our favorite uncle because he could spin a yarn about being a riverboat captain that made you believe you were there with him on the mighty Mississippi River. Aunt Ruby passed away when I was little so I don't really remember her but she must have been a pretty awesome lady because Capt. John always included her in his stories.

They lived on the river and had a screened-in porch that you could see the river from all angles. When we would stay there, we would beg to sleep on that porch. The breeze coming off the river was cool on a summer day and the crickets and frogs gave a serenade throughout the night while the fireflies danced to their chorus outside that screen.

Those aunts and uncles have gone on to a better place but they left me with the most vivid memories of being a child and learning to enjoy the simpler things in life which include the free music provided by the chirping of the crickets.

HPWD adopts lowest tax rate in 20 years

During their Sept. 13 meeting, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) Board of Directors approved a resolution reducing the 2016 ad valorem tax rate to \$.0075 per \$100 valuation for operation and maintenance of the district.

Persons with \$100,000 in property value will pay \$7.50 in taxes to HPWD under the approved rate, compared to \$8.03 in 2015. Overall, the lower tax rate will decrease tax revenue by about six percent as compared to 2015.

"I am pleased to announce

that the HPWD Board of Directors have adopted the lowest ad valorem tax rate in the past 20 years," said Board President Lynn Tate of Amarillo. "Beginning three years ago, the Board set a priority to achieve balanced annual budgets. We have worked diligently with HPWD management to get to this point which allows us to reduce the 2016 tax rate," he said.

HPWD Board Vice-President Brad Heffington of Littlefield agreed.

"Our five-member Board appreciates the efforts of Man-

ager Jason Coleman and the district staff in streamlining services and cutting expenses of the district. We are pleased that we are able to reduce the 2016 tax rate for operation of the district, while at the same time, improving services for constituents in our 16-county service area," Heffington said.

In other business, the HPWD Board adopted an order canceling the Nov. 8, 2016 general election in District Director Precincts Three and Four; took action to amend the approved 2016 budget; engaged Half Associates for consulting services to upgrade the district's SQL database; and heard a presentation concerning HPWD supported Dockum Aquifer research from Dr. Venkatesh Uddameri, P.E., director of the Texas Tech University Water Resources Center.

Created in 1951 by local residents and the Texas Legislature, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District is charged with the responsibility of conserving, preserving, protecting, and preventing the waste of groundwater within its 16-county service area. It celebrates its 65th anniversary in 2016.

Free car seat inspections offered

With 3 out of 4 child car seats improperly installed, the Texas Department of Transportation encourages all caregivers to make an appointment for a free inspection at the agency's 25 statewide district offices. TxDOT reminds all Texans that properly restraining their children while riding in vehicles is an everyday, year-round responsibility. It's also the law.

"We are determined to educate parents and caregivers in Texas about the importance of buckling their child into the correct car seat for their age and size," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "It's not only the law, but we're also trying to save lives through proper use of safety seats."

As part of national Child Passenger Safety Week, Sept. 18-24, TxDOT reminds drivers that Texas law requires all children under 8 - unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches - to be in a car seat whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle. Failure to properly restrain a child can result in a ticket of up to \$250. In 2015, 83 children younger than 8 years old were killed in crashes in Texas. In 2014, that number was 81.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 3 out of 4 child car seats are not properly installed. Common child safety seat errors include: installing the seat too loosely; putting the harness straps through the wrong slots; leaving harness straps too loose; positioning the chest clip incorrectly; and using the wrong seat belt path.

Drivers should refer to their specific car seat manufacturer's manual for instructions on how to install the safety seat. The vehicle owner's manual also includes information on the proper placement of the car seat and proper use of the seat belt or LATCH system.

To schedule a free car seat check with a nearby TxDOT Traffic Safety Specialist, text the word "seat" and your ZIP code to 876526. Drivers also may visit SaveMeWithASeat.com to learn if a child should be in a rear-facing seat, forward-facing seat or booster seat.

During Child Passenger Safety Week, a TxDOT safety demonstration van will travel the state to show caregivers how to choose and install the correct car seat for their child. TxDOT also is conducting special local celebrity story times featuring the newly released children's book, "Bernard in the Backseat." The book features a lovable teddy bear taking his first car ride. A free digital version of the book is available at SaveMeWithASeat.com.

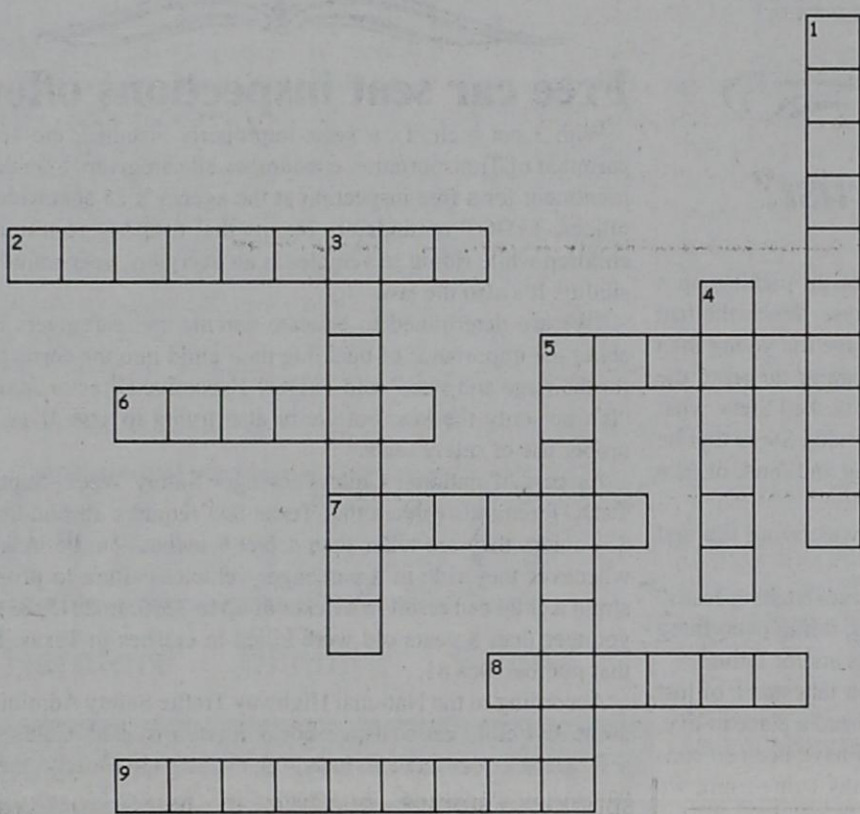
Monreal completed 14 of 20 passes, connecting with leading receiver Jonathan Hernandez on 8 passes for 74 yards. Santiago caught 4 for

AgriLife sets Swisher County Cotton Field Tour

The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service and the Swisher County Ag Committee will host the Swisher County Cotton Field Day on Sept. 29 at Kress.

John Villalba, AgriLife Extension agent in Swisher County, said registration will begin at 8 a.m. at the Bayer FiberMax Cotton Trial located 3 miles south of Kress on County Road DD off of the west Interstate 27 frontage road.

"Cotton is the No. 1 cash crop in Swisher County and though many producers faced tough decisions during planting, based on prices and other issues, the cotton

crop here is in good shape," Villalba said.
