




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Squaw volleyball final update

Chiefs slam Slaton 76-59

Friona and Slaton entered the final game of the season with 0-4 district records. The loser would claim last place in district.

The Chiefs and the Tigers both put on an offensive show but the Chiefs survived to win 76-59. Coach Daniel Rosales provided these stats from the game: Luis Trejo set the school record for most rushing yards in a game with 359 yards. The previous record was 312 yards by Eddy Garcia. The 76 points was the second highest points scored in Friona football history. The record is 79 points set in 1934.

Coach Rosales points out the Chiefs record of 4-6 is the most wins in seven seasons. Total points scored this season was 268, the most points scored since the 8-4 season in 2009. With 2,793 rushing yards, 1,066 passing yards, and a total of 3,809 offensive yards, it is the most offensive yards in each category in the past 7 seasons.

Trejo scored 6 touchdowns on 32 carries. Marco Monreal, Salvador Santiago, Sergio Flores, and Joel Cigarroa also scored touchdowns. Monreal carried 15 times for 152 yards and Flores 10 times for 99 yards. Monreal completed 8 of 16 passes for 120 yards and one touchdown. Leading receiver Jonathan Hernandez caught 6 passes for 86 yards.

For the season Trejo carried 152 times for 1,043 yards and 10 touchdowns. Monreal carried 150 times for 707 yards and 10 touchdowns. Hernandez had 48 pass receptions for 654 yards and two touchdowns. Monreal completed 85 passes on 154 attempts for 1,046 yards and 4 TDs.

Monday as at least one fatality has occurred each and every day on Texas roadways since Nov. 7, 2000. In an effort to end this deadly 16-year streak, the Texas Department of Transportation, through its #EndTheStreakTX campaign, reminds drivers to stay alert, obey traffic laws and take personal responsibility behind the wheel.

"Every day for the past 16 years, somebody has lost a spouse, child, friend or neighbor on Texas roadways," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "These deadly crashes are a sobering reminder that we must do everything in our power to stay focused and safe while driving. We can stop this staggering streak if every driver makes it a priority to be safe, led focused and responsible. Let's end the streak."

To help raise awareness of this tragic, daily statistic, TxDOT is asking people to change their social media profile pictures to the black image available for download here. Throughout November, Tx-DOT's social media pages will share facts and information about the last 16 years of roadway fatalities

The Lone Star State marks a deadly milestone on and invite Texans to publicly show their commitment to ending the streak of deadly days by sharing these posts with the hashtag #EndTheStreakTX. TxDOT also will invite the public to share personal stories of loved ones lost in car crashes on its social media pages using photo and video testimonials with the hashtag #EndTheStreakTX.

Since Nov. 7, 2000, fatalities resulting from motor vehicle crashes on Texas roadways have numbered 55,578. The leading causes of fatalities continue to be failure to stay in one lane, alcohol and speed.

To decrease the chances of roadway crashes and fatalities, TxDOT reminds drivers to:

Buckle seatbelts - all passengers need to be buck-

Pay attention - put phone away and avoid distrac-

Never drink and drive - drunk driving kills; get a

sober ride home Drive the speed limit – always follow speed limits and drive slower speeds when weather or conditions
