Mize is retired from the position of Bereavement Coordinator with Hospice of the Southwest and is currently the pastor at Fellowship of Believer's Church in Hereford, Texas. As I was reading the paperwork, I felt like I was listening to the woman on the car insurance commercial that asks if you have read all 21 pages of your policy. Blah! Blah! Blah! Blah!

The national news keeps reporting that Obamacare is about dead. If that is true, will the penalty be taken away as well? Will insurance companies rethink their position and somehow make insurance more affordable for those of us that just get by on the minimum?

I see people everyday that have to choose between paying their monthly bills and premiums or giving up the essentials such as food, water, etc.

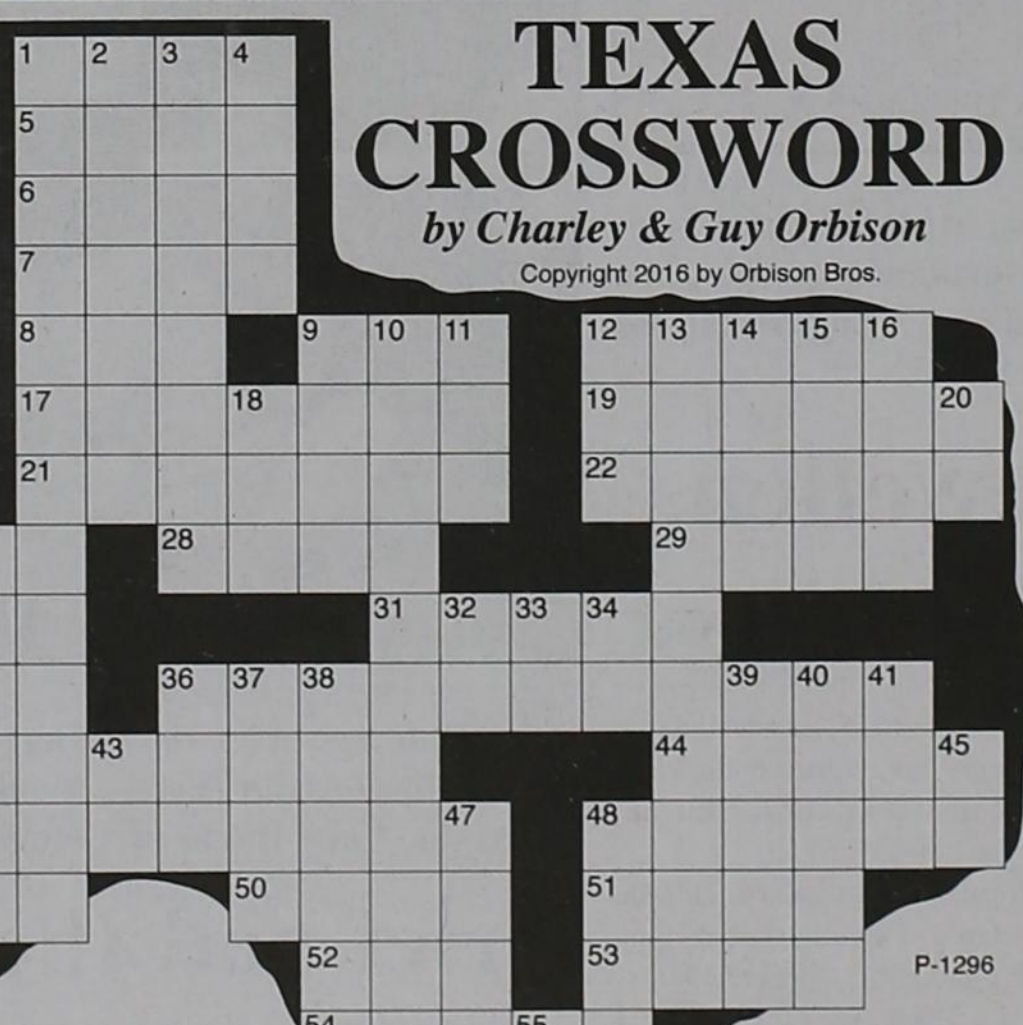

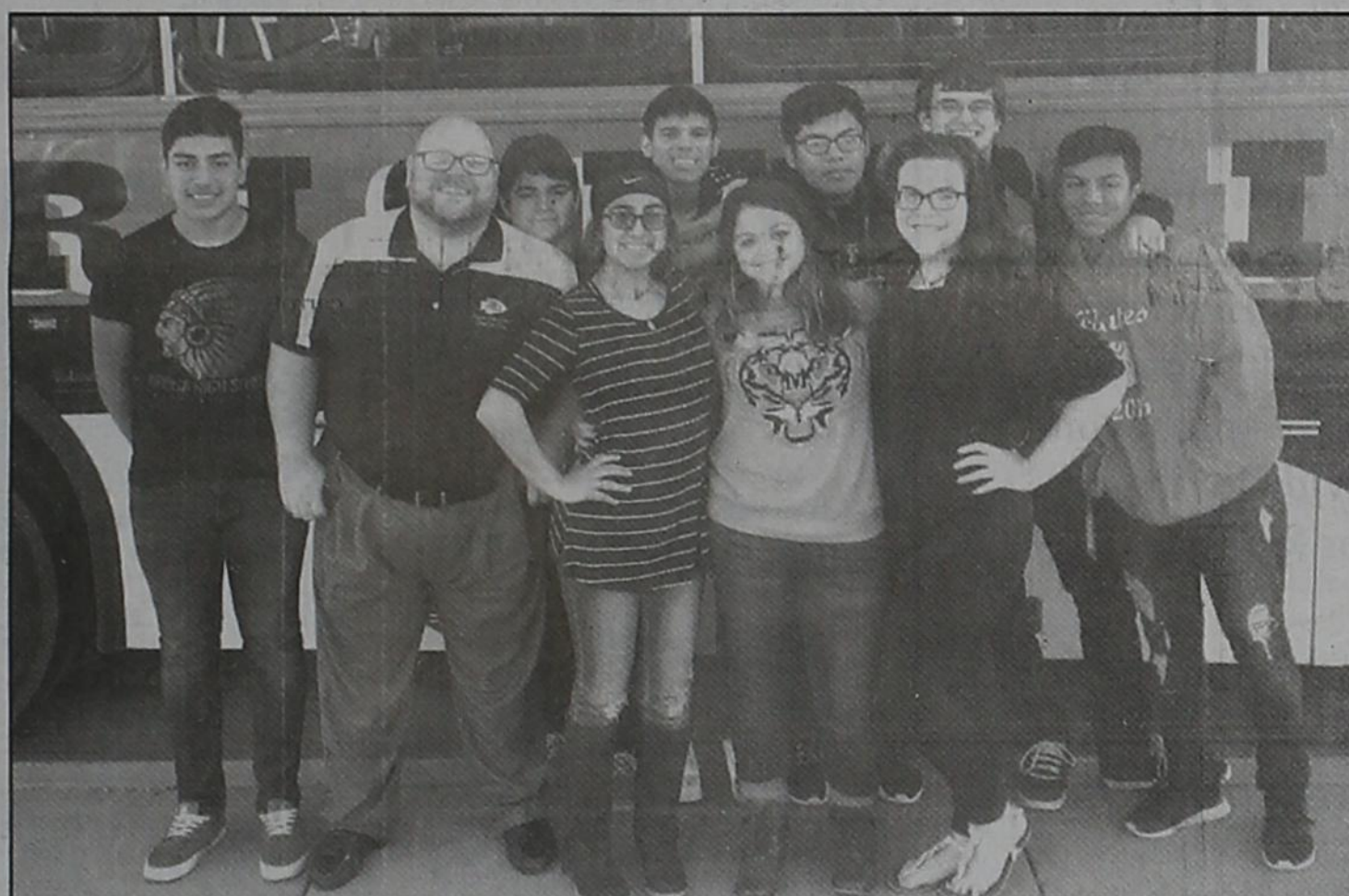
The resident of the month for November is Dora Parson. The employee of the month is Marta Reyes. She works in the dietary department and has been employed since June 2013.

