

# City Council awards ag lease, lets bids

The Friona city council met in regular session Monday July 11. Mayor pro-tem Greg Lewellen presided in the absence of Mayor Rick White. All other council members were present.

City manager Patricia Phipps swore in Municipal Judge Deborah Campbell for a two-year term, 2016-2018. The public hearing for comments on the drinking water quality report drew no public comments.

Police Chief Isidro Jimenez gave his department report. They made 18 arrests in June, three of them felonies. Officers made 81 stops and issued 42 citations.

They issued six citations for no driver license. There were 244 calls for service in June. Chief introduced the newest officer Micah Muerer, who is currently in training with other officers.

During the financial statement review city manager Phipps said the Friona EMS has made 297 runs so far in 2016. The council received three bids for the agricultural lease of 160 acres. The bid was awarded to Wyly Farms who submitted the high bid of \$25.00 per acre.

Holly Campbell and Andy Alexander were officially appointed to the board of the Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) replacing board members Robert Jones and Ron Davenport. Council members authorized the city manager to advertise for water plant generator bids. The bid notice is in this Star. Also a notice of public hearing on city zoning is included in this Star and will be held at the council meeting August 8, 2016.

A motion to cast Friona's vote for Eddie Edwards of Borger to the Texas Municipal League board was approved. James Edwards of AirMedCare gave a presentation on the membership plan for \$65.00 per year to cover the cost of Life-Star medical transfer. He told the council the average cost of a medical airlift is \$35,000 and the \$65.00 per year covers all members of the household. The city will make the plan available to employees but not cover the cost.

Council members were made aware of an official zoning plan that will be presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission at a meeting August 3 at 1:30 p.m. then to the council's August 8 meeting.

For more details about city business see the Mayor's Minutes on page two. The next meeting of the city council will be Monday August 8, 2016. All council meetings are open to the public.



#### Dear Editor,

Many of us in this community are concerned about the Hub intersection and its long history with major traffic accidents. The fatal accident July 7 prompted us to explore what other safety measures could be taken to prevent future occurrences of this magnitude.

Jamie Lewellen arranged for Channel 10's Shannon Smith to interview Becky Riethmayer and registered nurse Lynn Nelson in Friona last Friday. Leslie Ware started an and warning signs are inadequate. The north-south vehicles are traveling at least 75 miles per hour, without a reduced speed limit as they approach the intersection. There is no turning lane, and some cars waiting to turn have been hit or pushed into traffic from behind.

Hopefully, TxDOT will look further into the safety of this intersection and take into consideration the additional traffic brought on by wind farm development, the fairly new dairies, and grain transport. 

Judge Campbell had 53 new cases and 1 new juvenile case filed in June. There were 32 case trials held. Court cost equaled \$2,035.09 with \$4,096.03 collected in fines. Judge Campbell was sworn in as Municipal Court Judge for a two-year term 2016 to 2018. We are pleased to have Judge Campbell serve two more years. She has done a great job and we want to thank her for her commitment and dedication.

The swimming pool generated way 214) and at the intersection \$2,767 in June. There were 271 adults and 280 children swim-Emergency Medical Service ming in June. The city did have an issue with the motor that circulates the chemicals in the pool. There was a need to close the pool until the motor could be ordered and replaced. We apologize for the inconvenience. The cost to replace the motor was approximately \$10,000.

The city pumped 21,375,300 gallons of water, sold \$19,297,000 gallons of water and collected \$83,238.29 on 1441 accounts.

The city accounts payable to-

taled \$144,389.60 for the month of June. The money spent pays our bills and keeps us in good standings.


Chief Jimenez and the police department responded to 282 calls in June. There were a total of 82 stops, 46 warnings issued, 42 citations handed out and 18 arrests (6-no drivers license, 4-warrants, 1-criminal mischief, 1-assault causing bodily injury to a family member, 1-driving while intoxicated, 3-possession of a controlled substance, 1-possession of marijuana and 1-public intoxication). The patrol officers drove a total of 4304 miles protecting our city.

The city will continue to spray for mosquitoes during the calm evenings. The mosquito population has been down due to the lack of rain. Looks like the hot dry weather will continue for several days.

The grant cycle for State CDBG grants has begun. We are applying for two different grants. One grant is to continue the water line replacement towards the Pierce tower and the other grant is for Reeve Lake. We will try to add bathrooms or concrete the walking paths. Not a guarantee that we will receive money for either of the grants, but it is important for us to try. Panhandle Regional Planning Commission will be a assisting us in the application process. James Edwards, a representative from AirMedCare, spoke to the city council Monday evening about the cost of a medical helicopter flight and snake bite venom. He said the average cost now of a helicopter transfer to Amarillo or Lubbock is \$35,000, up from \$25,000 last year. He told the council that the LifeStar helicopters no longer carry snake bite medicine on board. He said one dose of snake bite antidote costs from \$12,000 to \$15,000 and it takes four doses.

He proposed offering the AirMedCare helicopter plan to city employees. For \$65 per year all members of your household are covered. The plan pays the airlift cost that is not covered by your health insurance. I have the plan and the card in my wallet. You should definitely have this. It has already paid off for several local residents. Pick up an application at PMC. There is no medical exam just a few questions. It's easy. Go do it.







# **Psalm 5-God & Guidance**

Do you want God's protection and guidance? Most people definitely want God's protection, but are not that interested in His guidance. Psalms 5 flows from a heart that is rejoicing in God's protection and ready to follow His guidance.

When seeking God's protection and guidance you must come to terms with the reality that they are not divorced from His character. When one separates God's character from His blessings you get Santa Clause and simply a god of your own making. Four aspects of God's character are crucial in this Psalm. First, God hears us, which is great when you are praying, but terrifying when you are cussing, gossiping or taking the Lord's name in vain. It is terrifying because God is holy, as stated in verse 4, "For you are not a God who delights in wickedness; evil may not dwell with you." God is not applauding the LGBT movement today, or the sin in your life, but He hates it with an eternal, holy wrath. Next, notice that although God is holy and you are not, He will lead you, but the question is "Will you follow?"

Finally, the Psalm ends with the promise of God's protection and blessing for a select group. This select group is the godly, or righteous, which is simply those who are right with God. Being right with God exposes your sinfulness, leads you to the cross and the empty tomb, and offers forgiveness full and free in Jesus Christ.





# Hub accident results in fatality Thursday

Another tragic accident at the dangerous intersection of Hwy 86 and 214, the Hub intersection, on Thursday morning July 7 resulted in the death of an 8-year-old boy from Clovis. Here is the official report of the accident from the DPS office:

This morning (July 7) at approximately 8:00 a.m. there was a single fatality resulting from a crash at the intersection of Hwy 86 & 214 east of Bovina. A 2015 Toyota minivan driven by Nita Patel, 37-year-old from Clovis, NM was eastbound on Hwy 86.

Patel failed to yield the right of way at the

stop sign and pulled out in front of a 2016 Kenworth 18-wheeler traveling south on Hwy 214. The truck was driven by Mario Mena, 44, from Hereford.


The minivan had six passengers including two young children. At impact an 8-year-old was ejected and killed. All passengers from the minivan were transported with non-life threatening injuries to a local hospital. The truck rolled onto its driver side after impact causing the driver minor injuries. He too was transported. Everyone in the minivan was wearing their seatbelts, as was Mena.