FHS Choir students named to All-Region

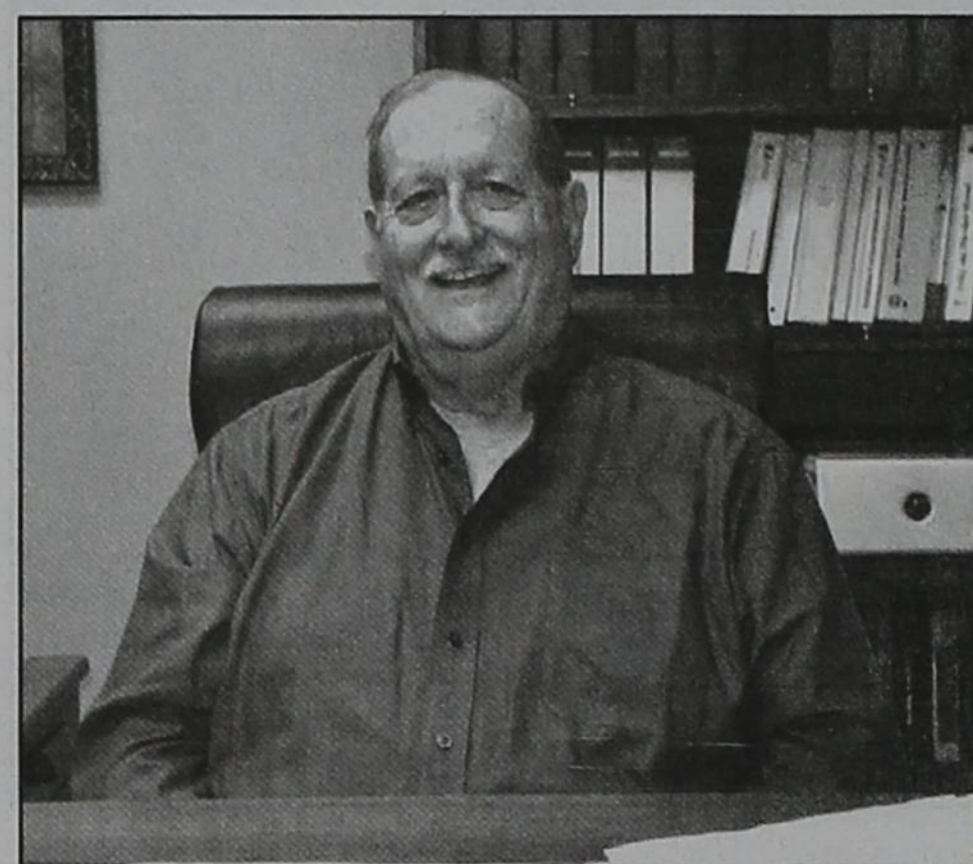
Auditions for the All-Region Choir were held Saturday, October 29 at Randall High School. Nine FHS students auditioned.

What is the Electoral College?

Which state has the most electoral votes according to the 2010 census? California at 55. Texas is next at 38. Florida and New York each have 29 and Illinois and Pennsylvania each have 20. See a pattern?

Battlegrounds: The candidates go after the states with the most electoral votes first. Ohio 18, Georgia, 16, Michi-

gan 16, North Carolina 15, New Jersey 14, Virginia 13, Washington 12, Arizona 13, Massachusetts, Tennessee and Wisconsin 10---six have only 3 each, including Washington DC which is allowed for purposes of voting in the presidential election, even though it is not a state. If a candidate can garner enough of the high-

er count states, then they don't need the less populous states... although they would certainly take them.

These numbers are determined by the number of senators from each state or 2 each or equal and the number of representatives from each state determined by population of each state. These votes are legally assigned to electors who are then bound by law to vote according to how their state's election results went to certify the nation's vote in what we call the Electoral College.

Because the popular votes are first tallied or counted and if a majority is determined, in most states, it is 'winner takes all' of the state's official electoral votes. A couple of states distribute proportionately. Therefore, it is possible to win by a narrow margin in the popular vote, and because of the winner takes all, to take a more decisive win in the electoral college or official result.

There are 538 electoral votes and the magic number needed to win is 270 electoral votes. Have you heard that number lately?

News from the week of November 6, 1958

*Friona Deflates Farwell... Staging one of the greatest rallies of their history, the Friona Chiefs spotted the Farwell Steers 12 points and came from behind to snatch away a victory of 15-12 over Farwell Friday night.

In a game which was called "Parmer County's answer to the Texas-Oklahoma series" by the Farwell State Line Tribune, the game was marked down in Frionan's books as one of the greatest comebacks in many years.

*Dr. A. Hope Owen, president of Wayland Baptist College at Plainview, will be the guest speaker at groundbreaking ceremonies for a new \$68,000 educational addition to the First Baptist Church of Friona Sunday afternoon.

*Well over \$13 million will be added to the gross receipt of Parmer County area farmers this fall, as they wind up history's most fruitful grain sorghum harvest.

The total production will be somewhere in the neighborhood of 15,000,000 bushels.
